As is customary, most of Ruidoso's retail firms will be closed opening day of the races Saturday, owners of some of the firms contacted by the News said yesterday. Opening Day usually is declared "Ruidoso Day" and full attendance from the home folks is expected.

Racing fans get a double dose of thrills for the opening of the 1952 racing season at Hollywood Park here Saturday and Sunday this week. Opening Day, Saturday, will see more than 80 horses in eleven races, some of them the finest the Southwest can produce, which have piled up winnings in races already held in Arizona and New Mexico this spring. Twelve races are carded for Sunday, also.

The third and fourth races Saturday will be trials in the Quarter-horse Futurity, world's largest such classic, finals of which will be run next week-end. Purse of \$2,500, plus entry fees and 5 percent of the muffled handle is posted for the finals. Fourteen horses are listed for the two-trial runs. Almost 500 horses are stabled here for entry in the 25 days of racing this year—coming from three states.

Drawings for prizes in the Saturday races were held Tuesday this week and drawings for the Sunday races were held Wednesday. The race officials and stable of the association have been a beehive of activity the last month or more in preparation for what everyone expects will be the greatest racing season in the seven years history of the association.

JURY FREES TINNIE WOMAN

Carrizozo, N. M.—A Third District Court jury Wednesday acquitted Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Horton, 29, of Tinnie, of murder in the first degree of her husband during a family quarrel.

The jury, which deliberated about 3 1/2 hours, returned its verdict shortly after 4 p. m. Mrs. Horton, questioned after the trial, said she was going away with her sister to "make a new life in Texas" for herself and her two daughters. The sister, present in the court room, refused to identify herself or to say which city in Texas they were going to.

Only witness to testify Wednesday morning was Deputy Sheriff J. C. Jones of Roswell, the Associated Press reported. He said Mrs. Horton had her husband, Manuel, arrested for assault on two occasions. The second time, last October, Jones said, he saw Horton pulling his wife by the hair near a Roswell taxi stand. Mrs. Horton did not testify.

Tuesday night, Sheriff S. M. Ortiz testified he had given Mrs. Horton a lie detector test. Results of the test were not revealed. A request from defense attorneys for a court room demonstration of the lie detector was withdrawn when Ortiz said the machine would not work with more than three people in the room, the AP reported.

In a separate action in the court Wednesday afternoon, Bill McTeague of Honda was fined \$50 on a charge of assault and battery. He was originally charged with assault with intent to commit murder in a complaint filed by Rose Crane of Tinnie, but the charge was later reduced.

Miss Crane, who appeared earlier as a witness for Mrs. Horton, said that McTeague picked her up after she was through working as an election official the night of May 6. She charged McTeague struck her when she would not respond to his advances.

COMMITTEES SOLICIT SIGNATURES ON HIGHWAY RIGHT-OF-WAY EASEMENTS

Committees from the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce and the local Lions club were to start work Thursday this week soliciting signatures and approval of right-of-way easements from property owners along the state highway 70 improvements are projected. The "main street" of Ruidoso is to be widened, leveled and straightened in three places where curves, hills and obstructions present traffic hazards. Some property owners have volunteered to give the land necessary. Mayor W. D. Reilly said this week he hoped it was not necessary to resort to court action on any of the easements needed, that all property owners would be given every consideration. "Speed of signing up these easements is the most important thing now," he added, and said he hoped all signatures could be secured very soon. The street improvement which cannot begin until all easements are secured, is a \$50,000 project.

Three States To Be Represented In Highway Meet

Officials of U. S. Highway 70 association of three states, California, Arizona and New Mexico, will converge on Ruidoso Sunday and Monday for a business session and banquet. About 35 to 40 out-of-town visitors are expected.

Ezell Clarke of Ruidoso, president of the New Mexico association, said he was hoping a large number of local people would also attend. Tickets to the banquet, at \$2.00 per plate, went on sale Thursday locally. The banquet will be at 8 p. m. Sunday evening in Navajo Lodge.

On the program Sunday will be an address by Tom Mann, state highway commissioner. Mrs. Susan Moore, editor of the Salome, Ariz., Free Press, will also appear on the program Sunday and Monday. Business of the association will be discussed Monday morning, with adjournment of the session at about noon. Carl DeBord, vice-president of the Ruidoso local association, will preside in the conference and at the banquet.

