(Editor's Note: following is a news story which appeared in the Plainview Daily Herald, with which both the publisher and editor of the Ruidoso News once worked, about "Happy Roy" Thomas, entertainer at the Navajo Lodge. Thomas' career covers half a century, and he's not only the greatest and near-great in the entertainment world. He loves Ruidoso, he says, and only last week he was spotted roaming about the countryside with a camera in his hand, taking snapshots of scenes here when a light snow covered the area.)


Think of a real oldie and we'll lay you ten to one Happy Roy Thomas can play it for you. He'll drift back into fifty years of show business and somewhere along the route he'll find it. His right hand will get a familiar response and the melody will begin to drop off his nimble fingers. His left will beat out the old one-two that has held a score of hot bands in tune, and there you have it.

If it's old enough, maybe while he plays it for you he remembers the time he dug out the same number with Dixie Lebeck, the immortal trumpet player, or Hub Lytle, tenor sax virtuoso, who went on to become an arranger for Russ Morgan. It may have been with the Armistead brothers, Harold and Donald, experts on the reed instruments. Or Paul Spivak, pianist nephew of Phil Spitalny. Spivak is Bob Hope's arranger. It could have been Pinky Tomlin or that fabulous trombonist, Jack Teagarden, or his brother, Chasie, the trumpet player, who were both in Thomas' Rag O Maniac band in Oklahoma

New Mexico fleeces at the recent National Western Livestock show in Denver again proved why the Sunshine State is one of the leading wool-producing states in the nation. All but two of the 30 New Mexico fleeces entered in the wool show at the National Western placed "in the money", says Ivan Watson, extension animal husbandman at New Mexico A&M College.

An Ordinance to amend that certain ordinance of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico, numbered No. 10 and entitled "Animals"

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO: That Section 2 of Article 1 of Ordinance No. 10 be amended to read as follows:
Section 2. That The Pound Keeper shall receive in full compensation for his services as such Pound Keeper, the following fees for the care and keeping of animals taken and impounded by him to-wit:
For each animal impounded..... \$2.50
For each animal sold..... \$1.00
For the care, keeping and feeding of each horse, mule or meat cattle, per day..... \$2.00
For the care, keeping and feeding of each burro, goat, sheep or dog, per day..... \$1.00
Any animal fed night and morning shall be deemed to have been held one day, and liable to all charges per day, and only the proper proportion of the fee provided per day shall be charged according to the number of times such animal has been fed.

'LONE STAR' STARS GABLE

Texas, in the turbulent era of 1845, and the deadly conflict between those who favored annexation to the United States and the ardent supporters of an independent republic, form the surging backdrop for M-G-M's "Lone Star," showing Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Pueblo theatre here, with Clark Gable, Ava Gardner and Broderick Crawford heading a powerful cast.

There is enough action in this red-blooded, two-listed drama to fill a dozen motion pictures. Its favor of excitement climbing from the beginning, when Gable, as the adventurous Devereaux Burke, is sent by ex-President Andrew Jackson to the beleaguered Texan patriot, Sam Houston, to intercede on behalf of annexation and is ambushed by Comanche Indian raiders, to the picture's fiery climax, in which Broderick Crawford, as Thomas Craden, bitter opponent of annexation and sworn enemy of Burke, tries to prevent the Texan Senate from convening in a blood-thirsty battle to break through Burke's barricades.

SAM CHINO HAS AIDED MESCALERO APACHES IN PEACEFUL PURSUITS

Alamogordo, N. M. — Many moons have come and gone since Sam Chino, a Mescalero Apache, now nearly 70 years old, came to the Mescalero Indian Reservation, born in Arizona in 1854, he came here as a small boy and through the years has been one of the Apache's outstanding characters.

In the turbulent days of the late '80s and through the '90s when Victorio, Cochise, Nana and Geronimo were terrorizing the Southwest for years, outfitting and out-general-ing Uncle Sam's forces, Sam Chino was assigned as a police officer on the Mescalero Reservation, and was soon advanced to chief of police, which position he held for near-

ly 10 years, always with dignity and credit.

