Insurance Dividend Checks Now Being Mailed To Veterans

Veterans Administration this week began mailing the \$2.8 billion dollar special insurance dividend to the approximate 16 million World War II veterans (or their beneficiaries) who were holders of National Service Life Insurance policies.

Any veteran or serviceman who took out NSLI prior to January 1, 1948, and kept it in force for three months or more, will receive a dividend, regardless of whether the policy is now in force or has lapsed. If the insured has died, payment will be made automatically to the beneficiary. The beneficiary need not file application.

Checks will continue to be mailed at the rate of one-million a week until the bulk of the project is completed. V-A hopes to have the job almost completed by July 1 of this year.

When To Expect Check

V-A could not tell any veteran when he would receive his check, but said the checks would be mailed in order of the last three figures of the veteran's service serial number. With some exceptions, veterans whose serial number ends in 000 will be among the first to receive checks; those whose service serial number ends in 999 will be among the last.

Nearly two million policy holders have not applied for the dividend, V-A said, adding that payment is not automatic to living veterans and living servicemen. For these, application must be made before the dividend can be paid.

Filing Another Application

Veterans who filed an application for the dividend a month or more ago, and who have not received the acknowledgment card, should submit a new application, clearly marked "DUPLICATE", V-A said. It is not necessary to submit a minor application, but the veteran's name, an address at which he can be located for the next six months, and his signature, are necessary.

Policy holders will not gain anything by allowing their checks to remain with V-A. The dividend checks will be drawn for the exact amount due policy holders, and this amount will remain unchanged whether the checks are claimed immediately or years later.

Polio Epidemic Over BUT Not for Him!!



President Truman and Congress

This session of Congress will consider some of the most controversial legislative proposals in history. Yet no one seems to expect that much definitive action will be taken one way or the other.

The fireworks began with Mr. Truman's State of the Union message, which contained nothing new, nothing that had not been anticipated. The President asked, as he has on many occasions in the past, for broadened social security, the compulsory Federal health insurance bill, some tax increases and adjustments, his civil rights program, repeal of the Taft-Hartley law, and the Brannan farm price plan. The response to his speech divided pretty much along party lines. The Democrats, with a number of exceptions—particularly the Southern bloc, which is prepared to fight the civil rights proposals to the bitter end—praised his program as being just what the country needs. The Republicans, almost to a man, denounced it, some vehemently—about 100 GOP Representatives signed a round-robin statement to the effect that Mr. Truman is firmly committed to the eventual socialization of the United States.

A change in the President's mannerisms and attitude was noted. The rather somber humbleness he first showed on taking office has gone. In its place, he shows utter confidence that he is right and his opponents are dead wrong.

If, as is expected, Congress turns down or defers most of the President's program, will it be a defeat for the Administration? That brings up a very curious situation. Some of the canniest commentators have been saying that Mr. Truman does not really want the program to pass at this time—that, indeed, its passage would actually amount to a severe setback to Administration plans and strategy. The reasoning back of this point of view is simple enough. The Democrats, like the Republicans, are looking to 1952. Recent events certainly indicate that Mr. Truman will run again, though he has not said so. Therefore, the argument goes, Mr. Truman wants the stage set so that he can go to the country, point to Congressional refusal to give him what he wants, and base his campaign on that. His advisors seem to feel that this would be sound politics, and that it would enable the President to paint his opponents as black reactionaries and tools of special interests.

Practically everything that this Congress does and says will be colored by the race for the Presidency that is to be run almost three years hence—as well as by the elections of next fall. As has often been noted, Senator Taft's campaign for re-election will command principal national interest in 1950. On domestic policy, he is the unquestioned leader of his party. If he wins, he will have the inside track for the 1952 nomination.

How To Keep From Growing Old

Drive as fast as you can on wet highways and streets. There is always something to stop you when you lose control. Always speed. It makes you look as though you are an amateur driver. Never stop, look or listen at crossings, people may think you are timid. Always pass the car ahead on a curve. It's fun to be surprised and besides undertakers must make a living. Don't use your horn. It might scare the other fellow and make him pull over too far. Demand half the road. The middle half. Insist on your rights . . . the heck with the other guy. Always pass cars on hills when possible. It shows your bus has power and you can always turn out when you meet someone at the top. Take the shortest route around blind left turns. The other fellow ought to be able to take care of himself if you can. Never give arm signals . . . if you do, be sure they are wrong. Never yield the right of way. If the other fellow is crazy show him what real insanity is. Always make turns from the wrong lane. If the other fellow is no mind-reader it's his own fault. Never stop at stop signs . . . you have as much right to use the streets as anyone else.

Bids On Hospital Ward Announced

Invitation for construction bids to provide an additional 37 bed ward at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Albuquerque was announced today by D. K. Dalager, manager.

He stated that the VA in Washington will open sealed bids February 7 for labor and materials necessary for converting Building 10 to medical wards. This large two story structure had formerly been used as attendants quarters. Work to be performed includes general construction alterations, a new transformer room new exterior stairway, plumbing, heating and ventilating, electrical work, kitchen and sterilizing equipment, electric dumbwaiter, and other specified items. Drawings and specifications may be obtained without cost by writing the Technical Service, Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C.

Dalager stated that the project, which should be completed this year, will increase available beds at the hospital from 291 to 328, of which more than two-thirds are for general medical purposes. Completion of the 250-bed tuberculosis addition, now under way, will give the Albuquerque Veterans Hospital a capacity of about 580 beds by mid-1951.

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
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
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
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Dr. Ehlers Commends Local Hospital; Gives Incubator
