## Lunch Room Materials, Labor Given

The Ruidoso High School Parent Teachers Association this week assumed complete responsibility for a building to house a cafeteria for the high school students in the Ruidoso-Stetson School District.

The high school must have a lunch room this year for several reasons. First, students who attend this school come from such distances as to make it impossible for them to go home at noon. Second, a well run cafeteria will provide these students with well balanced and well prepared meals. Third, this is the most economical way for the children attending high school to eat.

The school board has a limited amount of money to buy equipment for the manual arts shop, the new homemaking cottage, sidewalks, tennis courts, and finishing the main building constructed last year.

They also have funds that can be used for a high school lunch room IF NEEDED. However, the P. T. A. feels that the program they have planned for the construction of the building will make using school board funds unnecessary.

This is their plan. The contractor's shack which has been on the grounds since construction of the main building started last summer will be torn down and rebuilt around on the other side of the school by the homemaking cottage and shop. This will be a permanent building with pitched roof.

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## Ruidoso's New "Mood"

Editor's Note: This guest editorial was written by Lieutenant Commander George Dennis, Jr., U. S. Navy, a former El Paso newspaperman who is visiting Ruidoso for the first time in four years. Since wartime, cruiser duty in the Pacific, he has been stationed in Washington, D. C.

Every city from the concrete canyons of Manhattan to the teeming alleys of Shanghai has a throbbing pulse beat that is the soul of that community and furnishes fiction writers with sweet "atmosphere" adjectives. It is the stuff from which O Henry drew so richly for those fabulous tales of the Big Town.

This undertone is a constant thing and immediately identifies the mood of a community to every visitor, whether it be the boisterous tempo of a quick-sprouting oil town or the lazy and slow-dying rhythm of a bypassed cow town ignored in the shadow of a railroad siding.

Artists catch that atmosphere on their canvas and it dances in the words of writers striving for convincing mood music. It varies from the throb of L-trains in Chicago's tony Loop to the tinkle of pianos off the calles of Panama City and always it is a barometer to the health of that town.

That is the first change a visitor senses in the new "mood" of Ruidoso after an absence of four years—a dynamic atmosphere of confidence reflecting the energy, invincible determination and purpose of the men and women who today are building New Mexico's swiftest growing community.

The story of Ruidoso's amazing postwar development on a bedrock business basis is a living example of the ingenuity and imagination of unfettered Americans who believe that miracles are born of sweat and courage. It was thus in the dawn-to-dusk days of western stage stops and it will ever be thus so long as free enterprise and unshackled political thinking survive.

To a returning visitor, Ruidoso's unparalleled real estate development and business expansion reflect the determination and courage of a people wisely anticipating a period of roaring postwar tourist movement and population changes. It was so in 1866 and again in 1918 when adroit American business molded new communities that are today's world economic capitals in a turbulent era characterized by growing foreign envy of our wealth.

It can be assumed that in the years to come Ruidoso's wise exploitation of her many natural assets as a year-around resort will bring her wide renown in the same way that Sun Valley blossomed from the floor of southern Idaho under the spur the astute Chamber of Commerce promotion.

Ruidoso's new "pulse beat"—as sensed by today's visitors—is foreign from that prevailing in the gray days of the short "one season." This is a new Ruidoso and a new, determined confidence born of solid expansion.

It is the stuff of which giants are made—so long as free competition and the Western spirit of aggressive growth remain unfettered.

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# Severo Gallegos Tells His Story and of His Family's Friend, "Billy the Kid"

(Continued From Last Week)

long after the conference between Mrs. Gallegos and Billy a woman approached the door of the jail. She knocked... waiting with absolute calm for the jaller to come to the door... He looked out... saw an attractively dressed young woman... opened the door. This was the crucial moment... the plan had worked... for Billy dressed as a woman had through this ruse opened the jail door... this was all he needed, to complete his plans. He said "Don't holler... I'm Billy the Kid"... too surprised to move a muscle or even yell, the jaller was soon gagged and tied.

Quickly Billy mounted the stairs to release his friend from behind the iron bars... and not only freed Gallegos, but all the men in the jail. After explaining to the surprised men what had taken place he took them downstairs. To the jaller Billy said "I will untie you on one condition. Do not sound an alarm until I fire a shot a safe distance from the town. I will signal from the top of the hill." The jaller agreed... the Kid and the men fled into the night... on reaching the top of the hill the signal was given... too late for the jaller to do anything but sound a delayed alarm.

The fleeing men went on and

on... not stopping except for necessary food and sleep until they reached the haven of San Antonio, Texas... far from Lincoln county... These things the Gallegos family did not know until Lucas returned in about seven years with a full grown beard and long hair which had been his disguise. He had done well in Texas picking and selling wild pecans, but longing for his native country he had returned. Severo says, "Papa came back and could stay as long as he lived in Lincoln and didn't leave the county. There was understanding between papa and George Kimbrell, sheriff. The day papa came home he came to find me in the pasture where I was with the sheep. We were glad to see papa and did not know... until then what had happened to him."

