## Contest Stalls Sale Of Bonds For Water Works

The election contest suit filed last week has paralyzed efforts to sell Village bonds for a new water system, but has left work on the airport project virtually untouched, it appeared this week.

Arthur Quinn, Albuquerque broker, said the suit had placed Village Mayor Ike N. Wingfield in a "doubtful status" as an official and that such doubt made the bonds unsalable because bond attorneys would not approve the issue until authority of village officials has been proved. Only final settlement of the election contest will make this possible, he indicated.

However, Village Clerk L. F. "Jo" Dryden said work could proceed on the airport.

"We have drawn up the necessary zoning ordinance and it should pass the board of trustees Friday night," he said. "Then we must get complete engineering drawings in order to send the portfolio to Santa Fe and get our matching-funds grant of \$21,000."

Work can proceed on the airport once the first grant is approved, he said.

The election contest was filed last week by W. D. "Dick" Ratliff, unsuccessful candidate for mayor on the Non-Partisan ticket in the April 4 election, and Ray Dill, unsuccessful candidate for trustee on the same ticket.

The suit alleges that a number of votes were cast by persons ineligible to vote. Defendants are Mayor Wingfield and O. A. Lualaba, trustee.

## Race Program Is Described

A story on Hollywood Park's summer racing program is included in the May issue of The New Mexico Stockman, largest livestock journal circulating in New Mexico.

Claiming 17,500 circulation, The Stockman also has hundreds of readers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona and Colorado. The story tells of the quarter horse and thoroughbred futurities and other track schedules for the season which opens May 28.

Devoting a cover illustration to forest fire, The Stockman features an article covering the history of the Ocate holocaust by E. L. Perry of the Forest Service regional office at Albuquerque and several other articles of interest to farmers and ranchers.

## Bob Boyce Enters Matched Roping At Capitan Sunday

First calf roping of the season is scheduled at Capitan Sunday between Bob Boyce of Ruidoso and Billy Stover of Tularosa.

Each man will rope and tie 10 calves for \$1000. Jackpot roping also is planned.

Mr. Boyce, well known in Lincoln county, won rodeo honors on several occasions while still in school. He hasn't roped for several years but reportedly has practiced steadily since sale of the Navajo Lodge several weeks ago freed him of his work there.

Mr. Stover also is well-known in roping circles and reportedly is an excellent contestant.

## Tax Collection To Be Enforced

The Village will take court action against all persons who have not paid their business, occupational or special license taxes by June 1, Village Clerk L. F. Dryden said this week.

He said the Board of Trustees set the date for such action at their regular meeting Friday night.

"The office of the clerk and the police department have been instructed to bring court action for the collection of all stated taxes which have not been received by June 1. Delinquent dog taxes are included," Mr. Dryden said.

## Interest Mounts In 5th Futurity

Activity at Hollywood Park, where nearly 100 horses are being readied for the Fifth Annual Central Bar and Grill Quarter Horse Futurity, neared its peak this week.

Only nine days remain before the eliminations. Seven full races are scheduled.

The futurity, largest quarter horse event of its kind in the world, claims 66 entries from seven states. It also features the largest purses in the quarter horse world.

Herman Jefferson, Hollywood Park racing secretary, is starter, a role in which he is recognized as outstanding.

"The races are expected to draw capacity crowds. Interest has been widespread and is evidenced by numerous inquiries of horsemen and track fans who have mailed requests for information to the Chamber of Commerce and to the track's publicity headquarters.

## New Subdivision Opens Near Here

The Palmer Realty Co., this week announced opening of the L. W. Hutson Carrizo Creek Subdivision southeast of Ruidoso.

The Subdivision, which is restricted to residential use, comprises 40 acres which formerly were part of the Weldon Carter estate. They are located just north of the Carrizo School property adjoining the Mescalero-Apache reservation.

Frank Barajas, Ruidoso constable, was first purchaser of land in the subdivision. He bought tract No. 6 in block two. The tract measures 121 feet by 300 feet.

