
CONTRACT TO BE LET IN JANUARY ON TINNIE-ARABELLA ROAD

RUIDOSO ARTIST PAINTS TWO TYPES OF CANVAS

There are two types of work an artist puts out, the one that sells fast because of its popular appeal, and the kind in which he indulges purely as a creative release and which has a more limited market. Harris Shelton, well-known Ruidoso and El Paso artist, does both successfully, although naturally, in turning out what is made to order. For this purpose, Shelton maintains a summer studio at Ruidoso, N. M., and before opening each season, usually makes a tour of some interesting section of the Southwest for inspiration and subject matter. This year it was a 3000-mile jaunt, taking in most of the West, including the Big Bend, the Davis Mountains area, the bluebonnet country and the Gulf Coast. When pressed for time, Shelton works in his home studio at 3411 Richmond Street in El Paso, rather than at his regular studio in Hotel Cortez. He is currently showing a diversified group of canvases representing recent work which embraces the mountains and desert, modify the typical Mexican scene, use cattle country, national parks, and the Indian country. The artist's paintings are soundly constructed and the color completely balanced within the frame.

(Editor's Note: The column began in the last year's Christmas issue of the Ruidoso News, and was reprinted by request of a number of our readers. It is still the same, one year later, and it aptly expresses the sentiment of many this season. The request for a new column prompts the publisher to re-run it for those who may not have seen it.)

Last night I sat by my radio and listened to the world. There were reports from the battlefields where our boys were trying desperately to hold the line for freedom. A news analyst was telling of the terrific sacrifice our men make that is being made in the tremendous odds against them as they are fighting. How our communists were trying to put the squeeze on and our boys before they could be evacuated. My blood ran hot and silently I swore vengeance before God.

So great was my anger that I turned the dial to another station just as a program of Christmas carols was beginning. I listened as the voices of children told the wonderful story of Jesus and the joy that He brought to a sinful world over two thousand years ago. My anger was subdued and there was a soothing calmness that came over my soul. When the last carol had been sung I cut off the radio and read from my Bible the wonderful story of Christ.

I saw the wise men as they watched the star in the east and followed it to the lowly manger where the Christ Child lay, because there was no room in the inn. They looked upon his beautiful face as the mother held him close to her heart.

It was past midnight now and there was no sound but that of the murmuring little stream that flows past our cabin. I read on and on and lost myself in the life of the World's most Wonderful One. I saw Him in the Temple with the boys before they could





The correspondent and son, Tommie, are spending the holidays at our home in Albuquerque.