Severo played a prominent part in the escape of Billy the Kid and remembers every incident as if it were yesterday instead of over sixty years ago. He says, "Makes no matter who the man is... if I could ever keep a man from getting hanged I would. I don't believe in seeing any man hanged. I tell you how they caught Billy and what happened so they caught him and put him in jail and sentenced him to hang three times to death... the three times was in case he didn't die the first time."

And here is that part of Severo's story. The law was constantly on the trail of Billy Bonny. Through kindness of his many friends, hiding in mountain caves, homes, canyons, and keeping out of their reach when the searchers were warm on his trail he roamed the country for a long time.

He was fleeing into the Gallinas Mountains to hide out when he was captured. During his escape he was shot at and killed John Hurley, a deputy sheriff... this man he killed following the instincts of all trapped humans when there is seemingly no other way out.

"The posse closed in around him... Billy went into a stone house in the mountains and this would have been a strong fortress... but he had no food, water or provisions of any kind. The time came when he knew he had to surrender. He was taken prisoner and put in a cell at the Lincoln County Courthouse.

In jail he thought... and there are those who remember his uncanny calmness as he would strum a guitar... sing... and act as he always had. In time though his plans for escape were completed... the plans which had been on his mind constantly... and the time came to execute them. Much of the story to this point Severo has told from hearing others talk... Now he can tell in his own words what happened, for he was there.

Severo says, "Lots of boys were playing around the courthouse that day... three of us were on the ground playing marbles... everything was quiet and peace... Juan Alvarez, Miguel Lena and me, Severo... looked up to see George, a jaller running across from the old hotel. We laughed... he so fat it was funny to see him run... puffing and stumbling... when we laughed we didn't know what was going to happen to poor George."

"As he came up to the courthouse we all heard Billy yell... 'Look up here!' George, he did look up... about that time... bang! Billy shot him in the belly... he was so fat... with a double barrel shotgun... The body fell to the ground, with the face of George looking surprised... and blood ran from the torn belly of the man onto the dusty streets of Lincoln Town... where blood had been shed before.

Severo goes on with the story and says "All us boys were frightened... and started to run. Billy yelled to me saying 'Severo, don't run... come help Gus (the cook in the jail) get a horse and saddle from the corral.' 'I knew Billy had helped my father and I must help him. I went to the corral... caught the horse... a fine big one... black with a white nose... took him back to Billy. Right then Billy came out with every gun in the jail... the one he killed George

with too... he broke every one over a big rock in the yard... describing the size of the rock. Severo remembered "and it is still there today."

"While he broke the guns he kept moving and watching... Billy was slender and quick... and always wary... walking to the horse we had saddled... he mounted... and that horse started bucking and pitching like a wild 'un... hadn't been ridden while he was in jail... then Billy called to me 'Severo, see that man in the field plowing with the steers... and the rope around their horns... go get it!'"

"I ran to the field... asked for the rope... brought it back to the Kid... he threw it around the neck of the horse... the saddle horn... and was off across the field into Ventura Canyon." "Then Gus called to me 'Severo, let's go upstairs and see what happened in the courthouse'." The man and the boy started up stairs... Severo was in the lead and the part of the story he tells next he remembers too well.

"Going upstairs I stumbled... looked down... there was a DEAD man... I was scared to death... it was the jaller and he had been shot in the back... I ran."

"This day was the last time I ever saw Billy the Kid or any of my family did. We always knew he was dead... he would have come to see my brother Chavez... they were always such amigos."

Severo talks of this period of his life as the most exciting... but he has lived long in Lincoln County... and knows the stories well of many things... floods on the Hondo and Ruidoso rivers... minor feuds between men of the area over land... water... cattle... When still in his teens he went with his father and mother to the Cree Ranch where they worked for awhile. From the time he was a young man until the last eleven years he worked on some of the largest ranches in the county, always working with stock, cattle, sheep, horses, mules... with Frank Coe, Emil Fritz, Block Ranch, Captain Lee in Roswell breaking horses, Jose Anaya who had a huge sheep ranch years ago below Tinnie, Martin Chavez old ranch where Picacho is... and Pablo Fresquez in that same locality. When asked about In-

dians and his encounters with them he replied, "Frank Coe knew Indians... He say give them a present of rations... kill a beef and give to them, then they are your friends. They were always my friends."

Severo remembers the days when life on the Ruidoso where the town is now located around the old Mill... "Frank Lesnet used to run it you know," he says, "and there was a beeg horse corral where they make those bricks across the road... the river would come up and cover the whole thing... one time I was on guard... watching the horses... I heard the river coming down... Carrizo and Ruidoso too... worked fast to get those horses out."

Severo moved up the river to Ruidoso for good eleven years ago... He came from San Patricio. His home is here now with his wife and children. Eighty-one years ago he was born... and he has at least seventy-five of those years in his mind in detail... and loves to remember. Severo is another who has seen the days of the old West come and go in Lincoln county.