Ruidoso Pays Honor To Queen for a Day

Ruidoso rolled out the red carpet of welcome for a radio Queen for a Day yesterday afternoon when she arrived at the airport here, flown here with her husband from El Paso where she alighted from a transcontinental airliner at noon. Mrs. Ginny Ballance, 25-year-old attractive blonde from Los Angeles, Calif., was picked for Queen for a Day of Jack Bailey's nationwide Mutual Broadcasting system's radio program Tuesday afternoon in a television show, and a recording of her selection was then broadcast over radio stations Wednesday morning—just the reverse of the plan local people had understood would be employed to pick a queen to come here.

She was one of four contestants on the program and gave as her reason for wanting to be queen that her mother, who has nine children, needed a new stove. The mother was given a new kitchen range, and the queen herself was showered with gifts and attention in Hollywood before coming out here.

Her husband, Thaxton Ballance, is with her. In Ruidoso she is in for a round of excitement, including having a box seat at the opening day of the Ruidoso racing season at Hollywood park here, meals at various cafes and restaurants, scenic tours of the area, dances in her honor and other amusement. Friday night Navajo lodge has a dance in her honor. Friday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. Verne Wheeler are to dress in one of their antique costumes to receive her at their museum where a gift and a bouquet of flowers await her.

Those who heard her selection on the radio reported Ruidoso's resort facilities are excellent attractions were praised highly by Jack Bailey, giving Ruidoso considerable publicity. Her visit to Ruidoso was arranged by S. K. Kuykendall, owner of Vaughnland courts, where she will be a free guest for three or four days. Cafes and other firms here have contributed gifts and services to entertain her.

Museum Interior Is Repainted; Carvings Added

The interior of the Court House Museum in Lincoln Town is sparkling with a fresh coat of white paint and really presents a very inviting aspect. The walls and woodwork have been mended and patched, the paint applied, and three new show cases in the main entrance hall display the carvings of Don Eusebio of Tulsa, Okla.

Never before exhibited any place, these unique carvings have brought a great deal of praise and favorable comment from visitors to the Museum since June 8. One group of three Osage Indian dancers in full regalia, including floor length feathered war bonnets is observed by an Indian figure in modern dress and two blanketed women. Most popular with youngsters is the rodeo group which features two horses with trick riders, a cowboy spinning a rope and several cowboys and a seated Indian looking on.

The most elaborate group is the Magecoach scene. Entirely made to scale, the coach is drawn by four horses, with complete wagon harness. Seated on the top are a driver and a guard with a rifle across his knees. Four passengers may be seen through the windows, and piled on the top and at the back are trunks, suitcases and a saddle and bridle.

Six Indian figures in tribal regalia dance across another show case, accompanied by three Indian drummers seated about a large drum and three Indian women in festive buckskin dress look on.

The infinity of colorful detail in these carvings must be seen to be appreciated. The detail that has intrigued most guests is that one of the spectators in the rodeo group is rolling a cigarette. Hanging from his neck by a string is a tiny tobacco sack. Another of the rodeo spectators is an Indian, seated on a box. Carved to scale, this box is only three inches by two inches, but the corners are dovetailed and the construction is accurate to the last small detail.

Bures is a retired old man whose hobby, for many years, was collecting Indian artifacts. His remarkable collection is now owned by the Gilcrease Foundation, in Tulsa, Okla., but his knowledge of ceremonial dress and Indian characteristics is unequalled by any other artist, and he has used that extensive knowledge in these amazingly realistic and colorful figures.

Residents of Lincoln county are particularly urged to stop at the Old Court House where the carvings will be displayed for a very limited time.

SMOKEY TOURS U. S. CAPITAL

"Smoky (the fire prevention) Bear" has just finished a tour of Capitol Hill and the White House in Washington, D. C. It was a legislative tour, however. Smokey was the subject of a bill, now a law, to prevent misuse of "Smoky Bear" as the nation-wide symbol for forest fire prevention. Rules and regulations for use of the symbol bear, dressed in dungarees and a forester's hat will be issued shortly.

Smoky, who is still modeling for fire prevention posters, was found clinging to a tree trunk in the Lincoln National forest fire in New Mexico two years ago. He then weighed four pounds and had a badly burned set of feet. He's a big bear now and lives in the Washington zoo.

