## As I See It

We are learning more and more that if we give the kids something to do and somewhere to go they will be better satisfied themselves and will have less desire to be doing things that they should not. I hope that every parent in the community will join with the kids and let's all have a grand time.

Time will soon be here when every voter in New Mexico will be called upon to cast his ballot. Wonder just how many of us have already secured a sample ballot and have begun to study all of the candidates and their qualifications to hold the offices for which they have announced. The main question that should confront every voter when he gets ready to mark his ballot is whether the candidate is qualified to fill the office. Too many times the person elected to an office has no more business holding the office than the man in the moon. It is not a question of what the candidate promises but what will be able to do. ## Work Progressing On Airport Here

Work is progressing daily on the Cree Meadows Airport under construction by the Village of Ruidoso with Federal Aid from the Aeronautics Administration, according to Charles Richardson, engineer, and Roy Seymour, foreman.

The entire runway, 5000 feet long, is staked out. This runs for almost a full mile the length of the beautiful valley situated almost due north and south.

The grading and leveling is in process now with eight men working. There will soon be another grader, rock crusher, and gravel trucks here to be manned by another dozen men. The eighty foot wide strip will be surfaced with gravel and then one and one-half inches of hot mix. This will complete the year around runway which will take care of almost all the commercial passenger planes used in this part of the country.

Contractor for the job is H. C. Jones of Albuquerque working with representatives of Wilson Engineering Co. of Salina, Kan.

## Republicans Bid For Ruidoso Vote

A nice crowd of Ruidoso residents and valley took part in the final meeting last Wednesday night of this week for the Ruidoso Republican Rally and was announced which followed.

Mr. Wilbur McKnight, precinct chairman, opened the meeting and welcomed the crowd over to William A. (Tom) Chamberlain of Mescalero who is county chairman for the republicans in Ruidoso. Mr. Chamberlain, county commissioner, and party leader for many years in the county, then received a big hand from his many friends gathered for the rally. The conversation he gave to Ruidoso and the side of Lincoln County during his terms as commissioner has not been forgotten. Able speaker, Chamberlain was much to bring about the note of outstanding enthusiasm shown by the audience of republicans and Democrats.

All county candidates were present but Corbin West, who is seeking election to the board of County Commissioners. Those speaking for the most part simply asked that the voters consider their qualifications carefully and support them November 7th. They were introduced in the following order by Chamberlain: Herbert Smith, candidate for justice of the peace in Ruidoso; Wilbur McKnight, candidate for county commissioner district 3; Granville Richardson, candidate for county commissioner district 1; Paulino Aldaz, candidate for probate judge; Mrs. Lorine Samelson, candidate for school superintendent of Lincoln County; Ben Greisen, Wright candidate for treasurer; candidate for sheriff; John E. Manuel Chavez, candidate for tax assessor; J. G. Moore, candidate for re-election for county clerk; and L. S. Heavy Drake, candidate for the post of Representative from the 16th district.

McKnight said, "I am not a very good speaker, nor am I a politician—but I have lived here for thirty years and know pretty well the problems affecting Lincoln County—If elected commissioner I will fulfill this office to the best of my ability."

Richardson thanked the voters for the fine majority they gave him in the primary and for their confidence in his ability and promised to fill the office impartially if elected.

Paulino Aldaz pointed out to the gathering that he had served as probate judge in 43-47 and was experienced and qualified for the job.

Mrs. Samelson spoke of visiting over the entire county and talking with interested voters regarding the schools of the county. She said she greatly appreciated their pledge of support to bring about

## Democrats Hold Rally At Hondo

With the state and county election just two weeks away both tickets are campaigning almost nightly working frantically to win votes and influence people.

With this end in mind John Davis, Democratic Candidate for state representative from the 16th district came forth at the Hondo rally last Saturday night with statements which might perplex some folk of the county who had not realized what one of the main issues of the campaign seems to be.

Davis, who has heretofore been too busy getting in his apple crop, according to his own words, to do much active politicking took to the floor after being introduced by Carl E. Ness, Democratic chairman in Lincoln County. He spoke as follows:

"Neighbors, I have been asked by a number of people to get up here tonight and state my platform. I do not think it is hardly right for a Representative to have a definite, clear cut platform, for after all he is representing you and his opinions in the State Legislature should be your opinions. Some personal opinions I will state—I am for better highways and feel that both National Highway 54 and State Highway 37 should be surfaced. I think we all know that this would be good for all of Lincoln County. I am also for improving schools and our educational system—lower taxes would be good."

After further discussion emphasizing that there must be close cooperation between the voters and the elected representative for the best interests of all he dropped what amounted to a "bombshell" into the audience by publicly taking a stand on the subject of "gambling" as related to the residents and voters of New Mexico and Lincoln County.

