Dave Bronson presided with dignity and decorum and he was given a rousing vote of thanks by all present when he surrendered the chair to Gordon Greaves who was elected to head the organization for the coming year. Plans Progress For Restoring Old Lincoln

The Lincoln County Historical Society held a meeting, Sunday, January 23rd in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur F. Coe at Glen-coe. A discussion was held regarding a program to present to the State Legislature for the needs of the Old Court House at Lincoln and restoration of the old town of Lincoln as it was in its historic prime in the days from 1875 to 1879.

The old town is of perhaps more general interest than any other place in Southern New Mexico. In territorial times it was the capital and headquarters for an area of two hundred square miles each way, comprising one fourth of the area of New Mexico and embracing a territory about the size of the State of Indiana.

Col. Maurice G. Fulton, formerly of New Mexico Military Institute, one of the outstanding authorities of history of New Mexico, and present superintendent of the Lincoln Court House Museum, stated "We have been in consultation with the National Park Service and at their suggestion are applying for approval by THE NATIONAL COUNCIL FOR HISTORICAL SITES AND BUILDINGS. Ulysses S. Grant, the III, president of this organization, has given us much encouragement. We intend to bring it permanently to the attention of the people of this country as one of the points of national historic interest."

The town of Lincoln has already had two restorations. One is the "El Torreon," or old watch tower. The other the old court house. Mr. Coe, president of the organization in Lincoln County, and the colonel lead a discussion by telling reminiscences of the days of the Lincoln County War.

Ruidoso Valley Authority Predicted As REA Project

It has long been a dream of mine to have a dam at the headwaters of the Ruidoso River to store the floodwaters which year by year are becoming more precious to all of us who make our homes here in the Southwest.

This conservation project would provide irrigation water for the valley farms; would be about a great recreational development; and could possibly furnish hydro-electric power for this area.

Public power is now being recognized as an important factor in the development of this region. It is bringing about better living conditions on our farms and in our rural communities.

Our local REA has an outstanding advantage in that it receives power from Elephant Butte Dam. We have priority to receive this low-cost power from the Bureau of Reclamation.

The development of our cooperative has just started. In this period of expansion and extension of our lines we must realize that difficulties and delays are a part of the development. Public power has as its goal the bringing of electricity to every rural home in America at a price that we can afford to pay. Our cooperative intends to fulfill its part of this program. Our plans are to bring the comforts and conveniences of electricity to every home in this area at the lowest possible cost.

I want to say to the people of this region that each one of us has an important share in the responsibility for the building of this great enterprise. With the same kind of patience, understanding, and determination that have carried forward all the worthwhile achievements in this country of ours, we shall reap the lasting benefits that are sure to come.

Louis Vick Has Driven A School Bus Longer Than Anyone Else In New Mexico



Mr. Louis Vick and his 1948 Chevrolet school bus—the 8th bus he has worn out in nineteen years.

At the present time Mr. Vick makes and eighty four mile round trip daily... or when he is out of town his wife substitutes for him. Starting the other side of Cedarville he picks up boys and girls to take to the Cedarville Grade School and teenagers who go into Corona to attend high school. Twenty-five youngsters are put in his charge each day... to take to school and bring home safely... some leaving home as early as 6:30 a. m.

Mr. Vick has been a rancher all of his life. He is the father of two boys himself, Ermon and Austin, both now students at New Mexico A & M. He first drove a school bus in 1918 at Lucy, New Mexico... and his very good friend, Mr. Charles Rose, now state school superintendent, was driving one in Ft. Sumner in 1929 when Vick was still in Lucy.

That first school bus was a Model T Ford... with solid tires. From that day to now Mr. Vick has worn out eight school buses. His present bus is a 1948 Chevrolet which was bought this year.

He always kept in mind the tremendous responsibility attached with taking children from home to school... and then home again... regardless of weather. There have been a few times when storms have caught them out on the road... or made it impossible to leave Corona. He remembers one time hiring a wagon to send the children home... and then there are times when he asks the friends and patrons of the school to take them in for the night in Corona or Cedarville... and they are always welcomed.

A tribute to Mr. Vick, and all of the other bus drivers coming into Corona, is that they carry on in spite of the fact that ALL ROUTES OF THE SCHOOL BUSES COMING ARE OVER UNIMPROVED ROADS... and Corona has more school buses than any other school in Lincoln County.

Besides Mr. Vick the other drivers make their trips daily during the nine months of school... Jess vacations of course, they drive panel trucks... some bringing in grade school pupils and others high school students... or both.

Floyd Proctor makes a ninety mile round trip daily to pick up and deliver twenty children. Pete Madrid also is responsible for twenty children depending on his bus and makes a forty-four mile round trip. Earl Roper drives twenty children one hundred mile round trip. Jim Rogers picks up sixteen children on his route to bring and take back forty miles each way. J. E. Roberson makes a forty-two mile round trip... with eighteen boys and girls. John Ingram drives seventy-five miles round trip with twenty children.

