Minutes of last session read and approved

Now comes Geo. B. Barber and files petition signed by over 200 qualified voters and taxpayers of Lincoln County; asking that an election be called within 30 days from date of approval of said petition in accordance with chapter 83 of the acts of the 29th Legislative assembly, of the Territory of New Mexico, for the purpose of voting upon the proposition or question of issuing Bonds of Lincoln county at 6 per cent per annum to the amount of \$20,000 for building a new court house at the county seat in Lincoln, Lincoln County, N. M. The Board considering the same, approved the petition as herein filed, and ordered that an election be held, on the 2d day of July A. D. 1891, for the purpose aforesaid and in accordance with said chapter 83, and proclamation for said election to be published for three consecutive weeks, in the Liberty Banner, newspaper published at Lincoln and in the New Mexico Interpreter, newspaper published at White Oaks, N. M.

Board adjourned until 1 p. m.

Pursuant to adjournment Board met at 1 p. m. all members of Board present and Clerk Geo. Sena.

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Now comes George B. Barber counsel for Jose Analla and presents petition for the appointment of three appraisers to appraise the damage and lay off the public road running from Lincoln and neighborhood to Rio Feliz and Penasco and crossing through the lands of said Jose Analla, the Board taking the matter under consideration and being fully advised in the premises,

appointed Emil Fritz as one of said appraisers and by operation of law county surveyor becomes one, and the petitioner herein appoints Jose Montano as the third party, and upon said appraisers qualifying as required by law, they are ordered make such appraisal on the 7th day of July, A. D. 1891, and make report to this board, at their July session thereof.

It appearing to the board a matter of necessity and convenience to re number and describe the boundaries of the various precincts of this county, since the creation of the counties of Eddy and Chaves, therefore said precincts are hereby described by boundaries and renumbered as follows to-wit:

Precinct No. 1 (Lincoln) shall be constituted of sections 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 34, 35, and 36, in township 8, south of range 14 east.

28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, township 10 south range 16 east, sections, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, and 36, and south 1/2 of sections 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, township 10 south range 17 east, townships 11, 12, 13, south of ranges, 16 and 17, east, and shall be bounded as follows: Beginning at the corner to sections 13, 18, 19, 24, townships 0 south of ranges 15 and 16, east; thence east along section line 6 miles or thereabouts, to corner to sections 13, 18, 19, 24, township 10 south range 16, and 17 east; thence south along range line between ranges 16 and 17 east, 1 1/2 miles to west 1-4 section corner, section 25, township 10 south range 16 east; thence east on line of 1-4 section corners 6 miles or thereabouts, to west 1-4 section corner, section 25, township 10 south range 17 east; thence south along the range lines, 19 1/2 miles or thereabouts to the southeast corner township 13, south range 17 east; thence west along township boundaries 12 miles or thereabouts to the southwest corner township 13, south range 16 east; thence north along the range line between ranges 15 and 16 east; 21 miles or thereabouts to the point of beginning.

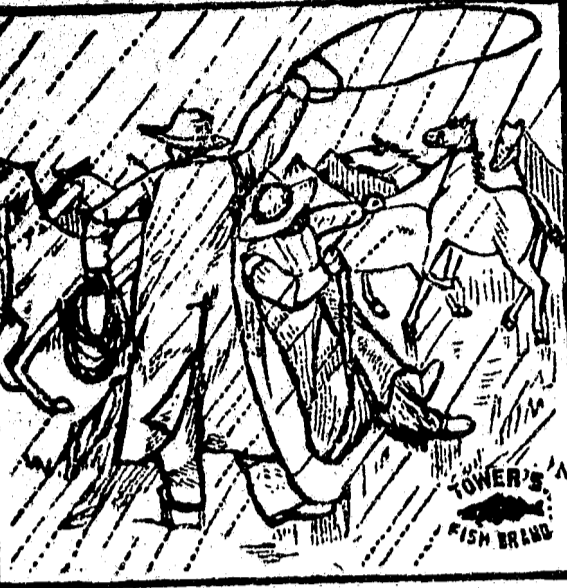