NEAR 3,000 ATTEND FETE IN LINCOLN

Near 3,000 persons attended the annual Old Timers' Day in Lincoln last Sunday, which started off with a good, cooling rain, and wound up with reminiscing, photo taking and candidate hand-shaking. Three state candidates, Governor Edwin McCreary, Pat Hurley and Ed Gutman, Republicans, were on hand and made brief remarks. County and district candidates present were recognized but not called on to speak.

Basket dinners were spread beneath the old trees about the museum and in the amphitheatre area at noon time. Plenty of coffee was available for coffee hounds. In the program in which Lloyd Bloodworth and Wilbur Coe alternated as masters of ceremony, a band, directed by Honda's fine school band, a quadrille by a Honda group and a local Lincoln string band entertained. There were six fiddlers in competition in a contest held as part of the entertainment.

Main idea of the Old Timers' day was to allow the early day residents of the region to get together and swap small talk, which occupied most of the pioneers for most of the day. Several amateur and professional photographers were present clicking shutters here and there.

The reunion was the first of two programs being held in Lincoln this summer, sponsored by the Lincoln County Historical society, of which Coe is president. "A Day in Old Lincoln" historical pageant, to be presented Aug. 17 at 8 p. m., is a widely known event which annually attracts an audience from several states, and which the society also sponsors.

YUCCA COUNCIL SCOUTS CAMPING IN RESERVATION TRY OUT NEW FACILITIES

The Yucca Council of the Boy Scouts of America of the El Paso region will open a three week camp next Sunday in the recreational area of the Mesquero Apache Indian reservation. Camp and Bandy will consist of three one-week camping periods. Each week of camping will open on Sunday and run through Saturday noon. About one hundred and twenty boys are expected for each week of camp.

W. H. Randow, council camping and activities official, will be camp director and will have on hand to help him as program directors: First week—B. J. Lewis, Scouter from North El Paso and Ocate districts; second week, Al Dultom, Scouter from Dona Ana and Otero districts; third week, Calvin Thrasher, Scouter from North East and El Paso districts.

On the staff will be: Activities Yard—Orlando Garza in charge; and Jerry Anderson, Archery—Bob Roberts in charge; Jack Osborne and Gail Bower; Hiking—Orlando Garza in charge; Angling and fly casting will have as directors specialists from Ruidoso and surrounding areas.

The cooks are H. A. Hughes, Charles Phillips and Gary Jackson. Cole Parker will be the busler and chief of the sanitation department, and Raymon Arevalo and Rual Madrid are in charge of the dining tables and dishwashing.

The camp has several very interesting improvements. The mobile kitchen, which can serve about 120 boys, is lighted with a portable butane generator. Water is furnished out of the top of the Ruidoso and is run through a filter unit and then is stored in a tank which has a pressure of 40 lbs. to the square inch. Enough pressure is there to supply the drinking fountains and the modern showers. A very modern first aid station is also located at the kitchen truck.

Some of the activities for the week will be archery, handicraft, pioneering, and activities yard where second and first class requirements and cooking merit badge requirements will be taught, angling and bait casting, fishing, special hikes and horse back riding for the scouts who pay for their own horses.

Thursday of every week will mark the big hike and it will be climaxed with a chuck wagon supper.

Council Camp Fires will be enjoyed by the scouts every Sunday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights. At the Thursday night council fire, new members of the Order of the Arrow, a national society of honor campers, will be recognized.

In 1947 a group of business men saw the need of a bank on the Ruidoso. At that time, on request by Joe C. Palmer, investigation was made by the State Banking Commission and the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation. It was then decided that within two years the territory would justify the bank, so a charter was applied for. Now—the development of the entire area merits this bank. Last fall, a group of Lincoln county residents started further work on the bank project. Attorney Geo. L. Zimmerman of Carrizozo was retained. A complete survey has been completed in Lincoln county, showing the assets, valuation of lands, voters, school children and products raised and sold annually in the county. The results of this survey are astonishing, and prove the great need of a real bank in the area, not an exchange bank, but a bank which will help the entire community grow and prosper.

