## HELICOPTER PILOT FINDS BOY LOST IN MOUNTAINS

A helicopter pilot early Monday afternoon rescued a 10-year-old boy who was lost overnight in the Osage Mountains.

First reports from the scene said the youngster, Jerry Emmett Gregg, was unharmed and in good condition.

The unidentified pilot, from Holloman Air Force Base at Alamogordo, landed, picked up the boy and returned him to the hunting camp from which he wandered Sunday afternoon. It is about 35 miles west of Osage, a village 17 miles south of this southern New Mexico town.

Persons returning from the widespread rescue operation said young Jerry related that he was "just went off from Dad's camp and couldn't find my way back."

He was found in an arroyo three ridges and from two to three miles distant from the hunting camp, on the old Withers ranch, now uninhabited.

Searchers said Jerry told of seeing a shelter from wind and rain in the draw. Contrary to early reports, he was warmly clad but his shoes and clothing were damp from the rain.

## 1,300 Cattle Are Auctioned By Mescaleros

Mescalero cattle brought their usual high prices last week when more than 1,300 were auctioned in the second fall sale on the Mescalero Indian Reservation.

The sales brought total sales this year to \$400,000 with proceeds in excess of \$400,000.

This sale totaled \$100,327, according to Ralno Sardin.

Biggest sales went to Bogle and J. D. Hance of Clovis, N. M., whose sales included 71 heifer yearlings at \$30.50 per hundred weight; 40 wet cows at \$24; 70 wet cows at \$19.10; 68 dry cows and calves at \$217 per pair; 60 dry cows at \$30.20; 60 cows at \$25.10; 18 cow and steer calves at \$41.30; 50 steer yearlings at \$39.50; and nine steers at \$24.

John Adams of Spur, Texas, was low bidder on 60 cows at \$22; Luther Adams of Woodward, Okla., bought 63 dry cows at \$24.80.

One hundred steer calves went to J. A. Shroy of Watoum, Okla. at \$3.00. 98 steer yearlings went to C. E. Baldrige of Clovis at \$37.60; 82 steer yearlings to Howard of Muleshoe, Texas, and Grede Gore of Big Spring, Texas, bid in 25 bulls at \$28; 10 bulls at \$23.50; 30 two-year-old steers at \$30; 10 stags at \$26 and 13 miscellaneous at \$3.

Funeral services of two kinds were held for Tahutoo Coonie, 99-year-old Indian woman who died at her home in the Mescalero reservation on Nov. 3.

Services were held on Monday, Nov. 5, in the Dutch Reform church on the reservation, with Rev. Reuben Ten Hagen, and Eugene Chiwawa officiating.

Then on the night of the same day, members of the Apache Indian tribe who were among her relatives and loved friends, held memorial services which were held in their simplicity. As the latter gathering, Ramon Dakhgie sang an Indian song, written by a relative of the deceased, in the poetic Indian tongue, which told the story of the spirit of the old one having gone to the happy hunting ground.

Mrs. Coonie, a widow, was survived by two step children, several grandchildren and great-grandchildren and nephews and nieces. Burial was in the Mescalero cemetery.

## Buck Fever

With the deer, bear and turkey hunting season opening last Saturday, the streets of Ruidoso have been dotted of local residents, the "homefolks" run "buck fever" to a higher degree than those out of the community, it seems. As Roy Anderson summed it up: "Never let pleasure interfere with business," as he packed up gear for an extensive stay in the mountains. He had just returned from a two-weeks fishing trip to Elephant Butte. (See photo elsewhere in this week's paper.)

Indicative of the interest in hunting was the slack attendance of men at church services here Sunday. One church here had only one man (besides the pastor) for Sunday school, and only three men for church services. Possibly other churches had the same to report.

Almost every youth large enough to take a gun was in the woods Monday, with the local schools declaring a holiday for Armistice on Nov. 12. The national holiday came on Sunday, and hunting season opening last week-end—school officials wisely turned out classes. The News first reported two weeks ago the Monday holiday was for hunting season, ignoring the date as following Nov. 11, but we still believe that was right in reporting it a "hunting holiday."

The more than 100 employees of Harris Lumber mill received their pay checks last week-end a day earlier (on Friday) instead of on Saturday noon—and the operators of the mill told the men to "get gone and get hunting." The men were told not to come back during hunting season "till they had enough of it."

Even Mr. Baldy was in style Monday morning. The snow Sunday left a beautiful mantle over all the top, and when the sun rose Monday, Baldy was red from the sun's rays. Red shirts, red hats, and hunting socks—and red topped Baldy.

Friday evening at four o'clock L. E. Sims and party of Lovington, N. M., checked in at Vaughnland Courts. It took them about an hour to unload their cars and get ready for the deer hunt. They drove away from Vaughnland at five o'clock and after they had their backs with their backs and within a few minutes had it dressed and swung high in a tree to cool overnight. Mr. Sims' young son was the lucky hunter and the group checked out early Sunday morning to return home since the rains had started but promised that they would be back before the season closes to try their luck again.


