Golf Tournament Dates Set At Cree Meadows

Dates have been definitely set for two golf tournaments at Cree Meadows Country Club during the summer, Warren Cantrell, professional and manager at the local club, announced today.

An amateur tournament open to both men and women will be held June 9 to 12 inclusive. Men and women will play in separate championships with as many flights as necessary to include all players. Qualifying will be on June 9 followed by a dutch luncheon and a Calcutta Pool. Players are expected from Texas, Arizona, Oklahoma, Colorado and probably other states in addition to New Mexico. The full program will be announced next week.

The Open Tournament will be held this year August 26 to 28 and will be open to all male golfers, both professional and amateur. A good field of classy players is definitely assured for this tournament. All the playing professionals from New Mexico and West Texas will compete, as will a number from adjoining states.

A local golf club will be organized within the next few weeks and a Ruidoso City Tournament will be held in September. Blind Bogey, Flag, Ringer and other tournaments will be held periodically during the playing season. Cantrell hopes to see local players at work on their games in order to get some representation for Ruidoso at other state tournaments. This is necessary in order to influence the State Championship Tournaments for men and women being awarded the local club in future years.

Sunshine Horses Now At Track

The Sunshine Quarter Horse Farm of Carlsbad, N. M., owned by Mr. and Mrs. Al Place, now have five outstanding horses at the Hollywood Park Stables, which they shipped up from down the way several weeks ago.

"Miss Easter," the colt that won the Carlsbad Futurity; "Gallant Man" and "Gallant Lady," will all three be entries in the Derby Trials to be held here May 29. The other two horses from their farm now on the grounds are "Saipan" and "Sunshine."

J. Kirby, a trainer on top tracks all over the world for a good part of his life, is in charge of the horses. This real old-timer in the racing world is a native of New Mexico, having been born in the Sacramento Mountains not too far from the community of Pinon. Since he left there in 1903 for Mexico he has seen many a horse race . . . and trained many of the winners of those races. The past years he has been in the East but is glad to be back in New Mexico.

Some of the outstanding horses Kirby has trained are "Double Rab," "High Honors," which horse won the King's Cup in Canada twice, "Blitzkrieg," "Ponty," winner of the Aqueduct Handicap in Brooklyn, N.Y., to beat "Marketwise," and winner of the Southern Cross Purse at Hialeah, beating "Chalcedon."

Other horses will be coming in during the next few weeks as activity picks up in preparation for the big Futurity Trials.

Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Scott of San Angelo, Texas opened their cabin last week, and are here to stay until October.

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

The State Tourist Bureau is starting a series of "Tourist Schools" to be held in various towns and cities over the state.

This state now plays host to more than five million paying guests each year. Some spend only a few dollars with us, principally for food, gasoline and lodging, but hundreds of thousands of these visitors remain in our state for days or weeks—spending millions with us each year.

The Tourist Bureau now is conducting the largest advertising campaign in its history, one designed to bring still more visitors to this "Land of Enchantment." And from the response by mail, that campaign seems certain to be successful, certain to result in much more dollars being spent with us this year.

Money allocated for such advertising constitutes a sound investment, of course. But it will be even better invested if, once they arrive, these visitors like what they find here well enough to remain a day or two longer than they planned.

Every day they remain means just that much more money spent here—money which benefits every business and every professional man in town.

Formerly a resident of Massachusetts, O'Brien is said to be a business man first and a Republican, second. Which would indicate that his editorial policies will be about the same as those of most other daily publishers in the state.

His two acquisitions were among several effected lately in the newspaper field in New Mexico. The 100-year-old Santa Fe New Mexican recently changed hands again. And Marcus Griffin, former publisher of the Eddy County News, bought the semi-weekly Leader-American at Tucumcari.

"No Speeding" Says New Sign

In an effort to "slow down" local drivers as well as people coming into Ruidoso a new sign four feet by seven feet has been put up below Carrizo Hill with big letters reminding drivers there will be "NO SPEEDING".

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On the Grapevine . . .

THE half-expected state liquor license "freeze" had not yet materialized, as this was written, but it remained a strong possibility.

Himself a practicing dry, Gov. Thomas J. Mabry nevertheless has a fairly liberal attitude toward the liquor business, though his close friends include several ministers who are outright prohibitionists.

Mabry's slightly different attitude can be traced back to his service as district attorney at Albuquerque during the Volstead era.

Bootlegging was as prevalent there at that time as it is now in Curry and Roosevelt Counties.

So, ex-District Attorney, ex-District Judge and ex-Justice Mabry obviously had rather see liquor legalized, and under at least a measure of control, than as it was state-wide during the prohibition years.

Understandably, those already in the legitimate liquor business in New Mexico strongly favor a repetition of the 14-month liquor permit moratorium Mabry declared during his first two-year term.

So far as they are concerned, the less competition, the better. And it will not be surprising if the Governor orders another such freeze in the near future.

You want to be the next governor? That particular bee is buzzing in a dozen or more bonnets, including those of at least two of New Mexico's former chief executives.

Still a third can hear that same sound, though faintly. This one is U. S. Rep. John E. Miles, who has said that he now has no intention of seeking to succeed Governor Mabry.

