Directors of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce will meet soon to consider extent of this area's participation in the projected publicity program of the newly-organized Southwestern Sunland Tourist Association.

Plans of the Association were presented at a joint Chamber and Sunland meeting at Navajo Lodge March 10.

Ruidoso was asked to contribute funds toward the Sunland campaign and to supply speakers for various "booster" engagements.

Speaking for the Sunland group were Carl De Bord, Deming mayor and president of the association, and Lloyd P. Bloodworth, Sunland manager.

## Mescalero Gym In 1950 Goal Of Legion Post

"Let's Build that Memorial Gymnasium This Year" was theme of American Legion Post No. 48 meeting at Mescalero Agency office, March 8.

The meeting attended by 32 members of Post 48, was directed by District Commander Roger L. Schenck and State Department Chaplain Henry L. Graves, both of Ruidoso.

Commander Schenck stressed the need to recruit all of the 102 veterans on the reservation into the Legion if possible.

The assigned quota for Mescalero is 50 members. With the assigned quota filled, the Legion at Mescalero hopes to gain support for the proposed erection of a Memorial Gymnasium bearing the title "Mescalero Memorial Gymnasium."

Chaplain Graves, featured speaker, spoke on veterans' rights and veterans and their churches, "Teach Children Religion." Chaplain Graves stressed two points: Membership in the American Legion comes first; and "in Legion work, hold high those things which are good in the eyes of your country."

New officers for the year were elected. Clarence R. Cordry was elected Post Commander succeeding Juan T. Baldonado; Fred Pellman was elected Vice Commander succeeding Percy Via. Mrs. Dorothy P. Wall, who resigned as Adjutant, was succeeded by Evelyn Pellman by a unanimous vote. Miss Pellman was also elected as news reporter. Jesse Campbell was elected Sergeant at Arms. Jonah Washington maintained his post as Chaplain and was also elected as historian. Other committees were designated the Gymnasium Committee, Entertainment Committee, and Membership Committee.

Alfred McTeigua, a member of the newly organized Hondo Valley Livestock Club, is setting an example for club members in that area.


Alfred was recently awarded a first-place trophy on a registered Corriedale Ewe Fleece that he entered in the State Junior Wool Show in Albuquerque.

He started his 4-H Club work in 1946, under the 4-H Sears, Roebuck Foundation contest. He was winner of a pen of five registered Corriedale Ewes awarded by the Foundation and selected by County Agent Radcliff from the Floyd Childress flock.

Since starting his 4-H sheep project, he has received: a third-place ribbon award in 1946; a third-place award in 1947; a first and third award in 1948 at the Eastern New Mexico State Fair.

On showing fleeces, he has received at the State Wool Show: one second award in junior division in 1948; and first award on a fleece in 1949.

Alfred has also won a second award ribbon on a registered Corriedale Ewe Fleece shown at the National Western Wool Show held at Denver in January.

## Forest Fire Burns 640-Acre Area Near Bonita Dam

### Bill Don Knox 'State' Delegate

Bill Don Knox has been selected as Ruidoso High School's delegate to the 1950 New Mexico State at Portales in June, Paul Vance, principal, announced today.

Wade R. Hedgecoke has been designated as alternate for the citizenship training course, sponsored annually by the American Legion, in the event Knox is unable to go.

The Ruidoso delegate will be sponsored by the Ruidoso Lions Club through the efforts of Robert J. Hagee Post No. 79, Ruidoso's Legion unit. The project has been developed by the Legion to train future leaders in citizenship.

Some 200 young men, carefully chosen from New Mexico high schools, will gather at Eastern New Mexico University for a week's practice in operation of state and local government.

Under the guidance of experienced counselors, the youths will hold primary and general elections and then proceed to operate their city, county and state governments, complete in every detail.

Delegates are chosen by their high school principals for qualities of leadership, character and school citizenship as well as for academic attainments.

### School Survey Set For County

Charles E. Rose, state school superintendent, has been granted authority to initiate a school survey in Lincoln County which would serve as basis for possible district consolidations.

An excerpt from the State School Board meeting of Feb. 20 shows Mr. Rose making a motion for such a survey.

Greater efficiency and economy are the goals he seeks in suggesting the survey, Mr. Rose said. He requested that members of a survey commission be chosen from the State Department of Education, the office of the Educational Budget Auditor and the office of transportation.