On June 10, 1952, Mr. and Mrs. Joe C. Palmer filed with Brown Air Service to Santa Fe, where they were met by Attorney Zimmerman and Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Lloyd. Mr. Lloyd is in business with operations in Tucson, Artesia, Farmington and other interests. This group consulted Gov. Edwin L. Mechem, receiving his full co-operation for the furtherance of getting this bank. Another interview held with the State Banking Commission, where minor details were discussed. On Thursday evening a meeting was held at Cree Meadows Golf and Country Club, Inc., attended by the following citizens of Lincoln county: W. W. Gallacher, Carrizozo; Geo. L. Zimmerman, Carrizozo; Hill Noble, Santa Fe; Dr. V. G. Gaigant, Tahoka; and Ruidoso; Robert L. Lloyd, Artesia; and Joe C. Palmer, Ruidoso. Certain papers were signed by these men, which, with the detail survey papers, were filed with the State Banking Commission of New Mexico and with the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation of Dallas, Texas, and final legislation will be completed at an early date.

A temporary location for the bank has been offered by Philip Foxman, who recently purchased the Dr. R. S. Sutton building in Palmer Gateway. Permanent building site has been donated by Ben Roy, and six business men are offered to construct the building. In conjunction with this construction will be a suite of four to six offices, with central reception room, public stenographer and notary public available.

The chartered Bank will be \$50,000.00 capital, and \$25,000.00 surplus, which has been fully subscribed. An experienced and at the present time very active New Mexico banker will operate this bank, and individually hold approximately one third of the stock.

It is the desire of Mr. Lloyd and his associates that the business men, ranchers, farmers and citizens of Lincoln county be well represented, and feel that the bank is the furtherance of getting this stock will be available for those who care to participate. The success and growth of the bank depends on the cooperation of the entire community and surrounding trade area.

