ZIMMERMAN WITHDRAWS FROM RACE

Geo. L. Zimmerman, Carrizozo lawyer, explained his reasons this week for not seeking political office or political leadership in Lincoln county at this time.

It is evident that restricted political competition, with its abuses and excesses, leads to party monopoly, because these abuses and excesses prevent political competition from functioning properly as a regulator of a community's affairs.

Therefore, believing that competition in Lincoln county is not fettered with the abuses noted above, and knowing that all of the present candidates are fully aware that real success in political activity is to be found in achievements comparable rather with those of the statesman or the scientist, of the inventor or the public servant, and are cognizant that the joy and rewards ought in the profession of political activity must be like their joys and rewards and not the mere vulgar satisfaction which is experienced in the acquisition of money, in the exercise of power, or in the frivolous pleasure of more winning, the undersigned withdraws his candidacy, and returns to his individual and cooperative endeavor to help Lincoln county, and to his practice of law.

I thought your readers would enjoy the editorial here, which came from the Las Cruces Sun News, Feb. 6:

**Is It Good Politics?**  
We don't know much about politics. We often wonder whether anyone else does.

We have never been able to understand political expediency and yet, apparently, the politicians do. But we are of the opinion that the American nation has now reached the point where they could answer that Republican question of four years ago with a resounding "Yes." This question, of course, was "Had enough?"

We believe America has had about enough. We are of the opinion the State of New Mexico has had enough or more than enough. But the thing that jumps out at us is the fact that the Republican party when it apparently has something in the palm of its hand doesn't know enough to close the hand.

We expect Gov. Edwin L. McPherson to be re-elected. We find a good many people including Democrats on the other side expecting the same thing. We found that a good many of our newspaper friends are anticipating that the Republican governor will be sent back for another term.

We believe that some other Republican state officials will be named in the coming election. We even believe if the right candidate file and run that perhaps some Republican county office holders will be named.

But what we can't understand is why the Republicans want to waste the golden opportunity which is theirs. We can't understand all the petty arguing and quarreling and fussing over who is going to run for what. We are particularly interested in sending a Republican senator to congress—a senator who has the respect of the members of congress and who knows national and international affairs.

They have the chance by putting the best qualified and strongest candidate they have in the field. They only have one man who is well versed in national and international affairs and who can have the respect of the members of the senate even if he will be a freshman senator. That man, of course, is Pat Hurley.

We have all the respect in the world for the other candidates. They may be fine men and they might make good senators but they haven't the qualifications of Pat Hurley. Everyone knows that.

And we can't keep from wondering if the Republican party isn't going to waste the golden opportunity it has to name a United States Senator by having too many file for the nomination and perhaps by this very action play into the hands of the Democrats and give the senatorial seat to them.

It isn't too late to do something about it, but there haven't been any indications anything will be done.

### Pueblo Books Musical Comedy

A talent-packed cast provides entertainment with a capital "E" in "The Strip," now showing at the Pueblo Theatre. Offering an exciting trip along Hollywood's Sunset Strip, the mile-and-a-half long stretch of Sunset Boulevard flanked by widely-known cafes, this unusual M-G-M offering unfolds a story highlighted by both drama and music. Mickey Rooney and Sally Forrest are the protagonists in the conflict between a young drummer and a girl aspiring to film fame.

Rooney is seen as Stan Maxton who, on his discharge from the army, plans to resume his career as a musician but "instead is persuaded to pick up easy money" by working for Sonny Johnson, a Los Angeles book-making racketeer. It is when he falls in love with Jane Tafford, a night club cigarette girl determined to crash Hollywood studios, that Stan finds himself in a tight spot. He introduces Jane to his boss because of the latter's studio connections only to find that he is losing his girl to the unscrupulous racketeer. How this dilemma is finally resolved in a shock climax makes for a story that is compelling dramatic and absorbing.

Since the action of "The Strip" takes place almost entirely against the background of the entertainment world, its musical sequences form a completely natural part of the story and afford an opportunity for Vic Damone to make an appearance at the Midcomb, singing "Don't Blame Me," and for Monica Lewis similarly to sing "La Bata" at Ciro's. 

### FARM POPULATION KEEPS DROPPING

Forty years ago, 35 per cent of the country's people were on farms, compared to only 18 per cent at the last census. Farm population was highest in history in 1910, numbering 32,500,000. Then war and business conditions encouraged migration from farms, except in depressed years. During World War I and the prosperous twenties, the number of farm folks declined steadily to 29,500,000 in 1930. The depression sent people back to the farm for a few years, bringing the count to 31,200,000 by 1935. Then the downward trend began again, first gradually, then rapidly as World War II came on. By 1951, there were 20,000,000 fewer farm people than in 1940.—N. M. Extension Service.
