Land For Cemetery Given By Forest Service To Valleys

Announcement was made throughout the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley last week that the United States Forest Service has given a tract for a Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Cemetery to be located below Stetson School one-half mile from the highway on a mesa.

In making this announcement it was also told that the Ministerial Association of this same area, including ministers of all denominations, will be the board of trustees for the cemetery in the future. This will mean whatever minister is serving a church will automatically be on the board.

There has been plenty of room allotted so that if any denomination desires a separate tract for burial of their members it can be had by their agreeing to maintain the designated area.

It is the intention of the Forest Service, the Ministerial Association and the people of the valleys to make this the most beautiful cemetery in the State of New Mexico. Plans are already being made to build a year round road to the area and to landscape and fence it. Many offers of help for these projects have come from people in the valleys, all of whom realize the importance of the gift of the land. This land has been obtained through cooperation of Mr. C. E. Moore, Forest Supervisor of Alamogordo.

Make Reservations Now For Second Annual Ruidoso Aspencade To Be Made Into Mountains Sunday, Oct. 9

Tuesday afternoon of this week the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce met to complete plans for the Second Annual Aspencade into the Sierra Blanca Mountains. The date is October 9th. Again this year those desiring to make the trip can do so by horseback or car.

Those making the tour by horseback will meet at the Ranger Cabin in the Mescalero Reservation straight up the Ruidoso Canyon Road at 8:30 that Sunday morning. Reservations for the horses and chuck wagon supper, \$5.00 for horse and \$1.50 for supper, and can be made at the Chamber of Commerce office by paying in advance. Only those who have made these reservations will be provided with horses from local stables.

Auto trippers will meet in front of the Ruidoso Post Office at 2:30 that afternoon. The drive will go to Mon Jeau, Eagle Creek, and back to the central camp for the supper. They also must make reservations for the supper at the Chamber of Commerce office.

Those taking the trip last year can testify to the beauty of the area at this time of year as the stately aspens take on the gold color of fall.

The quaking aspen is a member of the poplar family. The scientific name is *Populus tremuloides*. The word "tremuloides" describing the species signifies trembling and is descriptive of the action of the leaves in the wind.

The trees often reach a height of 100 feet and occasionally the trunks reach a diameter of 3 feet, but generally they are not more than 18 to 20 inches in diameter in very favorable sites in this locality. We have some in the Santa Fe National Forest, however, which have measured at 2 feet in diameter. The wood is light brown or white and is very soft. It has a very high quality fiber for paper making and would be more widely used for this purpose except for a destructive heart rot which would make faulty sections in paper made from the wood. It is now used considerably to manufacture wooden matches.

It is a tree of wide distribution, found from southern Labrador and the southern shores of the Hudson Bay, northwesterly to the mouth of the Mackenzie River, through the northern states and the mountains of Pennsylvania, northeast Missouri and northwestern Nebraska. Through the mountainous regions of the west, it often ascends to elevations of 10,000 feet above sea level. It extends from the Sierras of California, northern Arizona and New Mexico throughout the Rocky Mountain region. In the west and southwest on the high slopes of mountains and along the banks of streams, the seeds germinate quickly in soils made infertile by fire, and its seedlings grow rapidly in exposed places. It is actually a transitional tree which comes back in burned-over areas and it is later replaced by fir and spruce forests. More than being a beautiful tree, therefore, we can truthfully say that it is a nurse tree preparing the way for others to come.

Changing of color in leaves of all kinds after the growing season, is due to a change in their chemical content. When growth stops in the fall, the chlorophyll, or green color, changes, due to the trees becoming dormant for winter. This change is a chemical reaction and in the leaves it is expressed by a change from green to yellow color and many of the other tints. When tree leaves are thus changed very gradually, the colors are very mild, if noticeable at all. On the other hand, when they are changed by

quick action of frost, we get these beautiful displays in the aspen. If frost conditions are not sudden enough and the tree leaves change their makeup slowly, we get a very poor fall color. An extreme freeze, on the other hand, may turn them all black overnight.

Roswell Fair Starts Oct. 5th

Roswell, New Mexico—A dozen high school and college bands are expected to participate in the Eastern New Mexico State Fair here on Wednesday, October 5. In addition military units, floats and comic entries, Pecos Valley horsemen will present some spectacular features.

New Fair park just south of Roswell is rapidly nearing completion and will offer to exhibitors and visitors alike excellent accommodations. Five livestock barns will house the cattle, sheep, horses, swine, poultry and rabbits and general exhibits building will provide community and commercial displays with ideal accommodations. Farm products, flowers, home arts, and the art display will be shown in halls adjoining general exhibits building.

The mid-way and general entertainment program exceeds anything ever before attempted at the fair. On Wednesday and Friday afternoons, Thursday and Saturday nights Sheriff's posse rodeo, with Lynn Beutler as arena director, will entertain the crowds in Fair park stadium. On Wednesday and Friday nights "Circus of Thrills" will be the big attraction. Day and night throughout the fair Sheb Wooley and his Calumet Indians, stage and radio stars, will entertain.

Old Timers Day, Friday, Oct. 7, is expected to draw the largest crowd of the week. Those who have been in New Mexico 30 years or longer will be special guests at a program in the morning and at a barbecue at noon.



