142 People Get Old Age Pensions In Lincoln County

Santa Fe (Sp.)—Lincoln county has 142 persons on Department of Public Welfare rolls receiving old age assistance in the amount of \$6281 or an average of \$44.23 each, Alva A. Simpson, Jr., state director, said. The amount of the grant varies with the need of the particular individual. Officially old age begins at 65 in New Mexico. At that time a needy person becomes eligible for old age assistance through the Department of Public Welfare.

"Many inquiries reach the Department asking whether an individual is eligible for old age assistance," Simpson said, "and a resume of the regulations in this service is pertinent." Applicants must be 65 or over; one cannot be an inmate of an institution; must not own home property or an equity in such property in excess of \$4000, nor can he have transferred property in order to become eligible for old age assistance. He must not own unnecessary personal property in excess of \$150. There is no discrimination in old age assistance.

Money for old age assistance comes from federal and state governments. Federal funds account for three-fourths of the first \$20, and one-half of the balance paid up to \$50. New Mexico, which recently raised the maximum payment to \$60, now pays \$30 and the federal government \$30 of each \$60 check issued. State monies for this purpose come from license tax, tobacco, compensating use, severance and corporation franchise taxes.

Certification in New Mexico requires that the applicant must have been continuously in residence at least one year immediately prior to application. Further information can be obtained by contacting Mrs. Eileen O. Whittaker, court house, Carrizozo.

Board Simplifies Filing Method For Farmers

The Eleventh Regional Wage Stabilization Board, Denver, Colorado, has simplified the method of obtaining Board action concerning farmers who wish to file requests to make necessary wage increases. Dr. Edward J. Allen, WSB Chairman, says, "Agricultural employers in New Mexico, Colorado, Utah and Wyoming may petition the Board for authority to make wage increases by simply writing a letter to the Wage Stabilization Board in Denver." He adds that it is not necessary to fill out a form. Continuing the chairman says, "Prompt attention will be given to these letters and the Wage Board is aware that time is of great importance when crops are to be cultivated or harvested and sufficient help cannot be obtained at present wage rates."

Letters from farmers should contain the following information in order to obtain speedy action: Name and address of farm employer; location of farm, giving both state and county; type of farm (general, sugar beet, grain, cattle, truck crop, dairy, etc.); list of job titles or types of work for which adjustments are requested, showing for each job the number of employees, base rate paid for the same work during a comparable period in 1950, present rates of pay, proposed rates of pay and whether paid hourly, daily, weekly, monthly, yearly or by area, ton, lugs, etc. Letters must also specify if a house, room and board, etc., are furnished and the proposed changes, if any, a description of any bonus plan currently in effect or proposed to be instituted and reasons for requesting the proposed rates and when you want them to become effective.

It is emphasized by chairman Allen that under the WSB's general wage regulation 11, farm employers may pay 10 percent over their 1950 wages, 5 percent over their 1951 wages, or 95 cents an hour, whichever is higher, without Wage Board approval. It is not necessary for farmers to write a letter to the Board unless the increases they want to make exceed those permissible under the regulation affecting agricultural labor.

Grading Valley Apples to Bring Extra Profit

New Mexico apple growers are realizing the importance of grading and sizing their apples for greater profits to the grower, according to C. H. Keaton, associate extension economist in marketing at New Mexico A&M College.

According to Keaton, the latest group of apple growers in the state to "go in for" grading and sizing are the Hondo Valley farmers, who have recently formed a stock company, the White Mountain Fruit Growers Association. Burt Pingston, Hondo, is chairman of the association. Austin A. Albert, Lincoln County extension agent, assisted in forming the association.

After studying the advantages of grading and sizing apples, the association has purchased grading machinery which will be used to grade the 1952 crop of apples from the Hondo Valley. This will be the first crop from the Hondo Valley to be graded and sized on a large-scale plan, Keaton says.

The apples will be graded and sold according to U. S. grades and specifications. At present, the Hondo Valley growers are considering the construction of a packing shed at a convenient location in the valley, probably near Hondo. The older shed at Tinto may be used if a new shed is not erected this spring.
