## Retail Merchants Plan 'Dollar Days; First Event' And Drawing [Nov. 4

Friday night a representative and enthusiastic group of merchants of Ruidoso, Hollywood, and Green Tree met at the Community Center to discuss plans to promote year around business in the area carrying out a plan to make this a permanent and normal community economically.

The meeting was called to order by Lloyd P. Bloodworth, acting as chairman. After a short talk by him urging the merchants to think of some plan whereby consumers in the trade territory can be drawn to this community to trade the meeting was thrown open to discussion and suggestions from the floor. For the next period many ideas were submitted and discussed and finally from these evolved the decision to have "Dollar Day" on the first Saturday of each month.

To close the meeting the follow-

ing committee was selected to work out complete plans to hold the first dollar day November 4. George Fuchs, Bill Hart, Dick Ratiff, Joe Hawkins, chairman, Carmon Phillips and Lina Beth Stewart. After working all this week completing plans they have called a meeting for Friday night, October 27th at which time all merchants who plan to participate will meet at the Community Center.

Part of the plan includes a drawing every "Dollar Day" with the merchants taking part giving tickets to their customers, one ticket for each dollar spent. The tickets for the first drawing, November 4th have been ordered and will be here in time for distribution October 27th when final rules and regulations will be set up.

The hue and cry of those who have not been doing their trading

at home has been "we can't afford to". This program being planned by the merchants is also designed to show their potential customers that "they can't afford not to trade in their own territory."

This week the committee has spent many hours calling on other merchants from Ruidoso to Green Tree explaining the plan to them and giving them an opportunity to take part. Next week they will announce complete rules for the drawings, number and kinds of prizes, etc. as well as a list of participating business houses.

## Warriors Play In Carrizozo Today

The Ruidoso Warriors seek their seventh victory of the season today (Friday) in Carrizozo, with the kickoff scheduled for 1:30. The Warriors have now won twelve straight games counting the last six games of the 1949 season. This year they have scored 151 points to 15 for their opponents. The Grizzlies are one of the three teams to score on the Warriors this season. Ruidoso won 33 to 6 earlier in the season.

Last Saturday night in Artesia the Warriors defeated Artesia B by a score of 20 to 2. Artesia score a safety before the game was a minute old, but the Warriors came back strong and scored two touchdowns in the first quarter. Wade Hedgecock made the first from the five yard line after Wayne Lewis had set it up with a 15-yard smash through center. The pass for extra point was no good. Milton Sanchez scored the second with a sensational catch of a short pass from Dave Parks and 40 yard run following the catch. Hedgecock smashed over for the extra point.

The second and third quarters were scoreless, although Artesia threatened seriously as the third quarter ended. The Warriors held for four plays inside their own two yard line to take over on downs. Parks kicked out nicely from behind the goal line and a few minutes later Hedgecock hit Sanchez with a long pass good for 60 yards and a score. However, the play was called back and Ruidoso penalized 5 yards for offside. Two plays later the same pass play again was good for a touchdown. Again Hedgecock rammed the line for the extra point.

## Important To All Reserves

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M.— Army enlisted reservists with four or more dependents now under orders to report for active federal service may be discharged upon application, the New Mexico Military District announced this week.

The policy parallels the dependency discharge rules recently announced by the Navy. Dependents are defined as children, spouse and parents, but no other relatives.

Applications must be supported by affidavits from the reservists and his dependents. Further information may be obtained from the military district, P. O. Box 1689, Albuquerque, or the nearest ORC unit instructor.

Ruidoso now has three remaining conference games—to day in Carrizozo, Nov. 3 with Capitan here, and Nov. 17 in Monument.

Born in Tennessee he moved to Hood County, Texas when a small boy. He went to Strawn in 1888 and resided there until 1937 when he moved to Weatherford, moving back to Strawn in 1942 to retire. Mr. Roberson had been a farmer all of his life.

Also a step daughter, Mrs. Gladys Duckworth of Breckenridge and two brothers, Ras, of Mineral Wells, and Jack of Thurber, 36 grandchildren and 23 great grandchildren.

## Fisheries Study Completed At Ruidoso

Fisheries director Fred Thompson has just returned from a survey of conditions in the southern section of the state where in conjunction with Dick Allgood, Department engineer, and Bill Humphries, district warden at Capitan, he made a survey of stream conditions at Ruidoso, New Mexico.

The survey of the Ruidoso river was to recommend to the Ruidoso Game Protective Association, chamber of commerce, and the Lions Club, means of improving the fishing conditions on the stream. Thompson's plan of constructing a series of small dams to increase the amount of water in the stream is expected to be followed soon by construction on the part of members of the White Mountain Game Protective Association.

The improvements will take place on the stream above the town of Ruidoso. Ruidoso, between there and the Mesquero Indian Reservation, and are expected to increase the trout fishing possibilities for the many tourists who come to the area each season.

Thompson also visited the Pecos river area below McMillan dam where he and Allgood drew up specifications for a fish trap to be used there in connection with rough fish removal.