## VFW Auxiliary Head Visits



A Mescalero Cattle Sale up at Cow Camp No. 1 which is about 20 miles from highway 70 through the mountains out into the high valley country none more beautiful than this, is a never to be forgotten experience. There will be such a cattle sale November 2nd beginning at 9 am.

Cars, trucks, pickups start pouring onto the good gravel road early in the morning of a sale . . . all anxious to get there. But the cowboys who have been working the cattle to get them in from the range, segregated into "kinds" and into the huge corrals have been at their roundup for

hours and even days before this. In the influx of persons going to these sales are buyers, (from several states), sellers including all the ambitious and industrious Indian cattle owners of the Mescalero country, and the Cattle Growers Association representatives of Mescalero, writers, artists, movie enthusiasts and just plain "lookers" who get a thrill out of the occasion.

Upon arrival the visiting and paw-wowing starts with the men intent on talking cattle . . . what will they sell for . . . what shape are they in, etc . . . and the

**Hondo P-TA Hears Louis E. Diehl**

Louis E. Diehl of El Paso, Texas, addressed a P. T. A. assembly on October 10 at the Hondo Valley Union High School on the subject of the influence of the home plays in the education of the child. The rather startling fact was stated that the child spends only nine percent of life from the beginning of school to graduation from college in the classroom. Therefore, it was Mr. Diehl's contention that the home influence and the influences outside of school are the dominating factors which will determine the behavior of the child. He urged strongly that the parents consider carefully the importance of Christian American living in the home, for the training of a child begins from the day he is

born. He added further that an attitude of cooperation with all phases of the school program will enhance the benefits from it that will be derived by the child.

Another feature of the program was a musical program presented under the direction of Mr. Lane of the music department. Three numbers were presented by the members of the advanced chorus, accompanied on the piano by Margie Tinsworth—At Eventide, The Halls of St. Mary's and Las Mananitas. 

**Jerry Fairbanks In Korean Battle**

The following story was released by the United States Navy and pertains to Gerald J. Fairbanks, seaman apprentice, son of Lawrence E. Fairbanks, of Roswell and grandson of Harry Fairbanks of Ruidoso:

"As a member of the crew of the heavy cruiser U. S. S. Toledo, Gerald Fairbanks participated in the recent crushing amphibious invasion at Inchon, which spelled doom to any hopes of the North Koreans that they could flaunt the wishes of the United Nations security council.

"Fairbank's ship was part of the powerful U. S. Navy force which threaded its way through mines and treacherous channel to bombard the Korean port and soften it up for landings of U. S. Marines. The "irreconcilable Leathernecks swarmed over the town to start a drive on the west coast of Korea, splitting North Korean forces, which will eventually lead to their rout.

"The cruiser, under command of Capt. R. F. Stout, USN, is flagship of Rear Admiral J. H. Higgins, commander Cruiser Division Five, who commanded the two day pre-invasion bombardment and fire support phase and the ear-splitting bombardment on D Day.

After the beachhead at Inchon was secured, the cruiser remained in the area to supply long-range fire support to troops advancing inland toward the city of Seoul. Fire control parties evaluated the Toledo's firing as excellent as round after round dropped devastatingly on surprised North Koreans."

The Long Range National Program of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs will promote the economic, political and social contributions of women and their individual advancement and well being. To that end, our national program shall plan for the full partnership of women both in opportunity and responsibility.

The Business and Professional Women's Club of Ruidoso, was organized in 1949, and since we are so new and so young, we have hardly had time to map out a real program. But we have a major project, that of securing the funds for buying an ambulance when the time comes for Ruidoso to buy an ambulance for the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital. To date we have raised about \$400.00, which will grow, we hope, and plan to raise enough to accomplish our project.

Mrs. Edith Johnson is our president; Mrs. Dorothy W. Kirkman is vice president; corresponding secretary is Miss Francis Douglas, recording secretary is Mrs. Louis Chubbuck, and Mrs. Edith Sheehan is treasurer.

The club has also purchased the material to make gowns for children for our Hospital, and they are now in the process of being made.—By Lina Beth Stewart.

### Here's More Of The Story Of Lincoln Co. Museum

Members of the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission are: Frank Kendall, Carl Rad, Eddy County; A. T. Phing; n. Hondo, Lincoln County; Jim o. o. Roswell, Chavez County; Mrs. V. D. Sawyer, Crossroads, Lea County; Mrs. Ora Lee Skipworth, Fort Sumner, DeBaca County; G. W. Carr, Portales, Roosevelt County; Alfred Hunter, Alamogordo, Otero County; W. H. Duckworth, Clovis, Curry County; and E. C. Hawkins, Farmington, Commission Member from the state at large.

