### Ranchers Should Limit Range Stock

It is in years such as this that stockmen should give most careful consideration to the amount of stock on their range. During drouth years producers are faced with the prospects of a heavy supplemental feeding program, which is especially aggravated by high feed costs this year; or the other alternative of selling some of their breeding stock down to such numbers as is consistent with the amount of grass on their range.

Here is a point where careful consideration is needed in estimating the carrying capacity. During years of high rainfall a little overstocking will not have near the detrimental effect on the vigor of the grass plants as the same amount of overstocking when the grass is already in a weakened condition from the drouth. The root systems of the grass is smaller during the past drouth years and any over usage of the leaves of the plant will cause even smaller root systems even to the point of destroying them. Even when rains should occur the grass will not respond to the moisture since there is very little left in the way of a root system to rebuild the plant. A year's growth may be lost when root systems are allowed to deteriorate. Grass will return faster after drouth years if it has a good root system to begin with.

All of these newspaper friends called at the News office to say that they will tell many people what a fine place we have here.

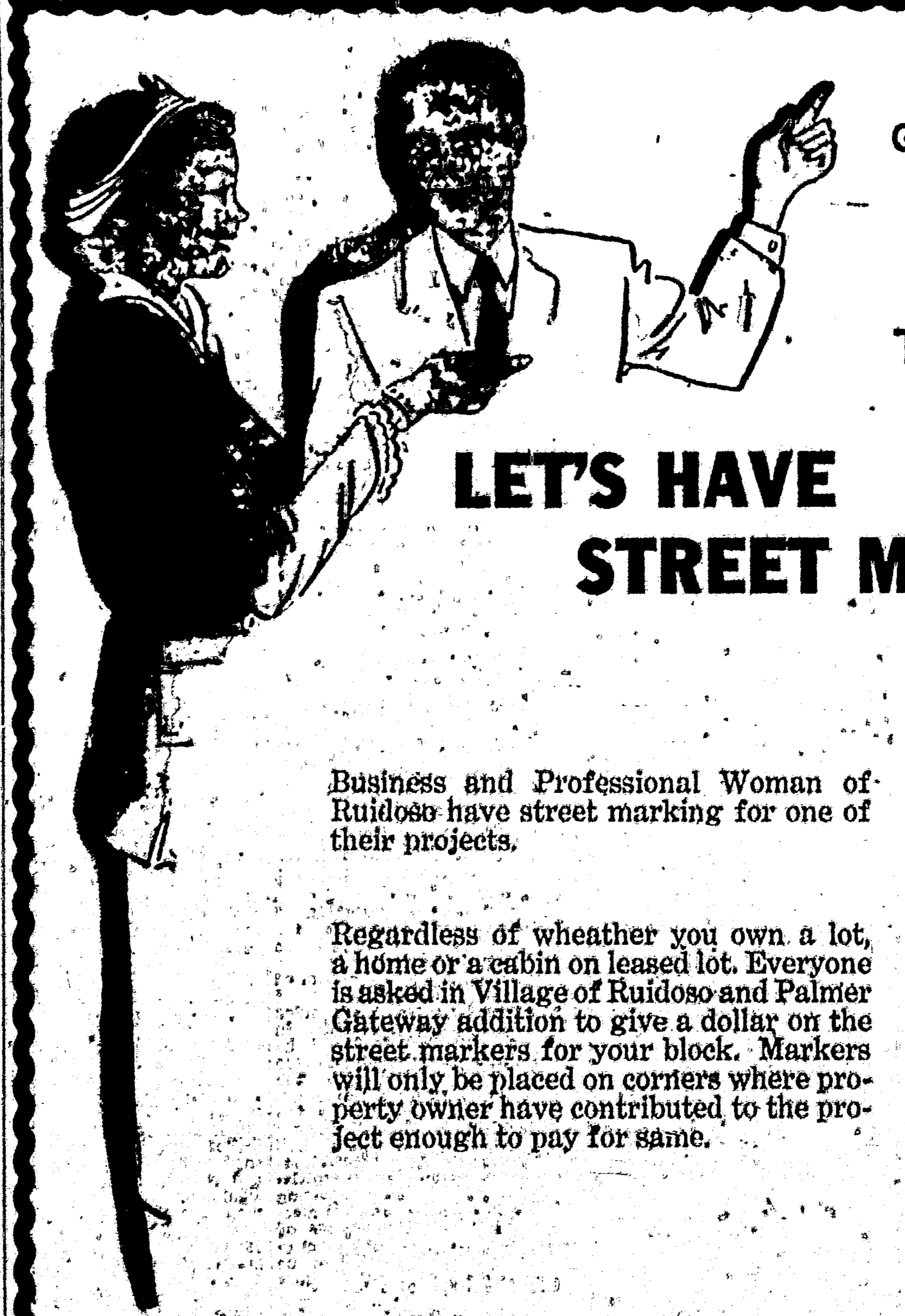

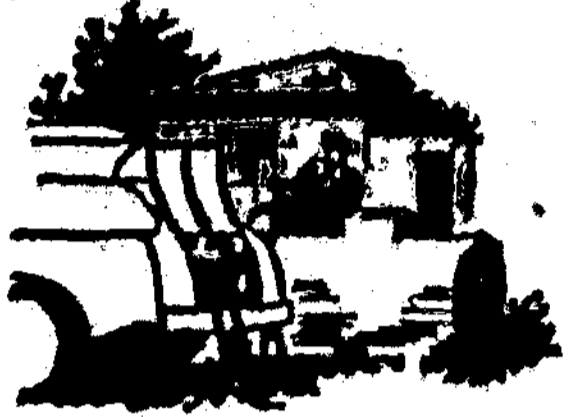


### Brittons To Build In Palmer Gateway

### Old Blazer Mill's Sales Book Tells Story of 80 Years Ago

(By C. W. M.)

Some fifteen years ago while the editor was visiting with his friend of many years, the late Almer N. Blazer, the latter gave me an old store sales book from which many items may be gleaned. The book records sales that were made in the early 70s.

A. N. Blazer's father, the late Dr. J. H. Blazer, who passed on in 1898, had been an officer in the Union Army, and upon coming west after the war, settled at Mesacadero in the late 60s. He operated a flour mill and saw mill.

