Directors Hold C of C Meeting On Monday

A meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce was held Monday afternoon to discuss moving the office from the present location to a more centrally located one offered at a lower rental charge.

Letters have been mailed to the membership asking for their vote on the matter.

Among other things taken up at this meeting was the Sunland Association which has assessed Ruidoso \$500.00 for a membership. The board of directors felt that the chamber of commerce should be a member, but the present budget makes no allowance for his expenditure. An effort will be made to raise this amount by direct solicitation before the matter is definitely settled.

Orders were placed for printing new letterheads with full membership listed. New Sunland and directional maps were also ordered.

The supply of folders have been exhausted, 15,000 having been mailed and distributed this year. A reprint of these folders has been ordered with sufficient changes to bring them up to date.

Mrs. Rosalind Harnes has been employed by the directors as permanent secretary for the coming year. Office hours have been set from one to five in the afternoon.

The treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$1200 with \$500 due in pledges. All bills have been paid to date.

A number of suggestions and plans suggested at the dinner meeting are being carried out. Correspondence with the State Game and Fish department has been carried on in an effort to obtain small dams in the river and dredging in order to improve fishing in this locality.

Ruidoso Schools Open

Ruidoso Municipal Schools opened August 21, 1950 with the largest enrollment in the history of the schools. According to J. H. Morris, Superintendent, the combined enrollment of all schools was 446, some twenty-six more than last year. Conditions are becoming crowded in the Ruidoso Elementary School and in Junior and Senior High School. The High School building more especially, is filled to capacity.

Music has been added to the curriculum this year and is offered on a limited basis throughout the system. Mr. W. C. Bright is in charge of the Music Department. Other teachers new to the school system are: John D. Kilgore, High School; O. J. Sitzes, Principal, Ruidoso Elementary; Miss Sally Ware, Second Grade, and Miss Bettie Guyton, First Grade, Ruidoso Elementary. Mrs. H. W. Dutton will assume her duties as Third Grade teacher at Ruidoso Elementary September 4th.

Warriors Play Roswell B's Here Friday

The Ruidoso Warriors will open their 1950 football season here next Friday, Sept. 8 at 2:30 p.m. with the Roswell B eleven. The game will be played on the new field which was built last year North of the high school. The grass received needed rainfall this summer and is in good condition. Seats for about 200 additional persons have been provided on the North side of the field, and a scoreboard and approximate time indicator have been installed. Prices for the home game will be the same as last year—seventy-five cents for adults, twenty-five cents for students in the high school building, and ten cents for grade school pupils.

Coach Cy Leland is optimistic over the chances for another successful season for the Warriors, who lost only one game last year. "Even though we lost seven lettermen from last season" he said, "we have some promising replacements for the line and our backfield will be as good or better than last year. The boys have worked hard since Aug. 18th for this first game" he continued. "They are in good physical shape and have a good mental attitude, and although we may have a pretty tough time in these first two games, both Roswell and Carlsbad B will know they have been in a battle."

Cattlemen Plan Gala Reunion At Silver City

Cattlemen from throughout New Mexico are planning a gala reunion at the third quarterly meeting of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association scheduled to be held in Silver City, September 5 and 6, according to Roy Forehand, President. The association was organized there in 1914, and Grant County ranchers and businessmen are preparing to greet cattlemen with an outstanding entertainment program.

The meeting will open at 3:00 p.m., September 5 in the Murray Hotel in a general business session. Association and industry problems which will receive special attention include State Legislation to be pushed during the next session of the Legislature; Port of Entry regulations and truck load limits; Participation of the FBI in the apprehension and conviction of cow thieves operating on an interstate basis; Water Development in the state; and research in the conservation of range lands.

The general program, September 6 will include addresses by Joe Heaston, Albuquerque, Chairman of the New Mexico State Fair Commission; Col. J. R. Gillenwaters Council for the Water Resource Development Corporation of Pasadena, California; Raymond Price, Director of the Southwestern Regional Forest Experiment Station, Tucson, Arizona; John Babbitt, Flagstaff, Arizona, President of the Arizona Cattle Growers Association and Guy Shepard, State Land Commissioner, Santa Fe.

J. S. Culberson, Lordsburg, Vice-President of the Association will serve as Chairman of the General Resolutions Committee. The Committee will include ninety-six members of the association Executive Board.

Entertainment and special arrangements made for visiting cattlemen include a tea for the ladies at the home of B. A. Christmas; a cocktail party; bar-be-que banquet and a cowboy dance. In addition plans are underway to conduct an inspection tour of nearby ranches in Grant, Hidalgo and Catron Counties.

Residents of New Mexico purchased \$1,096,619.50 worth of Savings Bonds at issue price last month, \$951,846.00 worth of which were Series E's. If held to maturity, the owners will receive \$1,269,128 for them.