Miles held the state's top job four years (1939-43) and almost wrecked his health at it. He might prefer to be back in New Mexico than in Washington, as one of the 435 members of Congress. But perhaps he'd also rather remain among the quick than be governor again.

Even at this date, next year's campaigns appear likely to involve some dangerous intra-party Democratic scraps. But friends say Miles believes he can do as much good by running for re-election to Congress as by entering the race for governor.

To some that may seem a strange statement, for several thousand Democrats in this state never have and never would vote for John E. Miles. There are many more who always support him staunchly.

Long a disputed figure, he polled more votes last November than he ever got before—receiving more than the Governor, more than Clinton P. Anderson, and more than his fellow-Congressman, A. M. Fernandez.

Miles still says he does not want the governorship. Instead, he is now expected to support the party's present state chairman, Bryan Johnson of Albuquerque, if the latter shows that he is really willing to work for the nomination.

Although he has received considerable publicity, Johnson actually is not known personally by many individuals throughout the state, except the top Democratic leaders.

A successful attorney, he is pleasant to meet though reticent almost to the point of timidity. Johnson is certainly no John Dempsey, no Clyde Tingley—both of whom, incidentally, would like another term in the governor's mansion.

Still, Johnson undoubtedly is favored by Mabry as his successor, and thus has the inside track at this time.

His chances certainly were enhanced when Howell Gage let it be known this week that he would not oppose Johnson in next spring's Democratic fight for the nomination.

Former Eddy County sheriff, now state penitentiary warden, the affable Gage said he would refuse to run, for personal reasons.

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
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Parent-Teachers Association Meets At Hondo Valley Union High School

The P.T.A. of the Hondo Valley Union High School met in regular session at the high school, Tuesday night, April 12. Mrs. Albert Kimbrell, president, called the meeting to order; minutes of the last meeting were read, by the secretary, Mrs. Nan Moberly and business was discussed. The P.T.A. agreed to give \$10 toward sending a girl representative to Girls' State. Mrs. Frank Titworth, Mrs. Britton of Tinnie, and Mrs. Swinny of San Patricio, volunteered to help with the Junior-Senior banquet. The nominating committee announced candidates for P.T.A. offices for another year, candidates being chosen by acclamation as follows: Mrs. Albert Kimbrell and Mrs. Ignacio Torrez to continue their good work as president and vice-president, respectively; Mrs. Ruby Allen as secretary, and Mr. Vernon Allen as treasurer. Installation of officers was left for another meeting to be called in the near future. Regular business being finished, the meeting was turned over to the entertainment committee, the chairman Mrs. Torrez announcing that we had a guest speaker, mineralogist from Roswell, and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Miles who were introduced by Supt. Montes.

Mr. Miles brought a large collection of mineral rocks which he displayed, explaining their qualities and showing his rocks under his special violet-ray lamp. He spoke substantially as follows:

"I should like to show you a few mineral rocks that are found right here in New Mexico—types of crystallized minerals and fluorescent rocks. Let me say here that any kind of crystallized rock is valuable. Picking up rocks is my

hobby. You could find rocks all over my house, in the attic, under the bed, and everywhere. Crystallization of minerals leads up to fluorescent rocks. Of the many types found, we have red cubes which always come that way; some will pan out flower-shape and have a center core; there are tubular crystals, garnets, 12-sided rocks that always come in multiples of 12; we find rectangles, perfect cubes that will stand on any angle; there are the Carlsbad twins, ruby silver that comes in red bubbles, zinc ore, some in little layers like books; bayrite found in fan-shape type, will always come in cubes, all faces are 90 degree angles to each other. That is the way they will always be—electronics can explain why but I won't go into that. There are minerals found in the bottom of the ocean. I shall show you a demonstration of the effect of violet-ray light on mineral rocks. You know there is only one source of violet-ray light, and that is the sun-rays. If you pass the sun rays through a prism, it breaks the rays down into the colors of the rainbow. There is a short, ultra-violet light which is one of wave length, measuring wave length by four-billionths of an inch. Light rays come in the radius of three to four-thousandths of these rays. The ultra-violet ray is the only light we can see. This light, the infra-red light, is the light that scientists think may destroy the world—that the infra-red light broken down would be powerful enough to destroy the world. When some sort of activating agent from the heat wave hits the mineral and knocks the electrons out of their orbit, the short time before the electron gets back into its orbit, it gives off a light which is the fluorescent light. When we use mineral light on a mineral it knocks the electron out of its orbit, it loses its power, comes back into its orbit, but this tiny fraction of a second when it is out, makes it give us a light and this light is the wave length."

Mr. Miles then had the lights turned out while he turned his mineral light on the mineral rocks, causing them to give off beautiful hues, some deep pink with purple spots, others gorgeous purple fading to lighter shades; some rocks seemed to glow with a consuming inner fire, and these continued to glow an instant when taken from under the light. Mr. Miles was requested to repeat this performance many times, and he showed how dull these fluorescent rocks appeared under ordinary light so that it seemed as though the duller appearing rocks were really the ones capable of glowing in the dark.



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