There are many interesting things to be gleaned from the despatched old sales accounts. Not the least being some sheets which had long ago been placed within its pages: A tax receipt issued Dec. 18, 1874, for \$76 in taxes paid by Blazer & Abbott; a lengthy invoice for goods bought by Dr. Blazer of Pat Goghlan, of Tularosa, dated Dec. 31, 1874; order for 8,000 feet of lumber to be delivered at Fort Quitman and East Selden and dated January 1, 1872; order for consignment of lumber for "Franklin," now El Paso, same date as above; Kansas & Pacific Ry. waybill, for machinery parts to be delivered to Kit Carson Wagon Train, probably at Trinidad, dated July 18, 1871. A letter written by John H. Riley to Dr. Blazer, agent the election just held in Lincoln County may have some historical significance, inasmuch as Tom Catron's name is mentioned. Date of the letter was Nov. 9, 1870.

Testimony to the fact that there must have been some devout members of Dr. Blazer's family in the long ago, there is a Chicago lesson leaf from the "Inter-Continental Bible lessons series" for March 1874. The Golden Text for March 22, 1874 might be quite pertinent to this day and world condition:

"When I cry unto Thee, then shall mine enemies turn back: this I know for God is for me. Psalm Lvi 9".

Coffee was selling to Dr. Blazer's customers at 50c per lb.; beef, 10c per lb.; flour at \$10.00 Cwt.; muslin, 20c per yard; a pair of shoes at \$3; sugar, 50c per lb. Plug tobacco was a frequent item, as it seems that most of the old pioneers in and out of the store, chewed "backer". But of course, smoking tobacco is an oft-repeated item.

A number of the names were of men who hauled logs to the Blazer mill and in exchange took a great deal of their pay in merchandise.

Many of the men who were customers, have descendants in these parts still: James West, Geo. H. Abbot, Andrew Wilson, Henry C. Brown, John Patton, James Scott, Benj. Iebalt, Jose Dormia, Richard Ewan, Martin Baca, Eugene Hince, Ed. Jerome, P. L. Gonzalez, Justo Ramirez, Wm. Copeland, Wm. Walters, Thos.

are living in the third or fourth generation. Other descendants from those pioneers around Mesacadero, now living here are those of Andy Wilson, James Walters, and perhaps a number of the Mexican families.

Paul Blazer has a number of these old sales books, but the one noted above was the first of the series apparently and is dated, October 2, 1871, in the first entry. The last entry was in March of 1872. The book reviewed herein will be turned back to Mr. Paul Blazer, probably to be turned over with other items to the Lincoln County Museum at Lincoln.

