Commission Signs Airport Contract

The Ruidoso Village Commission signed contract Tuesday night with the CAA for the building of the municipal airport. This action brings to a climax a long drawn out program on the part of the Village Commission and the committee that has been working with them.

Months ago the Lions Club appointed a committee of three men to work on the airport project. The committee was composed of Ralph Brown, Dick Ratliff, and A. J. Gates. This group made many trips to Santa Fe and other places and just kept hammering until the deal was consummated. Mayor Ika Wingfield and his commission got the contract signed last Tuesday and Brown and Ratliff flew it to Santa Fe early Wednesday.

The contract for the construction of the airport has been awarded to H. C. Jones of Albuquerque. The Wilson Engineering Company, also of Albuquerque completed their work some time ago.

The deal on the project was that the Village of Ruidoso put up 155 acres of land valued at \$500.00 per acre. This was matched by the CAA in the total sum of around \$71,000. The main runway will be 4800 feet in length and 80 feet wide. When finished it can easily take care of twin-engine planes. The runway will have a crushed rock base and will be topped with asphalt.

The completion of the new airport will be the greatest step forward that Ruidoso has ever taken. Ruidoso Lions will gather in a body when the first ground is broken for the project. The village commission has appointed a special committee to study further improvements which will include the bringing to Ruidoso of a commercial airline. Several of the larger commercial companies have been interested in serving this year round playground but the present airport has not been able to land the larger planes.

The municipal airport is under the personal management of Ralph Brown who plans to have four planes for charter service and who will be equipped to service all types of planes.
