B.P.W. Street Marker Project Grows Rapidly



## U. S. Officials Aiding Back To School Move

ALBUQUERQUE — With most public schools opening next month, officials of the U. S. Department of Labor already are turning their attention to the labor and employment of young citizens, particularly those under 16. Despite the national crisis, they want boys and girls to continue their education because prominent figures everywhere contend that good schooling makes a happier adult, a better wage earner, a finer citizen, and, if necessary, a more efficient soldier.

J. R. Carwright, supervisor of the Wage-Hour and Public Contracts Divisions of the U. S. Department of Labor here, points out that Federal laws prohibiting child labor now apply in all states to all children under 16 years of age employed on farms producing crops for interstate commerce (other than their parent's farm) when school is in session.

Local resident children as well as migratory alien children are covered by the law, he said. Neither may be employed in agriculture, during school hours if they are under 16. By "school hours" is meant the hours when school is in session for the district where the child under 16 is currently living, he explained. The law, amended by Congress in 1940, gives children in agriculture its full protection during school hours if the crop is for interstate commerce.

Official figures show that more than three million teen-agers held summer jobs this year. In the past, two-thirds of those employed in the summer continued to work full or part-time during the school year. They didn't go back to school. "When the school bell rings this fall, we want as many as possible of those children to be back in school and not to be employed illegally on farms or in factories," he said.

**What They're About**

**Proposed Amendments To Constitution Summarized**

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a series of articles written by State Senator Murray Morgan, dealing with the eight proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in a special election on September 18. Each amendment is summarized to indicate the purpose of the proposed change. The proposed amendments will be published in full text for four weeks prior to the election, in at least one newspaper in each county of the state. Read these articles, then read the full text of the amendments, and vote intelligently on September 18.)

**Amendment No. 3 and Amendment No. 4**  
Amendment No. 3 and 4 relate to salaries of Supreme Court Justices and District Court Judges, and propose to amend Article 8, Sections 11 and 17. Section 11 fixes the salary of Supreme Court Justices at \$6,000 per year. These amounts were set when the constitution was framed in 1910, and the legislature has had no opportunity to add to these salaries except by what the members of the legislature have found to be a distasteful method of "subterfuge".

The legislature, in order to increase the income of supreme court justices, from time to time, passed a law making them custodians of the state law library, and they draw additional compensation for this duty. The office of "juvenile judge" was created for the district judges, so that their incomes could be fixed by the legislature for this duty.

The Legislature, in proposing Amendments No. 3 and 4, asks the people to allow a salary adjustment for the offices for which the supreme court justices and district judges were elected, without resorting to the "subterfuge" method. Under these proposed amendments, the salaries of district judges, and supreme court justices would be fixed by the Legislature from time to time. They could be increased during the incumbents' term of office, but they could not be decreased. A decrease, if ordered by the Legislature, would take effect at the end of the term for which the individual is elected. The legislature has the power to fix the salaries of all other state and county officials, but not the judges and justices.

**Amendment No. 5**  
Article 9, Section 12 of our state constitution provides that no city, town or village may vote upon a general obligation, bond issue at any time, except during a general municipal election when the city council and mayor are elected.

Under Amendment No. 5, the municipal governing body would be able to submit that question at any time, without having to wait for a general municipal election. Other terms of the constitution relating to municipal gen-

sufficient supply of domestic water by pipeline. Since the issues of proposed indebtedness and election of city officials are unrelated, it would seem not necessary to hold election on the two subjects at the same time. Too often, the public attention is focused on the mayor race to get the mayor's study by the voters of whether they shall obligate themselves by debt for a proposed public improvement. If you concur in this thought, you should vote FOR Amendment No. 6.