He suggested that after the survey is completed, members of the commission meet with Lincoln County school authorities to work out agreements on any consolidations.

Dates of the survey and members of the commission are yet to be announced.

### Capitan Girls Plan Box Supper

The Capitan High School chapter of the Future Homemakers of America will sponsor a St. Patrick's Day box supper at Capitan High Gymnasium tonight at 7:30.

The dinner is intended to raise funds to send members of the state FHA meet to Las Vegas March 28, L. V. Clarke, Capitan school superintendent, reported.

A forest fire, which swept over a 640-acre area west of Bonita Dam for two and one half days, was controlled late Tuesday after claiming indirectly the life of a Carrizozo man.

The man, Lonnie McClintock, was reported to have died enroute to a Carrizozo hospital following a heart attack he suffered after hauling a load of fire fighters to the area Sunday. He had been an employee of the Southern Pacific some 20 years. It was reported.

Forest Ranger Ed Guck said about 110 firefighters, including 100 soldiers from Holloman Air Force Base, got a line around the fire late Tuesday in Aaron canyon, about 15 miles northwest of Ruidoso.

He said the blaze started shortly after noon Sunday when a picnic fire was fanned out of control by high winds. Actual burned area comprises only about 200 acres although early reports said it covered an area between 1800 and 3000 acres, Ranger Guck said.

About 100 civilian fighters responded to the fire call about 8 p. m. Sunday and later were replaced by the soldiers, he said.

Especially valuable in the fight were 18 members of a trained crew from Mescalero, under direction of Bert Shields, Mr. Guck announced.

He said several men sustained minor cuts, bruises, and burns but that no one was seriously injured on the fire line.

The fire burned through an area half a mile wide and two miles long. The kill was complete in some spots, Guck said.

The burn extends from Robinson canyon through Littleton canyon to Aaron canyon.

A three-act comedy, the play is being directed by Earnest Beagley, local artist.

All members of the cast except two appeared in the Junior Class play last year—"Girl Shy"—and should be able to present a play worthy of full community support, Mrs. Simpson said.

Proceeds will be added to the "Senior Trip Fun" which has been built so far from concession sales at school during the noon hour.

Purchase of the White House Apartments in central Ruidoso was announced this week by Buddy Richardson, San Angelo, Texas, oilman.

The apartments, formerly owned by J. B. "Dutch" Shier, will be open by April 1, Mr. Richardson said.

A pioneer in the ice cream industry in Texas, he moved to El Paso 37 years ago to found the Velvet Ice Cream Co., later consolidated with Price's Creameries.

He also was a director of Valley Gold Dairies at Albuquerque and was treasurer and director of Price's Creameries after his retirement in 1944.

Survivors include a cousin, Conrad N. Hilton of the Hilton Hotel chain.

Funeral was held March 10 at El Paso with burial at Restlawn Cemetery.



Since there are only four months left in this fiscal year, a regular \$60 membership would cost \$20, while the \$30 membership (for smaller businesses) would only be \$10.

"You probably read in the paper something of our present plans. We especially want you to become a member now so that we may have 100 per cent listing of our businesses to put in with the new booklet we are planning to get out as soon as possible.

"Also, you who have been paying for your membership on a monthly basis, we hope you'll check to see if you are paid to date—so you will not miss being listed. These pledges, of course, are not due until July 1, but by the 1st of April, those who pledged \$60 should not owe more than \$15, while those who pledged \$30 should have a balance of not more than \$7.50. We recently sent out letters showing how these accounts stand according to the Chamber of Commerce records. They were not meant as duns, but as a means of finding out how we stand. If there are any corrections to be made, we want to be advised. If you are behind, of course, we hope you'll catch up as soon as possible. If for some reason, you became unhappy with your Chamber of Commerce and decided to drop out, we hope you'll reconsider.

"We don't just want your money. It's a sordid fact we have to have money to work with, but we also want your interest and good will. If you have any suggestions, let us have them and above all, if you don't like what your directors are doing, let us know. Let us discuss our differences of opinion and see if we can't see each other's point of view and so come out with the best obtainable for ourselves, our businesses and our Community.

was made, they said, because this name indicated a construction firm rather than a publicity group.