One thing of special interest to the Blazer descendants, is that there has been an erroneous tradition that "Buckshot" Roberts, the sheriff's deputy, and Brewer, the Billy the Kid partisan, who were killed at the Blazer Mill fight, had been unceremoniously dumped into one common pit without separate coffins or graves.

The late Almer Blazer denied that claim, and was quite competent as an authority, as he was there. But that tradition has been more or less persistent. It was certain that Billy the Kid's outfit did not tarry for any funeral exercises, of course.

In looking over one of the old

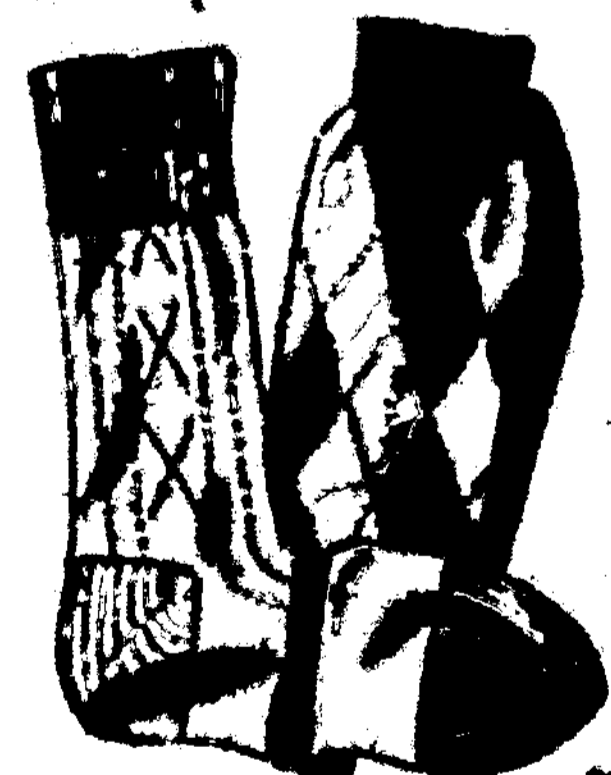

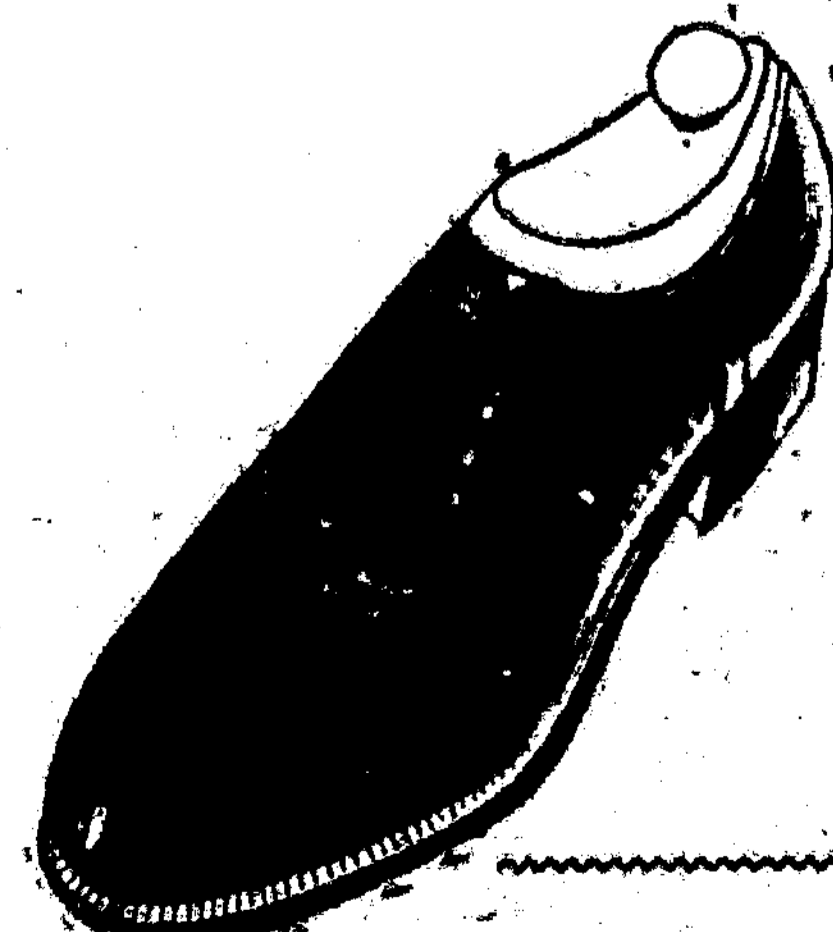

**Speculation on '52**  
THERE IS considerable speculation in Washington and, no doubt, the remainder of the country over who will be and who will not be a candidate for the Republican and Democratic presidential nominations. At the moment three men hold the spotlight: President Truman, Sen. Robert Taft and Gen. Dwight Eisenhower.

It is far too early to say 'who' will be the outcome of all the behind-the-scenes political maneuvering that is taking place in the nation's capital. However, there are some definite trends and speculations that should prove interesting to the home town readers.

**Truman's Intentions**  
In the light of political tradition, President Truman is the logical candidate for the Democratic nomination. As President he is leader of the party and a much more powerful political figure than a great many will admit. His enemies, both Republican and Democrat, contend that he has lost his power over the party and appeal to the average voter, with some justification, in the light of his relations with congress.

