The incubator for use with premature infants, and in certain types of illness where infants must have oxygen, is being bought "on the installment plan" by the women for the use of the entire Ruidoso area. If needed in an emergency the Volunteer Fire Department of Ruidoso, if called, will deliver it immediately where wanted.

Purchased through the El Paso Surgical Supply Co., a \$250.00 piece of equipment cost only \$220.00 for they gave a \$30.00 reduction.

So far \$78.40 has been raised for the fund through the big Canasta party, auction of pies and cakes and one afternoon session of Canasta. Other affairs of this type are planned on through the spring until the incubator is paid for. No contributions will be turned down, either.

One of the first ventures will be the construction of an attractive and permanent entrance way. Then will come redesigning of the fireplace units, the table and bench units, new signs, markers and more and improved parking spurs to make these areas more easily accessible.

## Movie Equipment Shows Sound Of Silent 16-MM Film

Last Tuesday night the Lions Club was entertained with a twenty five minute sound movie shown on the new equipment purchased by Carmon Phillips for the Chamber of Commerce, The White Mountain Sports Association and the Lions Club. These three organizations split the cost of the equipment three ways.

The equipment was purchased at a cost of \$319.07 and includes a 16mm sound and silent projector, a 16mm camera, a 52x70 inch portable tripod screen and several other accessories.

With this equipment the Chamber of Commerce plans to make up a color movie showing Ruidoso and the surrounding area and the things we have to offer vacationists. This movie will then be booked to show at Lions Clubs, Women's Clubs and other service organizations all over Ruidoso's trade territory. Mr. Phillips stated that it would take about a year to complete the filming.

The White Mountain Sports Association will use the equipment to further promotion of White Mountain Park as a winter sports area and the Lions Club will use it to augment their programs at various times. The projector is also available to the local schools and other organizations provided an authorized person operates the equipment.

The movie which the Lions Club saw Tuesday night was two subjects on skiing which were presented by the White Mountain Sports Association. It will be presented to the Capitan Lions Club next Monday night and to the local P.T.A. on Monday March 6. ## Thoroughbred Futurity New Race For State

A new futurity for New Mexico with a \$500.00 added purse is scheduled for July at Hollywood Park here in Ruidoso according to the Hollywood Racing Association. For 2-year-old thoroughbreds, the race is open to the world. Distance will be one-half mile and weights will be 116 pounds for both colts and fillies.

Nominations close March 15. A \$50.00 nomination fee must accompany all entry forms which may be obtained through the Ruidoso office of the Hollywood Assn. An additional \$50.00 will be required for each horse that starts. All nomination and starting fees will be paid out in the purse. The \$500.00 is being put up by the Hollywood Racing Association.

This will be the first thoroughbred futurity for the Ruidoso track and should become as famous as the annual Central Bar & Grill Quarter Horse Futurity, which is known as the richest quarter horse race in the nation.

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### Movie Men Join Anti-Tax "Battle"

Spearheaded by the men who present its works to the public, the motion picture industry is launching a determined campaign to reduce the price of theatre admission tickets.

In this nation wide battle, exhibitors of this State and surrounding States, are taking an active part through their organizations, the Colorado Association of Theatre Owners, and the Allied Rocky Mountain Independent theatres in the State are also throwing their weight into the campaign.

The theatre men's main object of attack is the 20 percent Federal tax, deemed by movie interests as "discriminatory" and as a misnomer when called a "luxury" Tax. Secondly, they oppose state and city taxes on theatrical amusements.

The theatre men contend they are justified in their charges of unjust and unreasonable taxation on their product. These taxes were first imposed during the war at which time they were "patriotically paid" and in the boom period later.

But the war is over and the boom has subsided, and the movie operators claim it is time for outright repeal of the 20 percent tax. They point out that the movies are the greatest form of mass entertainment, serving some 90 million people weekly, and therefore movies are not a luxury.