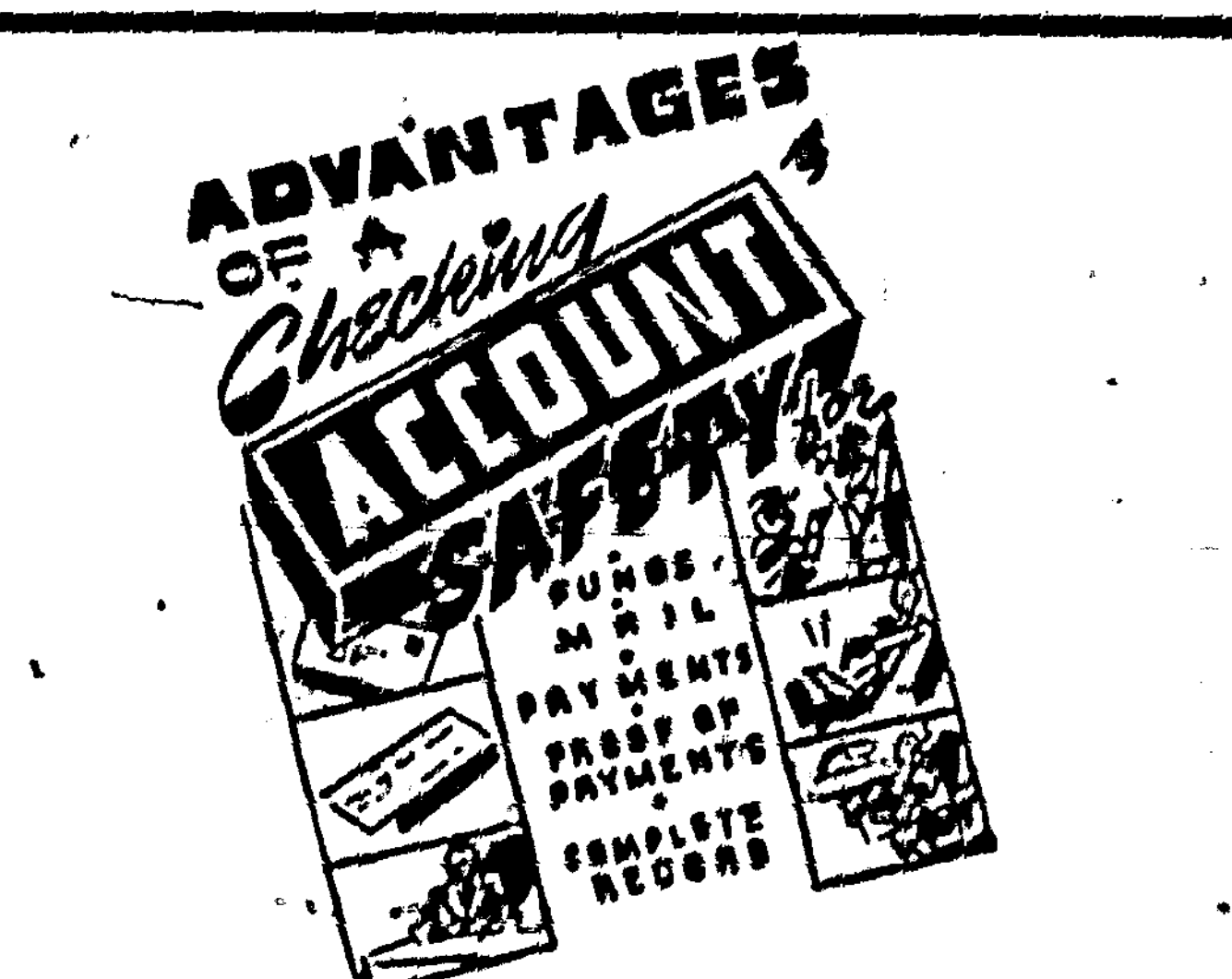

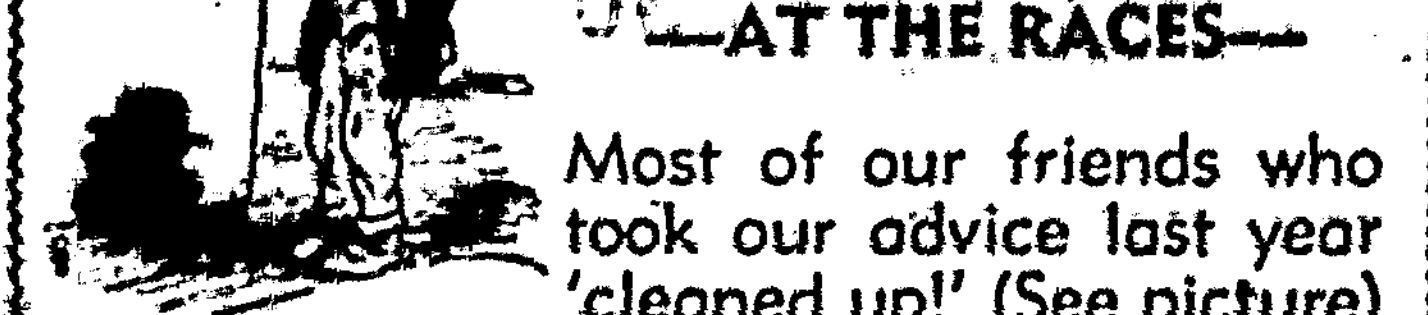

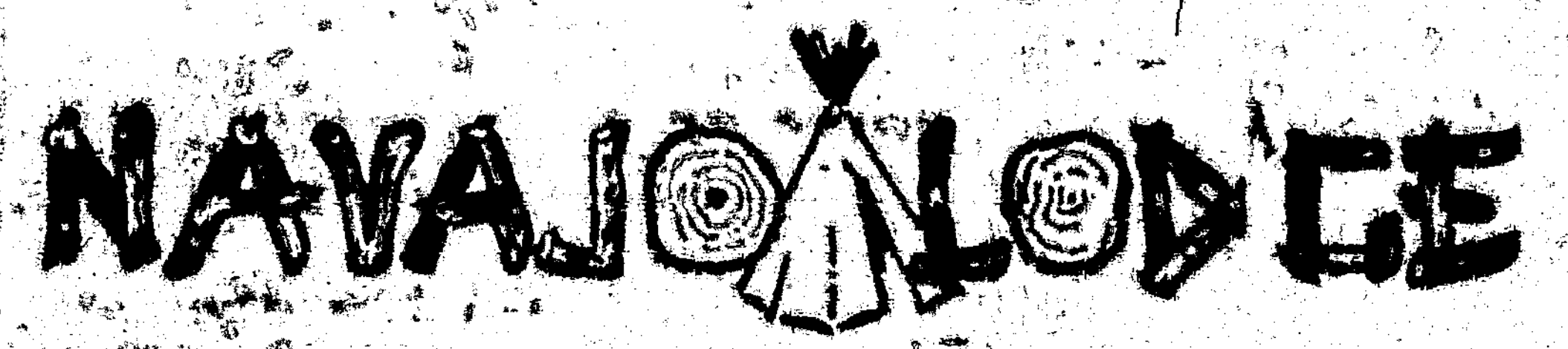

### Sykrider Touted As Most Novel Transportation

The Ruidoso-Sykrider, which was made on its way to completion this week, will offer Ruidoso visitors a most unusual means of transportation to the top of Moon mountain. Thousands of tourists would like to view this area from a vantage point but hesitate to drive their cars to the top of Moon mountain because of the steep and rocky climb back to the top of one of the mountains here. The skyride will answer their problem as a conveyance to the top of Moon mountain where they may see the most magnificent view in the Southwest. The skyride operates very similar to the cable cars used to transport school children to their classroom in Erstfeld, Switzerland. This car was pictured in the last Sunday Parade Section of the El Paso Times.