All of the drivers have fine records... love their charges... and are loved by them. With Mr.

Forest Men's Report Proves Apache Ski Basin Best Area For Winter Sports In State

"You've got an area up there bigger and better than anything in the State of New Mexico" said J. M. Herbert, Recreational Director for the United States Forest Service, in their main offices in Washington, D. C., following his return from an all day trip into the Apache Ski Basin, (the name suggested to soon become official for the new ski area). Saturday, January 22nd, Mr. Herbert further said, "The terrain is exceptionally good for skiing and the Forest Service is going to cooperate with the citizens of Ruidoso in every way to make this a winter sports area."

Friday night Mr. Herbert, Mr. Zane Gray Smith, of the Regional Forest Office in Albuquerque, New Mexico, which takes in New Mexico, Arizona, and Colorado, Mr. Sam Service from the Alamogordo office came into Ruidoso. They were unprepared to make this trip into the high country of the Sierra Blanca but at the insistence of members of the White Mountain Sports Association they took time out from a planned itinerary to see what the local men were "talking about."

Saturday morning they left, escorted by Chuck Milligan, president of the Apache Ski Club of Ruidoso who has acted as guide on all trips into the area in the wintertime to date, and Bob Boyce of Ruidoso, and a member of the board of directors of the White Mountain Sports Association.

On their return late that afternoon they were convinced of the possibilities for development of White Mountain Park. The men found, as had been described, the numerous possibilities for natural ski runs four and five miles long all coming into the natural basin on the north side of Mt. Baldy. They also saw the natural and ideal toboggan runs in the area and recognized the "perfect setting for a ski lodge."

They promised that all forest facilities will be available in gushing through the application of the local association in hopes that channels will be cleared, the permit granted, so work can start as soon as possible.

In an effort to bring to the attention of the Forest Service the need for this winter sports area the White Mountains Association wrote letters to various Chambers of Commerce throughout the Southwest not over ten days ago and are receiving replies daily encouraging them in their efforts. The replies have been astounding, i. e.

Special Services Office Walker Air Force Base Roswell, N. M.

Last summer it was deeply considered by this base to establish a Winter (Rest) Camp at Ruidoso. Everything could have been worked out perfectly and the camp could have materialized except for two difficulties which stopped the whole project. After careful investigation, it was decided that Ruidoso, first of all, had insufficient winter sports facilities, and secondly and most important, did not get as a general rule, near enough snow to justify a camp being established there by this base.

It would seem to me that if a ski course operated by you could be maintained high up in the White Mountains at an elevation of from 10,000 to 11,000 feet, Ruidoso would then be one of the most successful year round sports centers of the Southwest. I am sure that if a ski course had been high up in the White Mountains, this base would have established a camp up there.

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Perfect Example

During the various protracted periods in late years, it has looked as if there would be no end to price increases. Slowly but steadily, the prices charged for practically everything went up and up, with not even a momentary downturn, and there was no relief in sight. Many people, concerned with what was happening to their savings and income, came to the conclusion that the public was being exploited--that certain vague "interests" were deliberately raising prices for their own profit. Out of this belief came much of the agitation for a renewal of price control by government fiat.

The truth is, of course, that in a competitive economy no one can "fix" the price of any commodity in general use. And prices don't keep on going up unless supply and demand force them to do so. During the latter part of last year, there was an interesting and significant change in the meat situation. The price of meat stopped climbing, held its own briefly, then swung downward. By the end of the year, the general wholesale price of all meats had declined and average of about 19 per cent from the summer peak. And that, as anyone will admit, is a very large drop.

The main reason for this change in the meat price situation was a better balance, from the consumer's standpoint, between supply and demand. Plenty of meat was available and it had to be moved and sold. And, as is always the case, it was sold for what it would bring. The millions of people who buy meat were the ones who determined the price.

As a matter of fact, meat is an almost perfect example of the competitive system--all the way from the farms and ranges, through the packers and processors, and to the butcher shops. And the most apparent of the many virtues of that system is that it gives us what we want, in abundance, and at the most reasonable cost.

Texas Boys Tell Of Adventure Going To White Mt. Park

(Editors Note: The following story was written by Joe Lane and Phil Kendrick, both students at the University of Texas and both visitors to Ruidoso for many years.)

We arrived in Ruidoso Thursday night before New Year's for skiing. We were very crushed when we found... not a flake of snow... In the town here. The next morning by 9 a. m. there was still no snow. We were cheered up, however, when we found that Leon Farrar and Chuck Milligan were planning to go up into White Mountain Park... and would let us go with them.

Now we had never skied before. I didn't know what we were getting into... but visualized climbing gentle, snow covered slopes... seeing exquisite scenery... Both of these things were there... but the grief on the journey, oh brother!

