What They're About

Eight Amendments Submitted In September 18th Election

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a series of articles written by State Senator Murray Morgan, dealing with the eight proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in a special election on September 18. Each amendment is summarized to indicate the purpose of the proposed change. The proposed amendments will be published in full text for four weeks prior to the election, in at least one newspaper in each county of the state. Read these articles, then read the full text of the amendments, and vote intelligently on September 18.)

In a special election to be held September 18, 1951, the people of New Mexico will vote on eight proposed changes to the State Constitution, as submitted by their 1951 Legislature.

Only the people themselves can pass their own fundamental law, and it is important that each voter should study each proposed change and how it would affect the state in general, whether the change would be for better or for worse.

In the following series of discussions we shall attempt to justify the purpose of each proposed amendment, in the most understandable terms.

Amendment No. 1
This amendment proposes to establish the right of the Indian to buy liquor, which now is prohibited both by state and federal statute. By adopting this amendment, the people of New Mexico would, in effect, be renouncing its compact with the United States Government in this respect, for before the U. S. Congress would admit New Mexico to statehood, it was required that the people in their constitution a clause that the sale of liquor to Indians shall forever be prohibited. Amendment No. 1, the language is left out, but the other provisions, referring to religious toleration and polygamy, would remain.

New Mexico's compact with the United States (included in the state constitution written in 1910, 2 years before statehood) goes on to say that the compact can only be changed by mutual consent of the people of New Mexico and of the U. S. Congress. It is doubtful, however, what the U. S. could do if the people of New Mexico should renounce that part of the compact. We probably would not be expelled from the Union and be demoted to a Territory. Oklahoma wasn't when they decided to move their state capital from Guthrie to Oklahoma City two years before their compact said they could move it. That case, however, did go to the U. S. Supreme Court, and there it was ruled that that feature of the Oklahoma compact was not valid, because each state on the same basis, and the requirement of capital location was not imposed by mutual consent, therefore the U. S. could not make it stick in Oklahoma. Likewise, perhaps, the Supreme Court would find that the U. S. did not require other states to prohibit the sale of liquor to Indians and, therefore, could not impose this condition on New Mexico.

Those who would do away with the liquor prohibition applying to Indians contend that if Indians were allowed the same privileges as to liquor as are white people, many would not drink at all; others would take it temperately.

L. Threepersons Writes About Ruidoso

As we drove out of town Saturday evening, before starting over the big hill on the edge of town I paused to look back . . . and saw the careless spill of lights, yellow, red, white and neon green . . . that was Silver City. It looked so peaceful, so quiet, so secure, nestling in the little valley, like a babe in the arms of its mother. The lights all over the city were cobwebbed and golden.

The sun had gone down over the distant hills and then sunset had colored the clouds with brilliant rose. Only a dull red light came up behind the dusky hills . . . the day was slowly being blotted out.

Summer is truly here . . . I can hear the drowsy hum of bees singing among my flowers . . . and hazy clouds are drifting over the warm blue sky this Sabbath morning.

In my last column I didn't finish about my ten day vacation trip. I arrived home loaded down with cherry cider from Hondo valley (real cherry cider) not the kind made with extract, preservatives and jelly from the Ruidoso, historical plates from Roswell, pottery from Las Cruces, and memories of a lovely trip. Trips to your ritor are nice when they are not hurried ones. When you have time to stop and pass the night with them, stop along the highway and meet new folks in trading posts, hamburger stands, etc.

Over two years ago a sweet little lady in the Ruidoso valley that has an interesting trading post, sent me word to stop and see her sometime . . . Well, I know sometime I'd get to stop and visit her but didn't rightly know just when. Well, this time I pulled the Ford out of the road where the big, fast thru freight trucks wouldn't hit it as the whizzed by, tied by lines around the dash board and got out to sit for a spell. If I didn't get away until night it made little difference to me . . . after all she had asked me to stop.

She invited me in on the cool porch, a nice wind was singing and swaying the trees along the mountain side and such an ideal day for a visit. She opened up a big ice-box and poured me a cup of cherry cider and oh how good and refreshing it tasted. For your information I had several cups. If you ever pass this place be sure and stop and have some of this delicious cider.

