Mrs. Lucille Kennedy, owner of Armstrong's Country Store, miraculously escaped serious injury when her Chrysler passenger car turned upside down as it left State Highway 37 when it went out of control upon hitting a patch of snow and ice on the hill just above Anderson Lumber Co. Mrs. Kennedy was assisted from the car, which ended up with all four wheels high in the air, by passersby. She suffered only a slight bruise. The car was damaged considerably.

A certificate, certifying that R. H. Reynolds is co-holder of the record of 10 shots fired off-hand, at 800 yards was received by Mrs. Reynolds. Only two other men are known to hold this same record—out of a possible 30. The other two men are also from New Mexico, Ed Harrington of Alamogordo, and Ed Harrington of Silver City.

Ed Harrington set the record in 1949 and Wright tied the record the next day. Reynolds also tied the record September 18, 1951.

The target that Reynolds were hit on with a .30-06 rifle has been discontinued as it was considered too dangerous for all times. The new target, which is 12 feet high and 12 feet wide, is made of wood and is placed on a stand 12 feet high. The record is now held by Reynolds, who shot 10 hits in 10 shots.

Record Low Temperature Hits For November

A new low in temperature for the month of November was chalked up Wednesday morning when the thermometer dipped to 11 degrees below zero. The record low mark followed an extremely cold day Tuesday when the thermometer recorded below freezing temperatures for the entire day. A. C. Culver, weather observer here for the U. S. Department of Commerce, said the official reading was the coldest in Ruidoso since his eight years of keeping weather records. "Once before, in November, the temperature dropped to two degrees below zero," he said.

Every School Child Is Caution Sign To Motorists

The home folk, disgraced for the safety of themselves and others up and down State Highway 37 is a worrisome problem for City Marshal Arba Jones. Last week he asked the News to send again warm Ruidoso people that observance of the various speed limit signs in the canyon will bring them a traffic violation ticket. "We have various speed limits," all clearly indicated, and we intend for them to be observed," Jones declared. "It was necessary for us to obey these signs during the summer months when our highway street carried such a tremendous load of tourist traffic. It is just as important now with school in session, for us to give motorists, at the indicated speed rate. Often we see small school children, some of their first year, in school, darting out in the street without a glance either direction, and when that happens it is up to the motorist approaching to stop in time to prevent serious injury or death for the child."

Nob Hill Lodge Gets Publicity On Opening

(Editor's Note: The El Paso Times of Sunday, Nov. 16, carried the news article below and the accompanying pictures concerning Ruidoso's new tourist accommodations, Nob Hill Lodge. The forthcoming Picturesque New Mexico magazine in its winter issue will also have a picture and story about the new lodge.)

Recently constructed at a cost of approximately \$135,000, the two-story Nob Hill Lodge at Ruidoso, N. M., has been placed in service and will remain open this year for the winter season. Owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Thorn of Ruidoso, the lodge is one of the most unique buildings found in the rapidly booming resort town in New Mexico.

R. V. West was the contractor for the new building, which consists of 16 units, and includes a reception room, lobby and hotel chair type of elevator. Constructed of brick and stucco, the building is marked by the use of a red mission tile roof and the elaborate and extensive use of wrought iron on the balconies which front each unit.

The lobby of the lodge has been done in wood paneling, with a rubber tile floor and a wood-burning fireplace. The entire building has been air conditioned, with individual vents and controls in each unit. A paved parking area is provided in front of the lodge, and landscaping work will be completed this winter and spring with the possibility of providing an open-air picnic site and some barbecue pits.

HUGE TRES RITAS RANCH HAS COLORFUL HISTORY DATING BACK TO '80'S

(By Mrs. Tom Charles) The story of the Tres Ritaa ranch is also the story of its foreman, Carroll Johnson, and his experiences and adventures in his 27 years as "cowhand" and foreman in this country, according to Thomas F. Ryan III, owner of the historic old A. B. Fall ranch at Three Rivers, N. M. "Carroll Johnson is not only the best stockman in this country, but is also my best friend," declared Tom Ryan, a high point at North Well, he gazed over his domain of some 110 sections.