However, his friends and even some of his enemies, remember that President Truman is a stubborn, with more than an average feeling for the common man. They remember the 1948 campaign. Even in the face of the numerous investigations of his administration and its inadequacies, they realize he has taken a firm and heroic stand on a number of questions.

He can not be traced from the picture. Korean developments and internal economic picture, centered around the recently signed price control bill, may have much to do with his 1952 possibilities.

**Taft Wants to Run**  
There is hardly anyone in Washington who will tell you that Taft does not want the Republican nomination. To the contrary, it is generally believed he has already opened his campaign with his New England speeches. And it is generally believed his activities will accelerate until the eve of the national Republican convention in an all-out drive to capture the prize.

**The Eisenhower Story**  
The hopes and fears and speculations of political ambitious men and the Republican and Democratic parties depend, as perhaps never before in this country's history, upon the intentions of one man—General Eisenhower.

But there are a number of stumbling blocks in the general's path. For one thing no one knows at least it hasn't been publicly announced, to which party he belongs. It has been whispered that he is a Republican, but does not endorse these allegations. In fact, it is believed to feel this country's future depends on a strong foreign policy.

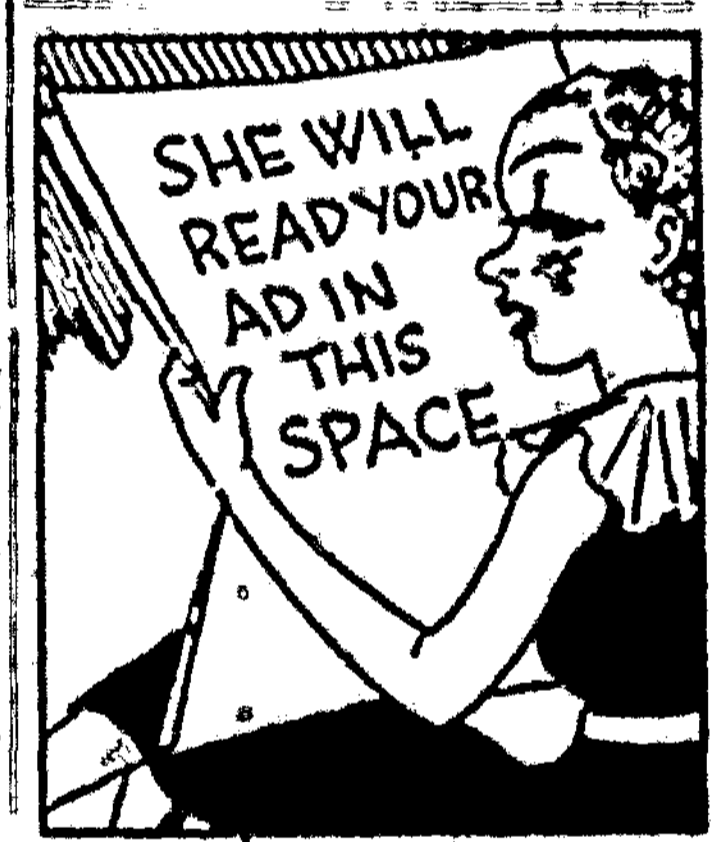