A Statement of Policy

In a statement to the Ruidoso News, the School Board of the Ruidoso Municipal Schools indicated their desire to issue the following statement of policy concerning the use of the school gymnasium:

"Your School Board is cognizant of the fact that the school gymnasium is the only facility in Ruidoso that can accommodate a large group of people. The demand for the use of this building has been quite frequent in the past and will continue to be in the future. The building is badly in need of repairs. Various groups and individuals have been more than generous in the past in contributing financially to the upkeep of this building. In this relation, members of the present Board and past Board members have contributed their full share also. We are making an effort to keep this building in a usable state of repair without asking for donations. We are limited in our funds for this purpose and for many other things which are an extreme necessity. The amount of money available each year for maintenance of buildings is not sufficient to meet the actual cost. As a result, your Board is faced with a building maintenance deficit that has increased each year. The policy set forth herein is

merely one of our efforts to meet this problem.

We have no desire to prohibit the use of the gymnasium for any worthwhile purpose. However, we feel that we would be violating our trust to the people of this district if we expended school funds for the upkeep of the gymnasium if it was made available without regard to cost.

"We are fully aware that demands will be made for the use of the gymnasium for purposes of a charitable nature and other special services. In this connection we feel a sense of responsibility in extending our cooperation. For such functions the Board extends an invitation to representative groups to discuss such special cases with the Superintendent and/or Board at their regular meeting.

For functions other than those listed above, the Board feels that a minimum charge of twenty-five dollars per day should be made. This figure is based on actual cost to the school and in many instances in the past the actual

cost to the school was more than this. This is a minimum fee and in some instances it may be necessary to increase this amount. This policy compares favorably to other communities throughout the State. We have authorized our Superintendent to negotiate on this basis. The Board reserves the right to refuse use of the gymnasium at any time.

This statement is issued to clarify questions that have arisen, or may arise in the future. We solicit at all times the cooperation of the people of this community to the end that we may have better schools, and by the same token your school board wishes to work with the entire community to the end that we may have a better community. To this we dedicate our best efforts."

Roswell, New Mexico, September—Old Timers of Eastern New Mexico are determined that their affairs in connection with the Eastern New Mexico State Fair which starts here October 5 for four days will be limited to those who are eligible to be called Old Timers. 

DON'T MISS SEEING CLAYTON BENNETT'S

Rev. O'Brien Tells Of "One Red Rose"

Rev. Dick O'Brien, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Big Spring, Texas, filled the pulpit at the morning preaching hour last Sunday in the First Baptist Church of Ruidoso. When he entered the pulpit he found a red rose, placed there by unknown hands. Now this may not seem important but there is a story back of this red rose, and here is the story as told by Mr. O'Brien:

"My wife put a red rose on the pulpit one Sunday morning with a note which said, 'Dick, do your best today.' I mentioned the rose to the congregation and said I would preach with a red rose in my hand every Sunday if I could, because a red rose is my favorite flower, and holding it in my hand might keep me from using my hands in unnecessary gestures. Next Sunday, which was the last Sunday in November, 1942, a long stemmed, red rose from a flower shop was on the pulpit with a note, 'From an unknown friend.' And the rose has not fallen since. It has reached me as far west as Albuquerque where I was in revival, and as far south as Port Arthur, Texas, and east as far as Pittsburgh, Pa., and Lynchburg, Va. Last Sunday made 355 consecutive Sundays it has come.

"On the first anniversary there were twelve extra roses; on the second twenty-four, and on the third thirty-six, but after that there has been an extra rose for each year and as much money as a dozen per year would cost to be given to the orphan's home. Last November there were seven roses, one for the day and one for each year and thirty one-dollar bills in an envelope. There is a note each year, written on a typewriter, and signed the same way, 'The Un-

known Friend.' No handwriting to identify the sender of the roses.

"At first I was curious and speculated who the 'friend' might be, but each one that I suspected has either died or moved away, and the rose still comes. I know it is not my wife or any other member of my family. Now I do not want to know who it is as something very sweet would be lost if I should find out. It could be any one of several hundred members, so I love them all alike since it might be any one of them. The church has come to look for the rose as definitely as I do.

"One Sunday the florist had two weddings and two funerals, and the rose did not reach the church until a few minutes before I was to preach. The congregation was very nervous until a boy came down the aisle and placed the rose on the pulpit Bible. You could almost hear the congregation sigh as they settled back for the sermon. Nearly every banquet or other special occasion I attend in Texas, there is a red rose at my plate, or on the speaker's stand."

On the sixth anniversary the Associated Press sent a reporter and photographer. The story and the picture were carried all over the Southwest and in several northern and eastern newspapers.

There have been 355 Sundays but the grand total has reached 442 red roses from the "Unknown Friend."

This, I think, should be of great interest to the people living forty or fifty miles from Ruidoso, for it will make long distance emergency calls so much easier for Dr. Moore. Most of the farmers, ranchers, and small communities have an area near them large enough to safely accommodate a plane.

If you recall, that airport was the scene of a tornado earlier in the year, and was practically demolished. From what I have heard the folks up there have done a remarkable job of rebuilding.

This time I would like to say a few words regarding the safety in flying. It seems that a lot of people in this world think flying is still the most dangerous mode of transportation. Statistics show far fewer fatal accidents in airplanes in proportion to the amount of planes than any other type of transportation. This is so true that insurance companies have set up machines in larger airline terminals to automatically write you an insurance policy covering you while flying. The cost? Twenty-five cents for \$10,000. This policy covers you from point of departure to destination if in the United States.

The public hears of every plane crash but seldom hears of an automobile accident unless some important official is involved.

So far as being practical is concerned, the airplane has a distinct advantage. You can buy a new plane large enough to carry your entire family for the same price you can buy a car. And you can operate the plane for less. Big business used the airplane almost entirely for long distance contacts. Roughly, a fourth of the mail that goes through the United States Post Office travels by air. Yes, year.
