Twenty-five El Paso businessmen stopped here for noon lunch Thursday at Navajo Lodge, and played host to 38 Ruidoso residents in a goodwill gesture. L. B. Bloodworth, former manager of the El Paso Chamber of Commerce, and Ed Holden, present manager of the Sun City civic club, took turns as program chairmen for the meal.

Bloodworth welcomed the group and extended the invitation for them to "shed the cares of the business-world-and-come-back-of-ten for relaxation in the playground of the southwest."

He also told the El Paso men that over 500,000 visitors had been in the mountain resort center during the past summer season and said that most of the tourist camps were being kept open this winter.

SKI SEASON OPENS HERE AFTER SNOW

More than 150 persons enjoyed Ruidoso's winter sports facilities here on Sunday, and many more were expected to throughout this week following the first big snowfall in the mountain region in many moons. It began snowing here last Wednesday with approximately two inches falling that night after a windy, sandstormy day. Thursday, Friday and Saturday additional snow fell, to bring the total to about two feet in the mountains, and to 13 inches in the village.

The community was a winter wonderland this week, the beautiful snow having fallen lazily and without wind. It stacked as high as eight inches atop fence posts.

Snowplows were needed to keep roads open in this vicinity. Friday night an estimated 200 people had to remain overnight in Ruidoso when travel over Highway 70 was halted by officers at Ruidoso Junction.

Almost 100 cars have had mishaps of some sort in the valley, the canyon and on the pass as well as on Highway 70, skidding on ice and careening into ditches, or trees, or other vehicles. It became quite the fashion to have dented fenders.

Mr. and Mrs. George Eldridge of Naperville, Ill., were hospitalized over the week-end here when they sustained minor injuries in a wreck west of this city on Highway 70.

Skating and tobogganning both were enjoyed in the improved winter sports area up Cedar Creek, by out-of-town visitors as well as local people in the Ruidoso canyon. Rangers made good use of hills with gentle slopes with their sleds.

Capitan Woman Heads Lincoln March of Dimes

The appointment of Mrs. Gwendolyn Morgan of Capitan as chairman for the March of Dimes program in Lincoln county was announced this week.

Further details on this county's participation in the drive for funds to help combat polio and the polio club will be announced as the program gets underway.

For the first time in its 15-year history, the campaign will continue four weeks instead of two, from Jan. 2 through Jan. 31, 1952, because tens of thousands of new polio victims have been added to the list of patients. There are 46,000 patients from past years who continue to require help, and March of Dimes expenditures for patient care have skyrocketed with the pattern of increasing incidence.

Polio epidemics are more widespread with 27 states having experienced their worst epidemics within the past four years. The problem is national in scope and must be fought on a nationwide basis.

Fireman first class William (Bill) McCarty and Chief Petty Officer Harold Baker were returned to duty in San Diego after spending a 21-day leave with Bill's parents here, Mr. and Mrs. George McCarty. Baker is from Ohio and says that Bill has given Ruidoso the right name, "Garden Spot of the World." Bill has lived in Ruidoso for 20 years. The boys are serving on the USS Marsh, a destroyer escort.

Invitations To Festival Are Mailed

Invitations went out this week to square dance clubs in New Mexico, all of the Texas Panhandle and to several in Arizona and California, informing them of the Square Dance Festival, booked here for eight days, from Dec. 22 through Dec. 31.

Confirmation was received this week that the famed Shuley Bros. western band of Clovis, noted for its square dancing rhythm, would play for the festival. Guest callers from all of the participating square dance clubs will be used throughout the week.

The festival this year is being sponsored by the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, and its officers declare it will be staged as an annual event each year's end if the one in 1951 proves a success.

Business places to serve the visiting dancers are open, including cafes, tourist courts, cabins, lodges and motels, and there are ample facilities to handle any size crowd that shows up, C. of C. officials stress.

In addition to the square dancing, there will be other diversions here, such as skiing, bowling, horseshoe riding, golfing and other recreations, depending, of course, on the weather.