The campaign to repeal the 20 percent tax is being handled nationally by the Council of Motion Picture Organizations, with headquarters in Washington, D. C. This organization represents all the exhibitor groups in the United States, and the plan is to carry the fight directly to Congress.

1. That registrations will be non-partisan and that anyone qualified will be registered regardless of party affiliation and regardless of what ticket or candidates they back in either City, State, or National Elections.

2. That qualified applicants will be registered only in a spirit of public service so that the large unregistered group who do not vote will become registered and take advantage of a franchise which they should consider valuable.

The reason for poor government today, in many places, is that the people did not register, and did not vote when registered. A person who has not registered or who does not vote does not have any business to state their criticism in regards to government which might have been different if they had only taken the trouble to qualify and express their franchise.

Qualifications are as follows:  
Residence in the State 1 year.  
Residence in the County 90 days.

Residence in the Precinct (or City) 30 days.

Inter County blanks are now also on hand for change of Precinct, change of Party Affiliation, change of Name etc.

Last registration date for City Election will be 5 p.m. March 6, 1950.

### Ruidoso Men Join Southwest Boosters To Plan Strategy

Walt Crosby, local director, Lloyd P. Bloodworth, Carmon Phillips, Nolan Hart, Bill Hart, Ezell Clarke, Joe Dryden, Jack Hull, were the Ruidoso men present in El Paso Tuesday night February 14th when nearly 150 enthusiastic delegates from West Texas and New Mexico formally set up an organization to "boost" the Southwest and named Mayor Carl De Bord of Deming, N. M., as president.

Twenty-four communities in the area were represented at the dinner meeting held at the Paso del Norte Hotel. The group voted to continue to operate under the temporary name of "Southwest Boosters" but made plans for choosing a permanent name. A permanent name will be chosen from entries in a contest to be conducted by the El Paso Times according to rules announced in their last Sunday's edition.

Lloyd Bloodworth, a founder of the group and one of the principal speakers at all organization meetings to date, predicted that where there are now twenty-four directors from that many different towns in the future there will be 56 members on the board representing every town and city in the area. The principal object of the club as outlined by Bloodworth, is "to organize a regional wide publicity and public information service" for the Southwest aimed at "attracting and holding" tourists in the area.

Boundaries of the area represented by the group are Pecos, Ft. Stockton and Marathon, Texas on the east; New Mexico-Arizona state line on the west; U. S. Highway 60 on the north, and the southern boundary of the State of Chihuahua, Mexico on the south. Bloodworth said the organization would seek to obtain for the Southwest a large share of the nation's tourist business for 1950, which Roger Babson has estimated at six billion dollars.

"Although there are an estimated 3000 travel agencies in the United States, not one of them has one folder about the Southwest area," Bloodworth told the delegates.

"We need to cooperate to accomplish effective national advertising we need to unite as have similar groups in Arizona and California. We can bring tourist



### Notice To The Public

Many questions are being asked concerning the delay in the Airport Program. This article is placed before the people to inform of the exact status of the program and to answer questions as to delay on engineering and construction.

1. The Village has gone as far as possible with the proceedings. The contract has been signed with the Federal Government for \$28,900 which is first participation money based on 25% of land acquisition value. Before the Village will be allowed this initial sum to start proceedings there are two stipulations of the Village-Federal contract which must be met.

A. No money will be appropriated by the Federal Government until the Village is in possession of the land, that is title in fee simple must be vested in the sponsoring body, which must be a Public Agency, and in this case the Village of Ruidoso.

B. No money will be appropriated by the Federal Government until an ordinance is passed by the sponsoring body which shall control all airport approach hazards. Such ordinance is on hand ready to be passed and dated but which cannot be executed until land acquisition has been accomplished, that is the deed passed.

2. Title must be passed abstract brought up to date, and opinion of title passed approved by the Village Attorney's office. The deed must be drawn, recorded and copy of same be forwarded to the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

3. There is nothing further that can be done by the Village until the above stipulations and necessary actions are executed.