All hands agreed that Carroll Johnson is no mean hand in the cattle business. Son of the late Pete Johnson, who, about 1887, came to the Carrizozo country as wagon boss for the old Bar W. ranch, and was later foreman there for nearly 40 years, Carroll was born at Nogal, about 20 miles from the Ryan holdings.

For over 26 years, Carroll has been employed on this Tres Ritaa ranch, first as foreman for the Fall, and for the last ten years as foreman for the Ryan ranch. He has never left the ranch, and never taken a vacation because vacations are "bore him."

Probably no spot in southern New Mexico is so historic as this A. B. Fall ranch, now owned by Pat Cogland, who built his own cattle domain, extending from the railroad to the west to Mesquite Indian reservation on the east, and from south of the I Bar W. ranch to the north to within a few miles of Tularosa canyon on the south.

Billy the Kid knew every foot of this range, and Victorio, the old Indian chief, made his first step here when he went on the wagon in April of 1878, raiding the Chisland camp, then on to Ojo Caliente where he killed the guards and captured 45 horses of the 9th Cavalry. Victorio had been sojourning with the Indians at Mesalero and this

was the beginning of the long Indian uprising which ended only with the surrender of Geronimo in 1887. The late Fred Crosby, well known stockman, nephew of Pat Cogland, often related how Apache Kid, noted early day killer, raided the Cogland ranch in the early 1880's. In Cogland's day, transportation to and from the ranch was by backboard on early day stage coach over the old Tularosa trail. This trail from Old Mesilla to White Oaks traversed this historic ranch and one still follows its winding course in going to Ryan's North Well area. "And that is one thing we're never going to change," Tom Ryan declared. Following his route in and around the rugged hills, one can vision what ideal hideaway spots these curves made for the early day bandits. Peter Hurd, internationally known Lincoln county artist, has promised Ryan he will make a painting soon of this picturesque old highway. Carroll Johnson himself remembers the old backboard days when the wagon trains made their way over the Cogland area. "And while Carroll Johnson has been the native boy's southwesterner, he has nothing on the boss, Tom Ryan, who is also an old timer in his own right. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. K. Ryan, came to El Paso in 1803 when the elder Ryan and his partner, Dick Dudley, built the North-west Railroad from Chihuahua City to El Paso. Tom Ryan was born in Chihuahua City and one of his most treasured possessions is a photograph of his parents and the stage coach in which they made their initial trip to Mexico. Though he spent most of his boyhood in the east, Tom Ryan returned to the Southwest in 1824, looking after mining interests in Chihuahua City and El Paso and Silver City. He has called the Southwest home since that time. He recalls he

ROTARY CLUB EFFORTS TO GET CEMETERY PLOT ARE NEARING SUCCESS

39 Persons Died Of Tuberculosis In County In '51

Pointing up the great need for Lincoln county people to support the annual sale of Christmas seals are the startling figures released recently by the state tuberculosis sanatorium which reported that 39 persons died in Lincoln county in 1951 of tuberculosis. In the same year 767 persons died in the state of New Mexico from TB, the sanatorium revealed.

New Mexico is second only to Arizona in the U. S. in number of deaths from this dread disease. Ruidoso and Lincoln county can help in the war against tuberculosis by buying Christmas seals. Money from the sale of the seals is used a great deal in detection and preventative work. More than half of the funds subscribed in Lincoln county will stay in the county, according to officials of the county association.

About 2,000 letters were mailed last week to residents of Lincoln county in which two sheets of Christmas seals were enclosed, along with a self-addressed envelope which can be used to return contributions to the county society in exchange for the bright stickers. County officials urged those who received the letters to answer them promptly.

Anyone overlooked in the letter campaign may secure Christmas seals by ordering them through the Ruidoso News. This publication will forward your order to the county headquarters in Carrizozo.