Following are some quotations from the legislative act of 1949 which created the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, which comprises representatives from each of the counties contained in the original Lincoln County. The Commission has as its purpose the restoration and preservation of the Old Courthouse at Lincoln, and of other sites and buildings in the larger area of Old Lincoln County:

"Members of Commission—Appointment—Term—The Commission shall be composed of nine members, no two of which shall be from the same county. The members shall be appointed by the governor of the state of New Mexico, by and with the consent of the New Mexico state senate for a term of four years, the first appointments to be as follows: three members for one year, three members for two years, and three members for four years.

"Nominations for members of Commission—Nominations for each member of the commission shall be as follows: the board of commissioners from each of the counties comprising the Old Lincoln county . . . shall send the names of three persons resident of their county to the governor of the state of New Mexico, from each of which lists of three names the governor shall choose one person, and shall name one additional from the state at large . . .

"Powers of Commission—The commission shall have full power and control over the Old Lincoln County museum, located at Lincoln . . . to acquire and hold real estate in its own name . . . to accept gifts, grants and donations

from the United States government or from any person, firm, corporation, or any group of persons, for the uses and purposes of building, operating and maintaining said museum.

"Custodian—The commission shall have the further power and authority to select some suitable person, or persons, as custodian of the buildings and grounds of said memorial, and to fix said custodian's salary.

"Operation of memorial—Admission fees—The commission shall have the power and authority to operate and maintain said memorial and to make all rules and regulations necessary for the maintenance and operation thereof, including the power to fix fees for admission . . ."

These paragraphs may be of interest to residents of Lincoln and the other counties named who have wondered what the Commission is, what its functions and powers are, and who its members are.

The Commission's manifesto is contained in some detail in a small illustrated folder entitled Restoration in Historic Lincoln, which will be mailed without cost to anyone writing to request it, and which is handed to all guests at the Museum as they register.

The Old Courthouse at Lincoln is a historic monument of exciting frontier days, and people of this area are very rightfully concerned that it shall be restored and preserved for future generations.

At noon everything stops... that is when the camp cooks yell "chows ready" and the long line forms to pass by the laden down tables of fried steak, frijoles, potatoe salad, etc. prepared by the camp cooks and served by the Indian. Reservation to all comers "free".

After dinner, with all full of the good camp food and hot coffee a fellow can hold, the sale is resumed. The chant of the auctioneer goes on... and on... till well over one thousand head of cattle in about twenty classes have been sold to the highest bidder.

The day ends with the buyers loading up the huge cattle trucks with their "buys". They have bought... the Indians have sold... and the spectators have watched the sale with lively interest... and so another sale ends.





**Cemetery Association Sets Up By-Laws**

Claude D. Peake, president of the Ministerial Association, announced this week that a meeting to discuss the cemetery plans for the community cemetery below Green Tree ended in the adoption of the following Articles of Incorporation and by-laws.

This cemetery, one of the most needed things for this area, will be operated by the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Cemetery Association.

**Articles of Incorporation**  
We, the undersigned, do hereby voluntarily associate ourselves for the purpose of forming a non-profit corporation under the laws of the state of New Mexico, and do hereby certify that:

**Article I.**  
The name of the corporation shall be the The Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Cemetery Association.

**Article II.**  
The purpose of this corporation is to provide a Non-perpetua Care Cemetery to be available to the public for interment of the dead, under a certain grant of the U. S. Forest Service, which is as follows: "Permission is hereby granted to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Ministerial Association of Ruidoso, New Mexico, to use the following described lands: the NW 1/4 of Section 23, Twp. 11 S., Rge. 14 East N. M. P. M., for the purpose of a cemetery of approximately 20 acres issued free of charge under authority of Reg. U-11 (2) and (3)." The association shall maintain and conduct the operation of such cemetery in accordance with the law of the state of New Mexico, pertaining to public burying grounds.

**Article III.**  
This association shall designate and maintain, under the direction of a Board of Directors, a central office where records and other information pertaining to the operation of such cemetery shall be available to the public. Such office to be located in Lincoln county New Mexico, as a place designated by the board of directors of this association.

**Article IV.**  
This association shall remain and exist of one hundred years as prescribed by the laws of the State of New Mexico, and in full accordance with the grant of the U. S. Forest Service; and in accordance with the bylaws hereinafter stated.

**Article V.**  
The names and address (places of residence) of the incorporators who have in good faith entered into these articles are as follows:

**BY-LAWS**  
1.  
This non-profit association shall be known as the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Cemetery Association, of Lincoln County New Mexico.

