## 1/2 and 1/2 WIT & WISDOM

We learned something about our Lions club down at Alamogordo the other day. Mark Shoemaker, the totally blind instructor of the adult training center for the blind, a division of the New Mexico School for the Blind, was conducting us through that unique institution, and he casually remarked that he had just that day received a check for some \$180 from the Ruidoso Lions club in payment for brooms made by the blind people in the center, which the local Lions had sold up and down our canyon. Now that's swell. The training center was set up to help adult blind persons learn a trade, so they may contribute towards their support. In the center, they learn to make brooms, which are sold to civilian markets and to the government for use in armed services plants, and otherwise. On government orders, the brooms may be made, partly, with shredded yucca stems. When we asked Shoemaker about where the yucca stems from he said "Since the yucca is the state flower of New Mexico, we cannot get any of it in our state, so we buy it from an Arizona plant that shreds yucca stalks which are imported from Old Mexico." The yucca shreds are used in the inner portion of the broom, and look to me as though they'd do as good a job as regular broom straw.

Besides brooms, which the blind men and boys make complete there, there is a sewing room in which women are making glove cases for army medic use. The glove cases are square and have two pockets, and Shoemaker says they are so simple the women can turn out 160 a day.

Also, equipment is being set up for the manufacture soon of cotton yarn mop heads. Weaving and carpenter work of various kinds which the people in the center do will amaze you.

Shoemaker said the center is about self supporting, getting about \$4,000 a month from sale of the items it manufactures. There are now 15 people receiving training. Since it was opened in 1947, Mark has been the director. He is a kindly, conscientious person you will want to get to know. He is very interested in conducting visitors through the center, and does so without aid of a cane or hand rails. He goes along at a pretty fast gait, too, and seems to know where every door-handle, every turn in the corridors, and every handle, lever, or nut and bolt is on the machines, as he operates them.

We'll never get used to cars without running boards. As a kid, we had rather ride on running boards than any place on any wheels (except maybe the cab of a locomotive). We used to delight in hanging on by our toenails to the running boards of cars in our youth, and we've seen many a dog that enjoyed riding on running boards. Elimination of them in modern, streamlined autos has sure taken a lot of joy away from dogs and boys.

Hats off to the Ruidoso people who did such a fine job with the Highway 70 caravan. Ruidoso was the only New Mexico city with representatives who started from Clovis, except at the western division camp, and who went through the entire state of New Mexico, then on through Arizona to California. Our little community got some mighty fine publicity along the whole route through civil minded Roy Anderson and Ruth and Mrs. Suzanne Oliver. Our city had a mighty fine crowd going through to the Arizona line, too, which included Mr. and Mrs. Carl DeBord, Carson Phillips, Mr. and Mrs. P. Bloodworth, Mr. and Mrs. Errol Clarke, Mr. and Mrs. Doc Furry, and Ace Parker, along with Roy, Ruth and Suzanne. Fine job, folks.

## ROSWELL MAN FATALLY HURT AT PICACHO

Billy Hayes, 23, Roswell, died in a hospital in Roswell Tuesday night from injuries he received in a car-pick-up collision three miles west of Picacho at sundown Nov. 30. Hayes was alone in his car, a 1940 Plymouth coupe, and was driving west when a Ford pick-up, belonging to the Federal government, and driven by Donald Newton of Alamogordo, a Soil Conservation engineer, skidded into his path.

Investigating officer A. B. Munsey of Green Tree, state policeman, said Newton told him he thought he saw a tractor, or some dimly lighted vehicle in front of him and that he applied his brakes and his car spinning out of control and into the path of Hayes' automobile.

Munsey said no charges had been filed late last night as a result of the crash.

## 720 Register At Museum In Lincoln

Seven hundred and twenty guests registered at the Old Court House in Lincoln during the month of November, representing 30 states, Puerto Rico and Alaska. There were a total of seven free days at the Museum during the month of November. The Dan Kusanovich art exhibit opened on Nov. 4 and has been well-received all month. It may be seen at the Museum until Dec. 20. The Old Lincoln County Memorial commission is readying rules and plans for a children's art contest to be held in April in connection with the Museum of New Mexico traveling art exhibit, "Junior American Artists." ## Hospital Needs To Be Outlined At Open House

Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital will stage an open house program on Dec. 19—an event to center attention of the people of the area on the remarkable good the hospital does, the fine institution it is, and its need for financial assistance.

Officials of the hospital have just issued some interesting figures on its operation the last few months—since April, 1950, when local people pledged \$4,030.29 in contributions for a 12 month period. Of the pledge, \$2,232.29 have been paid, 10 of them paid in full; and 33 paid only one month. A balance of \$2,404.00 is still due on pledges. It is pointed out that these pledges are not due in full in some cases that in instances at the present date could and would be of great benefit to the hospital if paid. People making the pledges have this assurance—should they need medical service in the year their pledges are current, they get full credit for all money paid in. After the year of the pledge, however, no further credit is allowed. (Five people have used the credit on their pledges in the amount of \$185.)

Some persons have paid two to four months on their pledges. Statements have been mailed on several occasions to those who are delinquent in their monthly commitments, in the hopes they would take care of the obligation they made on their own accord.

Accounts receivable at present total \$7,383.22, of which \$2,900.70 is counted as non-active. At least \$5,076.54 is owed the hospital today by local people who should and likely could, retire their debt.

## PROGRAM DETAILS SET FOR FT. STANTON PARTY

Preparations are being made for an attendance of some 300 Lincoln county and Mesquero Indians to attend the Ft. Stanton hospital Christmas party, which is to be held beginning at 6:30 o'clock the evening of Friday, Dec. 21. The party is held for two reasons this year—not only to offer good wishes from the people of Lincoln county and the Indian reservation to the patients of the hospital, but to assemble, address and package gifts for all Lincoln county and Mesquero Indian men in the armed services now.

## \$53,200 PMA Alloment For Lincoln

The Production-Marketing Administration program for Lincoln county will have a total of \$53,200 that farmers and ranchers may earn by conducting soil practices on their land during 1952. The maximum amount any one land owner may earn is \$1250.00. The PMA program pays part of the cost of soil conserving practices the individual producer may undertake to do, the remainder is paid by the producer.

Before March 1, 1952, farmers and ranchers must fill out an intention sheet which shows the practices they intend to do during the year. This intention sheet must be filed in the PMA office in Carrizozo before the deadline before any payments can be made to a cooperator during 1952. Also the cooperator must establish prior approval just before starting work on any practices and will have 60 days after in which to complete the work. Prior approval consists of notifying the PMA Secretary that the work is about to begin and the location or area on the farm or ranch that the work is to be accomplished will have to conform with the requirements of the 25 different practices which are approved for the county.

Practices must be listed on the farmer's intention sheet in order to receive prior approval. Specifications for each practice may be obtained from the PMA office in Carrizozo or from PMA county committees.

Two appointed supervisors will be selected by this group at a future meeting to fill the expired term of Wilbur McKnight and Daniel Brenton previously appointed members of the board.

These supervisors are elected for terms of three years to conduct the business of the district. Some of the work the conservation board may also do is conduct surveys, investigations and research relating to soil erosion and to publish the results; they may conduct demonstrations concerning soil conservation practices.

It is with this group that farmers and ranchers enter into agreements when technical assistance is requested for conservation work to be done on their places. It is through their efforts that machinery is obtained and maintained for the use of persons within the district.

Mrs. Luther Bynum, with Idle Hour Lodge, was winner of the top prize of \$25 in cash given by Ruidoso, Hollywood and Green Tree merchants as climax to December's Dollar Day last Saturday night in the local gymnasium.