Highlight of the big week will be a free game dinner on Christmas Day, in which deer, bear, elk, turkey and fish will be served at no cost to the visitors. The home folks will join with the visitors at the dinner by bringing side dishes, such as deserts, salads, etc., to add to the meat. The game is to be cooked and served free by the Navajo Lodge for the occasion. The game was donated by hunters of Ruidoso who were plenty lucky in the recent hunting season.

Cost of the festival will be \$1.50 per night per couple, or \$10.00 for a season ticket, good for all eight nights. The dancing will be in the Buffalo room of the Navajo Lodge.

Highway 70 Tour To Be Detailed At Coffee

A full report of the exciting, thrilling Highway 70 Cavalcade on which three Ruidosoans went the entire route of the western division late in November and early December, is to be heard at a coffee session at Navajo Lodge Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Anderson and Mrs. Suzanne Oliver were the three local people who covered three states, advertising Ruidoso to the fullest as the tour gathered momentum on its westward thrust. Television, radio and newspaper publicity galore was showered upon this playground of the South-west because the thrill from here was in the foreground in much of the activities.

The trio started with the western division tour at Clovis, had a part in all programs practically throughout New Mexico, and had a large part in publicizing Highway 70, as well as Ruidoso, on stops in Arizona and California.

When the Treasure Trail group paused in Ruidoso for its second New Mexico overnight stop, a fine supper was provided by the Lions club for the visitors and officials of the highway association. As the cavalcade left here the next day, more than a dozen people accompanied it as far as the Arizona line.

Anderson, who is president of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, took special pains to contact all chamber of commerce offices along the route, leaving hundreds of copies of literature about this city at every stop. On the return trip, he did the same thing along a different route. Copies of Carmon Phillips' song, "Ruidoso Sorenade," photo postcards of several Ruidoso attractions, and descriptive photo folders about this city were scattered in wholesale quantities in more than 50 cities.

The total of free advertising this city received from radio and television plugs, and newspaper reports of Ruidoso's participation in the tour would amount to more than \$20,000, by conservative estimate. "If we had to buy the time on the air we received free—and had to pay for space in newspapers we had for nothing, it would total that, at least," one local highway booster said.

Details of the good Ruidoso will gain from the tour will be aired at the coffee Monday afternoon. Everyone is invited to attend the affair, to be held in the Lodge, at which Carl DeBord, manager, will be host. "We want members of the Highway 70 association, Lions club members, C. of C. members and others—even those people along Highway 70 in the Ruidoso-Hondo valley—to attend this coffee," DeBord said.

WALTERS TRIAL SET FOR JAN. 10

Alamogordo, N. M. (Sp.)—John Walters, Dent storekeeper, is scheduled to go on trial here Jan. 10 for the Nov. 10 slaying of his wife in a Nogal Canyon cabin.

Walters' bond was reduced from \$7500 to \$5000 by Justice of the Peace H. B. Howerton. He was released on bond after waiving preliminary hearing.

Mrs. Walters was slain by an unknown sniper who shot her through the cabin window of the cabin. Attorney George Shipley will represent Walters.

Green Tree Community Tree Planned

The community Christmas tree will be held in Green Tree Dec. 21 at five o'clock.

A community sing will start the activities with Charles Bonnell leading.

Two fireboys from the Green Tree Fire Department erected the tree and the employees of the Harris Lumber Co. went to the mountains and brought down the big beautiful tree.

Santa Claus will be there in person, and it is rumored that Mrs. Santa might accompany him on this trip.

There is a treat in store for all the kiddies. The community tree is a project of the Women's Civic club.

Rare Mineral, Bastnasite, Found at Corona

The Helm and French mines in Red Clod canyon in the Gallina mountains are completing their plans for a corporation and will probably resume operations about the first of the year. These mines have recently shipped ore from the mill at Gallina station by way of the Southern Pacific. G. G. Furman of Corona says this ore is a "rare earth" called bastnasite, which is a fluo-carbonate of the cerium metals. Cerium, alloyed with magnesium and aluminum, is now used in the manufacture of jet engines. At the present time this mine is the only mine of its kind in the United States. The mine also contains fluorapatite and some traces of uranium.

RUIDOSO-HONDO VALLEY HOSPITAL OPEN HOUSE PROGRAM SET WEDNESDAY

Next Wednesday, Dec. 19, the people of the Ruidoso-Hondo valley are asked to pay a visit to the general hospital here serving this region, located in Ruidoso, and evaluate it from many standpoints—then attend a program at the Navajo Lodge that evening, beginning at 7:30 and lasting until further facts about the institution.

