Current Chamber of Commerce Activities For Year To Date Reported Here

January 1 - April 10, 1951

The Board of Directors voted to prepare a bulletin-letter to medical and osteopathic doctors on the health advantages to be had in Ruidoso. This letter is presently being prepared and envelopes have been addressed to 2,000 doctors in the Southwest.

An extensive mailing list has been compiled, currently with requests for literature, including all Automobile and Travel Clubs, Chamber of Commerce, Air Terminal and Lines, Railroad companies, Army posts and Air Force Bases. New literature has been mailed to these addresses, representing eight states in the United States and one Canadian Province.

Five hundred letters and advertisements were mailed to class presidents March 15, 1951, followed by a special edition of the Ruidoso News. Eleven inquiries regarding senior trips have been received in the Chamber of Commerce office.

The Board voted to institute a program for entertaining high students visiting Ruidoso, and asked the cooperation of all local organizations in the operation of the Youth Center. This office would like to see the Youth Center activated on a year-around basis for the benefit of Ruidoso boys and girls, and with the assistance of civic groups, we feel this can be accomplished.

The Chamber of Commerce made a bid for the next quarterly meeting of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association, however, a letter received from the Association stated they had voted to hold this meeting in Clayton

in June, and expressed hope of receiving another invitation from Ruidoso.

There have been three Board meetings since January 1, 1951, and an office manager has been named to handle all routine correspondence and bookkeeping.

JOHN JOHNSON PASSES AWAY Royston L. Johnson of Ruidoso, age 64 years, passed away Saturday, April 7th, 1951. Mr. Johnson had been ill for several days and died on the way to the hospital in the ambulance. He was born January 27, 1887 in Clarendon, Arkansas, a city where his family were pioneers. He grew up there and also lived in Memphis, Tenn. He attended the Military Academy in Staunton, Virginia.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson came to Ruidoso in 1933 and lived there and had business interests there until they came to Ruidoso in 1947. Here they have operated the Johnson Grocery and Market. Mr. Johnson lay in state at the Community Memorial Church in Ruidoso from 11:30 am to 1:30 pm. At 2 pm Rev. B. M. Stewart conducted services with a guard of honor from the American Legion, Marie Rogny sang two numbers with Maxine Teeter accompanying her at the organ.

Jordan Bond Set At \$3,000

Del Jordan, local business man, Thursday was being held in the Otero County Jail at Alamogordo on a writ of \$3,000 bond, after pleading "not guilty" through his attorney, to charges of statutory rape.

Proceedings in the case against Jordan have been changed from Lincoln to Otero County after attorneys for the state, questioning the complaining witness, determined that the alleged illegal act occurred in Otero County, on the Indian Reservation near White Tail road, which leads south from Highway 70.

First charges against Jordan were filed in Carrizozo, and the case has been under investigation by Sheriff S. M. Ortiz of Lincoln County and State Patrolman Robert Budagher of Alamogordo.

Jordan is represented by G. T. Watts and P. F. Hanagan, law firm of Roswell. Representing the prosecution in the case are Assistant District Attorney Robert Seiler of Alamogordo and J. Benson Newell, of Las Cruces, retained as special prosecutor by the parents of the complaining witness.

Through his attorney, Watts, Jordan pleaded not guilty in Justice Court at Alamogordo Thursday and waived preliminary hearing. He will probably appear before District Judge W. T. Seagraves in Alamogordo next Tuesday, for arraignment and further consideration of bond to appear in trial in the district court. Watts indicated in Alamogordo Thursday that his client would again plead not guilty before the district judge.

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Following the church services the local American Legion Post conducted a Military Funeral for Mr. Johnson, a Veteran of World War I, at the Angus Cemetery, where he was buried.

He is survived by his wife, Edith Johnson, two daughters, Mrs. George Trimble of Ruidoso and Mrs. Paul Klopstock of Galt, Ontario; and three brothers, Norman of Hollywood, California; Eben of Clarendon, Arkansas; and Julian of Jackson, Mississippi; and an uncle, Parker C. Ewan a pioneer of Little Rock, Ark.

Mrs. Klopstock and Mrs. Johnson's sister, Mrs. Edna Rowland and niece, Edna Ruth Rowland, of Roswell were here from out of town for the services.

HONDO DANCERS PERFORM AT TUCSON'S FIRST FESTIVAL OF ARTS BEFORE CROWD OF 4000 Before a crowd of 4,000 persons which packed to overflowing the huge auditorium of the University of Arizona, the Hondo High School Fiesta Dancers joined other talented groups of folk singers and dancers from all over the area and brought to life again some of the happenings of the old Southwest.