Mr. De Bord described various tourist attractions of this "Fabulous Empire" area of the Southwest and told some 70 persons present that the region "has been lying dormant."

He urged a campaign to publicize the section as a unit and to "predetermine" destination of eastern tourists so they would stop here instead of going on through to the coast.

Mr. Bloodworth told of national advertising plans and said "millions could be spent in this area that are not being spent now by tourists."

Publication of a Southwestern folder by May 1 was urged and the funds contribution requested. The group plans to use a contribution of \$1500 for each of five years by Lordsburg as a standard and request funds proportionately on a population basis.

# No Town or City Can Outgrow and Outlive Its Permanent Water Supply

## A Plain Talk With the People of My Town:

Most of you have known me for a long time. I spent my summers here from 1929 until 1933, when I became a permanent resident. I have seen Ruidoso make practically all her growth. In the scramble for quick profits too many lost sight and consideration of the very foundations on which the town had to stand to survive. Profit making enterprises went over with a bang. Then one day we woke up to the fact we had a water shortage. Instead of getting a highly qualified corps of experts to explore every possible source of a permanent water supply, temporary expedients were adopted. As one expedient failed another was tried. And each time the water situation went from bad to worse. Imagining powers and rights they did not have, the Village Board plunged their pipe lines into the Ruidoso River and without permission or promise of pay took the water that the farmers down stream owned as a vested right for scores of years. It was inevitable that the farmers would bring court action to stop it. This they did, and the suit is now pending in District Court.

Right now, the District Judge could, with one stroke of his pen, write the one word, "Granted" and put the clamps of an injunction on further use of the water taken without authority from the creek.

And that is why I have been warning the people of Ruidoso by articles in the local newspaper, "It is Later Than You Think." Another article pleased with our Village Board that "It is Late, But Not Too Late to Arbitrate." Who got us into such a dangerous predicament? Nobody else COULD except those in authority down at the City Hall.

As a result all the big things planned and put over for profit will wither and perish if there is insufficient permanent water supply. The situation is not entirely hopeless if we use courtesy, good sense and fair dealings with our neighbors.

The big boom and bluff of buying a few acres of water rights and get all the water we want has no more meaning than a red apple dangled at the end of a string. Neither rain, nor sleet, nor snow will guarantee an ample water supply for all entitled to it. Head the rings in the stumps of trees and check the recordings of cycles of wet and dry years here in the Ruidoso Canyon. I can show you nature's own record for 350 years in a tree cut in my yard. There are many dry cycles lasting from five to fifteen years. In such long dry seasons prorated water rights would not begin to supply Ruidoso. And to buy enough WATER RIGHTS to guarantee ample supply would bankrupt Ruidoso property owners.

## Manifestly, We Ought Not to Further Risk the Clamping Down of an Injunction

It is also quite plain that whatever water supply Ruidoso gets to bridge the gap pending a complete and final installation of a permanent water supply must be obtained by a temporary satisfactory agreement with the farmers. And this brings up the all-important question of who would be most likely to get a working agreement with the farmers. Most certainly and positively not any of the men of the present city administration. They are the ones against whom the suit is pending, and those responsible for the hopeless deadlock that ensued in bringing the suit.

If we have any chance or hope of success in an effort to reach an agreement with the farmers, we must have a complete change of personnel representing the Village to undertake favorable negotiations. There are able and experienced men among the farmers. Some are University graduates with years of active experience in engineering, geology, business administration and other leading professions. Neither bluff nor buster, nor unsound reasoning would get anywhere with them. That has already been tried with most unfortunate results.

We need, and must have, an entirely new team to come on the field and "carry the ball." Men with new enthusiasm, ability and business vision and experience far above and beyond the oxcart days of thinking. The men and women supporting the Non-Partisan Ticket are convinced that the men on that ticket have all the qualifications demanded in this crisis. They believe in a voter's right to a free choice. A choice without threats or campaign promises. They believe that you can do your own thinking and deciding without benefit of a ward-heeler's prodding.

If you have a home, property or business here, you will be wise to think frankly, soberly, and weigh carefully all I have said here before you vote on April 4th. Topics of statewide interest will be discussed. Reports will be submitted by committees on tourists, highway safety and legislative programs.


After the meeting, delegates will go to El Paso to meet with the El Paso chamber and later will visit Juarez.
