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Correspondence From Over The County.

RUIDOSO ROUND-UPS.

The news from the Ruidoso is limited this time, but I will give what there is and finish up on our neighboring settlements. Every thing on the Doso is running smoothly, even the wind storms, which about three days out of the week, keep the atmosphere filled with hats, old shoes, overalls, stovepipe, tin buckets, raw hide, dead cats and lots of other useful things. A new post office on the Doso named "Glencoe" has been established recently with Miss Annie Coe as Post Master. Tri-weekly, if we don't get it this week we will try again next week.

Our school under charge of Miss Pearl Burditt of Tularosa, will close in two weeks more. Miss Burditt has given good satisfaction and is a good teacher. The new school house at the junction of the Bonito and Doso rivers is nearing completion and when completed will be the best in the county except White Oaks and Capitan, and will be a credit to the large community in which it stands; much credit is due for this school building to the public spirit of such men as Santiago Gonzales, J. S. Williamson and Rufus Donahue, residents of that district.

The corn and oats of the large crop of this valley last year have all, or nearly all, been marketed. The apple crop has also been disposed of at good prices, a very little being left and that will probably all go before the close of March. A large proportion of our winter apples have been shipped to El Paso and other points. The White Winter Pearmain has found its way to, not only El Paso, but many other points in Texas. Estey City, Alamogordo, Socorro and into Arizona, Denver and several points in Mexico, Missouri and Ohio; and so far as heard from was praised for its fine quality.

It seems that our products reach perfection here in the rich soil of New Mexico without statehood, and according to Mr. Rodey, our delegate to congress, if we only had statehood us clodhoppers would all become bloated millionaires in spite of ourselves.

"Work for statehood" is the cry from many of our people in New

Mexico. I wonder if Mr. Rodey has read up on the statutes of New Mexico, old and new. Mr. J. Y. Hewitt, a few years since while conducting the EAGLE, gave us quite a lot of twaddle and nonsense from our statutes to show how badly we didn't need statehood, I have not heard of any of that stuff being repealed. The people of New Mexico are no doubt judged by their laws, by the national congress, and the decision of that body up to date has been, and justly so, "not quite ready". How much better is some of our new laws. The new game laws give our northern counties one month earlier to commence killing game than the southern counties. Why should not such a law apply alike to a state? What was the motive? Ask the game clubs of Santa Fe and Las Vegas. Our legislators must do as they are bid or get no pie. Every calling, almost is represented in the lobby at Santa Fe when the legislature meets, clamorous for some "special cut."

I would suggest that our next legislature have a nice building erected in Santa Fe, furnished and equipped specially for "our lobby", to be paid for out of any money not yet used for monuments to "our fallen heroes". Our legislature is O.K. but if our next would waste all its time on repealing business, the nonsense and absurdities are sufficient to occupy all their time, it might be in order then to talk statehood, but our man Rodey is very persistent before the congressional committee and they may be like the girl marrying an objectionable suitor to get rid of him; we may get statehood yet if Rodey's wind holds out.

MONEY POWER IN GOVERNMENTS.

As time rolls on, the fact of Governments being dominated by money power shows a falling off of their ability to protect their institutions and their life as Governments.

A pitiable example to start with is Great Britain. A Cecil Rhodes has brought down upon the heads of the honest Yeomanry of that country, a disgrace deeply dyed with the blood of its best citizens to satisfy the greed for money. A retrospective view will take us back along these lines to the Once Great-Roman Empire. And to resume with later evidence we feel the unsettled status of republics from the same cause. When patriotism is scoffed at and the "people be damned" idea prevails, the danger line is about reached. When liberty-loving people find these conditions hovering over them, they begin to ask themselves; what is the cause of this? Then a volume of explanation comes in the carefully prepared guise of what we call politics, and the deluded enquirer is told that he is partly responsible for it himself.

The genius of our government was conceived by the framers of it, and grew out of the sore needs of human liberty.

And our Constitution and Bill of rights cannot be improved upon by the tangents of any political faith leading away from it. "The greatest good to the greatest number" and "All Governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed" are the brightest stars in the galaxy of the American Constitution. We love money as the legitimate reward of labor and enterprise, and believe in its concentration for general good, but we equally despise its use to stifle the manhood and pride of Americans. When our poor factory men and mechanics in the east are given the word, by implication, so strongly that it makes them tremble, that they had better vote a certain way, they do the bidding, thinking of poor wife and children that will suffer if they disobey. And if don't stop there. They are tampering with the hinges of the "strong box" of America, in meddling with foreign helpless people, by chipping off a little Americanism in shape of the "Monroe Doctrine".

Will money fight the battles of our country? "Not much". Money will do its part, but who pays it? Is it the men who precipitate the fight, or the men who fight it? It is paid by a war tax, and taxation never reaches the traitorous money in hiding.

Pointers To The Fraternity.

Between 400 and 500 miles of projected railroads will be finished by the end of this year in New Mexico. The outlook for railroad building for the year 1903 is also bright. New Mexico is evidently attracting the attention of the men who put capital into new railroads.—Santa Fe New Mexican.

Five hundred miles of railroad construction in 1902 means several million dollars added to the assessed valuation of New Mexico in 1903. The construction of the Rock Island road across this territory will swell the levy of this year by several millions, and this is only the beginning. And this railroad building is going on regardless of statehood, which is apparently still very far from us.

There is a pointer in these facts for the newspapers of the territory, who ought to be looking after the commercial development of New Mexico. Our daily papers, as well as the weekly publications, can well afford to give less space to politicians and more to the material welfare of the people in a business way. Just think what a paper, that would do for New Mexico what the Dallas News has done for Texas, would be worth now!

Too much politics and not sufficient business tactics will retard the prosperity of a whole people as well as that of an individual, and New Mexico is a fitting example of the truth of the statement.—Carlsbad Current.

Charles W. Clark prophesies that copper will go to 14 cts. immediately.

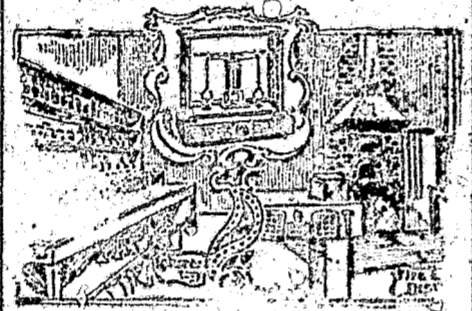
John M. Fritter, one of Grant county's most highly esteemed citizens died at the Lady's Hospital in Silver City, Feb. 28, of septicaemia.