Originally planned for presentation at the university stadium, the program was transplanted, at the last moment, to the stage of the auditorium because of threatening rain. Of the twelve dances and five songs planned for the repertoire of the Hondo group, only three dances and one song were given. Featured along with them were Apache, Yaqui and Papago Indian who gave their native dances; Kay Lee and Barbara Abben who sang mining and other folk songs; Rex Morris, a Tucson cowboy singer; Los Carlinos, Tucson Spanish American singers; Galdys Barker, singer and guitarist; and Juan Urias, singer of Mexican folk songs.

A burst of applause greeted the entrance of the Hondo Fiesta Dancers as they waltzed gracefully to their positions and gave the lovely valley dance, the handkerchief waltz. The splendid lighting of the stage brought out in full splendor the colorful costumes of the dancers as they swayed to the tune of an old waltz played by Mrs. Montes.

Several songs and Indian dances, including the Yaqui deer dance, the rattle dance, the eagle ceremony dance and the Apache dance intervened before the Hondo group returned to the stage to do the cradle dance combined with the polka suelta. Interspersed at other intervals during the program was a song, "Las Mananitas," by the girls' chorus under the direction of Robert Lane, and the Jarabe danced by Mary Kamey, Alfred McTeigue, Humphrey Chavez and Gloria Nunez.

The Arizona Star praised the work of the Hondo dancers and stated that their performance was excellent. It commented also on the fact that groups and individuals would have been called back for an encore except for the fact that the new act was started before the old one had a chance to express its wishes.

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New Corona Gym Is Outstanding

Without a doubt the largest building in Lincoln County, and perhaps the best they think it is the best in New Mexico is the almost completed Corona Gymnasium.

The building, started in 1946 houses a manual arts department, a community room which includes a fine kitchen, a high gymnasium which seats 1000 people, and locker rooms, showers, etc. that would be adequate for any high school anywhere.

The overall cost of the building, including equipment, when completed, will be \$142,000.00. This building was built by the three thousand (approximately) tax payors of the Corona Municipal School District voting bonds; because they wanted the building, realized the need for it and felt like they could swing the deal.

Mr. Parker, Superintendent of the Corona Schools, who showed the press through the building contends that it is simply "useful and adequate for their needs. As an outsider looking in we say it is a magnificent building and wish to pay tribute to the community spirit that made it possible.

The building is modern in design with clean lines and no wasted space inside or out. Many large steel casement windows make it bright as day throughout all the time. Tile floors and many tile walls make for permanency, as this, as well as other building materials chosen, will stand the wear and tear for many years.

The need for such a building in Corona might best be explained to those folks who have never been there. Corona has no movie... they have no bowling alley... or other places of recreation as most towns do. They rely on their schools and home town talent for musical programs, dramatic presentations, contests and get-togethers of all kinds and they have many the year around. The school has always been more or less the center of activity and the new building will give them a bigger and nicer place to have any kind of entertainment they care to plan.

If you go through Corona don't fail to take time out to stop and see the new Corona Gymnasium. It is 95 per cent finished and as Mr. Parker said on the tour through the building, "there are just hundreds of little things to be done now, but we'll be ready to make full use of it by next September when school starts."

549 VISIT LINCOLN COUNTY MUSEUM DURING MARCH In checking with Caroline Davis and Mrs. James of the Lincoln County Museum, we learned that 549 folks visited the historic landmark during the month of March 1951.

Wednesday, March 4th, the day the report was made, there were visitors registered from Wisconsin, Illinois, Ohio and Texas from out of state. Others from Santa Fe, Roswell, Albuquerque, Ruidoso, Green Tree and Corona had registered from New Mexico.

The spring program at the museum includes planting grass in the yard around the building and doing some other landscaping. The balcony will be finished and the wooden fence repaired and painted in the near future. This is in addition to a general inside "spring housecleaning" that is going on at this time. Everything will be ready for the hundreds and thousands of visitors who stop during the summer months.

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The evening program to be held at the Ruidoso Grade School Gymnasium will be the highlight of the day and will begin at 7 pm. As this is the queen's court, with representatives from the valley, Ruidoso and Mesacero, will reign in a beautiful setting representing New Mexico which will combine costumes and customs of Indian, Spanish and Anglo peoples which populate this vast area. The stage will be decorated in this theme and costumes of the most beautiful and outstanding programs ever presented in this area.

As the court reings school groups representing every school from the valley, Ruidoso-Stetson Municipal District and Mesacero, will present skits, songs and dances for the entertainment of the three queens and their court... and for the audience too.

The committee in charge has asked that all participating in the evening program be on hand at 1 pm Saturday for dress rehearsal.

At 4 pm that day there will be a parade of children from all schools. This parade will be formed at Monties Riding Academy up the canyon and the Lincoln County Mounted Patrol has been invited to lead it.

After the parade various civic organizations will be on hand in the school yard, will outside the gym, to "man concessions" and serve sandwiches, cake, milk fruit drinks and coffee until time for the program to start. The food to be sold at these concessions will all be donated, therefore all benefits will go into the hospital fund, and everyone is urged to eat supper there that night.

