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PROSPECTOR 40 YEARS.

**Jerry Hockradle Cleans Up a
Little Fortune and Returns
to the Pacific Coast.**

IS GOING TO CALIFORNIA.

The El Paso Daily News obtained the following interview from Jerry Hockradle as he passed through El Paso en route to California:

"Jerry Hockradle, one of the oldest residents of New Mexico passed through this city today en route from his home at White Oaks, in Lincoln county, to San Diego. Though about 70 odd years of age, he is hale and hearty and a typical prospector, in appearance. He said to a News reporter today:

"Yes, guess I am the oldest resident of New Mexico, for I went there in '68 when there was nothing in that section but mountains wild animals and Indians, and there were plenty of the latter. I don't suppose it will do me any credit, to tell just how many red fellows I have dropped in my career, in fact I never kept track of them; but I will say this, that after we once got the Indians to knowing us we did have nearly so much trouble with them as we had with bad Whites and Mexican.

That was about the time that Pat Garrett first became known in that country, or rather when he first got a job as cow boy and deputy sheriff. We had just gone through with one war between Mexicans because I had sheltered their White enemies when the Kid came into prominence as a killer. He seemed to have the sheriff pretty well bluffed, and the people were getting pretty tired of him any way, when they came to me and wanted me to run for sheriff to clean him out. I said that I would not take the job under any circumstances, but told them there was a likely young fellow in a cow camp who was a deputy sheriff, named Pat Garrett, who could do the work. Then we had the convention and nominated Pat. And I will say that he made the best sheriff Lincoln county ever had.

"Now I am quitting New Mexico for good and am going over into the Mudy river country region on the railroad that Senator

Clark is building from Salt Lake City to Los Angeles. I passed over the country with a Mormon wagon train away back in '66 when I was coming east to New Mexico. The place is off the Mohave desert and when I passed over there there was alkali so thick on the ground that you could have skated on the crust. Then the water holes were 65, 72 and 85 miles apart as you came to them in crossing the desert to Mudy river, and was only at certain seasons when you could cross at all or get water, because the wild beasts would drink it before you would reach there. It was on this spot that we had a bloody battle with 150 Indians, Piutes. The Indians had stolen some of the horses which belonged to the Mormons I was traveling with, when the men of the party tried to recover them they took position on a rocky knoll and fired several volleys into the camp. Our party then made a detour and got behind the rock. After the smoke cleared away we found 19 redskins whom we buried the next morning. It was a narrow escape for us for there were only about six good guns among us. While we were passing over that section I saw some mineral stains and now that the railroad is being built through there it will be a fine place for prospecting. I expect to stop there on my way to San Diego and see what the stains amount to. Then when I reach San Diego I will get an outfit together and go to the peninsula of Lower California, where I understand there are some promising placers. I made a good stake out of the White Oaks claims and I hope will have good luck in that country. I know it is there for a cousin of mine told me that he got enough gold out of a flour sack full of dirt to buy several sacks of flour."

Politics and Other Things.

Mr. Lightfoot in the last issue of the Nogal Republican, comes boldly out as a defender of the republican county ticket, and in doing so, attacks a number of White Oaks democrats, including myself for the nomination of John W. Owen for Sheriff on the democratic ticket. Now so far as this tirade relates to myself, I care nothing, as every one who attended the primary convention both at White Oaks and Capitan, and the county convention at Lincoln, knows that my course in support of John Owen was

open and honorable. I supported Owen because I thought him a suitable man for the office and because I thought he could and would be elected; and for what I did in his support, I have no apology to offer.