We left about 10:30 a. m. from Ruidoso Clubhouse where we had rented the first skis we had ever seen in our lives outside of pictures and drove in Chuck's reo car nearly to the summit of Mon Jeau.

We parked the truck there... and started the longest hike that either of us had ever experienced. To a good skier it would have been a forty minute walk... for us... four hours of drudgery... we hiked... and hiked... and hiked... carrying what got to be thousands of pounds of skis on a trail no wider than a foot... it is the horseback trail around the mountain just below Mon Jeau at the edge of which was a crevasse... looked to us like two thousand feet deep. But the scenery was beautiful as we traversed the trails few outsiders have ever before seen in winter.

After we had climbed to a point on the level with Mon Jeau Lookout the forested Leon brought out the grub... and hot coffee... which we welled... drinking the pork and beans and scrambling in the snow for the last crumbs of sandwiches... never had food tasted so good.

Fortified, we felt braver... and discreetly sneaked off to try and get our skis on according to instructions... (remember this was our first time) and cautiously we tried a "gentle" slope. Our famous last words were "HELLO!" for at the end of this gentle slope was a steeper one...

This is Joe now... telling part of my story... "about this time a ski came off... bulleted down toward the bottom of the canyon and Phil and I watched in despair as there was nothing we could do about it but wait for it to stop... it finally did. After

a long walk in which I was climbing, crawling and rolling and falling I retrieved the lost ski. The whole party then went on up into White Mountain park and we knew every minute of effort was worthwhile. The snow, trees, terrain of the land were the most beautiful sight my human being could ever experience. Believe us.

By the time we reached this goal I was getting larry and Chuck insisted we hurry... the wind was blowing like mad, the sun was coming... a heavy cloud was coming... hiding Mt. Baldy from our view as it rolled in... and we were hungry again. And literally exhausted.

Starting back down we skied, fell, ran, walked in two hours the same trail it took us six hours to go up. With still over a mile to go to get back to the truck total darkness fell... all at once. Then we discussed the situation and decided to desert the trail and take a short cut around the mountain... which should have been half a mile...

This part of our trip would have to be experienced to be appreciated. We had seen tracks of mountain lions all day... and being new to this sort of thing. Were a little afraid... As we hurried that last half a mile our clothes caught on trees... ripped and tore... for we were stumbling through utter darkness to keep up with the other boys.

Finally... we arrived back at the truck... dead tired but more than pleased with the days adventures. It was something entirely foreign to either of us and an experience we shall never forget. Now that we have obtained some skiing experience we know the trip would be much faster and more enjoyable next time. We made three wonderful friends during the day... White Mountain Park for we are looking forward to skiing here again and again as the plans develop this winter sports area are put into action... Leon and Chuck.

We shall act as a committee of two to spread the word of what Ruidoso is trying to do, and help publicize this wonderful new sports area which would serve the entire Southwest.

Hardin Works Toward Aims For Indian Service Schools

Lonnie Hardin is the school principal for all of the various districts which have schools in the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation. He has been working with this agency since August of 1948, and took over his duties at the beginning of the school year.

In making recent arrangements to let the Carrizozo school children come in to attend the Ruidoso Elementary School he is carrying out an aim of the United States Indian Service. It is their desire to have the Indian children attend public schools wherever this can be arranged.

Another change which has been made this year in the Mescalero schools has provided for a county-federal government school operated jointly, and successfully, for the Indian children in the village of Mescalero and the children of the employees at the agency. Heretofore there have been two separate schools. An Indian Day School and an Otero County public school. This was done because government provided schools for the Indian children, and the children of the employees would have had to pay tuition to attend.

Mr. Hardin is very pleased over the new setups and the happiness of the children in their new situations. The joint school at Mescalero... and the Carrizozo children attending Ruidoso Elementary.

He feels that sending the children to public school helps the Indians to accept their full responsibility as citizens and teaches them a better understanding of the many advantages which go with this citizenship.

Mr. Hardin said "when Indians and our children go to school together they all profit by being educated in the same school. The Indian learns our way of life and then our children learn to appreciate the Indian and his culture."

He feels that the children being educated together is a great privilege for all of them.

Mr. Hardin has been in the Indian Service since 1941. His first assignment was with the Hava Supai Indians in the bottom of the Grand Canyon in Arizona. He was stationed there for four years.

In 1945 he went to serve the Choctaw Indians in Mississippi and Louisiana at the Philadelphia Reservation. He was there for three years and had under his supervision nine schools. Mr. Hardin received his teachers education at the North Eastern State Teachers College in Tahlequah, Oklahoma.

Interested in his work, he is constantly seeking ways to help improve the schools of the Indian Service to the advantage of the children who are being trained to become citizens of the United States.

Mr. Litell first came to White Oaks in 1885. In 1893 he left to join Teddy Roosevelt and his Rough Riders during the Spanish American War. He returned to White Oaks in 1912 to live, and was eighty-two years old at the time of his death.