Following the evening program by the children there will be a dance at the Donald Skyring Rink starting at 9:30 pm. Everyone is urged to attend and there will be good music.

This Pow-Wow compares with annual May Day events held in many other towns over the United States each spring. The children enjoy taking part in the programs and the adults in turn enjoy seeing their boys and girls. Some Grade School through Senior High School having up as they participate or observe. This will be the fourth annual Pow-Wow and every year it has been a big success. For the reason that the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital is so in need of funds it is being given as a hospital benefit this year. In the past several hundred dollars have been cleared to be divided among participating groups so that amount of money would substantially aid in the hospital program.

FIRST SOUTHWEST RECREATION LAB APRIL 25 - MAY 2 The first Southwest Recreation Laboratory is scheduled for April 25-May 2 at El Mirador Ranch, Alameda, N. M. Miss Travis Hughes, associate state 4 H club leader, announced today about 100 4 H club leaders, county agents, and others interested in recreation are expected to come from all parts of the Southwest to attend the school.

Purpose of the school is to train recreation leaders in latest methods. Miss Hughes explained. Music, folk and square dancing, ceremonials, crafts, games, outdoor cooking, program planning, discussions and visual aids will make up the laboratory program. Crafts will include metalcraft, leathercraft, chip carving, finger painting, tin craft, wood carving, and aluminum etching.

Teachers at the laboratory will be Miss Jane Farwell, nationally known recreation leader, Dodgeville, Wis.; Bill and Mary Frances Bunning, craft experts, Colorado Springs, Colo.; Alvida Sorenson, local 4 H club leader, Brookings, S. D.; Rev. Don Clayton, Moscow, Idaho; and a number of other outstanding specialists in the recreational field.

Registration fee for the week's course, including meals and lodging, is \$27, according to Miss Hughes. El Mirador Ranch, where the laboratory will be held, was recently acquired by New Mexico State College. Located in the Espanola Valley of Rio Arriba County, the ranch comprises 80 acres and five ranch houses, beautifully furnished in Southwestern style.

Anyone interested in attending the laboratory may write to Miss Hughes, Extension Service, State College.

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J. V. Taylor To Retire As Conservationist

J. V. Taylor, known as the father of New Mexico's soil conservation district movement today that he will retire as state conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service on May 1.

The retiring state conservationist became associated with the Soil Conservation Service in 1937 as a state coordinator, and has held his present position since 1942. He and Mrs. Taylor will leave Albuquerque early in May to make their home in Venice, Florida.

The soil conservation program has made outstanding progress in New Mexico under Taylor's direction. Latest figures show that in New Mexico the acres planned for conservation and the number of acres treated for conservation rank second only to Texas. The cost of per acre planning for soil conservation in New Mexico is second only to South Dakota.

During his colorful career, Taylor has been a worker in the Louisiana rice fields, a teamster in Texas oil fields, secretary to a bank president, buyer for a lumber company, manager of a funeral home, a partner in three shoe and cigar raising enterprises and a New Mexico state legislator.

In 1920, he became manager and partner in a sheep and cattle business in New Mexico. When this business was dissolved in 1920, he organized the Alpine Sheep Company, which included the 40-section J-X ranch near Corona, N. M. The holding of this company later were increased to 95 sections.

In 1922, Taylor was elected to represent Socorro, Lincoln and Otero counties in the New Mexico legislature. He was re-elected in 1924 and 1926, serving through three regular and two special sessions. His major committee assignments in the legislature included service on the public lands and livestock committees in the 12th and 13th sessions.

The state soil conservation law was passed during the 13th session, and Taylor, as majority floor leader, and ex-officio member of all committees, was credited with being the father of the conservation law. The conclusion of his legislative service, Taylor was employed by the Soil Conservation Service.

Taylor's successor as state conservationist has not yet been selected according to Cyril Laker, regional director for SCS.

Junior Gun Club Started Here The Ruidoso Gun Club announced this week that they will be sponsors here for a Junior National Rifle Association. They have written to national headquarters for a charter but it should be about thirty days before the organization is complete and the junior boys can begin firing.

They will use the equipment belonging to the men's organization and will shoot 22 caliber rifles for the most part at 50 feet. The program entails teaching the boys to handle firearms safely as well as accuracy.

All of the Eagle Scouts of Ruidoso will be members and other boys up to the age of 18 years are expected to be interested in joining the group.

## EDITORIAL

"A new wrinkle in processing would be farm immigrants to the U. S. is the certification of 5000 farm families in Europe by a group of American county agents," Rowe says. Also Congress has made provision for loans for farmers to pay for transporting the families from Europe.

The immigrants, must in addition take oath to live up to the provisions of employment.
