## PUSHING ON TO WHITE OAKS.

The best of news comes from the surveying corps under Horace G. Ropes. They are making better progress than was anticipated and are finding good crossing places at all the difficult points. They have crossed the Pintada and from now on they have plain sailing to White Oaks.

H. P. McCrickett was in the city, Saturday. He had completed the preliminary reconnoissance between this city and Trinidad, and announced that he found no engineering difficulties in connection with the Ocate mesa, which many regarded as the most difficult part of the line this side of the Raton mountains. He left for Trinidad, where his corps will be organized this week, and where the outfitting will be done.

On the morning train, F. M. Jones, Carl W. Wilderstein and C. W. Wiley, left for Trinidad, the first two to take part in the surveying work, the latter to arrange for the furnishing of transportation.

It will thus be seen that the work of the preliminary survey is being pushed as fast as possible, while everything in connection with the work is perfectly satisfactory.—Las Vegas Optic.

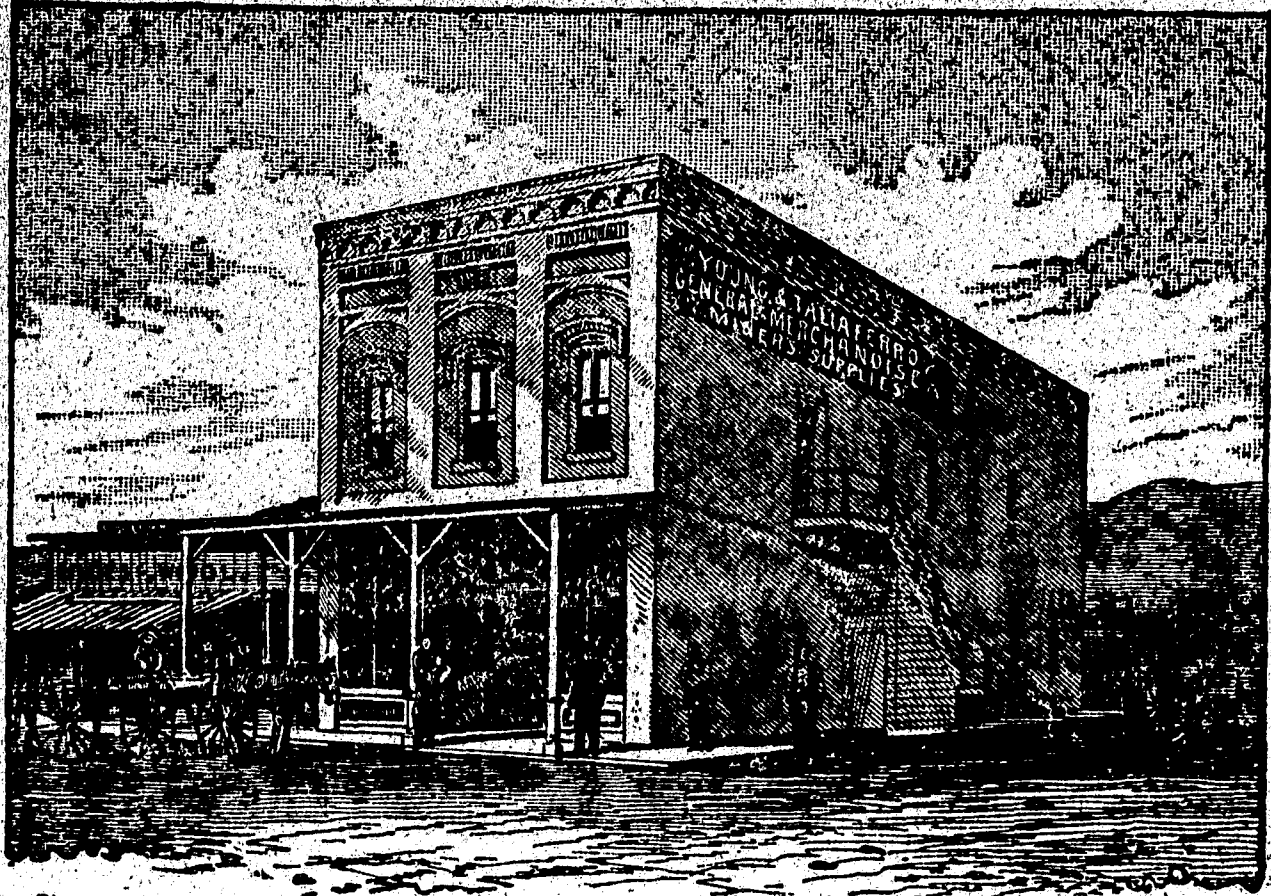

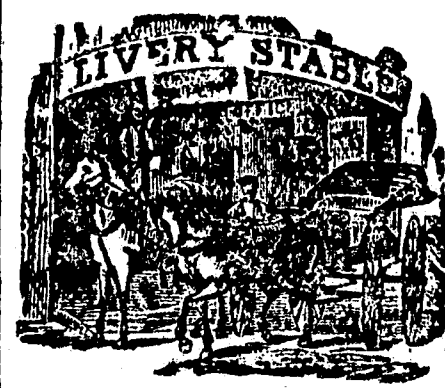