The fact that the opposition resort to such unjust and dishonorable methods to defeat him, proves that Owen's friends knew what they were doing when they caused his nomination. If the editor of the Republican and those who are paying him to write such stuff as filled the columns of that paper last week, did not realize that the prospect of defeating Owen was hopeless, or nearly so, why would they indulge in such methods of campaigning? They cannot beat him by honorable methods, and so they attack his friends by insinuations of corrupt methods in securing his nomination, as though the Nogal Republican was the guardian of the interests of the democratic party. Every democrat who attended the primary convention at White Oaks, will say that every thing was absolutely fair; and all who attended the county convention will say the same. Owen was the strongest candidate and won the nomination as fairly as ever a nomination was won. Now, as for the Capitan primary, I understand there is some complaint among democrats because we combined the Owen and Thompson supporters to beat Mr. Whitesides. Now, this is what was done as I can prove, though Mr. Weiner had nothing to do with this arrangement as Lightfoot charges. I merely assisted Owen men at Capitan to bring about this result. We simply asked the Owen men to vote with the Thompson men in the primary. Now, if the opposition to Whitesides saw fit unite on some one candidate and thus defeat him, there is no reason why they should not do so. It is fair and just, as the opposition had a right to vote as they pleased. But, our republican friends are, or the Nogal Republican at least, is shocked because they say some persons voted in that primary who were not democrats, or not legal voters. Now, all I know about this is, that all who did vote in that convention claimed to be legal voters and said they were democrats and would support the democratic ticket at the election in November. Some of them are new comers and I know

nothing of their past political history, and I suppose if they choose to act with the democratic party that we will allow them to do so. However, if they are as thin skinned politically as the editor of the Republican, so soon as they find that the money and most of the offices are on the republican side, some of them at least may "Jin" and be whooping things up for the opposition two years hence. So the editor of that sheet ought to be patient with them 'til he learns what sort of democrats they are. It is only two or three months since the editor of the Republican said in his paper, "If we must have a democratic sheriff let it be John Owen." Now, after he has been "Seen", or had a vision, or nightmare, as the case may be, he turns loose his mud-slinger at every one who had any thing to do with Owen's nomination.

He also charges myself and others with circulating the report that R. D. Armstrong is an infidel. So far as this charge relates to myself, it is false; and I will further say that Mr. Armstrong is a gentleman and in my opinion, needs no defense from Lightfoot or his paper. I care nothing about his religious opinions. He has a right to any opinion he may entertain upon religion as well as politics. This is a matter that concerns church people only and I am not going to dictate to them in matters with which I am not concerned.

Again Lightfoot says, "J. E. Wharton needs John Owen in his business." I suppose he means by this to convey the idea that Owen might be useful to me in the defense of criminals by fixing juries and witnesses. As I once defended Lightfoot when he was under a serious charge, he may speak advisedly. I wish to say however, that I have never called Mr. Owen or any one else to aid me in the trial of a criminal case, and if I had thought John Owen could be used by me or any one else for any such purposes, I should not have supported him. I know he cannot be used to further any dishonorable purpose and that is one of my reasons for supporting him. The other is that I thought him our strongest candidate.

Now, I want to say to those Whitesides democrats who will vote against Owen, as Lightfoot intimates, that not one of them,

if any there be, holds Mr. Whitesides in higher regard than I do, and, if he remains a citizen of this county, he will have no stronger supporter than myself, should he again aspire to office and become an available candidate.

It is also charged by Lightfoot and others in the hope of injuring some of the democratic candidates, that three or four persons at White Oaks are trying to run the democratic party, as though four men could outvote six hundred. All this "Big Four" did was to attend the primary and county conventions and each cast one vote. Every other democrat in the county had the same privilege. If some stay away from the primary, they should not complain if they are not selected as delegates to the County Convention. If they are not interested enough to attend the primary, how do those present know they would attend the County Convention if chosen as delegates. Those who stay away from the primaries have no right to complain if they are not made delegates to the nominating conventions; and it looks like they are hard pressed for arguments when this is given as a reason why democrats should vote against the nominees.

Now in conclusion I beg the pardon of the EAGLE readers for having occupied so much space with trifling matters. However, the fact that such reasons are being urged to get democrats to vote against Owen and others, shows how desperate the opposition has become and how hard pressed they are for argument.

CAMPAIGN LIES.

The Nogal Republican publishes a statement to the effect that \$500 have been placed in the Exchange Bank of White Oaks to be paid to any one who can prove that the cattle companies have put up a money for the election of Armstrong. Then adds: "Now, let the Wharton crowd prove their statement and win this money or forever after hold their peace. The White Oaks gang is making this campaign on false representations. Among other things they charge R. D. Armstrong with being an infidel."