The subdivision features abundant water which flows from several springs and is so near the surface in other spots that a well can be dug with a shovel. The tracts are restricted but will permit owners to keep saddle horses if they wish. Rich soil and water will permit cultivation of gardens, flowers and fruit trees.

Unusually scenic, the area is expected to attract a number of investors, Joe Palmer, Realty Co., partner, announced. He said his firm will be sole agent for the subdivision.

## Postmaster's Job At Mescalero Open

The United States Civil Service Commission this week announced an examination to fill the position of fourth-class postmaster at Mescalero. The examination will be held at Alamogordo at a date to be announced by mail to all applicants.

Applications close June 3, 1950, the announcement said. Salary for the successful applicant will be \$2079. Applicants must be at least 21 and not yet 65 to be eligible. Application blanks and full information about requirements of the examination may be secured from the Mescalero postoffice.

## Big OES Barbeque At Hollywood Park Set For Sunday

A benefit barbecue, sponsored by the Ruidoso Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star and local shriners, is expected to attract up to 2500 persons to Hollywood Park Sunday.

Featuring a program, including music by the Shrine band from Albuquerque, the barbecue also will offer carnival attractions, soft drinks and sweets.

## Cattle Growers Spend Heavily At Convention

Members of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association spent an average of \$43.10 per person per day at the 36th annual convention in March, Roy Forehand, Carlsbad, president, announced this week.

He said a survey of 2500 members who attended was made on recommendation of the convention committee of the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce.

Information compiled from a questionnaire shows that each member stayed in Albuquerque an average of three days and that the average number of persons representing a family was two and a half.

A division of expenses into three principal classifications indicates that ranchers spent 35 per cent for hotel, meals and travel; 48 per cent for ranch equipment, supplies and home equipment and 17 per cent for clothing and miscellaneous personal expense.

"Our organization has always felt that conventions of this kind add a good deal to the financial economy of the host city, however this survey is the first complete study we have ever made," Forehand continued.

Annual conventions of the association have been held in Albuquerque for the past 10 years because "facilities here appear most adequate to house the large number of people usually attending." (Continued on Page 3)

## A. H. Floto Dies Of Heart Attack

Albert H. Floto, resident of Ruidoso 10 years, died at his home here last week following a heart attack. He was 67.

Owner of the Floto Court, he had been in ill health for a long time. Immediate cause of death was a heart attack, the attending physician said.

Born in Iowa, Mr. Floto lived in Kansas for a time and then moved to Hagerman, N. M., where he operated a cotton gin and engaged in farming for a number of years.

He moved to Ruidoso permanently after the severe flood in 1941 and began operation of the court which bears his name. Well liked by those who knew him here, he is survived by a brother, Howard, at Marshalltown, Iowa, and two aunts, also in Iowa.

Funeral services were held at Ballard Funeral Home at Roswell May 13. Burial was at Rhodes, Ia.

H. H. Shier, general chairman, and Jack Hull, program committeeman, have promised fun for all members of the family.

The idea behind the barbecue, they explained, is to raise a sizable fund to be given to the Crippled Children's Fund through Frances Rogers, grand committeewoman of the Ruidoso OES chapter.

## R. M. Jennings In Full Charge At Hospital

The Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital board reiterated this week that Russell M. Jennings, superintendent and technician, is in complete authority at the hospital.

A board spokesman said the new statement was prompted by reports from various quarters that a number of persons believed a medical doctor to be in charge.

"Mr. Jennings has full responsibility for operation of the hospital and is charged with maintaining all standards as set forth by the board and the state," the spokesman said. "He may admit any physician who meets the requirements and he may exclude any physician who, once admitted, violates any of the regulations."

The board member said several medical doctors had come to the hospital under the impression that an MD was in charge and showed increased interest in the hospital when they learned that such was not the case.

A chief of staff has been one of the primary concerns of the board, the spokesman said.