ROTARY CLUB EFFORTS TO GET CEMETERY PLOT ARE NEARING SUCCESS

Ruidoso is to have a cemetery through efforts of the Ruidoso Rotary club. Formal application for a plot of land of about six acres, lying in the area several hundred yards south of the village garbage pit and on the paved Alto road, was signed recently by Mayor W. D. Ratliff of the village, and forwarded to the Alamogordo office of the U. S. Forestry service by Forest Ranger Ed Quack of Capitan. There is very little doubt that the application will be acted on favorably. The cemetery plot will be under the jurisdiction of the village of Ruidoso, and records of lots purchased, care and improvement of the plot will be the responsibility of the village. Mayor Ratliff told the News this week that the cemetery plot lies in the region of the Lincoln National forest here where the pioneer Ruidosoan, Lord Cree, is buried. His grave can be seen just off the Alto road, on the west side, surrounded by two wooden fences, now almost rotted away.

Securing of the forest land for a cemetery for the village was the project of the newly organized Rotary club, through a committee composed of Tom Jones, Ben Roy, H. H. Shier, L. P. Halst and others. The need for a cemetery for Ruidoso was pointed out six months ago to the Rotary club in one of its regular luncheon sessions by E. H. Fuchs, longtime resident of the area, who enlisted the aid of the Ruidoso News in getting such a project underway.

The Rotary club voted immediately upon hearing Fuchs' suggestion of such a project to attempt to secure land for a cemetery—but also voted to turn management and operation of such a project over to some responsible agency after the plot was assuredly acquired.

The Rotary club has received many volunteer pledges from local residents of assistance in working out roads through the cemetery and gravelling them for all-weather use and in landscaping the plot. The only burial grounds available to Ruidoso in the past have been at Stetson, on U. S. Highway 70, but that cemetery is now filled to capacity, and cannot be enlarged.

Whirl of Sports

Skiing is already underway at the La Madeta-Winter Sports area, on the Sandia mountains, near Albuquerque. The snow that fell on Nov. 16 was the earliest heavy snow fall since 1949. The big snow dump had already received a light snow November 9.

The run is being operated by the Albuquerque Ski Club this year. It has been run by the city of Albuquerque the last two years, which saw very little snow. Mr. and Mrs. Buzz Balbridge, both licensed ski instructors, are managing La Ma-

dera this year. A skating rink and sleeping accommodations, neither available last year, are being offered this year under the management of Tom Bainbridge, brother of the manager of the ski run.

The 4,200-foot Constant ski lift is usually operated only on weekends, and holidays, but groups may have the use of it on special occasions.

Had a nice talk with Mr. S. W. Stout of Green Tree the other day. Mr. Stout is upset because of the amount of game that was wounded and allowed to escape, and the large number of deer that were shot this year. In most instances, the doe were shot and left, even though most of them were in position to be easily identified. Mr. Stout and we feel that too many hunters, not "sportsmen" are coming into the area, just to burn up ammunition. We were lucky that no more hunters were injured this year than there were. Too many people shoot and then look. He recalled several instances where hunters, that he knew, had been "under fire."

American Foresters, the publication of the American Forestry Association, in the November issue, tells why more and more land is being posted. We're not as concerned about it here, as they are, back east; because we have National Forests to hunt in. However, if more care isn't taken by hunters and picnickers, our forests won't be in shape for hunting much longer. Too many hunters think that the forest is theirs to destroy, when it really belongs to all the people.

The article in American Foresters stated that there are too many vandals, disguised as hunters, destroying property belonging to farmers and ranchers. A favorite pastime of these so-called "sportsmen" is target practice on such things as light pole insulators, spark plugs on tractors, highway road signs, tires on cars and wagons, and even windows.

We're proud to be a member of the National Rifle Association, and the Ruidoso Gun Club. One of the things stressed by the club and the association, is safety with guns. In our first formal practice on the Range that is operated by the local club, we were given lesson upon lesson on gun safety. The second amendment to the Constitution of the United States clearly says that the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. More and more states have passed laws that infringe upon the people's right to keep arms, but they are, as many of the legislators say, to protect the people. If every one who possesses arms would have only a little instruction on safety, such as that stressed by the local gun club, these laws would be entirely unnecessary.

We've always been opposed to gun laws, and luckily New Mexico is not as strict as some states are, but if more safety is not practiced by some of the hunters, New Mexico will face some measures against guns.

The turkey shoot last Sunday was a huge success. Although it was run off in snow, everybody kept warm by the fires. The shoot was run off in short order, and every one was at the firing line when his turn came up.

