Mulcahy Sells Ranch; Buyers Plan Resort

Sale of the Mulcahy property on the Mon Jeau road to Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Wilson and sons of Roswell was announced this week.

C. D. Mulcahy, Alto, said the Wilsons will operate an up-to-date dude and livestock ranch at the 9000-foot location. It will be known as "The Mon Jeau Homestead."

Ranch-style meals of home-grown products will be a feature. Other attractions will include saddle horses for hire, guided pack trips to the top of Baldy and other points in the White Mountains, and guided hikes.

Accommodations will be available for hunters and ski parties in fall and winter.

The ranch, picturesquely located in one of the outstanding scenic spots of this region, is 10 miles from Ruidoso and is surrounded entirely by the Lincoln National Forest. The scenic road to Mon Jeau fire lookout (elevation 10,000 feet) crosses the ranch.

Mr. and Mrs. Mulcahy are moving to Roswell.

Hundreds Visit Hospital At Opening; Help Needed

Attendance at the formal opening of the new Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital was heart-warming and contributions generous, but more help is needed if the hospital is to remain open, T. J. Welborn, board chairman, said this week.

Some 600 persons attended the open house and silver tea Sunday. Contributions totalled \$1024.64, Mr. Welborn said.

"We are very grateful for this expression of interest and support," he said. "But the hospital will receive no aid from the state or county until next November. Only continued support of the community will keep its doors open."

Mr. Welborn said Federal funds were provided only for construction and equipment. State funds will not be available until fall and even then will not be sufficient to cover all costs of operation.

Many contributions of food and aid were acknowledged by the hospital staff.

Popular Dry Goods Co. of El Paso gave a large shipment of sheets, pillow cases and blankets. Other individuals have donated linen, bedspreads and food.

Martha P. Graves, local artist, gave the hospital a painting "Superstition Point." The picture hangs in the lobby.

Mr. and Mrs. Welborn endowed a room in the honor of their parents. They contributed \$500 to cover cost of equipment in the maternity room adjoining the nursery, room 105.

A bronze plaque bearing a memorial inscription to Mr. and Mrs. Thomas W. Welborn and Rev. and Mrs. John W. Cowan, will be placed in the room. Other rooms are available for endowments.

Mrs. J. W. Carruthers has been retained as cook at the hospital. She is well known in Ruidoso.

Russell M. Jennings, hospital superintendent, praised work of the Ruidoso Business and Professional Women during the silver tea.

"The B & P W women really put it over," he said. "They worked very hard and deserve most of the credit for making the opening such a success," he said.

Gun Club Wins Coronado Match In Sunday Shoot

The Ruidoso Gun Club moved a step closer to the coveted Coronado Cup this week by winning the first stage of the Coronado Cup aMch on their home range.

Participating were the local club, New Mexico Military Institute, and the Roswell Rifle and Pistol Club.

The Coronado Cup Match, an annual contest, was instituted in the '30's by the New Mexico Rifle and Pistol Association. It is a shoulder-to-shoulder match fired by every rifle team in the state.

The match must be fired with at least one other team, and only one stage may be fired on each team's home range. Only one stage may be fired on one day. Scores are tallied officially and totalled by the NM Association secretary. Awards for teams and individuals are made from these scores.

Thirty six men took part in the Sunday shoot. Each man fired 20 shots at 600 yards. Team scores: Ruidoso 463, NMMI, 464, Roswell 462. Five high men: Doc Dudley, Roswell, 96; R. H. Hedgecock, Ruidoso, 96; Charley Fuller, Roswell, 96; L. D. Blake, NMMI, 95; and George Trimble, Ruidoso, 95.

The final stage of this match will be fired at Roswell Sunday at the NMMI range.

Baccalaureate services for the graduating class of Ruidoso High School will be Sunday, 8 p.m., at the Community Methodist Church.

A vocal solo will be given by Bill Nolan and Mrs. Don Richner will play the processional and recessional marches.

A record number of fishermen were expected to crowd the banks of the Ruidoso today as the 1950 trout season got under way.

Sales of fishing licenses, reservation fishing permits and fishing gear indicated a big turnout, local businessmen reported.

The season, opening 20 days earlier in trout fishing areas south of U. S. 60, also was expected to attract several hundred anglers from the northern part of the state. Fishing in that part of the state does not begin until May 25, except in certain special waters.

The season opened here May 5 because of the extreme drought conditions which have resulted in very low stream flow for this time of year, State Game Warden Elliott Barker said.

Anticipating heavy loss of fish, the Commission decided to open areas here and near Silver City, he said.

The action followed by a few days the planting of 4545 legal size trout in the north and south forks of the Ruidoso in the reservation.

The Ruidoso from Hondo to its source is good fishing, many who have fished it report. But heavy fishing pressure and low water have reduced chances of success in many stretches, local anglers say. Good results are expected in the reservation and in a few "holes" in the village.

Plenty of fish are reported in the south fork of the Bonito, but size is small. Fish are congregated in pools at present, it was said.

Fishing still is prohibited at Bonita Lake by the Southern Pacific railroad, owner of the dam. Nogal Lake is open.