The little lady that owns the trading post is none other than Mrs. Edna C. Schierenberg . . . her place is called, "La Huerta". She gets her mail at Glencoe on the

Ruidoso. The Hondo river and valley are most beautiful. After coming in from that dry baked country around Roswell you feel like you have just entered paradise. Orchards all up and down the valley, emerald green squares of alfalfa and garden patches all along the river bottom. And the clear sparkling river winding its way peacefully and noisily down thru the midst of it all.

You can spend hours in La Huerta just looking at the many, many, interesting articles on display. Mrs. Schierenberg is a very artistic lady. In one corner of her trading post she has built a miniature Taos Pueblo. It stands about three feet high and has everything that a real Indian Pueblo has. Even to the Indians standing on the rooftops with their gayly colored blankets wrapped so securely around them. She has dozens of Taos dolls to achieve this effect of people. It is beautifully constructed and as near a perfect copy of a Taos pueblo as one could possibly make . . . and Mrs. S. made it all by herself.

She has many interesting and beautiful Indian handmade articles she gets from the reservations. She even has imported things from far away Guatemala . . . colorful and gay. I fancied some pretty Guatemalan skirts with hand embroidered designs made into wide bands around the bottom of the skirt . . . would make such pretty square dance costumes with a gay blouse to go with it. She had intriguing dolls from Guatemala, lovely hand bags, charming wall tapestries, and many colorful and pretty things from Mexico. That doesn't begin to half name the many lovely things in her trading post.

Now you'd like to know something of the little lady herself, wouldn't you? Her loads of personality, and such a warm friendly smile . . . you just know she is a friendly person to look at her. She is a widow, and by profession is a registered nurse. For awhile she was health nurse in Dona Ana county. Then she was in a disastrous automobile accident and was not able to continue her profession. So she came up to the Hondo county, bought this trading post, and is living happily ever after, in a house, by the side of the road, where the race of men go by (and women too). I can easily understand why she loves the winding river, the blue mountains and foothills. The friendly country people that stop by to visit and bring her her mail and buy a jug of cherry cider, the tourist that is passing thru this lovely part of God's own country. A pleasant interlude in a passing day.

I must tell you of my visit to Ruidoso. I was there a long time

ago when there weren't many people there among the tall pines . . . But now . . . they are thick as ants, and buzzing to and fro like bees in a hive. I wondered where so many people came from? Ruidoso is a wonderful spot but isn't so much prettier after the rains . . . but aren't all places . . . Grant county for instance. It was dry and dusty like every place else. But the friendliness of the people had no dryness or dustiness on them. I stopped at a motel and the proprietor, an ice friendly lady, buzzed around to see that everything was in shipshape, brot me a pitcher of ice water . . . if you've never tasted good mountain water then have a drink in Ruidoso. It's so good.

Then I started out visiting my friends. One of my nearest and dearest are the Brownfields . . . Jim and Rose. My husband worked with Mr. Brownfield on the El Paso police force, and a finer man never wore a police uniform. He is the one that got my husband interested in target shooting with a pistol. He coached him for a long time. He is retired now and the police force in El Paso lost a fine officer when he left. He is a great fisherman . . . takes his little dog and passes many happy days along the bank of the singing Ruidoso river and on a boat on the placid mountain lakes in the vicinity. His wife worries and is afraid he might over-tax his strength along the fishing streams and he told us he knew of no more beautiful or peaceful place to end his journey than in those peaceful mountains. I don't either.

And Rose is one of those friend-

ly persons that can't do enough for you when you are her guest. You feel at home as soon as you enter her door. There is that atmosphere of friendliness that you don't see but definitely feel it. She has a nice beauty salon in Ruidoso and talk about keeping busy . . . She does. But she always has time for her friends and neighbors and she has many. And such a good cook . . . last year she canned and preserved 500 jars of fruit and vegetables, canned when she wasn't working, after shop hours. Now you know where my jelly and preserves I brot home came from. I'll never forget that good supper of big juicy steaks, she broiled to perfection, served with a crispy salad, crusty bread and ice tea, and the cold watermelon for dessert. What a cook that lady is!

Well folks here I am at the bottom of the last page . . . still haven't told you about Ruidoso and some other things I promised.