Arvel Rannels of Alto cleaned up at the shoot, when he took five turkeys home. Rannels won the gun this year that was presented by Nickel's Hardware in Capitán. He won a model 70, 270 Winchester with a four power scope on it.

George Trimble collected three birds at the shoot.

Texas university won the South-west conference last Saturday while sitting idle. Southern Methodist university, the only other team with a chance at the crown and the Cotton Bowl, was tied by Baylor University 7 to 7. Texas will meet Tennessee, who was tied last Saturday by Kentucky 14 to 14, in the Cotton Bowl January 1 in Dallas.

The University of Southern California defeated U. C. L. A. to win the Pacific Coast championship, and the trip to the Rose Bowl, in Pasadena, U. S. C. will meet the winner of the Big Ten Conference in the annual classic.

With Texas Western out of the running, it appears that the Sun Bowl clash will be between Arizona State's Sun Devils and Mississippi Southern, in El Paso.

Oklahoma clinched their seventh Big Seven Conference by defeating Nebraska 34 to 13. Nebraska was the school that was instrumental in passing the rule that no Big Seven school could accept a post season bowl bid. Oklahoma decided to refuse a bid to the Sugar Bowl and remain in the conference.

The day that the first turkey shoot was held in Ruidoso in October Carrizosa also sponsored one. Three turkeys were given away, and three local men, "Duteh" Collins, R. H. Hedgecock, and George Trimble, won those three turkeys.

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PENNSYLVANIA SOLDIER STATIONED AT ROSWELL GETS BIG GAME, CAPTAN

T.Sgt. H. R. Fetty of Walker Air Force Base, Roswell, is a short man with a keen eye. He comes from Waynesburg, Penn., and has hunted in the Keystone state for seven years. Like most hunters he is given to understatement. Recently, when he came out of the Capitan mountains after ten days of hunting, he said, "I had a little luck."

The buck turned out to be a 300-pound, brown-faced black bear with an extraordinarily good pelt, and a 235-pound, nine-point buck mule deer with 28-inch antlers.

Fetty was moving through the brush on the north side of the Capitan when he first came across the deer. A week later he saw and hunted the black bear. The deer was killed from a distance of 50 yards with a shot from a 30-06, which tore through the big buck's shoulder. He had more trouble, far

more trouble, with the bear. On the morning of Nov. 18, Fetty, and three other hunters from his camp were moving through the brush at widely separated points. They had recently shot some deer, and their thoughts were of getting more deer.

When Fetty's glance fell upon a rocky point some 200 yards distant he was surprised to see a brown-pelted bear sitting on a rock. He had a clear shot with his 30-06 Winchester, but he was over anxious. There was a disturbing amount of brush between Fetty and his target, so he was not too disappointed when the bullet ricocheted off the brush.

The bear did not run. It looked at the hunters and growl tense and frightened. Raising his rifle above the antler height of the brush, Fetty did better with a second shot. The bullet ripped through

Fetty says he followed his blood trail, and when he caught up with the bear, it was leaping eight to ten feet high, trying to climb a pine tree. He was unable to secure a grip because of his wounded leg, and he kept sliding down the tree trunk. He slid once too often.

The hunter, standing 30 feet away, shot him through the heart. Fetty said he could hear the beat of the huge heart, "sounding like an irrigation pump." It beat for five minutes and then the other hunters came in and cleaned him out with a hunting knife.

It took four men 18 hours to transport the 300 pound carcass through the woods on a travois constructed of three-inch thick pine boughs ten feet long. Most of the time was consumed in cutting a trail in such a manner that the bear's fine pelt would not be ruined in the long trek.