At the evening program, several brief talks will be heard, and top-most feature is to be the presence of Santa Claus in person. Santa will make probably his only appearance here this Yuletide season at the hospital program, and little children may get to talk with him there. His main purpose in being on hand is to receive any gifts of money people of the region wish to make towards the hospital.

Officials of the hospital say a total of \$3,000 is needed now to care for the institution's immediate needs, and that if everyone will contribute a liberal, but reasonable amount, the needed fund will be raised in this one program.

Letters were mailed this week to about 500 persons, both in the Ruidoso-Hondo valley area, and elsewhere, soliciting their contribution—and already some replies have been received from out-of-county points. Also to be mailed are postcards inviting the people to visit the hospital on open house day.

Mayor W. D. Ratliff last week proclaimed next Wednesday Hospital day in Ruidoso and called upon the people of this area to stand behind the institution.

Blood typing of every person interested will be made during the hours of 9 to 10 a. m. and from 3 to 4 p. m. on Hospital Day. This blood typing program, instituted here by the Volunteer Fire department, needs to be enlarged upon, so that more blood types, and more persons as donors, can be listed for ready call in any emergency.

S. B. Bostians To Observe 50th Anniversary

Mr. and Mrs. Stephen B. Bostian are to observe their Golden Wedding anniversary on Christmas Eve at their home here.

The Bostians were wed Dec. 24, 1901, in Topeka, Kans. At that time he was with the Missouri and Kansas Telephone Co. and Mrs. Bostian, the former Miss Pearl Douglass, was teaching school in Jackson county, Kans.

His occupation with the telephone company, and with electric light companies, also, caused the family to move about considerably. They have made their home here in Salida, Colo., where they lived five years; and then for ten years Mr. Bostian was employed by the Santa Fe Railway, in Emporia, Kans., he operated an electrical contracting business, but sold it in 1929 and located in Carrizozo. In 1949 they moved to Ruidoso. They own their home on Vine road in Skyland here.

Mr. Bostian was born Sept. 9, 1879, in Tarrant county, (Ft. Worth) Texas, and in 1883 his folks moved to Southern Illinois. His father died in 1888 and from then on he helped his mother, working in a drug store, carrying papers and telegrams in between school attendance. He also worked on a farm for his brother, Tom. He started as an apprentice in an electric light plant and small telephone plant and after four years was placed in charge of construction work with telephone exchanges in Illinois, Kentucky and Missouri. He went to Kansas City, Mo., in 1900 as foreman and was charter member of No. 18 International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers union.

In 1900, he was sent by the Santa Fe Telegraph department to Galveston, Texas, after the big storm and he reported the crew built lines from Alvin, Texas, to Virginia Point. The bunch quit when they received only regular pay after having been promised double time.

He returned to Kansas City, where he met Pearl on Christmas of 1900, while employed on a toll line division for the Bell Telephone Co. A year after their meeting they were married.

Mrs. Bostian was born in Birmingham, Jackson county, Kans., Sept. 10, 1881, and was graduated from school and attended Campbell University, then taught a country school at 333 a month and to pay for board. Board in those days was five months school, so she started housekeeping March 1902 at Ottawa, Kans.

Mr. Bostian recalls that when he was a baby, the family home burned, and all papers and records were lost. "I was sick and they rolled me in the bedclothes and carried me outside. I had pneumonia after that."

GERONIMO LEADS TRIBE TO PROSPERITY

(Editor's Note: The following appeared in a recent issue of the El Paso Times, and proved so interesting to the editor of the News, we felt sure our readers would like to pass it on for their own information.)

The name of Geronimo is well known throughout the Southwest where old chief Geronimo led the Apaches in an uprising which lasted for several years in the late '70s and early '80s, but few know that Robert Geronimo, son of the old chief, is president of the Whittall Farmer's Association which has brought progress and prosperity to the Indian farmers in the Whittall area of the Mescalero Indian Reservation.