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

Present for the meeting were Mr. Thomas Crume, superintendent of the Ruidoso-Stetson schools and members of the board, Mr. Herbert Smith, Mrs. Della Hale, Mr. Jack Parnell and Mr. Will T. Coe.

Final plans for this program were worked out Saturday night, August 29.

The Parent Teacher Association will employ one supervisor for all three schools to do the buying and planning for the lunch rooms. Mrs. Della Hale has been employed by the organization to act as this general supervisor, and this selection has been approved by the school board. All three of the lunch rooms will have the same menu each day. The grade schools will have hot lunch programs.

The high school lunch room will be run as a cafeteria. The board feels that the older children should have a choice in what they eat and will also have access to candy and cold drinks to be sold in the cafeteria.

There will be two women employed at each school lunch room to prepare and serve the food and maintain the kitchen. They will work under the supervision of Mrs. Hale.

This plan of buying and planning for three schools at one time will make the available funds have more buying power per dollar as quantity buying always means a saving.

## Draft Proclamation Covers Eligible New Mexico Men

(Continued From Page One) Act, the President of the United States called upon the Governors of several states, and all officers and agents of the United States, and

and all officers and agents of the several states including the political subdivisions thereof, to do and perform all acts and services necessary to accomplish effective and complete registration.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, THOMAS J. MABRY, Governor of the State of New Mexico, do hereby proclaim that all male citizens and all other male persons, who, on the day or days set for registration, have attained the eighteenth anniversary of the date of their birth but have not yet attained the twenty-sixth anniversary of the day of their birth, must present themselves and submit to registration at the announced place therefor. It is further proclaimed that all male citizens and male persons of the aforesaid age group, who are transient in the State of New Mexico on the day or days set for registration, must present themselves and submit to registration at the most convenient place regularly designated as a place of registration.

The following day or days for each age group have been proclaimed by the President of the United States as Registration Day, or Days:

- (a) Monday, Aug. 30, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1922 after August 30.
- (b) Tuesday, Aug. 31 or Wednesday, Sept. 1, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1923.
- (c) Thursday, Sept. 2 or Friday, Sept. 3, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1924.
- (d) Saturday, Sept. 4 or Tuesday, Sept. 7, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1925.
- (e) Wednesday, Sept. 8 or Thursday, Sept. 9, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1926.
- (f) Friday, Sept. 10 or Saturday, Sept. 11, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1927.
- (g) Monday, Sept. 13 or Tues-

day, Sept. 14, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1928.

(h) Wednesday, Sept. 15 or Thursday, Sept. 16, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1929.

(i) Friday, Sept. 17 or Saturday, Sept. 18, 1948 — For persons born in the year 1930 before Sept. 19.

(j) All persons who were born on or after Sept. 19, 1930 must present themselves to their Selective Service Local Board and submit to registration on the day they attain their eighteenth birthday or within five days thereafter.

Registration in the State of New Mexico will be conducted under the supervision of the State Director of Selective Service and the Selective Service Local Boards within the area of their own jurisdiction. All places of registration will be designated by the various Selective Service Local Boards and each place of registration will be open from 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. on the day or days designated herein.

Any person subject to registration may register after the day or days fixed for registration, if he is prevented from registering on that day or any of those days by circumstances beyond his control. However, such individual shall accomplish his registration as soon as possible after such circumstance which caused his inability to register ceases to exist.

I call upon all officers and agents of State Government and all officers and agents of political subdivisions thereof, and all local boards and agents thereof who may be appointed under the provisions of Title I of the Selective Service Act of 1948, to do and perform all acts and services necessary to accomplish effective and complete registration.



# DEFROST

 whenever frost reaches thickness of one-quarter inch

Thick frost retards coldmaking, makes your refrigerator run longer, increases operating cost. It should be removed whenever it becomes one-quarter of an inch thick. It is necessary to defrost more often in summer than in winter because of more moisture in the air and greater use of your refrigerator.

### A Quick Method of Defrosting

Empty defrosting tray and turn control to "off." Remove ice trays and frozen foods from freezer. (If latter are wrapped in several thicknesses of paper and placed on refrigerator shelf, they won't thaw out in short time it takes to defrost.) Fill proper-sized pans with very hot water and place on shelves of freezer. Use fresh hot water as needed.

When frost has melted wash freezer with weak solution of baking soda and lukewarm water. Clean food compartment, wash thoroughly with baking soda solution and wipe dry. Empty drip pan, replace ice trays and frozen foods and start freezing. The entire operation should take only 20 to 30 minutes.

### The Best Time of Day to Defrost

During the hot summer months it's best to defrost in the late evening just before bedtime, when the refrigerator has less work to do. If you defrost during the middle of the day, the refrigerator may run excessively when started up, because of the heat, frequent-door openings and warm foods being placed in food compartment.
