New Egg Law Explained

"I just have a few hens. What must I do when I sell my eggs?" Many small poultry flock owners in New Mexico have been asking this question since the new state egg law went into effect last summer. According to Richard Marek, state egg inspector, the New Mexico Egg Law was created to standardize the quality of eggs sold to consumers—not to work a hardship on any producer.

Yet misinformation concerning the egg law has caused producers a great deal of bewilderment, Marek says. Many small flock owners would rather sell their hens than to try to sell a few dozen eggs under the law. But when the law is explained, Marek adds, nine out of every ten farmers raising poultry find that the law does not affect them.

Marek believes that the following explanations will help to clarify some of the confusion:

A producer selling directly to the consumer less than five cases (30-dozen-per case) of eggs in any one week is exempt under the law. This means that the producer can sell his eggs directly to the consumer. If the producer sells over five cases of eggs a week, he will be required to grade, size, carton, and stamp the cartons. In other words, he must comply with the law.

Under the new egg law, a grocery store can still continue to buy from local producers. If a dealer or grocer buys less than 10 cases of eggs a week from producers, he is exempt under the provisions of the law—provided he buys all his eggs from producers. If he buys any eggs from

another dealer, he must comply with the law. When a dealer is operating under the law, he must comply with all the regulations. Some grocers have refused to buy local eggs because they don't want to handle and grade eggs. Many grocery stores are now buying eggs in cartons from the producers who are doing their own grading and packing. This has proved to be a very satisfactory system for both the dealer and producer.

Producers having questions concerning the New Mexico Egg Grading Act can address their inquiries to the Inspection Department, State College, New Mexico.

NOTICE!

Notice has been released by the New Mexico Electrical Administrative Board to the Members and consumers of the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc. in the village of Capitan that all old wiring must either be replaced or repaired made that will permit safe operation. The Cooperative is nearly completed the rebuilding of the electric system outside but a stop order has been placed on connection of the new system to the homes, businesses and other establishments, until repairs are made by the residents.

The Electrical Administrative Board has ruled that it will not be safe in a large number of cases in Capitan to connect to the old wiring.

The Electrical Board has agreed to wait for a period of 90 days to allow the residents of the Village to have an opportunity to have their dwellings checked and repairs made if needed. The State Inspector, Mr. D. C. Horine has stated that he is of the opinion that a number of fire hazards exist in the present wiring in the dwellings and in order to prevent fires from defective wiring the foregoing stop order has been issued.

The services of Mr. Horine in checking the present wiring is available upon request. Mr. Horine, representing the State of New Mexico in this capacity of electrical inspector, will not perform any wiring, only making a state inspection and advising what is wrong.



Undercover Drive

SEN. Owen Brewster of Maine is leading an undercover drive to expose GOP national chairman Guy Gabrielson — because Gabrielson won't join the covert anti-Eisenhower campaign.

This is what was back of the slandering attack on Gabrielson by Republicans' Senator Dikens of Illinois, Walker of Idaho and Jenner of Indiana, all faithful friends of Brewster's.

For some time there has been bad blood between the amiable, conservative Gabrielson—who feels he must be neutral as to all GOP candidates—and Brewster, who is both the strategist for extreme rightwing forces in the senate and likewise Taft's campaign adviser. Gabrielson is privately pro-Taft, but he refused to go along on the anti-Eisenhower smear campaign recently distributed in Maine.

In fact, Gabrielson told a separate elections subcommittee he was "surprised and shocked" at the circulation of the "Partisan Republican" pamphlet making Gabrielson's connection with the Communist.

Therefore when conscientious Republican Senator Williams of Delaware criticized Gabrielson's connection with RFC loans to Carthage Hydrocol, Brewster saw his chance. He called in other Republican senators, asked them to join Williams "for the good of the party."

Sam Rayburn Rages

Speaker Sam Rayburn, usually an easygoing soul, gave Congressman Clarence Cannon of Missouri, chairman of the house appropriations committee, a private dressing-down last week.