## Car Leaps 150 Feet, None Hurt

Two residents of LaMesa, Calif., died early Sunday morning when the 1940 Buick sedan in which they were riding left the pavement on Highway 70 half a mile east of Highway Junction and hurtled over and over, throwing the two luckless victims clear.

The dead were Willie B. Meredith, 65, owner and driver of the car, and his father-in-law, William Earl James, 68.

Two other persons in the car, Mrs. W. B. Meredith, wife of the driver, and their two-year-old son, Charles Thomas, escaped with only minor cuts and bruises.

Patrolman S. J. Smith of Green Tree, who arrived at the scene of the wreck only a few moments after it had happened, said wet pavement evidently caused the car to skid and plummet from the road. He said the driver was probably instantly killed, and that the older man died only a few moments after being rushed to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley hospital here.

The quartet was on route east to Norman, Okla., the home of the Merediths, until they moved to LaMesa, California, about four or five months ago, where Mrs. Meredith's parents lived.

Henry Purcella, 74, was found dead late Monday in New Mexico's huge Lincoln National Forest.

The Capitan, N. M., rancher died of natural causes on a hunting trip, State Police reported. His 13-year-old grandson was with Mr. Purcella when he was stricken.

The pair were on a hunting trip with Mr. Purcella's son, Charles Purcella of Albuquerque, N. M. The boy ran for help when his grandfather complained of feeling ill. But he was unable to direct District Game Warden John Shaul to the spot. It was several hours later before the body of the elderly man was found.

The death occurred on the Old Lujan ranch.

Mr. Purcella is survived by his wife, who lives in Albuquerque; two sons, Earnest, Capitan; Charles, Albuquerque; two daughters, Mrs. B. W. Young, Ft. Stanton; Mrs. E. B. Brown, Albuquerque.

Funeral services were held in Albuquerque the middle of this week and burial was in the cemetery there.

He had lived almost all of his life in Lincoln county. He was wed in 1901 to Miss Nancy Harris in Lincoln.

### Practical Projects Stressed In National Legion Meeting

Roger C. Schenck, Commander 5th District New Mexico, the American Legion, has recently returned from Florida where he was a National Delegate to the 33rd annual national convention of the American Legion, and is now making his report to the various posts in the district.

District Commander Schenck reports that more than ever before the business of the convention was directed in a realistic manner towards Americanism, National Defense, Civilian Security, Child Welfare and Rehabilitation, and last but not least, our Foreign Relations were emphasized.

The newly elected National Commander, Don Wilson, from West Virginia, was elected without the traditional opposition. National Commander Wilson was Chairman of the Legion's Foreign Relations commission, and that body developed a resolution setting up the Convention's recommendations on certain aspects of our national policy. The following substance of the Resolution was passed, 2881 for, and 131 against. It is significant that all sections of these United States were represented at the Convention. Substance of the resolution is as follows:

"We condemn the failure of the State Department to deal adequately with the grim and bloody violence of Communism spreading over the world, and demand the removal of the present corps of leaders whose every action has reflected incompetency, indecision and defeatism; also condemning the present government of the Soviet Union; condemn all efforts to appease Communism anywhere; called for limitation of Communist Plan aid, strengthening of United Nations and using every possible means to win the Korean war with the bombing of enemy bases in China, if necessary."

A comprehensive and realistic rehabilitation platform was adopted, tending to eliminate inequities in rehabilitating the disabled veteran. Schenck said. Special emphasis was placed on the rehabilitation of the Korean War veterans, especially that those unrealistic parts of the rehabilitation program according to benefits to veterans of World War one and two, the 22-20 club be not again brought into existence, he said.

The creation of an American Legion Legion to bear arms against Communist approaches, was brought into existence. Reduction in transportation rates for members of the Armed Forces; enactment of final legislation to implement UMT; endorsement of the Civil Defense program as a fourth arm of our national defense; cost of living increases in pay for all officers and enlisted men of the military services, were among topics brought up. Designating Armistice Day as

annual "Veterans Day" for veterans of all American wars; continuation of the House Committee on Un-American activities with adequate funds; outlawing of the Communist Party; making the study of American history a required subject in all colleges and universities, were discussed. Emphasis was placed on a 15 point American Legion program, at all levels, for fighting the illegal use of narcotics, Schenck reported.

National Commander Wilson's speech in accepting the high honor was forthright and to the point. There is no doubt as to his ability for leadership in approaching world problems, and as he so aptly expressed himself, "we need some of our hardheaded determination of our founding fathers." And he hailed the American Legion "as the rallying place for all believers in democracy... who, in the confusion of half wars and diplomatic disasters search for true leadership." He committed himself to pursuing a policy in Legion persuasion and action for aggressive Americanism, aggressive in the most liberal sense against all of the forces which seek to attack, smear and undermine our concept of the way of American life, and to the point of the false philosophy that the lives of American youth are expendable... Let us in common sense declare that the proper place for a traitor's neck, from within and from without, is in the hangman's noose... "If death to our betrayers comes as a shock to any American, the death of American boys in a 'police action' is shocking to the membership of the Legion. No traitor in or out of government is worth the life of one American fighting man who was born to enjoy those God-given privileges of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

Concluding, National Commander Wilson said: "To our comrades who cannot be with us today, because they lie in the cold hills of Korea, living and dead, and to their loved ones, I say, 'So long as the American Legion can speak and act, you will be remembered, you will be supported and you will be fought for.'"

