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## The Party Line

In 1937, in a speech before the University of Washington Luncheon Club, Harry Bridges, the militant head of one of the principal unions of longshoremen, said: "We take the stand that we, as workers, have nothing in common with the employers. We are all in a class struggle and we subscribe to the belief that if the employer is not in business his products will still be necessary and we will be providing them when there is no employing class."

In 1947, Mr. Bridges was quoted in the official I. L. W. U. paper as saying: "A country that has a totalitarian government operates like our union."

Last September, when his union was engaged in a strike against employers, Mr. Bridges was quoted by one of the leading San Francisco daily newspapers as saying: "When this strike is finished, we will be out of business or they will be out of business."

Mr. Bridges is entitled to his views and, certainly, they have the virtue of leaving nothing to the imagination. The important issue is just what proportion of labor in this country subscribes to such ideas—and just what it thinks will happen if the "employing class" which Mr. Bridges despises is destroyed.

It should be obvious to a child that if the present "employing class" is sent to the junk heap, another must take its place. And the new employer would be the government, which is precisely what has happened in Russia and the other total states that Mr. Bridges apparently admires. If the government is the dictator of the instruments of production, it must also be the dictator of all labor—the people who run the machines. No one can strike against the government without being guilty of promoting civil war. The result—and here again Russia is the perfect example—is a system of slave labor, where no one dares dissent and everyone does precisely what he is told on pain of the severest penalties.

The fact that labor in this country can strike; that it can wring concessions out of employers; that it can stand up on its own feet and say what it thinks, is the finest possible example of democracy in practice. Under Socialism and Communism, by contrast, with the government as the only important employer, the working man and the union are nothing but tools of the state.

It is a pleasure to record that many a tough and intelligent labor union chief, knowing this, has fought for the principle of free enterprise. Unless we have free enterprise we cannot have free and independent labor. That is the tremendous issue that will determine the welfare, the future, and the living standards of all the workers of this country.

Section 1. That it is hereby declared necessary and advisable for the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, to construct a waterworks plant and water system and the Village shall construct such plant and system.  
Section 2. That at a special election to be held in the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, on the 23rd day of November, 1948, there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the Village the question of constructing a waterworks plant and water system consisting of a waterworks plant, storage reservoir, settling plant, filter, water pipes, water mains and all the other usual components of a waterworks plant and water system, and all rights and properties, whether within or without the boundaries of the Village, necessary to be used in connection therewith.

Section 3. That it is hereby declared necessary and advisable for the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, to construct a waterworks plant and water system and the Village shall construct such plant and system.  
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Section 5. That the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, shall submit to the qualified electors of the Village at a special election to be held on the 23rd day of November, 1948, the question of whether the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to construct a waterworks plant and water system for said Village of Ruidoso and its inhabitants.

Section 6. That the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, shall submit to the qualified electors of the Village at a special election to be held on the 23rd day of November, 1948, the question of whether the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to construct a waterworks plant and water system for said Village of Ruidoso and its inhabitants.

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## Legislation To Highlight Cattle Growers Program

State legislative matters will highlight business at the fourth quarterly meeting of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association, scheduled to be held in Carlsbad on December 17 and 18 according to G. W. Evans, Magdalena, president. Association officers recently met with Eddy county cattlemen and Chamber of Commerce officials and made plans to accommodate a meeting of more than five hundred state ranchers in the Cavern City.

Roy Forehand, Carlsbad rancher and a vice-president of the organization has been named chairman of the General Resolutions committee for the December meeting. Evans announced.

Complete schedule of speakers and business subjects has not as yet been worked out, Evans said, however "we expect to be able to announce the entire program the latter part of November."


"We believe there will be several matters of a state legislative nature affecting land and livestock which will be discussed and acted upon at this meeting," Evans continued, "And we are hopeful it will be possible to work out a program which will be in the best interest of the entire state as well as our industry."

Date for the annual convention, usually held in Albuquerque in March will be set at the Carlsbad meeting. The annual session usually attracts between three and four thousand state ranchers, Evans said.

Water Company on a lease basis paying a lease of \$300.00 per month. The lease was for a period of two years with two succeeding six-month extensions, which should afford plenty of time for the Village to get in its own municipal system.

Notice of election to the voters in the municipality is given in this issue of the paper and said election if passed and approved by the citizens of the Village will give the Trustees the power to go forward with a revenue bond issue for a municipal water system. It should be noted that this election merely gives the people's approval to go into the water business and is not for the purpose of floating the revenue bond.

The revenue bond issue will immediately follow approval at the election.

The Village engineers feasibility report on the engineering is on hand and the proposed system will cost approximately \$360,000.00. Feasibility reports and copies of the proposed water system maps showing the entire layout are on hand at the City Building for the inspection of any citizen.

Proposed rates for the system are given here and will be placed in effect immediately so there will be no change later on in going from the old system under lease to the new municipal system. Please note that there is very little change from present rates except for citizens outside the municipality who in no way contribute to the support of this Village.

Flatrate consumers will pay for services on a base computed by the Water Department but in no case will the minimum rate be less than \$3.00 each month.

Meters will be installed on all services as soon as the Village is able to purchase them.

For metered services 3/4 of an inch in diameter there shall be a minimum annual charge of \$36.

For metered services 1 inch in diameter there shall be a minimum annual charge of \$60.00.

For metered services 1 1/2 inch in diameter there shall be a minimum annual charge of \$72.

For metered services 2 inches in diameter there shall be a minimum annual charge of \$108.00.

For metered services 3 inches in diameter there shall be a minimum annual charge of \$144.00.

For the next 5,000 gallons, \$75 per 1,000 gallons. For the next 10,000 gallons, \$0.50 per 1,000 gallons. For the next 25,000 gallons, \$0.40 per 1,000 gallons. For the next 50,000 gallons, \$0.30 per 1,000 gallons. For all over 50,000 gallons per month of such excess, \$0.25 per 1,000 gallons.