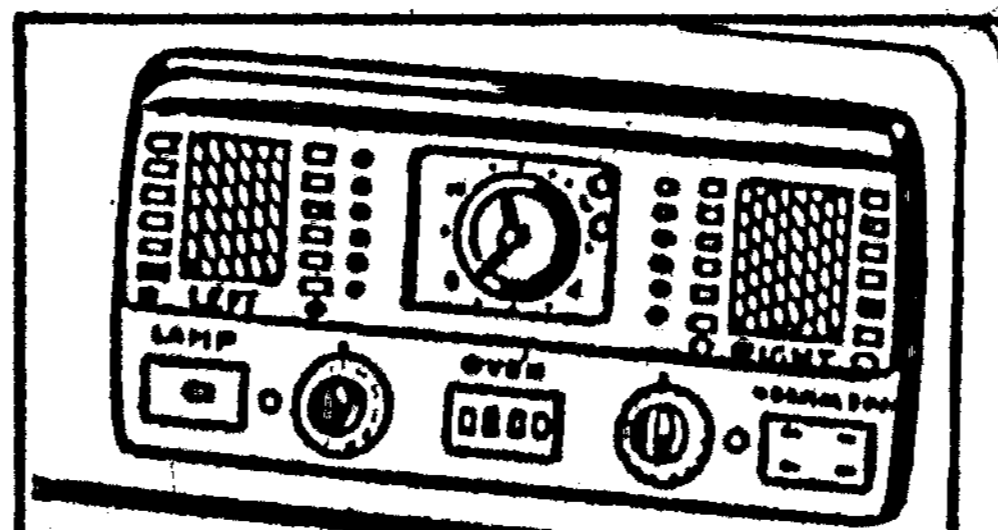

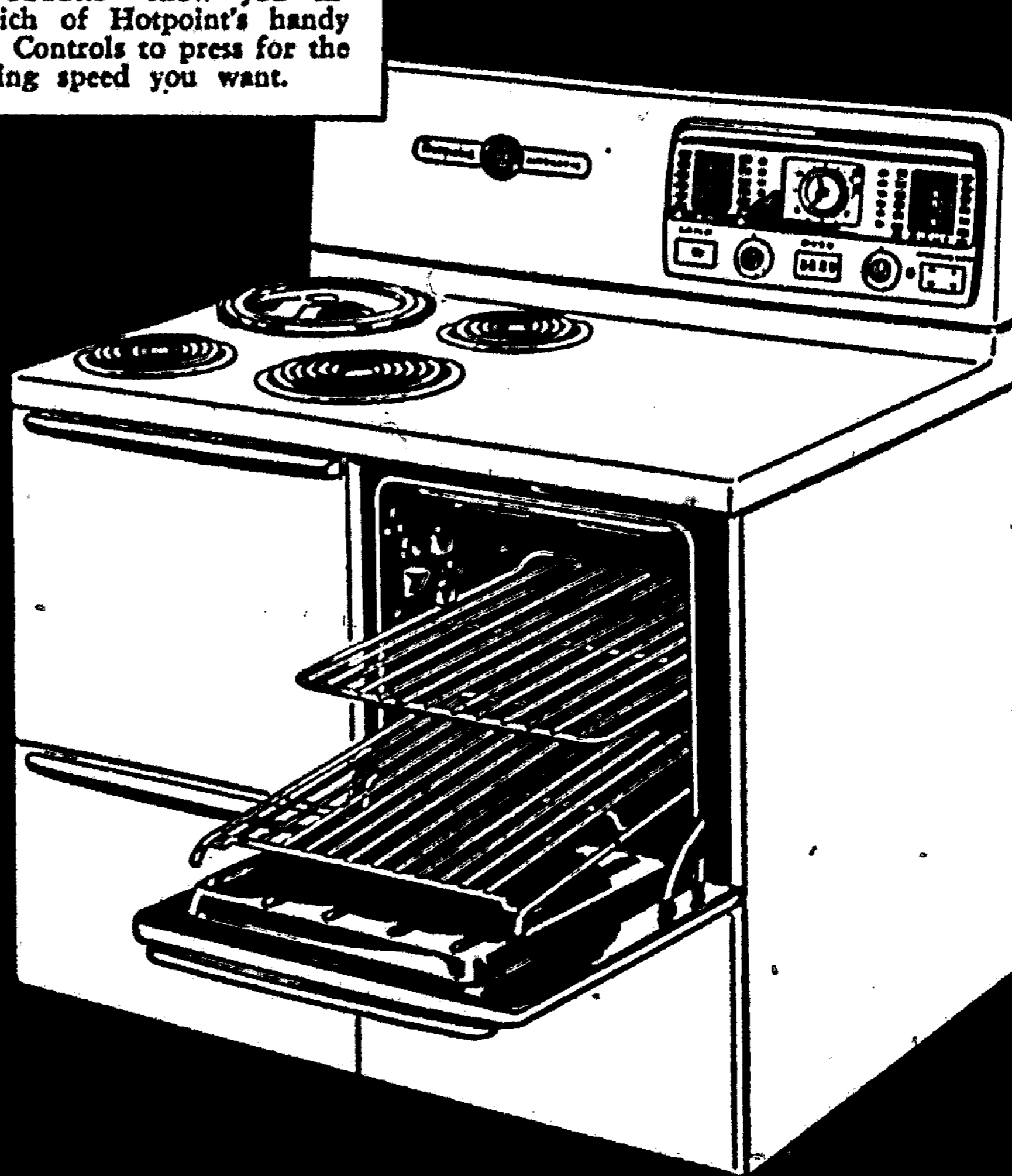