Those who have roofing jobs, have to wait for a rain or snow storm before leaks are discovered. In the meantime, the gyps have moved to another part of the State

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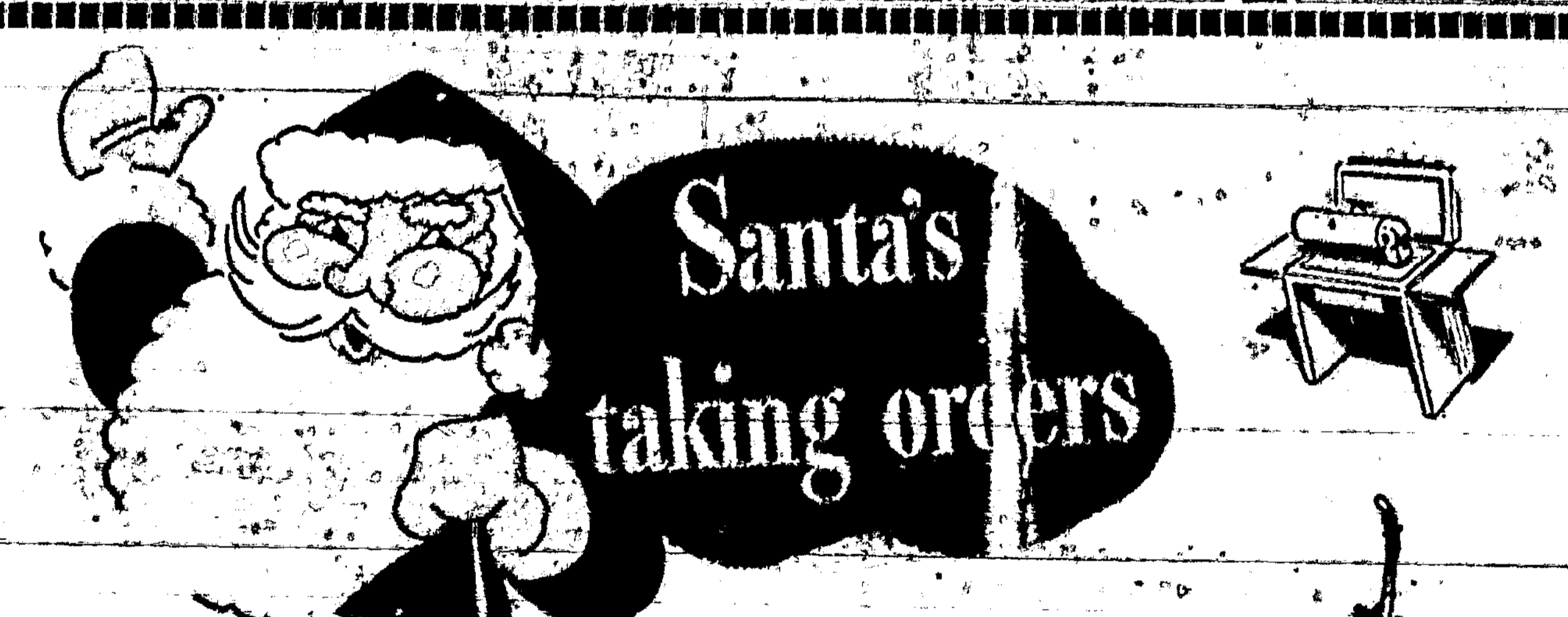

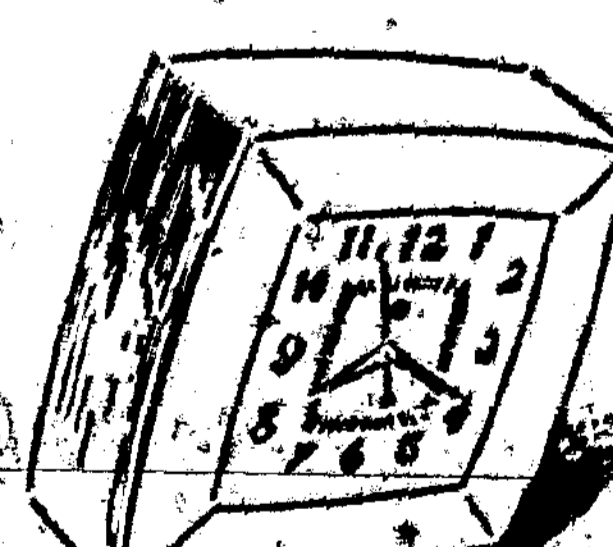

LEA COUNTY CATTLEMEN PLANT 'STEPPING STONES' AT STATE'S BOYS' RANCH

"Every Charitable act is a step toward Heaven"—Henry Ward Beecher.

