Summary of OPS Released Today

A summary and compilation of orders and regulations issued last week by the Office of Price Stabilization is released today by Roy S. Walker, District Director of the agency for New Mexico. A supplement to Enforcement Authority affects formal delegation of authority to enforce provisions of OPS meat and livestock allocation orders. Amendment 1 to the General Ceiling Price Regulation makes it possible for sellers to proceed with sales for future delivery by allowing these sellers to offer goods for sale under future contracts at the ceiling price in effect at the time of delivery. In connection with party restrictions, Amendment 7 to General Ceiling Price Regulation provides for automatic removal from the exemption list of any commodity, except tobacco, within five days after the Department of Agriculture has declared the commodity has exceeded both party and the highest price received from May 20 to June 24, 1950. Under Amendment 2 to General Ceiling Price Regulation additional guide books for price-use cards has been added and authorized use of several republished volumes that were revised to conform with OPS regulations. Price Regulation extended the deadline to April 30 for retail merchants to file their pricing charts with the District Office in Albuquerque. Bituminous prices were removed from the general price freeze and placed under a coal regulation set up in February, under an amendment to Ceiling Price Regulation 3. A regulation to relieve the difficulties of gasoline dealers who were selling at abnormally low prices when the freeze came, is contained in Ceiling Price Regulation 13. They are now allowed a maximum margin of four cents a gallon.

150,000 School Children In Clothing Drive

Approximately 150,000 New Mexico school children will take part in the state-wide drive to collect 100,000 pounds of used clothing to aid victims of war in Korea, Western Europe, underprivileged children on Southwestern Indian Reservations and handicapped areas of the South. Tom Wiley, State Superintendent of Public Instruction and New Mexico Chairman of the Tenth Annual National Children's Clothing Crusade, announced. The drive will begin next Monday and last one week. Co-operating in the school children's clothing drive is the New Mexico Motor Carriers Association whose members are providing free transportation for the clothing collected. Charles H. Washam, Manager of the Association today reported that more than 1,000 trucks will be available for the transportation of the clothing. The clothing will be distributed by The Children's Education, a National Children's Service organization which does extensive child service work in rural American and in war devastated areas overseas. Mr. Washam reported that trucks of the New Mexico Motor Carriers Association would begin picking up clothing at schools on Monday. He urged the motorists to continue as rapidly as local school superintendents notified their local carriers that the clothing was ready.

New San Patricio School Completed

Mrs. Linde Samelson, County School Superintendent, announced last week that the new San Patricio Grade School is now completed and that tentative plans are to have the children move "back home" the last week of school. In moving in, even just one week, what equipment that was salvaged from the fire can be placed and when school starts next fall, so plans can be made to get it during the summer vacation. The modern building, has four large class rooms, a wide hall through the center of the building, modern rest rooms for the boys and girls. All of the rooms are painted a shade of green recommended as being the best color for children's eye sight, and have 12 feet of modern deep green black boards. The interior has cream colored trim. All of the windows are steel casements and are large and will give ample light and air in every room. There are gas circulating heaters for the building with thermostats. The building was constructed at an approximate total cost of \$22,000.00 or \$5.00 per square foot. School officials in Santa Fe say that the same type of modern building now would run \$10.00 per square foot, or more. The entire school plant will be painted in six and a half months. Many more of the San Patricio Grade School children for several years in the future without any enlarging or remodeling.

Home On The Range

Clovis is a city of around 20,000 people and has 31 Protestant churches, of whom seven are conducted by the Baptists. Last Sunday 643 students were counted in the Sabbath Schools and it wasn't a premier day either, just ordinary like. These statistics have a definite place along with the classification as "The Capital of the Bible Belt." Come to think of it, that is a pretty good nickname.

Jack Skipworth of Clovis and Cotton Lee of Fort Sumner will pull a matched fopling contest on either May 6 or 13 at Santa Fe. These international ropists will be stars at the Rodeo de Santa Fe July 12 and 13. Each of the boys will rope and tie ten steers, with the winner getting \$1,000, plus a share of the gate receipts.

