
Cree Meadows Host To Women Golfers

Plans Made For Mescalero Youth Center

Clarence Cordry, Commander of American Legion Post 48, Mescalero; Mr. Andrew Little, president, Mescalero Council; and Roger Schenck, Commander of District 5, The American Legion, made a trip to Albuquerque Friday of last week for the purpose of conferring with Mr. Eric Hagberg, Area Superintendent of Indian Affairs, New Mexico, and a representative of the Interior Department, Washington, on the projected Mescalero Youth Center and Gymnasium. This will also be set up for a Community Center.

Progress has been made on this project. The conference was arranged by Senators Anderson and Chavez, New Mexico. It is an ambitious undertaking, and it is felt that when completed it will serve a long needed purpose, a place where those in residence on the Mescalero Indian Reservation will have parity as related to other community centers in the southwest.

Tentative plans call for a large gymnasium, ante-rooms, swimming pool, all adaptable for community meeting for sports and civic activities. There are plans for approach roads—a full time youth counsellor and athletic director. The project when completed, will cost around \$200,000. The natural resources available on the Reservation will be used to a large extent. The labor will be partially on a Veterans Administration set up under Public Law 246, on the job training and crafts school.

Cattlemen's Third Quarterly Meet Set For Silver City

The third quarterly meeting of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association will be held in Silver City September 5 and 6, according to Roy Forehand, Carlsbad, president. More than 500 state ranchers are expected to attend the regional meeting scheduled to be held in the town where the association was first organized in 1915, under the guidance of Grant County cattlemen. Several pioneer ranchers who are charter members of the organization are expected to be present. "In the past 36 years this association has grown from a dozen southwestern ranchers to its present strength of 5,587 members representing every county in New Mexico," Forehand said.

FISH AND GAME DEPT. PLANTS TROUT IN RIVER

The area in the reservation in which 3,500 six-inch rainbows was restricted for five days. The other 1,500 were placed in the lower Ruidoso. These trout were from the Pecos Fish Hatchery as were the 3,500 seven-inch fish planted the week before.

Headed by Paul Smyer, President of the Albuquerque Junior Chamber, Hill said the general committee includes, Cliff Ryan of Carlsbad; Bill Williams of Albuquerque; Max Edwards of Hobbs; Roy Beach of Roswell; William Klein, Jr. Albuquerque; Howard Klein, Las Cruces; and Harry Nelson of Artesia.

"We've never had so much enthusiasm over the State Fair", Hill said, "and this year's parade promises to go down in history as the 'biggest and best ever staged.'"

The merchants of Albuquerque and surrounding towns will undertake a campaign to turn the residents of the area out in western dress. All merchants in Albuquerque, through the Chamber of Commerce and the Albuquerque Retailers Association, have initiated a campaign to see that all their employees dress western for the fair, and will hold a "Days of '49" promotion prior to and during the nine days of state exposition.

Postmasters Under Civil Service System

Harry B. Mitchell, Chairman of the United States Civil Service Commission, has called upon the American public to recognize that postmasters are permanent officers under the Civil Service System, and entitled to all the rights and privileges of the law.

Chairman Mitchell's statement was issued as a part of a nationwide campaign launched by the National Association of Postmasters to educate the public as to the true status of postmasters in the Civil Service System. Too many people, the Association announced, believe that postmasters are temporary political appointees and it is resulting in an incorrect attitude toward the Postal Service.

In a public statement Chairman Mitchell announced: "Every postmaster not only has to qualify for appointment through an examination given by the Civil Service Commission, but he must be among the three top eligibles. Like other Federal workers, the postmaster serves without limitation on his term, subject only to the same competent handling of his office as required of all personnel."

"The country benefited when postmasters were placed under competitive civil service. The postmaster and his employees are the most important daily contact a citizen has with his Government. I am glad to know that the National Association of Postmasters is launching a campaign to inform the American public as to the real facts. The United States Civil Service Commission is particularly gratified at the manner in which postmasters are performing their duties."

Gov. Mabry Urges Rep Cross Training

As one of the initial steps in the State's Civil Defense Planning, Governor Thomas J. Mabry today urged that all New Mexico residents take the greatest possible advantage of Red Cross First Aid training programs being conducted throughout the State.

Governor Mabry pointed out that the National Security Resources Board top Civil Defense authority, has indicated that the American Red Cross would be asked to provide the nation with 20 million trained First Aiders within the next two years. This means, he said, that New Mexico should train 71,000 First Aiders for protection of its population.

The Governor cited an understanding between the National Security Resources Board and the Red Cross in which the Red Cross agrees to assist State, Local and National Governments to the extent of its ability, in development of their Civil Defense programs. Within this understanding, he said, the Red Cross when requested by State and local authorities will assist in First Aid training of Civil Defense workers and the public; training in home care of the sick and injured and Nurses Aid activities, and in other ways.




