Dear Vic:  
At long last we are located. I think have rented an old saloon building made of stone in 1852 (100 years old). This town of Murphys was quite active during the Gold Rush days. The population was about 20,000 at one time, and nearly \$100,000,000 worth of gold was taken from the area all together.

Mark Twain was raised here and this is the locale where he got his inspiration to write the book "The Jumping Frog of the Calaveras". Bret Hart his companion, shared much of Mark Twain's time, and Black Bard is said to have been their close companion.

Many tourists pass through Murphys the little village named after the Murphy brothers who did mining and ran a general store here. Several old buildings are still in use as well as the picturesque hotel. We are next door to a small but very interesting little museum. I am busy arranging the interior of my shop which will be known as the "Lode Art" gallery and gift shop. The rear half of our store will have a small mezzanine below a large north window and serve as a studio where I can paint and watch the store during the quieter hours. Below this will be storage space and to the side a work shop and service entrance. We do not expect to do great wonders as far as making a fortune is concerned but I can see the future of a comfortable living in store for us. At least that is our objective, beyond art and creative endeavors, of course.

The climate is wonderful and there is much to be seen of beauty and interest throughout this area.

**To Read or Not To Read**  
Dear Vic:  
The past few weeks has seen a wave of excitement sweep across this country (and I don't refer to politics). The release of a book on 30 September has prompted this clamor. A million copies (the largest of any initial printing) have been greedily snatched up by a hungry population.

You are right. It is a remarkable book to create so much enthusiasm--a literary masterpiece containing writings which are literally "out of this world." It tells a story as old as the universe itself; yet its message goes beyond the present throughout eternity. Thirty-two outstanding Biblical scholars worked fifteen years to produce the New Revised Standard Version of the Holy Bible. While retaining the majestic beauty of the King James Version, the Revised Standard Version is easier to read, easier to understand, and more accurate in content.

Yet neither this new version nor any other version will be of much value to you if you don't read it. Maybe you have had the idea that Bible reading was dull and "old-fashioned." Actually it contains some of the

most thrilling stories to be found anywhere. Let me suggest a few for you to try out: There is plenty of excitement in the stories of Ehad (Judges 3), Deborah (Judges 4), Gideon (Judges 7). You will be touched by the story of Jephthah and his daughter (Judges 11). There is high suspense in Elijah's contest with the prophets of Baal (1 Kings 18). For a beautiful love story read the Book of Ruth for romance read the Song of Solomon. If you like poetry there is nothing richer than the Psalms. You can find real, solid theology in Paul's letters. For a biography containing the greatest messages ever spoken by the greatest man who ever lived read one or all of the four Gospels--Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

Perhaps our biggest mistake in Bible reading is our failure to read enough at one time. A few isolated verses can sometimes leave you confused, while a few chapters can leave you greatly enriched. Try it out.



# WARRIORS REPEAT WIN OVER ROSWELL B SQUAD

The Ruidoso High school Warriors scored twice in the first quarter, once in the third quarter, and twice in the last, while spotting their opponents one touchdown in the fourth quarter, to defeat the Roswell High school B team, 32 to 6, here last Friday. Only one point less than they defeated, the Roswell team earlier this season, was the Warriors' record in their second encounter.

Ruidoso scored the first time they had possession of the ball, when they received the kickoff. The Warriors marched 80 yards in eight plays, to score, with Marion Gayden taking the ball over. Gayden converted on a carry over right tackle.

The second Ruidoso counter came when a punt from the Warriors was fumbled by Roswell, and recovered on the Roswell 20 yard line. In two plays the Warriors had moved to the 5 yard line, and quarterback Benny Gardenhire carried the ball around right end for the score. A pass went incomplete for the try-for-point.

After taking the kickoff Roswell was only able to get as far as the fifty, and then penalized to the 35, before the quarter ended.

The second quarter opened with a strong scoring threat by Roswell when Ed George passed to Wyman Akin, who was able to work his way to the Ruidoso 30. Roswell exchanged fumbles with Ruidoso, and then fumbled again to give the ball to the Warriors on their own 45.

Alan Skellet, reserve quarterback, went into the game and tossed a nice pass to Jimmy Barnes to the Roswell 20 yard line, but

to no avail, as the Warriors lost the ball later on downs on the Roswell 20.

Roswell, taking over on their own 20, threw a scare into the Ruidoso fans, when Floyd Hardiman rated 48 yards to the Ruidoso 32 yard stripe. The Roswell squad was unable to take advantage of the long gain, and lost the ball on a fourth down pass attempt, the Warriors working to the Roswell 46 before the half ended.

Ruidoso kicked off to open the second half, and then took over when Roswell was forced to punt. Billy Glascock returned the punt to the Ruidoso 35, and the Warriors began another touchdown march. The Warriors, after taking several penalties moved to the five yard line, where Benny Gardenhire tossed a pass to Dean Holman for the score. Holman was injured on the attempt for the extra point, which was no good, but he remained in the game.

Roswell taking the kick, began to show its passing strength, when they completed three passes to move the ball to the Ruidoso 40. A 15-yard penalty moved the ball to the Ruidoso 25, where Glen Westall intercepted a pass and raced all the way to the Roswell 32. Billy Glascock was injured and removed from the game on this play, but was able to return later. Westall's nice runback was nullified somewhat, when another 15-yard penalty was charged against the Warriors. In their eagerness to move out of a hole, the Warriors fumbled, and Roswell recovered. Two passes took the ball to the Roswell 45, before the quarter end-







# BEST APPLE SEASON YET DESCRIBES '52 HARVEST; TREE PRUNERS LAUDED

Up and down the Three valleys and over along Nogal creek a few apples can still be seen shining bright red and gold among the leaves that are turning their Indian Summer colors of amber and soft maroon in the mellow autumn sunshine.

