Here are a couple of news items we received in the mail this week that might be of interest to you.

An application was filed April 7 with the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, by John A. Barnett, for a construction permit for a 110,000 watt television station to serve Roswell and most of Southeastern New Mexico.

In announcing plans for the station, it was stated that 110,000 watts is more than twice as powerful as any station now operating in the United States.

The steel tower for supporting the 12 section superturnstile antenna is to be erected east of Roswell on Comanche Hill.

In addition to the antenna on Comanche Hill the plans include a complete studio and programming building which will be designed especially for television broadcasting.

The Roswell station is expected to provide television reception over a large area. According to engineering data the entire Pecos Valley will enjoy satisfactory reception.

And here is the other news article: New Mexico is assured of a fitting national monument at Trinity, scene of the explosion of the first atomic bomb.

It is certain the very able job done by Rep. Bernard Boland will result in the passage of his bill to establish the national monument and the erection of adequate and appropriate structures on the Trinity site.

It was agreed that the "birthplace of the atom bomb" will be properly fenced and marked; that a glass-floored museum will be constructed so that visitors may look down at the glazed surface of the bomb blast and that other fitting exhibits will be placed in the museum.

COMMITTEES HARD AT WORK ON CC PROJECTS

Only a small attendance was noted at the general membership meeting of Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce Monday evening at the American Legion hall—but a great deal of work was reported on by several committees recently named by the civic body.

S. K. Kuykendall, treasurer, gave a financial report, noting the C. of C. has cash assets of \$1,010.21, including \$921.31 accounts receivable and pledges.

The majority have worked in their beds, wheel chairs or hobby shops in hospitals of the Veterans Administration, although many have been employed at special poppy workrooms maintained by the Auxiliary in several states.



ORDINANCE No. 61

An Ordinance to amend Section 15 of Article 8 of Ordinance No. 9 of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, and to repeal Ordinance No. 31 of said Village.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico:

That Section 15 of Article 8 of Ordinance No. 9 of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico be amended to read as follows:

Section 15. THAT IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL for any person, persons, firm or corporation to burn refuse or trash within the limits of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, without first having obtained permission for such burning from the proper authority of said Village.

All persons, firms or corporations so burning shall be held liable for any negligence connected with such burning and in the case of any fire so set by them and no fire shall be left unattended at any time.

Any person, persons, firm or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be fined in the sum of not less than \$5.00 or more than \$100.00 for each separate offense.

This Ordinance repeals for all purposes Ordinance No. 31 of the Village of Ruidoso.

**Bulletins Out
in Yucca Council
Scout Camp Here**

Bulletins were mailed last week to Scoutmasters of Boy Scout troops in the cities in the Yucca Council, the area around El Paso, during the summer camp season, planned on the eastern lap Sierra Blanca peak here. Some Scouts are expected to attend camp in three groups, starting on June 22 through July 12. Each boy will be \$13.50 a week.

Below is a copy of the bulletin which tells the Scoutmasters what their Scouts need to know about the camp:

RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO
CAMP "OLE" BALDY

The Yucca Council has long recognized the necessity of offering a camping opportunity to the Scouts of the Council and this opportunity is now available.

Through the courtesy of the

Department of the Interior, Indian Service, we have been granted permission to use the activities area within the Mescalero Indian reservation, at Ruidoso for three weeks of camping.

Through this opportunity we will be able to offer a little different type of camping experience than Tuff Moses, namely fly fishing and horseback riding. The Council will furnish the fly fishing equipment for practice and horses will be available, however, each individual Scout will have to pay the fee for this in addition to the camp fee.

The feeding will be a little different type than Tuff Moses, as we will serve cafeteria style from a portable kitchen, therefore each Scout will be expected to bring his own eating equipment, including plate, cup, cereal bowl, knife, fork and spoon.

This camp will be located in the heart of the Lincoln National forest in the White mountains and hikes to "Ole" Baldy and fishing trips, up the North and West forks will provide a real mountain camping experience.

Reservations will be limited to 120 Scouts for each period, on first come, first served basis. Reservations for \$2.00 per Scout must be turned in at the Yucca Council, 818 N. Main Building, two weeks in advance. Application form is attached and must accompany reservation.

An adult leader for each troop is a must. The Council cannot camp Scouts without leadership. If leader can't make arrangements to go with another troop before coming to camp.

PROGRAM

Tops in outdoor activity, hikes to "Ole" Baldy, nature hikes, fishing, archery, bait and fly casting, equipment furnished by Council for practice only, handicraft of all kinds, and if Scouts desire, horseback riding. (Scouts participate at their own expense).

Lots of good camp fires, fun and fellowship. This is a real outdoor Scouting camp.

WHAT TO BRING

Troop tents and equipment, plenty of warm bedding (4 blankets or more) ground cloth, troop first aid kit, 2 pair shoes, uniform (if you have one) 2 or 3 changes of clothes, towels and soap. Personal gear. Money for commissary which will be fully stocked.

WHAT NOT TO BRING

No guns of any kind or ammunition. No dogs. No knives larger than Scout knives.

Please Notice—All Scouts and Scouters who plan to fish who are 14 years or older must have a license. A non-resident has available a 10 day fishing permit which costs \$3.00. A season license for non-residents is \$5.00. All those who fish on the Reservation must have a permit from the Reservation which costs \$1.50. All Scouts under 14 years of age do not have to pay a license fee.

HOW TO GET THERE

Go from El Paso to Alamogordo and then to Ruidoso and drive through Ruidoso into the Mescalero Indian reservation and that's it.

**OLD STORE
AT LINCOLN

15 New Mexico Hospitals Built with Federal Aid

Santa Fe (Sp.)—Fifteen New Mexico hospitals have been completed or are now being built with federal aid at a total cost of more than \$4 million and a half million dollars, according to an article in the April issue of New Mexico Magazine on new hospital construction.

Written by Beatrice Chauvenet, director of the Division of Hospital Surveys and Construction of the New Mexico Department of Public Health, the article describes the hospital-building program which was initiated with the passage of the Hill-Burton bill to provide federal aid for new hospitals. Federal aid has totaled three and one-half millions.

The fifteen hospitals supply 768 beds and 179 bassinets.

In addition to the hospitals built with federal aid, New Mexico also has several new hospitals built by private sponsorship. These include the Espanola hospital, the AEC's medical center at Los Alamos, De Baca County Hospital, Fort Sumner, Colfax County Hospital, Springer.

"Despite all the building in the past five years, the population of New Mexico has been increasing so rapidly that the percentage of need remains about the same for general hospitals," Mrs. Chauvenet writes. "However, facilities are greatly improved and since the length of hospitalization has been cut down, beds are available for

more patients.

The hospital building program has made hospitals possible in some areas which have never before had such facilities, such as the Guadalupe County Hospital at Santa Rosa.

Hospitals that have been built with federal aid are: Lincoln County Memorial Hospital, Carrizozo; Gerald Chapman Memorial Hospital, Alamogordo; Hondo Valley Hospital, Ruidoso; Memorial General, Las Cruces; Las County Community, Hobbs; Roosevelt County, Pecos; St. Vincent's, Santa Fe; Tucuman General, Tucuman; Las Vegas Hospital, Las Vegas; Southwestern Presbyterian, Albuquerque; Clovis Memorial, Clovis; Eastern New Mexico, Melrose; Ebasan Memorial, Albuquerque; San Juan County, Farmington; Guadalupe County, Santa Rosa.