**II. BOARD OF DIRECTORS**  
The control of this association shall be vested in a board composed of five (5) members; who shall be elected by the members of the association, annually at a place and time publicly announced not less than thirty (30) days

prior to such meeting. The board shall elect from its members a chairman and a vice-chairman, both of whom shall have voting privileges. Members of the board shall be eligible for re-election.

**III. MEMBERSHIP**

Membership in this association shall be open to any American citizen, upon payment of annual dues of a sum not to exceed two dollar (\$2.00) per annum. All members in good standing by virtue of having paid such dues shall be eligible to vote on any matters pertaining to the operation of the association including the election of officers; except the office of the Clerk Sexton, who shall be appointed by the board of directors.

**IV. Duties of Board of Directors**

The Board of Directors shall elect, following the annual meeting a Secretary-Sexton, whose salary shall be fixed by the association on recommendation of the directors; which salary may be paid from dues to the association or from certain fees hereafter prescribed.

The chairman of the board shall be chief executive officer and shall preside at all meetings. In the absence of the chairman the vice chairman shall preside in his stead.

Vacancies occurring by resignation, death, or removal, may be filled by the board at any called or regular meeting; but such vacancies shall expire concurrently with the other members of the board and be eligible for re-election.

**V. Funds**

The board of directors may designate the Clerk-Sexton or any other person as Treasurer but in any event suitable bond shall be required as the board may see fit. Such treasurer shall report fully at each annual meeting and as often as the board may deem wise.

**VI. Secretary - Sexton**

The Secretary Sexton shall preserve and keep at such place as the board of directors may designate, all maps, papers and information pertaining to burial sites and plots. He shall be empowered to receive dues from the membership and shall issue certificates of ownership to purchasers of burial sites, and shall keep and preserve full and accurate burial descriptions of each plot, lot or grave-site. He shall keep and preserve a complete record of every transaction at all times. He shall create and designate for and to the purchasers in accordance with the rules governing the acquisition of such sites. Certificate

must be signed by both Chairman of the Board and Secretary-Sexton.

The Secretary-Sexton shall have police powers over the cemetery for the purpose of enforcing the rules of the association to maintain order and enforce the laws of the state of New Mexico.

**VII. Plots, Lots, Graves, Crypts and Vaults.**

Members of the association, may purchase through the Secretary Sexton designated burial sites for the sum of not to exceed five dollars (\$5.00) for a single grave or family lots having a dimension of 14 by 17 feet exclusive of streets and alleys, for a sum not to exceed twenty five dollars (\$25.00).

Owners of family lots or single graves sites shall not be permitted to transfer or resell any portion of such sites without the consent of the board of directors.

No interment of a body shall be permitted without first having secured permission from the association through channels either grave or family plot.

A fee of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) shall paid to the association through regular channels when designating or locating a grave site; except in the case of multiple interment in a single location.

Non members of the association may be permitted to inter in the cemetery upon payment of the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) per grave site and no fee shall be charged for locating such grave site.

**Opening of Graves**—All graves shall be excavated in full accordance with the laws of the state of New Mexico, and may be excavated by the association's employees in keeping with current labor sale; or by private labor and not be charged other than the regular locating fee of two dollars and fifty cents.

Owners of burial sites shall be permitted to erect suitable headstones, crypts or vaults, etc., of their own choice without consulting the association or its officers, but such erections must be within property lines, and all obstructions and unused materials must be removed by the owners of such lots.

**AMENDMENTS:** These by laws may be amended at any annual meeting held in accordance with the provisions set forth under Section II of these laws by a two-thirds majority vote when a quorum is present. A quorum shall consist of as follows: one half of the members if not more than twenty-five (25) members; one third if not more than fifty

 (50); one-fourth if one hundred (100) or more. For voting purposes it is understood that such members shall be residents of the vicinity in which the cemetery is located when considering quorums.

**Exception to Amendments:** In keeping with the spirit of a non-profit purpose, and of good faith with the donors of the Burial Park, any and all fees herein stipulated, and any and all fees herein fixed shall not be subject to revision upward, and this regulation shall not be subject to amendment or revision.

**Special Designations of Areas:** Upon application by authorized agents or officers of such institutions, the Board of Directors of this association may set aside specific areas of this cemetery for the exclusive use of Religious Bodies, Fraternities or other similar groups. Such special allocations shall not in anywise abridge any rule or regulation of these by-laws herein set forth.

Nothing in these by-laws or regulations shall be construed as conflicting with the laws of the state of New Mexico, or the regulations specific or implied of the U. S. Forest Service.