The Mescalero Reservation, west of Ruidoso, well known for its fine cattle and timber, is also one of the richest farming districts in this section. Although prolonged dry weather has brought lighter crops than in 1950, the Mescalero Apaches capture many a blue ribbon on their produce at the recent Otero county fair, and their 4-H groups won honors with their livestock and garden projects.

Time was when the farm work on the reservation was performed by the tribal corporation, the Indian farmers paying for the work done for each. They came to realize that capitalizing on their own time and labor would mean larger individual incomes, so the farmers decided to organize into community groups and work out their labor and equipment problems on a co-operative basis.

Since farms are too small in most instances to warrant the individuals owning their own tractors and other expensive equipment, a plan was worked out, with the aid of the Mescalero-Business

Committee, whereby the co-operative in each community could own the farm machinery but the individuals could use it themselves by paying a small fee for its use. Co-operative organizations were formed in the Mescalero, Geronimo, White-Tail and Elk-Silver areas.

Today, these co-operative groups own \$46,000 worth of power equipment, including tractors, hay balers and combines, and if crops warrant it next year considerable other equipment is to be added.

A normal year, according to Geronimo, sees nearly 1800 acres of field crops under cultivation on the reservation, mostly oats and barley, with some winter wheat. Thirteen hundred acres in 1950 yielded a gross value of \$26,600 in field crops, Geronimo said. In addition to the field crops the Indian farmers raise excellent gardens and the quality of their products was evidenced by the many awards they received at the Otero County Fair, Geronimo himself came home with a haul of blue ribbons, not only receiving first prize in corn, pumpkin, squash and other vegetables, but was also awarded first prize in county wide competition, for quality of his products. In quality also, the Mescalero school project was second and Bruce Kincaid of the Three Rivers area of the reservation third.

W. Gomanche won first place with his exhibit of oats and V. Koyakzinski, second; Lucy Kanneah won first and third with field beans. Mescalero fruits won high awards in cling peaches, Red Delicious and Golden Delicious, Stamen Winesap, Rome Beauty, and York Imperial, in apples, and in Bartlett pears.

Mescalero cattle came in for their share of honors at the county fair, winning second place with their registered Hereford Bull, Larry Domino, and second in two-year-old bulls with Mescalero Chief. FFA and 4-H groups entered 27 exhibits and came home with 21 ribbons and cash awards. FFA and 4-H livestock projects on the reservation were accomplished through the co-operation of the Mescalero Cattle Growers' Association, which allowed each member of the beef cattle and range management clubs a purebred heifer, with the understanding that her first calf was to be turned back to the association, to be assigned to another 4-H member. Eric Tortilla is president of the cattle growers group.

The cattle industry has been very successful on the reservation and Government officials believe that the careful selection of breeding stock is a large factor in this success. Directors of the cattle growers group attended the stock show in Phoenix, Ariz., last year and purchased the reserve champion pen of bulls, and an additional bull, grandson of Larry Domino 50th of the Milky Way Hereford Farms. From the Mescalero purebred herd last year 98 bull calves and 82 heifer calves were submitted for registry with the American Hereford Association.

The cattle growers sell an average of 2400 head of steers and miscellaneous cattle every fall from their herd of about 8000. They maintain a herd of about 300 registered Herefords from which most of the bulls for the range are produced.

Cattle prices paid to the Mescaleros for the past several years have been consistently higher than current prices.

Hearing For Policeman Is Postponed

A preliminary hearing for Earl Tessman, deposed state policeman charged with the rape of two Indian women, which was to have been held Tuesday, was postponed on request of Assistant District Attorney Robert Sellar.

Sellar said that Justice H. B. Howerton, before whom the hearing is to be held, has not set a definite date.

George Shipley, who last Wednesday was retained by Tessman, said he offered no objections to postponement of the hearing. Sellar said that the postponement was requested for two reasons, namely, that a call to Mescalero indicated that one of the Indian women was still in the hospital for injury treatment and that State Police Chief Joe Roach made a telephone request from Santa Fe that he would like to "study a few points" relating to the case before the hearing is held.

Roach arrived in Alamogordo late Tuesday coming from Silver City, where he had been to look into recent strike developments and related matters of maintaining peace at the picket lines of a struck mine.