El Rancho Milling Company is getting ready to build a 270,000 bushel grain elevator at Melrose, which is to be completed in time to receive this year's crop in the "Grain Bowl". Austin Brooks will be manager of the elevator. It is to be built by a home company of which Otto Smith of Clovis is president. J. T. Curtis will be manager of the Melrose plant.

E. J. Workman, president of the School of Mines at Socorro, who is in charge of the rainmaking attempts, admits that so far he is discouraged with the results, and Joe Sisler of Clovis and Delmar Roberts of Las Cruces admit there is plenty of room for rain, if that is what is holding up the cloud makers—and Texas needs the water that isn't in the stream.

Paul Russel, right-hand man of Boss Barker of the state game department, has about completed the trading and swapping needed in taking over Big Heart ranch, in the heart of the Gila wilderness, and expects to pay something more than \$50,000 for the water holes of the tract, which was first promoted by the Grant County Game Protective association. It will be used for wild life conservation and propagation, for which it is well fitted, especially as to deer and wild turkey and other wild critters.

The state is getting ready to spend \$100,000 to build a new governor's mansion, and may be able to do it, as the site is furnished in North Santa Fe, the Texas and Bishop's roads by the Chamber of Commerce and the School of American Research. Otherwise the hundred grand wouldn't build more than a few cottages, with these high prices.

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Tell Breeding Gains In Grain Sorghums

A Rip Van Winkle who grew grain sorghum in 1925 would hardly recognize the crop today. Because more than 50 improved varieties are now available to farmers, present day sorghum production is in vivid contrast to that of only a quarter-century ago.

These growers with large acreages, chiefly in the Great Plains States, faced greater losses from drought, frost, chinch bugs and mildew. They harvested much of the crop by hand because the stalks were too high for combining. Grain sorghums were used for livestock feed either as grain, forage or silage. Bitter seeds in many varieties made the forage unpalatable. Fresh leaves of most varieties were extremely poisonous to livestock.

Now, growers can obtain sorghums adapted to specific climatic hazards. Many of these require only a short season for maturity and can be grown in high altitudes and northern latitudes. Early maturing varieties evade drought. Certain new sorghums have a high tolerance for chinch bugs and all are resistant to mildew disease.

One of the most dramatic improvements has been in the size and shape of the panicle. The new dwarf sorghums can be harvested by combine. Earlier maturity and a greater ratio of grain to stalk have increased the yields of the new varieties about five per cent. These new varieties can be produced economically and thus can replace corn where grasshoppers and corn borers are abundant. Sorghum suffers little damage from these pests.

Wes Izzard of the Globe News in Amarillo is another news hound who needs educating. In a column last week he asked for information about the little city of Bernalillo, New Mexico.

Here in Wes. Bernalillo, which is not in Bernalillo county but Sandoval, was the site of Cortez headquarters in 1540-42. It was in the province of the Tiguex Indians. Prior to the rebellion of the Pueblo Indians in 1680, Bernalillo was only a scattering group of isolated Spanish ranches and haciendas.

Six years after the reconquest of De Vargas (1692) Bernalillo was founded by settlers and soldiers. It is today, a quaint little city of adobe houses which breathe of antiquity. It is also quite a trading center for Indian, Spanish and Anglo farmers. Bernalillo most know as a cattle and lumber shipping center.

The name Bernalillo comes from one Bernal Diaz del Castillo who was in the Cortez group. The ending indicates the miniature of Bernal—Bernalillo or Little Bernal—much as you would say Michaschitos, little boys or children.



Employment In State Over 11,000 Higher Than February 1950

New Mexico showed an employment increase of 1,150 in February over the January 1951 total of 149,350, according to a release from M. F. Miera, chairman and executive director of the Employment Security Commission.

This employment is 11,050 higher than in February 1950 the release states.

The increase from a year ago is spread over all major industrial groups with trade and manufacturing, respectively registering the largest gains.

A decrease in average weekly hours worked in all major industrial groups resulted in smaller weekly earnings in spite of a slightly higher average hourly earnings.

