WEATHER

Mid-winter conditions prevail. 25° below zero. Wind measure about 30 miles per hour. Precip. 100%.

Two days of snow and sleet Sunday and Monday brought 8½ inches of sparkling diamonds to the Ruidoso area. Tuesday's bright sun made the surrounding country-side a winter wonderland.

Moisture from the snow measuring 78 of an inch was welcomed here since the area was sorely needing it.

Highway and street travel was hazardous for several hours Monday. Several bent fenders and narrow escapes were reported here. One serious wreck occurred on U. S. Highway 70 one mile east of Ruidoso early Tuesday when a convertible overturned, seriously injuring its lone occupant.

"Once before, in November, the temperature dropped to two degrees below zero," he said.

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PENNSYLVANIA SOLDIER STATIONED AT ROSWELL GETS BIG GAME, CAPITAN

T Sgt. H. R. Petty of Walker Air Force Base, Roswell, is a short man with a keen eye. He comes from Waynesburg, Penn., and has hunted in the Keystone state for seven years. Like most hunters he is given to understatement. Recently, when he came out of the Capitan mountains after ten days of hunting, he said he had "a little luck."

The buck turned out to be a 300-pound, brown-faced black bear with an extraordinarily good pelt, and a 235-pound, nine-point buck mule deer with 26-inch antlers.

Petty was moving through the brush on the north side of the Capitans when he first came across the deer. A week later he saw and hunted the black bear. The deer was killed from a distance of 50 yards with a shot from a .30-06, which tore through the big buck's shoulder. He had more trouble, far

more trouble, with the bear.

On the morning of Nov. 16, Petty, and three other hunters from his camp were moving through the brush at widely separated points.

They had recently shot some deer, and their thoughts were of getting more deer.

When Petty's glance fell upon a rocky point some 200 yards distant he was surprised to see a brown-pelted bear sitting on a rock. He had a clear shot with his .30-06 Winchester, but he was over anxious. There was a disturbing amount of brush between Petty and his target, so he was not too disappointed when the bullet ricocheted off the brush.

The bear did not run. It looked at the hunters and grew tense and frightened. Raising his rifle above the antler height of the brush, Petty did better with a second shot. The bullet ripped through

the bear's left shoulder and sent him tumbling 75 yards down a steep cliff.

"He was growling and grunting and tore up earth, rocks and small trees," Petty says, adding, "I knocked over one sapling on the way down. His fall was stopped when he landed in some trees at the bottom of the rock cliff."

As Petty came out of the brush, the bear began running as fast and as far as he could from the hunter. He was able to get from 250 to 300 yards away when a bullet struck his right hind leg. Petty had fired down from a height of 150 feet.

The bear kept running. In a few moments he disappeared over a rocky point and vanished in the brush.

Petty says he followed his blood trail, and when he caught up with the bear, it was leaping eight to ten feet high, trying to climb a pine tree. He was unable to secure a grip because of his wounded leg, and he kept sliding down the tree trunk. He did once too often.

The hunter, standing 30 feet away, shot him through the heart. Petty said he could hear the beat of the huge heart, sounding like an irrigation pump. It beat for five minutes and then the other hunters came in and cleaned him out with a hunting knife.

It took four men 18 hours to transport the 300 pound carcass through the woods on a travois constructed of three-inch thick pine boughs ten feet long. Most of the time was consumed in cutting a trail in such a manner that the bear's fine pelt would not be ruined in the long trek.

Had a nice talk with Mr. S. W. Stout of Green Tree the other day. Mr. Stout is upset because of the amount of game that was wounded and allowed to escape, and the large number of doe deer that were shot this year. In most instances, the doe were shot and left, even though most of them were in position to be easily identified. Mr. Stout and we feel that too many hunters, not "sportsmen" are coming into the area, just to burn up ammunition. We were lucky that no more hunters were injured this year than there were. Too many people shoot and then look. He related several instances where hunters, that he knew, had been "under fire."

American Forests, the publication of the American Forestry Association, in the November issue, tells why more and more land is being posted. We're not concerned about it here, as they are back east, because we have National Forests to hunt in. However, if more care isn't taken by hunters and picnickers, our forests won't be in shape for hunting much longer. Too many hunters think that the forest is theirs to destroy, when it really belongs to all the people.

The article in American Forests states that there are too many vandals, disguised as hunters, destroying property belonging to farmers and ranchers. A favorite pastime of these so called "sportsmen" is target practice on such things as light pole insulators, spark plugs on tractors, highway road signs, tires on cars and wagons, and even windows.

