



Some Questions About The New Mexico Egg Law

By Charles Whigham, Extension Poultry Specialist, New Mexico A & M College.

1. What is the purpose of the New Mexico Egg Law? The primary purpose is to promote the egg industry in New Mexico by preventing the sale of inedible eggs.

2. What are the main features of the law that will affect the grocer? Grocers who buy from egg dealers will have to sell eggs in cartons. The eggs will be graded into one of five grades (AA, A, B, C, unclassified) specified by the egg law. The eggs will also be graded as to weight. Grocers who deal in more than five cases a week will need a license for selling eggs. This license will cost \$10.

3. How will the law affect the advertising of eggs? Descriptive terms such as "fresh", "strictly fresh" or "ranched eggs" will not be used in advertising except when eggs are Grade A or better. All advertising must include the size and quality of the eggs.

4. How will the law protect the price of eggs? The price of the higher quality eggs such as AA and A grades will probably be raised a little. The price of B and C grade will probably be some lower so that the over-all figure will balance out about the same.

5. Will the new law raise the price of eggs? The price of the higher quality eggs such as AA and A grades will probably be raised a little. The price of B and C grade will probably be some lower so that the over-all figure will balance out about the same.

6. May the grocer buy direct from the producer? Yes. If he buys direct from the producer in quantities less than ten cases in any one week or 520 cases a year, he may be exempted from the provisions of the law, but if he handles more than ten cases a week, he is subject to the

regulations of the law and will have to grade the eggs out. 7. How will the merchant and Rousewife determine the grade and size they are buying? They need only look at the grade and size marked on the carton to tell what size and grade they are. All cartons will have the quality and size marked on them. 8. Who will be liable in case of violation? The decision will be rendered by the inspector as to who is liable in case of violation. 9. What are the grades allowed? Five grades are allowed—AA, A, B, C, and unclassified. The carton seal for unclassified eggs shall bear the words "These eggs have not been graded as to quality and weight, but eggs unfit for food have been removed."

10. What sizes are allowed? All sizes are allowed—from the 18-ounce peewee to the 30-ounce jumbo. Size has nothing to do with quality. 11. Are there any exemptions to this law? Yes. Producers who sell directly to consumers, not to exceed five cases a week, are exempt. Grocers buying directly from producers, not to exceed ten cases in any one week, are exempt. 12. Who is to be the chief inspector? The chief inspector will be Richard Marek, former Torrance County extension agent.

13. How will egg dealers purchase the license, case labels, and carton seals? They may be obtained from the Egg Inspection Department at New Mexico A & M College, State College, N. M.

14. What may the penalties be in case of violation? They can be a jail sentence up to 90 days, a \$200 fine, or a revoking of the license.

U. S. Army Needs Civilians For Foreign Work

The United States Army is inviting 2300 civilians to accept employment at Army installations in Austria, Germany, Alaska, Okinawa and Japan, according to an announcement made recently.

At salaries which range from \$2650 to \$7,000 per year, the Army urgently needs construction and maintenance personnel; communication engineers and technicians; automotive engineer and mechanics; safety engineers, engineering and survey aides; draftsmen; typists and stenographers; librarians, industrial and cost accountants; auditors; storekeepers; warehousemen; property and supply clerks; tabulating-machine operators; economists and public health physicians. Civilian personnel in Alaska and Okinawa receive an additional 25 per cent allowance in pay; and in Japan it is 10 per cent.

Transportation will be provided both ways to successful applicants and, in addition, all Army facilities available to military personnel will be furnished to civilian employees who take advantage of the offer.

The approximate cost of living for a civilian employee overseas compares most favorably with the cost of living at home. In Alaska, salaries will cost the single worker \$75 per month, in Austria and Germany, \$60; in Okinawa \$45 and in Japan only \$35. Civilian tour of duty have the opportunity to save a very large part of their earnings.

Where Can I Catch Plenty Of Fish?

All Game and Fish Department personnel, is plagued this time of year with the plaintive question: "Where is the best place to go fishing?"

The Department has published a listing of the 2,715 miles of trout streams and 11,382 acres of trout lakes of New Mexico giving a brief description, location, etc., which is available by contacting the Santa Fe office. Here we have tried to report on the most popular of these and some results that have been obtained from them so far this year.

Bluewater Lake, located 9 miles from Bluewater south of Highway 66, had good trout catches early in the season and the crappie and perch are still excellent.

Brazos, which heads near the Colorado line and flows into the Chama near Park View, has rainbow, natives and Loch Leven, and are happy here this year.

Canjilon Lakes, beaver lakes reconstructed and enlarged by the Game and Fish Department, about 10 miles northeast of Canjilon. The 15 acres of lakes on the southwest side of Canjilon Mountain have been stocked and legal size fish are plentiful.

Cebolla River, in the Jemez Mountains from its head to its junction with Rio Las Vacas, is especially good near the Seven Springs Fish Hatchery.

Chama River from El Vado Dam down to Rio Puerco is especially fruitful for those preferring rainbows.

Cimarron River, in the beautiful scenic Highway 64, is a good rainbow area, especially in the upper portion. The remainder is a good Loch Leven haven.

Cow Creek, which heads at Elk Mountain, is a tributary of the Pecos. It is reached via Pecos or by trail from Martin's or Irwin's ranch. Excellent fishing.

Gallinas River, west of Las Vegas, is the most scenic canyon in the state and has good rainbow and Loch Leven fishing.

Taos area, we have grouped the fine trout lakes of the mountains in this area, the best being: Geoco Creek, Little Blue, Lost Lancers, Middle Fork, Ponce and Williams Lakes. These are all beautiful places to go with the best mountain trout fishing in New Mexico.

Hondo, north of Taos, is a swift, cold stream with good brook and native trout fishing.

Jemez River, flowing through Jemez Springs, has been heavily stocked with rainbow and Loch Leven.

Pecos Lakes, here again we group the lakes rendering the best catches in the Pecos area: Johnson, Katherine, Lost Bear, Pecos Baldy, Spirit, Stewart and Truchas Peak Lakes.

Mira-Pecos River, joins Pecos a mile above Ferrero, reached by trail from Cowles. Very fine stream with a lot of open water.

Pecos River, near Pecos town, is one of the best streams in the state. It is well stocked but heavily fished.

Red River, near Red River town, is heavily stocked and heavily fished. Fine open waters and beautiful scenic beauty. As fine a system of trout waters as there is in the state.

Rio Grande, upper, from Velarde to Colorado line. The King of New Mexico trout waters, still yields the largest fish of any stream in the state, occasionally to 19 pounds.

Rio Las Vacas in the heart of the Jemez Mountains paralleling the Jemez Springs-Cuba road for some way, is a very good stream.

Ruidoso River, in White Mountain country near Lincoln National Forest, parallels Highway 70, heavily fished but heavily stocked by Game Department.