Tessman is in jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

Sellar said that Roach told him of receiving some anonymous correspondence from the local press, intimating that Tessman had been "framed" in the rape charges. Roach, Sellar said, did not appear to take the statements of "framing" seriously, but said he wanted a chance to look into all aspects of the case himself.

Q1. The tooth buds of both the first and the permanent teeth are formed in an infant's jaws during prenatal life, or before he is born. (True or False).

Q2. Most babies cut their center front teeth (central incisors) between about (a) 4 and 6 months; (b) 6 and 8 months; (c) 8 and 10 months. (Select one).

Q3. Digestive disturbances or even malnutrition and speech defects may occur when a child loses his primary teeth before it is time for him to shed them normally.

A1. True. The primary teeth begin to form about the sixth week and to calcify about the sixteenth week of prenatal life. That is one of the many reasons why proper diet for the expectant mother is so important. It also is one explanation why some persons are literally "born with poor teeth." A2. (b) 6 and 8 months, although some children are slower than others in cutting their teeth, and in rare cases, children even are born with some of their teeth already erupted. When that happens, it is "news," and the new arrival usually gets his picture in the local paper. A3. True. A child reads his first teeth to chew his food properly. He also may need them to form certain sounds in speech. It has been found that

speech defects acquired by a child when he is learning to talk may later prove very difficult to correct.

Q1. It isn't necessary to take care of a child's first or so-called temporary teeth because they are going to fall out, anyway. (True or False).

Q2. At about what age should the mother start taking her child to the dentist regularly?

Q3. There is a special treatment now available for the reduction of tooth decay in children. (True or False).

A1. False. It is important that a child's first or deciduous teeth be kept in good repair by regular visits to the dentist, who will remove stains and detect and fill any small cavities he may find in them. He will also instruct the mother in proper mouth hygiene for the child, including the cleaning of the teeth and mouth at home. A2. Between about 2 1/2 and 3 years of age, unless, of course, dark spots, which may indicate the beginnings of cavities, start to appear on the teeth earlier. Proper mouth hygiene and good health also require that a child's gums be firm and pink around the neck of the tooth where it grows out of the gum. A3. True. Applying a chemical called sodium fluoride to the teeth. Ask your family dentist about it. This treatment is said to be about 40 per cent effective in reducing cavities if it is used when the child is about 3 years of age or just after his primary teeth have erupted, when he is about 7 years of age, or just after he has cut his first permanent molars, and again, when he is 10 and

ORDER 1952 PESTICIDES NOW AND AVOID BOTTLENECK

The 1952 pesticide supply situation looks "mighty tight," says Mike Swoboda, extension entomologist at New Mexico A&M College. Farmers may help avert possible bottlenecks in supplies of these necessary materials, he says, by buying some part of their estimated requirements now and through continued orderly purchases in advance of actual need.

Annexation Is Defeated At Claunch

Unofficial returns from the Dec. 1 election at Claunch indicate the proposed annexation of a portion of Socorro county to Lincoln county was defeated. The reported election results show 38 voting against annexation, 13 voting for the proposition, five challenged votes, and one rejected ballot.

The area proposed to be annexed to Lincoln county covers approximately 462 sections, 42 miles long and 13 miles wide at the point of maximum distance.

The attorney for the Lincoln County Annexation committee, Geo. L. Zimmerman, Carrizozo, said he did not contemplate any further action regarding the matter. A 1951 legislative enactment, effective June 9, 1951, requires county-wide participation in an annexation election. The recent election did not come under this ruling since action had been taken on it prior to the effective date of the new law.

ORDER FERTILIZER NOW, SOILS SPECIALIST SAYS

Order your fertilizer now—and be sure of having the kind and amount you need for your next year's crop. According to Leonard Appleton, extension soils specialist at New Mexico A&M College, there will be a limited supply of certain fertilizer materials, and labor and transportation difficulties may make the situation even worse.

While there will probably be more total tons of fertilizer available in 1952 than in 1951, the chances are that it will be more difficult for a farmer to get the grade and type he wants," Appleton explains.

Appleton adds that fertilizer can be stored on the farm without loss or damage if kept dry. Most any shed on the farm can be used for storing provided the roof doesn't leak.
