Funeral Held For Pioneer At Glencoe

Will, T. Coe, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George W. Coe, was laid to rest Saturday, August 12, at 2:30 p.m., in the family cemetery on the ranch that was his birthplace in Glencoe.

Mr. Coe was born at Glencoe June 16, 1887, and died at Saint Mary's Hospital in Roswell August 11, 1950, after having suffered a stroke at his Glencoe home August 5.

Beside his widow, Bebe Coe, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Mayme Coe Perry of Glencoe, and the following children: Mrs. Everett Myer, Tularosa; Harold Coe, Albuquerque; Mrs. Roy Campbell, Espanola; Mrs. George Clert, Lisle, Ind.; Mrs. Marie Farrar, Ruidoso; Rowena Coe, Patsy Coe, Wanda Coe, and Bebe Carroll Coe, all of Glencoe. Also surviving Mr. Coe are thirteen grandchildren.

A host of friends and relatives attended funeral services which were held from the Will Coe home at Glencoe. Ballard Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements. Clergymen officiating at the services were the Reverend Oscar Stanford of the Green Tree Baptist Church, and the Reverend L. O. Oldham of the Tangle Baptist Church.

Pallbearers were: J. H. Morris, J. E. Reese, Dr. D. E. Snyder, Paul Jones, Carmon Phillips, Jack Parnell, S. G. Heeter, and Genevivo Ybarra.

Mr. Coe served with the United States Customs Service at El Paso 11 years from 1923 to 1934. He was state representative from 1944 until his death. His term would have expired in 1951. During the last years of his life he devoted his time to ranching and farming interests, at his Glencoe home.

Some 50 Lions, wives and guests gathered at the Boy Scout camp site in the Mescalero Indian Reservation at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning. Breakfast of bacon, eggs, potatoes and coffee with Indian fry bread made up a hearty meal and was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Preparation of the meal was made by Mescalero members of the Club. The group consisted of the following: Reno Sarlin, John Crow, Marshall Woodward and Juan Bal-donado. They were assisted by Victor Dolan, Bradley Bismouth, Mrs. Blaza Dorame, Ellen Yazhe and Bert Shields.

The two ladies prepared a fry bread which is an original Indian food and is served at this breakfast, was a rare treat. It is made from a previously prepared dough, about 24 hours, consisting of flour, baking powder, salt and shortening with enough water to make the proper consistency.

At the time of cooking, the dough is cut into balls as for rolls, but then they patted flat until they are the size of a dinner plate. Next they are cut in half and each piece dropped in hot fat. They immediately fluff up and turn a golden brown. Served with honey they are a treat.

Ray Reed entertained with his Western songs and guitar music. Everyone seemed to enjoy the breakfast affair so much that several members suggested that this be made an annual affair, according to Bill Hart, Lions president.

Road Right-Of-Way Application Refused Sports Association By Indian Business Committee

Application of the White Mountain Sports Association for right-of-way for a road from the Cedar Creek ski course to White Mountain Park was turned down by Mescalero Indian Business Committee at their regular meeting last Saturday.

Officials of the sports association had prepared complete engineering data with maps of the proposed road and had presented the information to the committee in person. The forestry committee had approved the project and the Indian attorney, Mr. Mobley had approved the contract.

If this application had been granted it would have enabled the sports association to have arranged financing for a cog railway to this natural ski area.

Another important decision made by the Business Committee in voting not to go into the saw mill business. After gathering a great deal of information on such an operation it was decided not to go on with the plans at the present time.

Stumpage prices of today bring the Indians a good profit and it was agreed to continue this operation as in the past with the exception of the following changes: The reservation timber lands are divided into units and the first unit, North White Tail, will be put up for sale on an auction basis.

Other units will be offered for sale as fast as surveys can be made. Within the next several months the tribe hopes to offer some 70 million feet of merchantable timber.

Continuation of the sale of stumpage by the Indian assures the village of Green Tree that the sawmills there will be able to keep on operating.

Central New Mexico Electric Cooperative, Held Special Meeting

A special meeting of the Central New Mexico Electric Cooperative was called to order at the public school in Corona by Mr. Charles Kellogg, president of the board of trustees.

Mr. Carl H. Johnson, manager of the Cooperative, welcomed members to the meeting and impressed upon them that neither the REA, the board of trustees, the manager nor his employees could do the job alone. Each member is needed to contribute his share.

The Cooperative is a locally owned, private non-profit enterprise democratically organized by the people to bring electric power to its members at the lowest possible cost.