Down in Lea county, New Mexico, there are 33 men today, most of them ranchers, who, by a generous deed have planted their individual "stepping stones" on that

"Heaven-bound" road. Not only for themselves, but also for the 30 grateful boys now living at New Mexico Boys Ranch, boys whose familiarity with stones before they came to the Ranch was usually with the bruising kind. Undoubtedly, most of these ranchers would deny their present fitness for "heavenly wings" but granted they may yet have a long way to go; the odds are all on their getting there.

"Calves for kids" was their slogan as they rounded up 40 of Lea County's finest heifers around the first of November and "Get Along Little Doggies" they yelled when Roy K. Stovall, president of New Mexico Boys Ranch, arrived in Lovington to accept this blue-ribbon stock on behalf of his fifty "kids" back at La Joya. Making this Lea County presentation was Jack Dang-

lade, Senator elect from Lea County and H. J. "Punk" Burns, president of the Lovington Bank, the two "trail bosses" chiefly responsible for this Boys' Ranch Cattle Drive.

To many people living in New Mexico, Boys Ranch at La Joya, is an old story and to some of them, a tiresome story, particularly when they read again that the Ranch is in need of financial aid, or when they are told that there are 30 homeless boys from all over the state, who have been refused admission to Boys Ranch because of lack of money to clothe and feed them.

What is the matter with those people down at La Joya? Some of them exclaim, "What do they do with the money we send them? Why I sent them \$10.00 this year—or maybe it was last year—but still they're always harping on donations!"

Yes, these critics are correct. Boys Ranch is ALWAYS harping on donations and will continue to do so until the time arrives when the humanitarians of New Mexico begin to realize THEIR responsibility toward the charitable organization known as New Mexico Boys Ranch, the ONLY refuge of its kind in this state today.

What many people do not know is that there is no state-supported orphanage in all New Mexico, and so these boys from broken homes have only two alternatives—Boys Ranch or—the street. Then of course, there is the Juvenile Detention "Home" at Springer.

One of the men down in Lea County who long ago realized the problems of these homeless, untended boys decided to do something about it—Jack Dangle, Senator-elect from Lea County, is a director of NMBR and well aware of the part this Ranch is taking in rehabilitating unfortunate boys of New Mexico. Also, he knew that NMBR is supported wholly by donations. So perhaps he had a keener concern than the average person, in working like a flying saucer to put the Boys Ranch Fund Drive over in Lea County this year. With the help of many other humanitarians in this part of the state, Jack Dangle did not only make his quota of \$4,500, but more than doubled it—bringing in \$10,000 for

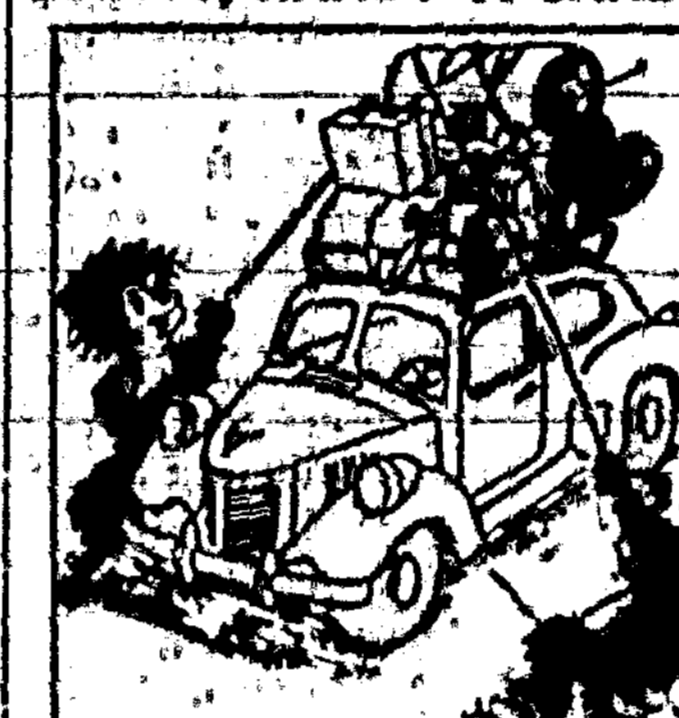

BFD, editor of the Abernathy
Weekly Review at Abernathy, Tex.,
from whence comes many Ruidoso
visitors in all seasons, had this cute
paragraph in his column "TIP" re-
cently:

