RUIDOSO NEEDS A BANK

In a few short years Ruidoso has grown from a small village to a thriving, prosperous town. It is doubtful that there is another community the size of Ruidoso, Hollywood and Green Tree that entertains as many visitors in a years time. Last year it was estimated that more than half-million people came to enjoy this climate.

Within the past two years there have been built a large number of new homes. Many of them having in cost from twenty-five to seventy-five thousand dollars.

The Ruidoso area has modern schools and churches and a small hospital that would do credit to a town many times our size. We have as fine golf course as can be found anywhere and this fact is well known to golfers all over the southwest.

Within the corporate limits of Ruidoso the taxable property valuation is \$1,912,788.00. In school District 3 outside of the corporate limits it is \$548,747.00. Which means that within the School District we have a valuation of \$2,460,931.

If we have a half-million visitors during the year and if they only spend \$10.00 per capita that would mean a revenue from our visitors of \$5,000,000. In Ruidoso, Hollywood and Green Tree we have an approximate population of 2500 people who are permanent residents. If these people spend, or have spent on them, \$200 each in this community that would mean another \$500,000. This would give a total income from this area of \$5,500,000. This is in addition to the fertile Ruidoso and Hondo Valleys and our ranchers.

These figures seem to be high but we are of the opinion that they are low. However five and one-half million dollars is a tremendous income for a community such as ours.

In spite of these figures that show a healthy growth and an ever growing economic structure we do not have a bank. It is doubtful that another community in all the Southwest with such resources can be found. Our people do their banking all over the county. Many of them carry accounts with the banks in the communities they moved from to Ruidoso. Banks in our neighboring towns and cities have been exceedingly helpful but no city can grow and prosper unless they have financial institutions that know and understand the local situations. Certainly we are able to stand on our feet and continue to build here a larger and better place in which to live. We are firmly of the opinion that Ruidoso has greater potential possibilities than any other town our size in New Mexico. WE NEED A BANK — LET'S GET ONE.

R. E. A. NEWS

Electricity does not cost—it pays.

When the Otero County Electric Co-op first energized its 76 miles of lines in 1940, there were 93 consumers that used 2,351 kw-h in the month of December. This showed an average consumption of 25 kw-h for each individual.

In 1945, the average consumption for each individual during the month of December was 80 kw-h. This was an increase of 55 kw-h consumption per individual for the five year period.

The average consumption in October of 1950 was 165 kw-h. This was an average increase of 85 kw-h consumption per consumer from December, 1945 to October, 1950.

Why has this kw-h consumption increased over a period of ten years? First, electricity is an asset to farmers, ranchers and businessmen. Second, it is time and labor saving device. Third, it can be used to better the quality of farm products to increase income.

An American Woman

This is a story of a woman whose desire to improve her education, so as to enable her to better support her family, brought her back to high school at the age of 31.

Mrs. Fedora Upton, Fedora Carrillo as she was christened, was born in Arabela, New Mexico, on June 9, 1919. Arabela is a small isolated community near Tinnie, New Mexico. It was here that Mrs. Upton lived and attended school. Since there is no high school in Arabela, Mrs. Upton's schooling ended with the eighth grade.

For several years after her graduation Mrs. Upton's life was rather uneventful. But in 1941 Fedora Carrillo became Mrs. Fedora Upton. Again her life ran on smoothly until June 5, 1943 when she enlisted in the W. A. A. C. (Women's Army Auxiliary Corps). It was two months later when her real army career began—she was sworn in as a W.A.C. on August 1, 1943. Ft. Devens, Mass. was her first stop for basic training, then came Shank, N. J., New York City, and Camp Kilmer, N. Y., leaving the army life in 1946. Mrs. Upton returned home. Upon being questioned about her travels, Mrs. Upton said she liked New Mexico better than any other of the places she had been, but she said also that she liked the slower life of her own home state best of all.

In 1949 another notable event occurred in the life of Mrs. Upton; a son was born to her, Mickey Carrillo. Mickey stays with his grandmother, Mrs. Dorothy Soto, and his aunt, Mrs. Connie Carrillo, now that his mother is going to school.

Mrs. Upton decided to come to Ruidoso to go to school because it is so near home. When asked about her studies, Mrs. Upton replied that after 17 years away from school it was harder for her to study. In any event, Mrs. Upton feels that English is, by far, the hardest subject. She is enrolled as a freshman and is taking five freshman courses. It is Mrs. Fedora Upton's plan to continue her schooling under the GI Bill until she has obtained her High School Degree.