While his friends of his own age had possibly the more dramatic role of joining in the campaign against the renegade Indians, Chino quietly helped to keep those at home in check, influenced them toward peaceful pursuits, and oldtimers in the area credit him with much of the advancement of the modern Mescalero today. His son, the Rev. Wendell Chino, a college graduate, pays him a simple tribute, "I think my father was an illustrious man."

See History Made

Had all the varying incidents that link Sam Chino with the Mescalero Reservation been recorded it would make volumes of human interest material. He has lived to see the pageantry of nearly a cen-

break up a tinwin and gambling party by riding into their camp and shooting into the tinwin cans. Chino says he had about 15 policemen under him and they were always in uniform.

Tribal Chairman

Chino served as chairman of the Tribal Business Committee in its early days and was one of those promoting the project, which brought new Indian homes throughout the reservation, and later was influential in changing the ranges from sheep to the cattle industry. This has proved highly successful, the cattle herds today yielding an income of approximately \$400,000 to the tribal fund.

Still in good health for one of his age, Sam Chino has a clear mind and enjoys reminiscing over the old days. He chuckles when he recalls that at a tender age he was carrying a pistol at his belt, but was still so young that he cried when a bronc threw him off.

His face saddens when asked about the time that he and his posse were forced to kill Kitty-chin, one of their own group. Oldtimers recall that this was in the winter of 1907. Kittychin had stolen cattle from a nearby ranch and was skinning one of the animals when Roy McLane, brother of Roy McLane, former owner of Flying H Ranch, came upon him. Taken by surprise, Kittychin shot young McLane, killing him instantly, then with his wife fled south along the rim of the Sacramento Mountains, hoping to escape into Mexico. Sheriff H. M. Donney offered his services, but Chino and his Indian posse, who had been allowed to deal with him in their own way. They trailed him on foot, for five days, Chino says, finally overtaking him in Grapevine Canyon southeast of Alamogordo. Chino says there was no way but to shoot Kittychin, for he was desperate and they had to beat him at his own game. Roy McLane, brother of young Don, still lives at Artesia, N. M.

Enjoys Nice Home

In the twilight of his life, Chino enjoys a nice home, with his wife still living and his eight children, all upright good citizens, settled and doing well, most of them on the Mescalero Indian reservation. His son, Wendell, completed seven years of study at the University of the Pacific, the theological training after his graduation from the Indian school at Santa Fe, and has served the past year as associate pastor of the Reformed Church at Mescalero, which has a membership of 350. On March 1 he will leave for Macy, Neb., where he has been called as pastor of the Reformed Church on the Omaha reservation, which has a population of some 7000 Indians. Chino's daughter Phoebe is in Staten Island, N. Y., with her husband, George Kincaid, who is stationed there with the Coast Guard. Besides his children he has 11 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

His pride and joy is his son, Corp. Frank Chino, 25, now in Japan, who only recently received the congratulations of his commanding officer for completion of his radio operator's course with a grade of 95 per cent. Young Frank has been in service the past two years. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Reformed Church at Mescalero, which position is being held open for him during his service in Japan.

As to the changes the years have brought Sam Chino says, "It is all good. I am glad that my children and my grandchildren have these advantages which our people did not have so many years ago."

Chino's father and Geronimo's father were brothers, and although Chino says he and Geronimo were never close friends, it is conceded that he probably knows more about the old chief than any other living person. A few years ago Chino and Robert Geronimo, son of the old chief, were honor guests in Phoenix, Ariz., riding with Governor Jones in the parade at the premiere of the motion picture "Geronimo."

One of the first battles of the Lincoln County War took place at Blazer's Mill at Mescalero. Two local settlers, Dick Brewer and Buckshot Roberts, were killed there and were buried in the Mescalero cemetery. Chino says that he had seen Billy the Kid many times but that he did not know him personally. He recalls that Dr. J. H. Blazer, who came to Mescalero in the 1860s, was always a good friend of the Indians and did much for the community.

In the early days tinwin and gambling made grave problems for the police, Chino says. The Indians would store their tinwin in large turpentine cans and more than once, he says, he has seen his men