Cannon, who has had a tough time getting appropriations cleared in his committee, dropped into Rayburn's office to ask for a fourth 30-day extension to permit the government to operate another month while waiting for its appropriation bills to pass congress. The bills were supposed to pass by the end of the fiscal year, June 30, and ever since that date, the government has been operating on a month-to-month piece-meal basis.

The speaker listened to Cannon's request and then hit the ceiling. He told the startled Missourian that this is the first time in history that congress has had to give four extensions on appropriations bills.

Too Late in Iran

Some people against the British in the Iranian oil dispute are other oil men in the middle east. They point out that the British oil concession in Iran was obtained by corruption, that Britain kept certain members of the Iranian parliament on its payroll for years, and that everyone in Teheran knows this.

They also point out that the royalties paid by the British are so meager that the Iranians were bound to kick over the traces.

In Indonesia, American companies pay 60 per cent royalty to the Indonesian government, keep 40 per cent. In Arabia the split is fifty-fifty. But in Iran, Britain officially pays only 25 per cent to Iran, though unofficially a 20 through secret bookkeeping the split is reported nearer 12 per cent for Iran; 88 per cent for Britain.

Justice Douglas Warned

In recent months the state department has been on the ball, but this was far too late. In 1949, for instance, Justice William O. Douglas came back from Iran to warn the state department what was bound to happen. On January 30, this column also warned: "Moscow is waging an extremely effective campaign to take over Iran by friendly infiltration. Simultaneously, the United States has so bungled its diplomacy that Iran is on the verge of losing a 100-year-old traditional friendship with the U.S.A. . . . Iran has cut the Voice of America, given free play to the Moscow radio, has negotiated a new trade treaty with Russia. . . ."

For months, however, U.S. ambassadors in Teheran had instructions not to discuss the British oil problem. This was Britain's baby, they were advised, and we should keep hands off.

Now, however, the entire middle east is on the verge of a crisis—and possible war—because of this bungling.

A-Bomb Report

The atomic energy commission has sent President Truman an extremely encouraging report on the atomic race with Russia. This is the first reason behind the enthusiastic statements recently about our fantastic A-bomb progress.

The report to the President says daily that the United States has now regained the tremendous atomic superiority it had over Russia in August of 1946 when the first Soviet atomic bomb was exploded.

Lincoln County Citizens Buy Defense Bonds

Since the start of the Defense Bond Drive which began last Labor Day, more than \$774,913.25 worth, at issue price, of Series "E", "F", "G" and "H" Bonds have been purchased by residents of New Mexico, not including those bought by employees of the Federal government and members of the Armed Forces, according to an announcement by S. E. Grelsen, Chairman of this County's Defense Bonds Committee.

New Mexicans invested \$528,713.25 in Series "E" Bonds during September; the chairman said. The State Treasurer, R. H. Grisom, invested \$200,000 of permanent funds held for various State institutions in Series "G" Bonds, bringing the total for September placed in Series "E's" and "G's" to \$246,200.00.

Residents of this County invested a total of \$3,325.00 in Defense Bonds last month, of which \$3,325.00 was in Series "E's" and the chairman said.

"Before the close of the first Defense Bond Drive on October 27, it is hoped that Defense Bond Sales will exceed those of all previous campaigns," the chairman said. 

Fish Writes From Tinian Island

L. D. Fish, formerly of Ft. Stanton and for a time correspondent for the Ruidoso News, writes us this most interesting article. We know the readers will enjoy reading it.

TINIAN
L. D. Fish

Seven weeks ago I came to the island of Tinian. I came here to become a member of a group of only ten white people whose duty it is to administer the affairs of the island in the interests of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. The work we do is not too unlike any other similar position in the United States or any other organized community. The unique feature is the peculiar situation of a place that only a few years ago was a thundering, roaring military establishment engaged in the serious business of waging a war in the interests of the government of the United States.