"We were the victim of modern

The Grant Beacon gives us some

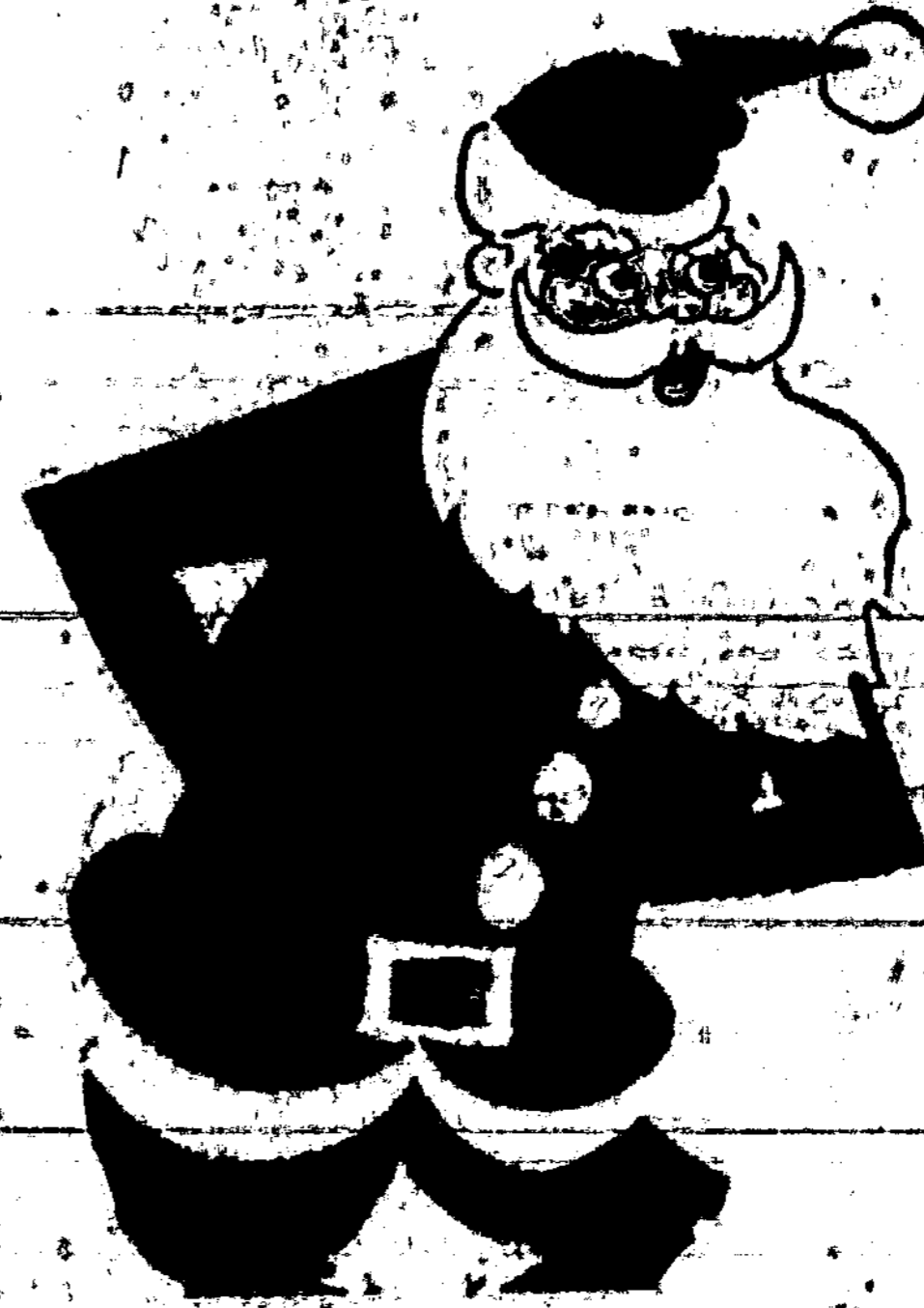