No Antelope Hunting On Reservation

The Mescalero Tribal Business Committee has announced that there would be no open season on antelope on the reservation this year for Indians or any others.

Early drought conditions caused the death of many antelopes as well as other animals.

Also scarcity of bear in the high country does not allow a bear such as last year when 50 permits were granted.

Barkley To Address State Democrats

Alben Barkley, Vice-President of the United States, will be the principal speaker at the Democrats' Jefferson Day banquet in Albuquerque August 23, Ray Rodgers, State Democratic Chairman, announced today.

More than 2,000 Democrats and delegates to the party's state convention on August 24, are expected to attend the \$25.00 a plate banquet at the La Loma Ballroom in Albuquerque on the night of August 23 and to hear the Vice-President speak off the cuff.

The banquet and convention will mark the largest gathering of members of the Democratic Party in the history of the state.

Tickets for the banquet are on sale throughout the state with each Democratic county chairman in charge of the ticket sales in his county. A preliminary report to Mr. Rodgers early this week indicated that approximately 2,000 tickets will be sold prior to the night of the banquet.

Most of the proceeds from the banquet will be sent to the Democratic National Headquarters in Washington, D. C.

The convention will discuss and adopt the party's 1950 campaign platform. County conventions are now being held throughout the state with each county electing new county chairmen and naming delegates to the state convention.

The Vice-President is expected to fly to Albuquerque from Washington and spend approximately 24 hours in the state before leaving. Mrs. Barkley, his bride of a year, has been invited to attend also.

Prominent guests will be introduced at the banquet but Mr. Barkley will be the sole speaker.

Ralph Keleher, prominent Bernalillo County Democrat, is in charge of the banquet arrangements.

All state candidates will attend. Congressman John E. Miles, the party's 1950 nominee for governor, is expected to arrive several days prior to the banquet to discuss the 1950 campaign with party leaders.

Other members of the New Mexico congressional delegation are all expected to be here.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A MUNICIPAL DEFENSE COUNCIL, DESCRIBING ITS DUTIES AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico:

SECTION 1. There is hereby created the Municipal Defense Council of Ruidoso, New Mexico, to be composed of the Mayor, as Chairman, and such other persons, not exceeding eleven (11) in number, as the Mayor may appoint from time to time. The Mayor shall designate one of the number as Coordinator, who shall act as Vice-chairman for the Village of Ruidoso. Each member of the Municipal Defense Council shall serve at the pleasure of the Mayor, or until repeal of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. The Municipal Defense Council shall have full and plenary powers to employ such persons as may be necessary to carry out the functions of the Council, at no salary, unless the salary is authorized at a regular or special meeting of the Council. These persons shall be subject, however, to all regulations now provided by law governing this municipality.

SECTION 3. The Municipal Defense Council shall be charged with the duty of coordinating all defense activities of this Village. It shall:

- (1) Coordinate the activities of municipal and private agencies cooperating in the defense program;
- (2) Keep in contact with the Office of Civilian Defense to the end that all requests and suggestions from that Office shall receive prompt and efficient response;
- (3) Conduct studies regarding defense problems of the Village of Ruidoso to the end that the municipal government of the Village will at all times be abreast of the problems of defense, and information desired by Federal agencies will be readily available;
- (4) Survey existing facilities, profers of facilities, services and ideas originating within the Village and make appropriate disposition of them;
- (5) Act as a clearinghouse on municipal defense information for all governmental and private agencies cooperating in the defense program;
- (6) Direct information regarding the defense program to all municipal departments or agencies which are or may be affected thereby;
- (7) Make recommendations, from time to time, for improvements in the handling of defense problems affecting the Village.
- (8) Perform such other advisory functions as may be requested by

agencies or departments of the Federal Government in connection with the National Defense Program.

(9) Do whatever is necessary and proper to carry out the intent and purpose of this ordinance, tending to protect life and property.

SECTION 4. The Municipal Defense Council may expedite procedure by organizing itself into subcommittees, and may subdivide its work and prescribe such rules and regulations as are not in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance. It shall prescribe the training regulations. It may delegate the authority of preliminary hearings for dismissal of voluntary workers to the heads of Departments.

SECTION 5. The Municipal Defense Council may appoint additional com-

mittees to meet any emergency that may arise, but shall report same promptly to the Council of the Village of Ruidoso which shall have the authority, at its discretion, to order the discontinuance of such committee. Any person appointed to any position created under this ordinance may be removed by the appointing authority for any reason deemed by it to be sufficient.

SECTION 6. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, and shall take effect immediately upon execution and publication in the official journal.

Passed, adopted and approved this 11th day of August, A. D. 1930.