The island, which would occupy a spot about three square feet on a map a mile square, is laid out in a system of highways very much like the streets of Manhattan, New York. We have our Broadway and 8th Ave. running parallel from one end of the island to the other. We have our numbered streets crossing these thoroughfares at regular intervals. Quite often one sees a sign marking such streets as 59th, 92nd, etc. Some of these signs are hanging by one nail and with the paint blistered, but still readable. The air strips, at one time the largest in the world, are intact and sometimes a plane sets down here. The wind socks have gone, but their poles still stand. It is remarkable—and a credit to you men of the NCB—that all of the paved streets and your air strips are still usable. This information does not violate any of the rules of security; the information is common knowledge here and numerous photographs have been taken by many people, and have been sent to all parts of the world.

The housing area where Staff Officers were once located is now in use by the white people living here. One house (said to have been the home of a general at one time) is now a hotel doing a good business. On one side of the island and inland is the village of San Jose; at the other end of 8th ave. is a Hansen's Disease Colony containing about a hundred patients. A salvage company is doing a temporary business here and that, insofar as people is concerned, is all.

The native people are Chamorro from Yap, having been moved here after the war was over. The Chamorros, except for the color of their skins are not unlike the people found on the mainland of the United States. They make excellent neighbors, are highly intelligent, clean and neat, and a credit to themselves. The first thought that comes to the mind of people in the United States when a native islander is mentioned is someone with fuzzy hair who is quite likely to stick a spear into any intruder. This thought is ridiculous (I had it myself) because many of these island people speak better English than I do and are fully as well civilized as any white man I have ever seen.

Many changes have come over the island of Tinian since you were here last. While the roads and air strips you built are still so tough for the trees and vines to tear apart, the island is slowly but surely returning to her Lord and Master, the Jungle. Soon the last of the abandoned quonsets will have been covered, the last of the deserted wooden buildings will have rotted away and again the little island of Tinian will be but a spot of green in the trackless waste of the ocean. The few white people here will go quietly about their business; the only sounds will be the hoarse speech of the white "foreigners," the soft musical words of the Chamorros, and the screams of the ocean as it throws wave after relentless wave at the unyielding rocks—natural fortresses of the insignificant island.





Hallowe'en Party Cake
CAKE OF THE MONTH



Here's a three-layered chocolate beauty guaranteed to keep your mind off those spooky and hobgoblin that might be wandering around on the night of your Hallowe'en party. The cake is chocolatey rich and dark—tender and light as only downy soft flour can make it. Filled and frosted with a Fluffy Butter Cream Frosting and decorated with grinning pumpkin faces it adds gaiety to any party! To make the faces on top of the cake dip a toothpick in melted, unsweetened chocolate and draw a small outline of a sprightly pumpkin face—complete with eyes, nose and mouth. Repeat, making a border of these jaunty faces so that each person gets a pumpkin face with his piece of cake.

Hallowe'en Devil's Food Cake
2 cups sifted cake flour
1 teaspoon soda
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs, unbeaton
3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
*Milk (see below for amount)
1 teaspoon vanilla
*With butter, margarine, or lard, use 1 cup milk. With vegetable or any other shortening, use 1 cup plus 2 tablespoons milk.
Sift flour once, measure, add soda and salt, and sift together three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Add chocolate and blend. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Turn into three 8-inch layer pans, which have been lined on bottoms with paper, then greased. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 30 minutes or until done.
Decorating: Spread Fluffy Butter Cream Frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Outline pumpkin faces on top of cake with a toothpick dipped in melted unsweetened chocolate.
Fluffy Butter Cream Frosting
1/2 cup butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
0 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
3 egg whites, unbeaton
1 1/2 tablespoons milk (about)
Cream together butter, salt, and vanilla. Add sugar alternately with egg whites, beating well after each addition. Add milk and beat well. Makes about 3 1/2 cups frosting.


