Manuel Ortiz, Carrizozo, Re-elected Treasurer.



Drive For Water Users' Pledges Gets Under Way By Ruidoso Lions Club

The drive being made by the Ruidoso Lions Club at the request of the Village Council to sign up contracts for water users is not making much headway.

When the Lions Club accepted the task of signing up contracts, it was assumed that it would be an easy matter to sign up all the permanent residents, since it would cost them no more, and that most of their work would be with the summer residents. After two days work it was found that this was just the opposite. Many summer residents are so anxious to get water that they readily sign up while the year-around residents delay the committee by arguing about everything imaginable, most of which is entirely unrelated to the water problem.

The Lions Club members are doing this work voluntarily and sacrificing their time in the midst of a busy season and it behooves every resident to sign up without delay. If you have not been contacted, go to the City Hall where all information is available and sign up there. Just because you have water now is no guarantee it is going to continue. The present supply is only temporary.

It is no more the duty of the Lions Club and the City Council to get behind this drive than it is for each individual resident to acquaint themselves with the proposed solution and sign at once.

Some 1800 persons registered in the old court house, but it was estimated at about 5000 persons attended the event. Last year, first year of the pageant, some 1400 persons had registered.

Hoarding Aids Our Enemies

FROM all over the country there have been reports of scare buying and hoarding. A minority of our citizens have been purchasing ridiculously large quantities of sugar, tires, nylon goods and other commodities on the theory that they would become scarce as the Government's armament program moves on toward high gear. The hoarder does not know it—but he is serving those who would destroy us. Hoarding undermines the economy. It dislocates the smooth machinery of supply and demand. It brings inflation. It creates fat black markets for racketeers. And finally, it leads to rationing and price controls and ever-growing government interference in the affairs of the people.

Manufacturers, retailers and others say that there are plenty of goods to go around, with few exceptions. If we buy normally, in the light of current needs, we will, not suffer for want of anything. But even if this were not true, there would still be no excuse, no mitigation, for the hoarder. Goods that go out of circulation, to be held in basements and attics, are goods which are lost to the country. They amount to a leak in the stream of production.

Retailers have been especially active in opposing hoarding and scare buying, and pointing out its folly and fallacy. They know that kind of business is bad business for everyone—and they know the grave results that will occur if it goes on long enough. But no one can stop hoarding except the consumer himself. The hoarder aids our enemies.

American Legion Urges Civilian Defense Plan

Immediate organization of local civilian defense systems is being pressed by the American Legion of New Mexico through its 100 posts covering every county and every major community in the state.

Letters have gone out to post officials from State Commander Seaborn P. Collins of Las Cruces, warning that adequate defense planning "may well mean the difference between life and death" in event of war.

Legionnaires have been urged to organize emergency committees and to offer the services of these to the mayors of their communities as a nucleus for any official defense programs which may be set up.

A suggested model plan of organization for a community defense set-up accompanied the letters, calling for a local director of defense and five deputy directors, each charged with a separate phase of the program.

Citing the possibility of all-out war, the Las Cruces man added that "We will win if we are ready. Now is the time to get ready."

Track Talk

Saturday and Sunday, August 5, and 6, were the final weekend of racing at Hollywood Park. With no rain the previous week the track was dry and fast for both days.

A crowd of about 1200 persons wagered \$28,880 through the mutuels on Saturday. The tenth race on the program—a half mile \$400 and \$500 claiming race—had the most mutual play of any one race of the day, \$3,421 being bet on it. It was won by Mr. Williams' Irene B, a fast mare with a lot of early speed. She is trained by her owner and was piloted by apprentice jockey D. Farris.

There was a crowd of 1700 persons on hand for Sunday's races. The mutuel handle for this day was \$50,032—a total that shows people were really betting on this last and final day. The eighth race on the card was the one with the most mutual play of the day. It had a handle of \$6,209 which was also the most mutuel handle of any one race for the entire week. This sprint—The Buckaroo Loung Purse a 330-yard allowance—had a purse of \$300 plus five per cent of the mutuels. University of California. He is an experienced teacher and has had extensive experience in the professional field of music.

The same bus drivers will serve the schools this year as last. R. H. Hedgecock will continue to serve the upper canyon, while R. E. Cater and H. L. Smelser will serve the same route as last year.

Extensive repairs have been made to the school buildings, more especially the High School building, where a complete plaster and stucco finish has been added both inside and out.

Elsewhere in this issue of the News announcements appear concerning football practice and registration plans for High School students. School busses will run on the first day of school on the approximate morning schedule as last year. All children will be returned to their homes by noon of the first day.

Gabriel Prins will operate the school bus for Indian students from Carrizo as he did last year.

Lockers were ordered for the High School last April. Latest information on this order indicates that these will be shipped from the factory on September 7, and should be ready for installation on or about September 20.

"Patrons of the school should make every effort to see that their children attend every day that is possible," according to Superintendent J. Howard Morris. "Not only is this essential for the educational welfare of the student, but it is essential to the financial welfare of the school. The amount of money received from the State for school maintenance is based on the average daily attendance of the school. Large numbers of absences materially reduce the amount of money received by the school."

Children are eligible for entry in school if they have attained the age of six years on or before January 1, 1951. Due to the crowded conditions of the school system "unders" will not be enrolled. By this is meant that children who attain their sixth birthday after January 1, will not be enrolled. All children of school age should be enrolled on the first day of school.

The largest enrollment in the history of Ruidoso Schools is anticipated for this school year.

School Registration Date Announced

High School registration will be Monday, Aug. 21. The schedule of classes as arranged last Spring will be changed slightly so that some students will be required to make changes in their daily schedules. Extent and number of changes in the schedule cannot be determined at this time.

Members of the Student Council are asked to plan to meet for a short time sometime during the morning, probably immediately after registration. The schedule will call for a home-room period only for seventh and eighth grades. Ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades will meet in home-rooms for 15 minutes and then report to assembly where the schedule will be worked out to fit courses desired by the greatest number of students. Registration cards will be filled out and filed for each student.

No classes will be held Monday. Class work will begin Tuesday morning, Aug. 22.

Students having problems concerning their 1950-51 classes may bring them to the High School Saturday morning, Aug. 19, from 9 to 11 a.m.