Now if this means any thing it is to show that Armstrong is not a company candidate. The Block company, the Bar W company and the V V company, are for Armstrong for sheriff and the Republican finding that the support of the companies was hurting Armstrong, publishes the above offer to hoodwink the people and make them think it is all a mistake and that the cattle companies are not doing a thing to elect Armstrong. Now, these companies are corporations and a corporation acts through its Board of Directors, and as they only meet once a year, it is likely that the Board have had no meeting and put up money to elect Armstrong. Therefore, the companies have put up no money; but how about those in charge of the ranches? Why don't they offer this \$500 to any one who will prove that the men in charge of the ranches, or stock holders of the companies, have put up any money, or offered to put up any, to elect Armstrong. If they will put the offer in that shape and put the money in the Bank, we will call the bluff.

Now, we don't care any thing about the companies or who they support. The men in charge of ranches have a right to vote as they please and to spend their money as they please. But they, or some of them, have been making a fight to beat John Owen and elect Armstrong. Now, do they wish to make the voters believe they have quit, and that they have no interest in the matter? It looks that way, or they would not put up \$500.00 to give to any one who will prove that the Companies have furnished money to elect Armstrong. They no doubt feel that their support is doing Armstrong no good and want to make the impression that they are not supporting him. But, why don't Lightfoot tell the truth and say the Companies have put up no money, but the officers and stock holders of some of the companies have done so, or offered to do so. But, no. He don't aim to even try to tell the truth. His object is to deceive voters, and this offer of \$500.00 is simply to deceive and for no other purpose.

Now, as for the charge that Owen's friends are making this campaign on false representation, why did he not show where the charge that Armstrong is an infidel, is false. Lightfoot again aims simply to deceive voters. Read the Republican of Oct. 16. He does not say Armstrong is not an infidel. He simply says that Owen's friends have charged Armstrong with being an infidel, that they are making this campaign on false charges. Now, so far as the "Wharton crowd" are concerned, they never told any church member, nor any one else that Armstrong was an infidel. They could have done so and told the truth, for the writer of this article has heard Mr. Armstrong express himself and knows him to be an infidel, or one who does not believe in the scriptures, but he has not told any body that such was the case for the purpose of influencing votes. He is not that sort of a politician, and besides it does not disqualify Mr. Armstrong for the office for which he is a candidate; and as we have said before, this is only a matter that interests the church people, and we merely make this reply to the statements published in the Nogal Republican in defense of Mr. Langston, and other church people, who oppose Mr. Armstrong on account of his religious views, and to show that if they have said Armstrong was an infidel that they did not make a false representation as charged by Lightfoot; but simply stated what nearly every one in White Oaks knows to be true. We regret the necessity now for having to make the above statement, and we hope it will influence no one to vote against Armstrong, for a man's religious opinions should not be considered so far as his qualifications for office are concerned. His fitness to discharge the duties of the office and his character as a man are all that need be considered.

MORE CAMPAIGN LIES.

Lightfoot, in the Nogal Republican, says that Sol C. Wiener did not have the courage to attend the democratic primary, but waited till the Owen men got control and then came in.

Wiener was present and was elected a delegate to the county convention. As he was a candidate and supported by both sides in attendance at the primary, he did not participate in the fight for delegates, and was not expected to do so.

"It is reported that the White Oaks ring have asked Sanger to withdraw from the race for commissioner because he refused to contribute to their campaign fund."—Nogal Republican.

The truth is Mr. Sanger resigned of his own accord. He was never asked to resign by any body and Lightfoot knows it.

"The Wharton crowd are howling because W. G. McDonald refuses to support their part of the democratic ticket."—Nogal Rep.

If the editor of the EAGLE is one of the Wharton crowd referred to, our answer is: We are democrats; and if Mr. McDonald is against any of the democratic ticket, he is against our part of it, it is all ours in this regard and we have no desire to part it, but like it as a whole. McDonald refuses." What the dickens do the "Wharton crowd" care who McDonald supports. He is probably looking after his own affairs will vote for and support whom he pleases. If any body has ill used or abused him on this account, we have failed to hear of it, and as for howling, the under dog usually does that, and from the ring of the bark, Lightfoot is making he must think it is his time to howl.

"Ellis, Coe Chavez and Baca are being traded off right and left in the interest of the Big Four ring of White Oaks."—Nogal Republican.

Every candidate whose name is mentioned knows this is absolutely false and voters know it is made to hurt John Owen. Oh no! The opposition to Owen are not hard up for argument to use against him! They are not anxious at all. All this desperation is their usual demeanor—like thunder! They simply realize they are gone, and like drowning men they are catching at straws; they gulp down every rumor and throw it to the voters in a desperate effort to turn a few votes away from Owen.