Fishing licenses are available here at Bonnell's Hardware, White Auto Store, Self-Serve Grocery, and Ruidoso Dry Goods. Reservation fishing permits, at \$1.00 each, are available at the same stores, or from Bradley Blymouth at the Ruidoso Recreational Area campground in the reservation.

Flames Threaten Big Fire Here

A spectacular fire, believed to have been caused by a cigaret tossed into a pile of trash, threatened to spread out of control for a few minutes here Monday afternoon.

Fanned by an intermittent breeze, the flames shot 20 to 30 feet into the air before they were brought under control by Ruidoso volunteer firemen.

The blaze broke out just east of the home of Melvin Knox of the Community Public Service Co. on the north side of the river.

A few tall pines were seared by the flames which set some of the overhanging branches on fire. Aside from a stack of lumber which was destroyed, no damage was reported.

70 Association To Convene Here

Highway 70 Association will convene here June 10 to transact regular convention business, W. D. Crosby, an association director, announced this week.

Mr. Crosby said he invited the group to hold its convention here at a meeting of association officials at Roswell April 25.

About 100 delegates from Texas, Arizona and New Mexico are expected to attend, he said.

Although separate, the meeting coincided with a session of the directors of the Chamber who named W. D. Crosby, Ruidoso, director of the Highway 70 Association, discussed plans for a Ruidoso "Duffers" Golf Tournament," and approved an advertisement for two El Paso newspaper special editions.

In voting to close out finances of the Year-Round Club, its directors said that money raised by the club had been used for advertising and that the Chamber "might as well make use of it." Any objections should be directed to the Chamber directors, it was said.

Mr. Crosby was appointed chairman in charge of plans for the "duffers" tournament. The tourney, invitational to all amateurs, will be June 8, 9, 10.

Bid of Harry Crimmins, Ruidoso sign-painter, was accepted for repair of Ruidoso highway signs.

Power Lines On New Station After Switch

Electric power to REA consumers in this area was off almost all day Sunday, although the Community Public Service power plant in Ruidoso supplied local users.

The power shutoff was necessary so Bureau of Reclamation workmen could transfer lines from their temporary sub-station at Alamogordo to a new one recently completed, it was reported. The station, termed one of the best in the state by Bureau spokesmen, handles power generated at Elephant Butte dam and sent over Bureau lines to Alamogordo, Ruidoso and other communities.





LET'S KEEP IT UP

Ruidoso and the Valley have a right to be proud of the most modern, best-equipped hospitals in New Mexico. Let's continue to give it our support, our interest, and our best efforts to see that its facilities are made available to everyone, no matter what his profession.

WHO IS NEXT?

But it might not last much longer. Who will start the next fire—you?

The FBI's Confidential Files

THE question of whether or not the confidential files of the FBI should be opened, in order to affirm or refute current charges that certain men high in the Government are Communist stooges, has been much in the headlines. To many, it may seem a reasonable procedure. But the Bureau's director, J. Edgar Hoover, sees the matter differently. And his twofold reason for opposing opening of the files is of the highest importance.

First, opening the files would gravely damage the Bureau's future efforts in obtaining confidential information, by disclosing the names of informants. Some of the witnesses whose testimony led to the conviction of the 11 Communist leaders in New York had risked their lives as undercover employes of the FBI. In Mr. Hoover's words, "A disclosure of FBI reports would reveal the identity of confidential sources of information and, if it did not place the lives of such persons in actual jeopardy, it would certainly ruin their future value and effectiveness." And, moreover, criminals and subversives would be forewarned and would conduct themselves accordingly.

Second, opening the files could do the most serious and unwarranted injustice to individuals. The files contain complaints and allegations—not only facts—which may or may not be true. Mr. Hoover compared them to the notes of a newspaper reporter before he has culled the printable from the unprintable. Then he said, "I would not want to be a party to any action which would 'smear' innocent individuals for the rest of their lives."

Mr. Hoover makes it plain that opening these files could very well both endanger the national security and commit profound injustices on good citizens.

ORDER OF STATE GAME COMMISSION AMENDING REGULATION No. 247

Under authority of Section 48-201 of the New Mexico Statutes 1941 Annotated, Section 5 of Regulation No. 247 establishing open seasons and bag limits and certain rules for taking game mammals, game birds and game fish during the license year beginning April 1, 1950 is hereby amended as follows:

"In all trout waters situated south of U. S. Highway 66, the trout season shall open on May 8, 1950, instead of May 25, as provided by said regulation, provided that Bear Canyon Reservoir shall not open until May 30."

This change in opening date is due to the continued drought situation prevailing in the mountains of the southern half of the State and resultant abnormally low stream flow which will inevitably cause a great loss of fish in the late spring or early summer unless heavy precipitation comes, and sportsmen will thus be permitted to harvest the fish while there is sufficient water in the streams of that area and forestall anticipated loss of trout.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the foregoing amendment to Regulation No. 247 be published in accordance with law in the Albuquerque Journal, the Silver City Enterprise, and the Ruidoso News.

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
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
Appraisal Meet At Albuquerque
