Electric Rates Are Increased Here January 1

Ten years of war and postwar inflation necessitated the increase in electric rates granted by the Public Service Commission here...

"Our costs of doing business have gone upward steadily, just as have food, clothing, rent and other items in the cost of living," Johnson stated.

"Compared to the last pre-inflation year of 1941, for example, we are now paying 100% more for power, 75% more for copper wire, 85% more for insulators, 145% more for crossarms and 50% more for meters."

"Basic salaries paid to our employees have gone up an average of 80% during the last 10 years and our total base payroll in New Mexico has increased 144%, due to increases in both wages and personnel."

"Coincident with the sharp rise in labor and material costs, the company has had to invest large sums in new facilities to insure adequate service to its New Mexico customers..."

"The increase granted by the Commission is the first we have requested or received since we began operating in New Mexico in 1927," Johnson stated.

The increase became effective Jan. 1, 1952, and will be reflected in the electric service statements mailed to customers after that date...

**Contractors Prepare Bids On Route 83**

Several contractors in making preparations for submitting bids to the Bureau of Public Roads in Santa Fe, on January 8, have been looking over the proposed project of 6 1/2 miles of construction on Highway 83, east from Cloudcroft in James Canyon, during the past week or ten days.

The project, which has been on the Bureau's agenda since early last fall, calls for new construction along the present route of State Route 83, and is part of the over-all Forest Service program for new construction through the Lincoln Forest from east to west.

Now remaining for construction on the route through the Forest reserve is the distance from Cloudcroft to the east forest boundary, to join the state paving, a distance of a little over 20 miles.

**Dwarfism Now Reported Serious In Livestock**

Cattlemen are aware of the many "freaks of nature" or abnormal calves that are dropped from time to time. A great number of these are the result of inherited characteristics.

Recently, however, a new abnormality has become prominent in the U. S., causing serious losses among registered cattle and promising considerable trouble in commercial herds. This inherited abnormality results in dwarf calves, with losses as high as 30 per cent in some herds. These dwarfs are thought to be counterparts of cretinous dwarfs in humans and result from a deficiency of thyrotropic hormone.

Most dwarfs die within a few months, though some live a reasonably long time. They are virtually worthless, even as veal, being abnormally short-legged with a bulbous-shaped head. They are afflicted with labored or "antling" breathing and a pronounced tendency to bloat. Although most often observed in Herefords, dwarfs occur in all major breeds.

The high incidence of dwarfism is thought to result from selection of normal appearing carrier animals which have a desirable conformation characteristics. They have often better conformation, especially of the head, than normal non-carriers. About one-fourth of the calves from normal appearing "carrier" parents may be expected to be abnormal.

Dwarfism appeared first in pure bred herds as a result of intense selection and because of closer relationship—Inbreeding—than in commercial herds. However, since more and more range bulls are being selected from purebred herds, the condition is expected to become more prevalent in range herds. Few, if any, of the popular bloodlines of today are free of it.

The surest and easiest way to eliminate dwarfism is to use non-carrier bulls and eliminate cows which have produced dwarfs. When a dwarf appears in a herd steps should be taken at once to eliminate it. At present, progeny testing is the surest method of determining a carrier, but testing a bull for dwarfism need not upset a breeding program.



### Protect Your Social Security Status

Are you a regularly employed farm worker? Are you working as much as two days every week for someone in their home? If you are, your employer is required to make a report of your wages and turn in the social security tax on what has been paid to you. The next report is due during January 1952.

Samuel C. Anthony, Manager of the El Paso Social Security Office, said today that all farm and household workers who come under social security must have social security account numbers for their employers to use on their social security tax reports. Everyone who already has a social security account number card should show it to his employer so that he will be sure he has the correct name and account number for his report.

Those who have never had an account number should apply immediately. An application form may be obtained from any post office or the El Paso social security office at 234 U. S. Court House. Those who have had a card and lost it should immediately apply for a new card with the same account number they had before. The application form mentioned above can also be used for getting a lost card replaced, Anthony said.

It is important that these employees have their account number cards early in January, so that their employers can have correct information for their quarterly report.
