The success of the Ruidoso News has been brought about by the wonderful cooperation we have received from all of the citizens of Lincoln county. Our correspondents in every community have had a large share in our progress, and we want to take this opportunity to thank each one of them.

It takes advertising, and a lot of it, to put over a weekly newspaper and the merchants have been quite liberal in that respect. Mary Nell Taeger will continue with the News in the capacity of editor. She came to the paper in its early life and has been with us ever since with the exception of a few months at Alamogordo. She knows and loves Lincoln County and her stories of the early days here have created much favorable comment. She is a gifted writer and a most ardent booster for "these here parts."

The Ruidoso News covers Lincoln County "like the dew" and goes into practically every community in New Mexico as well as forty states. It has become the home town paper for thousands of people who look eagerly to its issues every week.

Paint-up, Clean-up, Fix-up Campaign Changes Whole Appearance of Main Street

Although the actual dates set for the 1949 Clean-up Campaign for the Village of Ruidoso were April 1-15 work going on all up and down the canyon is beginning to "show" and perhaps the most noticeable and encouraging improvement is the repair work being done on the main canyon road by the State Highway Department being assisted by Pat Farrar, road commissioner for the Village, and employees of the city.

The road is being widened in downtown Ruidoso and laid out to provide for adequate drainage. When this process is complete graders are spreading chat and packing it put the main road in better shape than it has been in several year. Work will continue on this project.

The repaired road, the painting and cleaning up being done by business houses and individuals up and down the canyon show promise of presenting a clean and neat village to visitors this spring and summer in Ruidoso. Many people are painting outside and inside, remodeling, landscaping, and just cleaning up trash which has been an eyesore for many months.

Civic groups and social organizations, the churches and ladies groups in the church are all backing the clean-up campaign to the fullest extent and pledge cooperation as a group and as individuals. Anyone desiring information in regards to hauling of trash, getting help to "clean-up" can contact the city hall.

State Receives Share National Forest Receipts
The Federal Government is forwarding the State Treasurer a check for \$112,436.43, representing the state's share of national forest revenues during the fiscal year. The amount is the largest on record, P. V. Woodhead, Regional Forester at Albuquerque today and compares with \$107,745.32 for the previous year.

The payment is made in accordance with a law passed in 1908 which requires that twenty-five per cent of national forest receipts be turned over to the states for the benefit of schools roads in the counties in which the forests are located. The payment to Lincoln County is \$4,699.53.

In addition to the twenty-five per cent of receipts which is paid directly to the states another ten per cent is earmarked for use by the Forest Service in building and maintaining roads and trails in the national forests situated in the states where the revenue is derived. The balance of the receipts, except for a small amount designated by Congress for special projects, goes into the general treasury.

Bloodworth Sells Ruidoso News To Louis R. Spain

Lloyd P. Bloodworth, editor and publisher of the Ruidoso News, announced this week the sale of his paper to Louis R. Spain of Carlsbad, New Mexico and El Paso, Texas. Mr. Spain has been editor of the Eddy County News in Carlsbad for the past year. He is a partner in the El Paso Printing Company, one of the larger companies of its kind in the Southwest.

The Ruidoso News was started three years ago by Lloyd and Ida Bloodworth to fill the need of a paper in the Ruidoso and Hondo Valleys. From this beginning it has grown to become one of the most widely circulated papers in the Southwest and one of the largest weekly papers in the area.

Mary Nell Taeger, who has been connected with the paper almost from its beginning, with the exception of a few months with the Otero County Times, has been named editor of the paper according to the new owner and publisher, Mr. Spain.

Mr. Bloodworth has stated he will continue to make his home in Ruidoso and plans to become more active in the real estate business, maintaining his present office in the Ruidoso News-Chamber of Commerce building.
