50,000 Through Reservation Entrance During Summer

October let the summer season at the Mescalero Apache Reservation Ruidoso Recreation Area was officially over and no charge will be made at the entry gate until next summer.

Fifty-thousand people visited the area from May 15th until the middle of this week taking advantage of picnic grounds, fishing, horseback trails, foot paths in the Reservation area open to the public seeking the pleasure afforded by outdoor recreation in the Sierra Blanca mountains.

Latest improvements of the area include completion of forty fire places with grates, the rebuilding of the historic old Ranger Station which is soon to be turned into an arts and crafts, and many things of interest about their tribe.

Sanitary conditions have been improved with the providing of the latest type of equipment available for the area.

Plans for the next season's further improvements include the creating of a naturally beautiful scenic approach to the Reservation area; the construction of a picnic grounds above the Ranger Station for the use of civic clubs and larger groups with tables, a fireplace and Bar-B-Q pit. This will be large enough to accommodate 200 persons.

The Mescalero Business Council are happy to provide this recreation area for residents and visitors and at all times are willing to accept constructive suggestions regarding further improvements.

"The Road To Arabela"



"The Road to Arabela" shown above is the Pete Hurd painting in which many people over the area are interested. This watercolor was a study for a tempera landscape which has been in the Roswell Museum but is now in New York City as one picture in Hurd's one man show for Associated American Artists. (Exhibited in this show are twelve water colors, four temperas including the portrait of Hurd's daughter, Ann Carol).

The house shown is on the Purcella Ranch, the typical rancho of New Mexico and the South

west. At one time this past summer Pete was working on three versions of the same painting, the one above to be given to the San Patricio school to be used as they saw fit.

Hurd painted the subject in the late afternoon, which at that particular spot one fourth mile north of Tinnie, the landscape is always full of color. The effect lasts such a short time that he had to return repeatedly to complete the painting planning to arrive just before "color time". If anyone goes there to the exact spot Sierra Capitan, visible in the painting,

can not be seen from there... but can from the next canyon. As an artist he took the right to add to the painting for reasons of effect.

Another version of this same subject was painted by Pete Hurd about seventeen years ago and today hangs in a Utah Museum.

The above painting is still on display at Anderson's Lumber Company in Hollywood, New Mexico. They will be happy to tell you how to become the owner, and at the same time help rebuild the San Patricio school demolished by fire early last spring.

At the present time the hospital is as well equipped and stocked as any in the Southwest according to doctors from surrounding cities who have visited here and made inspection tours in the recent weeks past.

The board feels that the support of the communities served by the hospitals is increasing all the time and this means the successful operation of the institution.

John Davis Is Chosen To Fill Vacancy On Democratic Ticket

On the night of Oct. 5th, at the Court House Carrizozo the Lincoln County Democratic Central Committee held a meeting to fill two vacancies which had occurred on their ticket through the withdrawal of Frank Boyce, candidate for representative and Don J. Queen, candidate for county clerk.

John Davis of Hondo was selected by vote of the Central Committee for the representative position and Bracell Fresquez of Picacho was selected for the position of County Clerk. Both candidates were given a unanimous vote by two thirds majority of eligible voting members of the Central Committee.

John Davis comes to us from Chavez County having graduated from the Roswell High School, he has made his home in Lincoln County for the past three years, some of you will remember him as "Bully the Kid", he played this part in the past two annual Lincoln Day Celebrations; John Davis worked a year at Ft. Stanton deciding to become a farmer, he acquired a small ranch or farm near Hondo. He is a veteran of World War II, having served as a radar man. He is married and has two children, his wife just recently was appointed Curator of the Museum at Lincoln. John Davis is honest and sincere, I think he will make Lincoln County a fine representative.

Bracell Fresquez is a native of Lincoln County, I think the name of Fresquez in Lincoln County is as old as some of the very rocks of the Hondo Valley. Bracell Fresquez graduated from the Hondo High School in 1940. He served in the Air Force in World War II for 3 years, he attended City Community College of Santa Fe, for two years, after that he was employed by the State Fish and Game Dept., working with them about five years. He returned to Lincoln County after a death in the family and is now active in managing some of the Fresquez's business ventures. Bracell Fresquez will make us a good County Clerk.

Who Opposes Socialized Medicine?

It is frequently argued that most of the opposition to either socialized medicine or government controlled medicine originates within groups whose motives are entirely selfish, and who are completely without interest in the welfare of the masses of people.

That argument cannot withstand the light of fact. Current proposals for government medicine have met with the opposition of 15 state legislatures, and the amazing total of 10,000 national, state and local organizations. Among these are the General Federation of Women's clubs, the American Legion, the Vetrans of Foreign Wars, the American Bar Association, and the American Farm Bureau Federation.

To say that organizations of this character are inspired by the selfish considerations of a few people is to say the ridiculous. They represent millions of individuals, of all political faiths, and of all the economic levels. They agree on the issue of government medicine for one reason—their belief that it would reduce the quality of medical care that it would place a tremendous and unnecessary burdn on the taxpayers, and that the growth of our established system of medical care, along with the many voluntary insurance plans, offers the best available solution to our health problems.

Those who would socialize, or otherwise regiment the practice of medicine, work on the theory that if a roof leaks, the solution is to burn down the house. That there are gaps in our medical care system goes without saying and doctors are among the first to realize this, and to take measures to close them. In recent years, enormous progress has been made. The future will bring greater progress still—if the hand of the politician can be kept off the back of the doctor.

Put Your House In Order

Between October 8 and 14, Fire Prevention Week will be observed. So it's time to consider just what that week can mean to you.

You can, of course, take a cursory glance at fire prevention posters and news items and promptly forget them. You can doze when a brief fire prevention film is shown at the movies. You can turn the radio to another station when a fire prevention week speaker comes on. Do that, and you'll run a good chance of having a destructive fire—with the ever-present possibility of death and injury—some time in the future.

On the other hand, you can take the week seriously—and give your full attention to the suggestions and advice offered you. Then you can apply the expert knowledge thus gained to your home and other property. As a rule, fire prevention is both easy and inexpensive. It consists largely of such common-sense practices as periodically inspecting heating and lighting equipment, ridding buildings of accumulations of junk, providing proper storage for paint, cleaners and other flammables, and giving due care to matches and smoking materials. The basic purpose of the week is to refresh your mind on such matters, and to encourage you to get the job done as soon as possible.

Do this, and the chances of your having a fire will diminish. Fire prevention week is designed to help you put your house in order. How about it?

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
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Over Lincoln County