District Commander Schenck was a member of the Convention National Security committee, and states that broad and realistic program having to do with all segments of our national defense was adopted, and will be sent to the Congress on a follow-up basis.

The following is a breakdown of school funds for the 1950-1951 school year allocated to Lincoln County and their sources: State sources, motor vehicle licenses, \$2,026; transportation fund, \$2,187.07; average daily attendance formula, \$280,077.51, and current school fund, \$48,080.16. Local sources: County tax levy, \$42,594.00; merchants licenses, \$3,022; Federal surplus, Federal forest, \$3,820.48.

The 1950-51 synopsis of state not assessed valuations shows the following figures: Assessor's value, \$8,389,200; railroad value, \$2,824,110; telephone and telegraph value, \$81,250; pipe line value, \$3,000; public utilities, \$102,427; non-producing mines, \$20,462; total corporate value, \$3,000,255; total assessment value, \$11,480,645.

Total acreage in Lincoln County is 3,109,760 with 1,095,297 acres or 21.0 per cent owned by the federal government.

The state average per student expense for the year 1949-50 was \$201.41.

Income for the support of public elementary and secondary education in Lincoln County is allocated as follows: State support, 88.1 per cent; federal support, 1.0 per cent, and local support 10.3 per cent.

**Old Landmark Falls In Ruin As Early NM Hotel Is Razed**

(From the Silver City Enterprise) The old Paywood Hot Springs Hotel, early-day gathering place of persons from all over the world and a landmark in this area, is being razed and is already but a shell of its former glory.

Now owned by Herman Lindauer of Deming, whose future plans for the site have not been revealed, the huge building, once ornate and gay, is being daily reduced in size. The huge veranda is gone, the roof removed and the appearance so much changed already that those familiar with the landmark would scarcely recognize it.

The Paywood Hotel was built in the early 1890's by A. S. Graham, Chicago real estate man who came here to visit his mother. He became interested in the ever-flowing hot spring as a health benefit and the waters of that beautiful gift of nature brought thousands each year to the new, and then modern, hotel and health resort.

The present structure now being razed, was not the first hotel on the scene however. Another, the pioneer structure, was built about 1885 by Dick Hudson, an Englishman residing in Pinos Altos who was an uncle by marriage of Mrs. Robert Bell of Vanadium. Built in the form of a plaza, the original hotel surrounded a large court and the bath house was located on the hill where the hot spring water bubbles forth. Mr.

Hudson married Mary Stevens, sister of Mrs. Bell's mother. The first hotel burned in the year 1890. Both structures have gloriously perished. Considered the smart thing to do in those days, people sojourned there fat days at a time, holding gay parties, seeking strength from the mineral waters and devoting their time to such pursuits as writing of novels, painting and playing of plain old fashioned poker. It was during the time that the Santa Fe railroad was creeping toward Silver City in its initial construction that the crew of engineers and surveyors in charge of the work made the hotel their headquarters. Much poker was played in the hotel throughout the night hours while the desert moon rode high overhead.

One man, a person with ability to direct the railroad's course, lost heavily to Mr. Hudson. In desperation he offered to alter the railroad's course to come close to the famed resort if the proprietor would but tear up his IOU's. Hudson refused and destiny, pursuing its relentless course, sent the railroad four miles away.

The hot spring, actually the only hot spring, albeit a good one, for the existence of the hotel, is a strange phenomena of nature although it is duplicated in various spots of the world and in Grant County. Once it bubbled up into a natural rock basin. The hotel builders, determined to increase its flow, or at least concentrate it in one spot, drilled five hundred feet into the earth to draw the water. The Indian relics brought to surface, it is evident the Indians held the spring as supernatural and sacrificed trinkets to it.

An earthquake in 1888 is said to have hurled the water clear of the spring leaving it dry for a short period. It soon resumed its flow however and today runs a heavy volume of mineral laden water, too hot to long immerse the hand in.

I took a walk around the grounds of the old hotel last Sunday and although it was unknown to me not long ago, I could sense the nostalgia that people still living would sense, if they were to visit the scene in its fading glory. Here and there were scattered the evidence of time-long passed. Letters—about, personal letters with dates of another century. The multitude of empty wine, champagne and liquor bottles bespeak a gaiety of a less temperate age. Generally the scene vividly represents the gentle paroxysms of the passing of an era, the transition of time from one century to another.

Up on the mound of mineral rock left by the sediment of the spring the waters of perhaps a million years gurgled like the postle babbling brook and time, which is an intangible thing, stood still awaiting the next move of man to avail himself of that which only nature can provide.