Now the truth of the matter is that Armstrong has several thousand dollars worth of property—from two to four thousand dollars worth—and has considerable money, having recently been paid \$2,000 by the Old Abe company, and out of debt while Owen has about 75 head of stock and a well out on the plains that he calls his ranch all of his property probably being worth \$1,500; and neither money nor whiskey, nor does he need any for this purpose; it is the other fellow who must buy the sheriff's office if he gets it and the people know it and the EAGLE believes it will take seven national banks to do it; hence it is out of reach even of Lightfoot, that famous editor of the Nogal Republican, that disciple of truth who is the Moses of that awkward squad who are yelling thief to every man who mentions the name of Owen for sheriff. Does it become this man Lightfoot to discuss character when it has been less than two years since 50 or more of the best citizenship of Capitan swore in the court in

which he was being tried under criminal indictment for ballot box stuffing that he did it in the school election at Capitan? Now if Lightfoot will prove that he didn't stuff the ballot box and that his paper last week was not a sheet of false statements, and that he is not a liar on general principles, we will give him the money that wasn't put up as a reward for any man who would prove that cattle companies have not put up any money for Armstrong's candidacy.

"Paul Mayer is telling the anti-Owen democrats that he is supporting Owen because we thought him the strongest man and not because he thought he was the best man for the office."—Nogal Republican.

Now this is a dandy. What do EAGLE readers who know Mr. Mayer think of this? Paul Mayer not only believes Owen a better qualified man for the office than Armstrong, but as good a man for the office as Whitesides would have been, and he also believed when Owen was nominated and now believes him a good deal stronger man than Whiteside among the voters. That is why he is supporting Owen.

"J. E. Wharton, Sid Wharton, Paul Mayer and Wiener are the men who defeated Whitesides by unheard of methods."—Nogal Rep.

None of the persons named had anything whatever to do with the Capitan primary except J. E. Wharton and all he did was to ask some of the Owen men to vote with Thompson's supporters in the primary. This was all any White Oaks democrat had to do with that matter; yet it is being told everywhere that Wiener took a hand in the Capitan primary. Of course this is done to turn a few votes from Wiener.

Now all we wish to say further is that in all the three or four columns of matter in the last week's issue of the republican party's black-eye, as Lightfoot's paper is called by most republicans, relating to democrats and democratic candidates, there is not one honest truthful statement. The statements made are false and many of them malicious, and given out in a desperate effort to influence democrats to vote against their own candidates. Will any body be deceived by such methods? We think not.

Since the article with reference to that \$500.00 being placed in the "Exchange Bank" was written, we went to Mr. Sanger, the cashier, to know if it was true that the money had been deposited as stated by Lightfoot, and we were informed by the cashier that no such deposit had been made. Simply another of Lightfoot's campaign lies. Of course what we said about this matter does not now apply to the companies, because they have not made any such deposit as claimed by Lightfoot.

We wish to say that the Eagle and the "Wharton Crowd" are not responsible for the circulation of the report that Armstrong is a corporation candidate, or company candidate. We know the companies had nothing to do with his nomination, and if they, or their employes see fit to support him, it is none of our business. The men in charge of the companies are good citizens and have the same rights that other people enjoy, and it makes no difference whether they support Armstrong or Owen. If, however, their support of Armstrong turns other voters to Owen, because of the feeling existing between the company people and others, that is a matter with which we have nothing to do.

No doubt Lightfoot and his backers, if he has any, will publish wonderful things, and all sorts of misrepresentations about John Owen and other democratic candidates and have people distribute them at the polls on election day. Don't be fooled or deceived by such stuff. Election day stories are generally false. So look out for such. They will likely be printed in both English and Spanish. No body should be fooled by Lightfoot and his false and malicious statements.



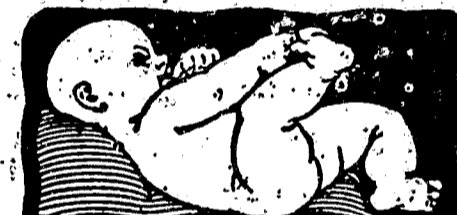