Mining employees averaged the highest weekly earnings, \$72.70, while construction workers averaged the lowest, \$41.88, during February.

The February increase in employment is a normal seasonal climb, Miera states.

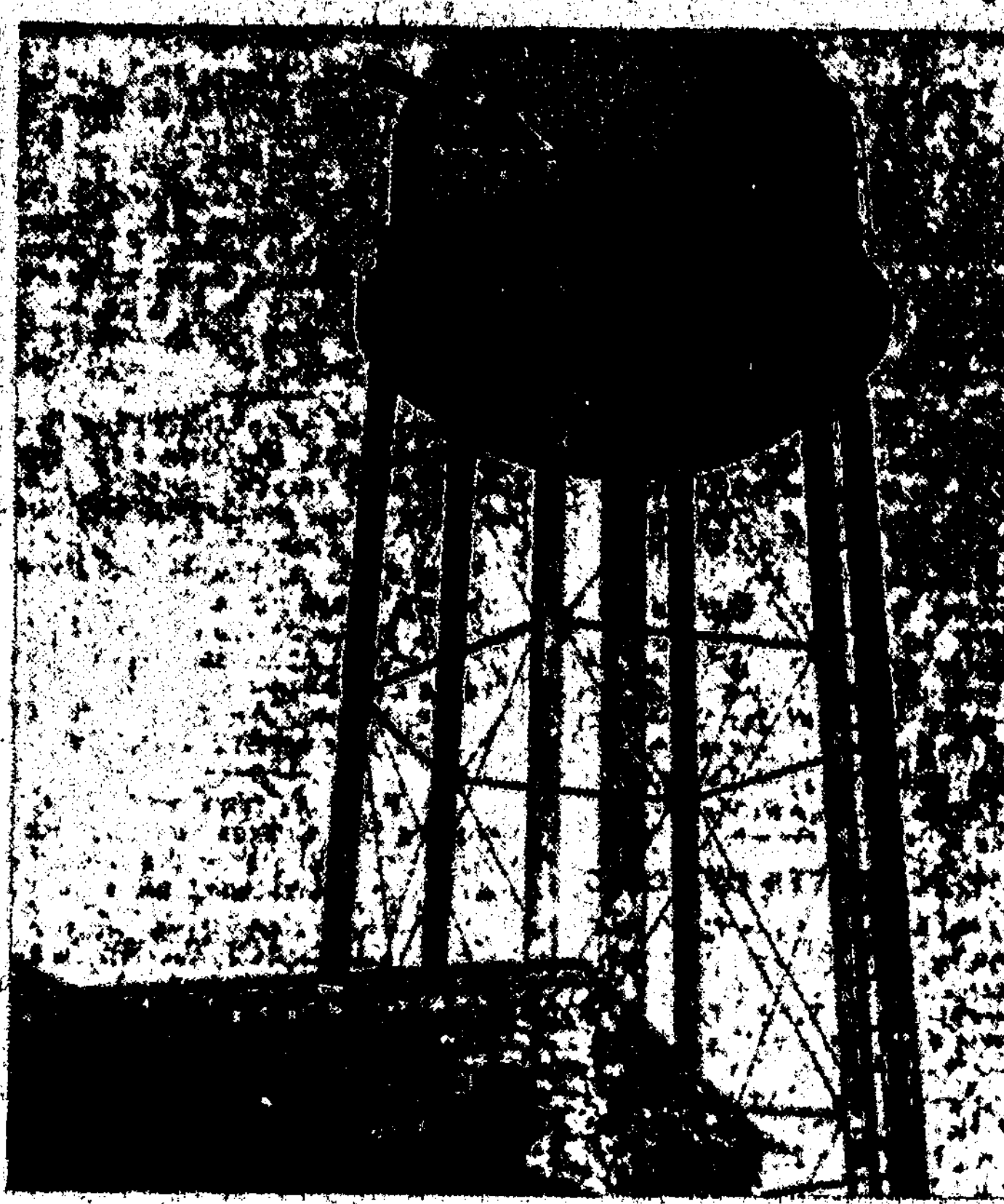