The aerial tramway in Ruidoso, however, has 24 seats that will hold two people each and is about a mile up and a mile back in length. The vertical rise is about 3,000 feet. This week's construction saw the two carrying cables and the traction cable run on the ground and readied for placement on the towers which were also being placed this week. The upper terminal, including the viewing platform where the two 35 power telescopes will be placed, was completed this week. Painting, it was reported, will start sometime around the first of next week. Trial runs are expected to be made around the 29th of the month. **YOU CAN LIVE WITHOUT PICTURES BUT NOT SO WELL, DECLARES RUIDOSO AND EL PASO ARTIST**

"You can live without pictures, but not so well," So says Harris Shelton, noted Southwestern artist, who, for 23 consecutive years, has spent much of his life and done much of his work on the inviting banks of the Ruidoso. His friendly postoffice on the main Canyon

road, is again open to the public, and until the maples turn red in the fall and the aspens splash our hills with gold, he will be one of us. Shelton paintings have been known to art lovers far and wide for many years and each spring after closing his El Paso winter

studio, the artist makes an extended swing through some paintable section of our Southwest. Then, in the peace, beauty and comfort of Ruidoso, among these beloved pines and the friends he cherishes so deeply, he completes the work he recently commenced. Last spring Shelton covered the central and south part of Texas from its western tip to the Gulf Coast. This season he worked through the spectacular areas of Northern Arizona. He is starting now to prepare his paintings for the winter art showings.

Always a year or more behind on commissions and with dealers clamoring for his work, Shelton nevertheless paints deliberately and cuts no corners to hasten his output. "In art, as in other fields," contends the artist, "there is no substitute for good, honest work." Harris Shelton has been termed a superb draughtsman and with his color is a veritable passion. Yet his hues are so skillfully balanced that the result is soft, warm and friendly. Shelton's distinctive use of color has won him the position of one of the country's outstanding interpreters of the desert and the mountains, critics say.

His work embraces numerous other subjects—the cattle and range scene, our national parks, the Indian country, the typical folk life of Mexico—even an occasional foray into the surrealistic and abstract. But there is nothing of the "quick and easy" in Shelton's canvases. They are soundly constructed, the color vivid yet unstrained, the details executed with care and tenderness. It has been said that his paintings are "genuine, defined in spirit and feeling, painted with skill and good taste." They are vital and alive—and easy to live with.

For Harris Shelton strives to glorify the natural beauties of our Southwest. On canvas alone may be preserved the many moods of Mother Nature. The artist's walls are lined with beautifully framed paintings, each canvas being a serious attempt to combine artistic correctness with a maximum of liveability. The paintings run the gamut of life in the Southwest, although best known are his popular portrayals of the desert and mountains, with their subtle variations of rhythm, their delicate qualities of light, atmosphere and color, and elements that are felt rather than explained. "For a painting," explains Shelton, "should not only convey corporeal beauty, but as did those of the Old Masters, reveal inner states of mind. It is not what a man sees with his eyes, but what he feels, that provides the material for distinctive creation. It is far more important to have an effective picture than a mere literal transcript of nature. Therein lies the difference between true and enduring art and mere representational or naturalistic paintings.

"Yet, after all, good pictures are self-explanatory and easily gotten through the eye. No picture ever was, or ever will be, any better than it looks. As a rule, the better a picture is, the less there is to be said about it. It speaks for itself," he claims.

Shelton has exhibited in New York, Los Angeles, Palm Springs and many other cities. He is a member of the Lions club, the Texas Fine Arts association, the El Paso Artists association and the National Society of Arts and Letters.

Visitors are always welcome to Shelton's studio. And the artist left us with this parting thought: "A painting should be an unending source of visual pleasure."