"We have made considerable progress in this direction," he said, "but it is still too early to make a definite announcement concerning our chief of staff."

He indicated that the board is considering a doctor from another state who desires to locate in Ruidoso.

## CHAVEZ RIDES AGAIN

NEW MEXICO'S Senior Senator, Dennis Chavez, a Democrat appointed to the Senate in the '30's by then Gov. Clyde Tingley, was back in the news this week for vilifying a public figure. This is a fact which surprised few persons who are familiar with his campaign tactics.

This time he chose Louis F. Budenz, self-styled ex-Communist editor of The Daily Worker and repentant Catholic. Budenz now is assistant professor of economics at Fordham University, a Catholic institution.

Chavez, careful to cloak himself in senatorial immunity and to attack a man who had little chance to strike back, accused Budenz of using the Catholic church as a "shield and cloak" behind which he was denouncing others falsely as Communists.

Whether or not we agree with Chavez, we deplore his motives. Without fail the man who is Chavez in New Mexico but "Shavay" in Washington chooses campaign time to make political hay of the superstition, prejudices, religion and hopes of a large segment of New Mexico's population.

From one side of his mouth he whispers brotherhood and charity, while from the other he screams hate and hypocrisy and seeks to create a guy between "his amigos" and those he opposes. This rabble-rousing talent of the senator's is embarrassing to the majority of both large segments of the state's population.

But his shrieks against "discrimination" are the rallying cry of brotherhood. Their appeal, while rejected logically, nonetheless are powerful emotionally in pulling votes from persons who cherish their small and imaginary grievances—and those who have real grudges to settle.

Chavez knows this. Each campaign he resurrects the same old skeleton and rattles it in the same moth-eaten closet. Each campaign he wins a few followers this way and alienates others who honestly seek to end the discrimination, however slight, which so agonizes the senator.

We believe the Chavez attack on Budenz was calculated for its effect on New Mexico politics. We believe Chavez chose again to don the patchwork coat of "the champion of the downtrodden"—a role he conveniently forgets for long periods.

Some have said they believed the Chavez blast was inspired by the administration. He denied this. We like to think it was inspired by a desire to appear powerful and fearless at a time when his brother, Ex-Federal Judge David Chavez, is seeking the Democratic nomination for Governor of New Mexico.

Chavez said he spoke "as a Catholic for the first time in 19 years." So the words of The Very Rev. Lawrence J. McGinley, S.J., president of Fordham University, are especially effective in rebuttal.

Terming the Chavez attack on Budenz a "slandorous and cowardly . . . and vicious offense against Christian charity," he said:

"It remained . . . for a member of . . . Senate to bring this personal vilification of Professor Budenz to a point even lower than that reached in the columns of the (Communist newspaper) Daily Worker. It might fairly be said that never within recent memory has a member of Congress so used his immunity in personal attack upon the character of a fellow citizen.

"The Senator had the effrontery . . . to pose as a Catholic while publicly snatching this vicious offense against Christian charity."

Reaffirming his faith in the completeness of Budenz's renunciation of Communism, Father McGinley said: "I must denounce the hypocrisy and uncharitableness" of the Chavez attack.

"Let those who shout another man's alleged transgressions from the housetops, look instead into their own hearts."

### PROGRESS?

Horse-drawn carriages used to travel an average speed of 11.5 miles an hour in New York's midtown traffic. Today the average speed of the high powered automobile on the same streets is six miles per hour.

Stressing the role that unsanitary outdoor privies and horse corrals play in spreading disease through flies, the release told of the importance of disinfecting stables, saddles, toilets screen doors, and window casements.

Other preventive measures suggested were for homeowners to make sure all privies are clean, well painted and well constructed in recognized fly-proof design, removal of fly breeding places, tight covers for garbage cans and good, tight screens on all windows and doors.

Spraying of a mixture of DDT and Chlordane as fly poison also was recommended.
