When he came to Ireland for the second time it was as a bishop of the Christian church intrusted with the mission of converting the heathen in Ireland. The date of his birth is assigned to the year 387, but the place is not known to a certainty. His own confession gives it that his tather had a small farm near Bonavem, Tabernia, although some writers assign his birth place to the present Bonlogne-surmer, and others at or near Dumbarton. His father, he himself tells, was a deacon naned Calpurnius. His mother was named Conchessa. In his sixteenth year, while at his, father's farm, he was seized by a band of pirates, and with a number of others carried to Ireland and sold to a petty chief, in whose service he remained six years, and then. made his escape to France, where he became a monk, first at Tours, and afterwards at the celebrated monastery of Lerins. In the year 431 he went to Rome, whence he was sent to Ireland to preach, and where he was eminently successful, for he adopted the expedient of addresling himself first to the chiefs. .. and of improving as far as posible the spirit of clanship, and other existing usages of the Irish for the furtherance of his preaching. He visited a large part of the Island and baptized great numbers, chieftains as well as people. Irish biographers state that he founded 365 churches and baptized with hir own hand 12,000 persons. He is said to have ordained a vast number of priests, and blessed many monks and nuns. After he had been engaged about twenty years in this missionary work, he is said to have fixed his see at Armagh about the year 454. He died at a place called Saul, near Downpatrich, and his relics were preserved at that place down to the period of the Reformation. It is alleged that he lived to the surprisingly great age of 116. years.—Optic.

Public Money, and Education.

Bision, March 11.-A proposed am-indiment to the constitution of the United States has been drawn up by Lawyer W. M Butler, of New York, acting in consultation with ex-Gov. U. Ozanne, was interviewed by the El Paso Herald a few days ago as follows:

U. Ozanne, proprietor of the stage line and mail contractor from San Aantonio to Lincoln via White Qaks, Nogal, the Bonito mining country and Fort Stanton, is in the city. The starting point of the mail was originally from Carthage, but it has been changed recently to San Antonio on the sane road. He also carries passengers through to Roswell and the Pecos valley. The distance from San Antonio on the Santa Fe to Lincoln is 139 miles, stage running daily and Sundays. He states that Roswell and vicinity are growing rapidly there being now 800 iuhabitants in the town alone and they are increasing daily, The upper oa Roswell canal is completed. It is twenty miles long, and they have an unlimited supply of water there. Farming on a large scale is going on and there are vast quantities of fruit trees being planted. Over 10,000 frnit trees are being planted in the vicinity of the town this spring. One firm of frontier of Afghanistan, stockmen named Chisum and Roberts, who own a large herd of cattle there and who have 12,000 acres of land in cultivation, are setting out 2,000 fruit trees. Pat Garrett and J. W. Poe are setting out large quantities also. Judge Stone is setting out 80 acres of an orohard. S. M. Folsom president of the Albuquerque National Bank, is about to start a bank in the town. There are a large number of coal prospects of our patent system.