We're proud to be a member of the National Rifle Association, and the Ruidoso Gun club. One of the things stressed by the club and the association, is safety with guns. In our first formal practice on the Range that is operated by the local club, we were given lesson upon lesson on gun safety. The second amendment to the Constitution of the United States clearly says that

the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. More and more states have passed laws that infringe upon the people's right to keep arms, but they are, as many of the legislators say, to protect the people. If

every one who possesses arms would have only a little infringe upon safety, such as that stressed by the local gun club, these laws would be entirely unnecessary.

We've always been opposed to gun laws, and luckily New Mexico is not as strict as some states are, but if more safety is not practiced by some of the hunters, New Mexico will face some measures against guns.



Reports have been received by several of the Contractors License Board field representatives that there is presently an influx of out-of-state unlicensed painting and roofing contractors, soliciting and obtaining jobs in New Mexico. Complaints have been received from citizens, particularly in the southern section of the State that citizens have contracted with the painters and roofers and the work has been very inferior. These so-called contractors usually solicit jobs on a door-to-door basis. The price for their work is lower than that of a licensed contractor. The materials are inferior and so is their work.

The citizens taken in by these gyps usually do not discover the bad workmanship for several weeks at which time the paint begins to peel. Those who have roofing jobs have to wait for a rain or snow storm before leaks are discovered. In the meantime, the gyps have moved to another part of the State.



(Continued from Page One) made his first venture in the cattle business in 1929, buying 1,000 head from Oliver M. Lee at \$60 per head for a cow with calf at her side. Ryan bought the Three Rivers ranch in 1940 and declares he has never been sorry. He decided to locate in New Mexico. He and his family reside there year round.

Pat Copland, old timer, re-

obtained his foothold in his ideal cattle country by buying up the Joe Wingfield ranch and the Bar KL cattle, Wingfield and bought out Bud Smith, who had owned the "Plus" holdings. Smith later managed the SRS ranch for George and Susie McSweeney Barber, while Judge Fall added to his interests in 1957. Mrs. Barber, widow of Al

Alexander McSweeney, killed in the Lincoln County War, was for many years known as the "Cattle Queen" of New Mexico.

After selling her holdings to Fall in 1957, Mrs. Barber moved to White Oaks where she died some years later.

The "Rock House," a landmark in Three Rivers canyon, was head-quarters for the Barber outfit.

Judge Fall purchased the Copland ranch about 1907 from Numa Frenger of Las Cruces who had obtained title to it through a mortage foreclosure. Fall continued to add to his holdings by merging with the Hatchett Cattle Co. and the dying of the Will Ed Harris and A. D. Brownfield holdings, eventually controlling close to a million acres. In the collapse of the Fall-Hatchett empire, the ranch was divided up and sold. Thos. F. Ryan acquiring the Three Rivers area.

year, and one which is Ryan's spe-

cial hobby, is the Billy the Kid's

annual rodeo which brings kids

from a radius of 100 miles or more

for riding and roping contests and

for the big barbecue put on annually by the Ryans and the Tularosa Lions club. The new rodeo grounds were dedicated in 1951 at the A. B. Fall arena in memory of the late Judge Fall. At the 1952 rodeo held Aug. 24, there were 2,200 paid admissions with Gerald Marx of Tulerosa acclaimed as grand champion in the day's events. Bill Danley of Alamogordo and Joan Stanley of Archo tied for the reserve championship in the senior division. Gov. Edwin Mechem and his family were among the guests of honor along with Mayor Hervey of El Paso and Congressman Ken Regan of Midland, Tex. Carroll Johnson is arena director each year.



BFD, editor of the Abilene Weekly Review at Abilene, Tex., from whence comes many Ruidoso visitors in all seasons, had this cute paragraph in his column "TIP," recently:

"We were the victim of modern household gadgets and curiosity. While prowling through Mrs. BFD's refrigerator, we came across a container that resembled a fly spray bomb can. Curious as to what the contents and how to get them out, we tumbled with the top of the can. Suddenly there was a swishing sound and white, foamy stuff sprayed all over the kitchen. It was canned, pressurized cream. What'll the food-packaging industry think of next? The mess was cleaned up before Mrs. BFD came home."

"The Grant Beacon gives us some light into the matter of truck crop rail shipments out of that town. According to this clipping from that paper, 2,000 cars of produce were shipped this season so far:

"The Santa Fe Railroad gave us figures to date which are as follows: 1553 cars of all kinds of vegetables, which broken down were 1193 cars bunched carrots; 223 cars topped carrots; 76 cars of mixed bunched and topped carrots; 8 cars lettuce; 42 cars peas; 4 cars onions; 1 car lettuce and carrots. The approximate of 500 railroad cars was shipped out by trucks on top of this amount, which would arrive at figures of over 2,000 cars of produce shipped from Ruidoso."