This has been the best apple season in the history of Lincoln county. Through the courage, intelligence and unselfishness of our local apple growers, a great forward step has been taken in the establishment of the White Mountain Fruit Growers' association, and the building of a splendid modern apple grading and packing plant at Hondo.

Now is a good time to say a few words about a sort of forgotten man in the apple industry, the pruner. The pruner works during the winter after all the leaves have fallen from the trees, when the snow is whirling through the air and the north and blowing. He is the man who builds the strength into the tree for the years ahead, and puts the color, size and flavor into the fruit.

There are many good pruners in the county, but for the purpose of drawing the picture of this important worker, I think it best that we make a sketch of one of the outstanding pruners in the county. Everywhere you see a tree loaded

with a good crop of apples, you may be sure that an expert pruner has been at work. The pruner, like the doctor, engineer, or lawyer, must gain his power both through education and training, and also from a natural gift.

The man I have chosen to present as a typical tree man of Lincoln county is a son of a very distinguished and honored family of Lincoln county, Elfege Polaco.

Elfege is the grandson of Florencio Gonzalez, a leader in the early days of Lincoln county. Florencio was a highly educated gentleman, beloved of all the local community, who spoke six languages.

First of all, a pruner must be a man who loves trees. Elfege Polaco says, "The tree can not talk but, if you pay close attention, it will tell you which limbs must be cut, so that the tree will grow in size and in health and the fruit have its color, size and flavor. It is not enough just to prune so that a good crop of fruit will be on the trees this year. The main thing is to help the tree in its work—to look out for injuries to the tree, and protect it so that there will be enough strength left so that the tree can grow and be strong for ten, fifteen, and twenty years from now."

Elfege worked for six years under the late Cecil Crank, one of the best tree men in the entire nation during his lifetime.

## John Shaul Is Youngest Game Warden

(Editor's Note: New Mexico Magazine has been carrying a series of articles monthly on the game wardens of the state. A recent issue presented a picture of John Shaul of Capitlan, with the following article.)

In terms of service, John Shaul of Capitlan is the youngest district warden on the Game Department's roster, having received appointment just a little over a year ago. Shaul has seen two years' service with the Game Department as a trapper in the Big Horn wilderness country prior to his promotion to his present post.

Born near Scott's Bluff, Nebraska, 38 years ago, Shaul spent some time in Alabama and Florida as a youth before moving to Silver City in 1931. Later the family moved to Cliff, and Shaul considers that his home town.

After finishing school, he worked as foreman on a dude ranch in the Mogollons for some time—then entered Government employ as a hunter for the U. S. Geological

study and remember in pruning a tree, that it is therefore "natural" that a good pruner must have many talents and many different strong points in his character.

It is quite interesting to note that every good pruner is capable of doing many things well. To this rule Elfege Polaco is no exception. He is an expert mechanic, a talented musician and singer, a carpenter, a stock man, and a philosopher. He is humorous and a man who delights in "dichos" (wise proverbs of sayings). One of his favorite sayings is, "Dios tarda; pero no olvida." Which means, "God may be slow in his judgment; but He never forgets." His faith in this saying marks Elfege as a man of deep and abiding religious faith.

Elfege says that to the casual observer, the work of a pruner may look easy. But it is not. The man who has the interest of the tree and the orchardist at heart will study long and hard to find which limbs must be cut. One tree may not have the strength to stand severe pruning, and must be nursed along. While another tree may be vigorous and able to stand much cutting so that the fruit may have color, size, and flavor.

When you ask Elfege how he is able to tell what a tree needs in the way of care or pruning, his clear blue eyes will flash with kindness and he will say, "The tree has feelings like a person. It is trying to do its work for you. It must have water, care of the soil—and attention—it is the duty of the orchard man to give the tree every thing it needs."

Good pruning, Elfege points out, will help the orchard man to do a good job of spraying, and picking, and will make the crop of fruit a thing of beauty to those passing by on the highway.

Elfege is married and is the father of four beautiful children. He has an interest in the community, and is anxious and willing to do his part for the benefit of his home neighborhood in the way he knows best—the care of orchard trees.

We are more and more than glad to give his advice and his help to all who desire to learn from him in regard to the production of more and better fruit for the homes of America. Like all wise men, Mr. Polaco is learning every day. He is eager to exchange ideas with others interested in the care and protection of fruit and orchards, and in the study of all things which may make Lincoln county a better place in which to live. The people of Lincoln county are better off through the fact that Elfege Polaco is one of us.

Resigning his hunter's job in 1940, he turned to farming and ranching for a livelihood and he stayed with this until he accepted a trapper's job with the State Game Department in 1949. When Bill Humphries was transferred from Capitlan to Las Cruces, Shaul accepted the proffered post at Capitlan and has been there ever since.

The Capitlan region is, for the most part, mountainous terrain with ranches and mines dotting the hillsides and valleys. Towns are relatively small and the area generally is lightly populated.

The State Game Department has announced that the quail season this year will be from noon Dec. 12 through Dec. 23.

Bag limit will be eight birds per day or in possession and a total of 48 for the season.

The Department said the pheasant season will open at noon Nov. 28 and close at sunset Dec. 1, except in Grant, Young and Hidalgo counties. There the season will begin from noon Jan. 3 to sunset Jan. 5. Bag limit is two cock birds for the season.

Dates for the prairie chicken season have not been announced. The following counties will be open to Gambel and scaled Quail hunting: Grant, Luna, Hidalgo, Dona Ana, Otero, Sierra, Lincoln, Socorro, Catron, Valencia, Bernalillo, McKinley, San Juan, Sandoval, Rio Arriba, Santa Fe, Taos, Union, Guadalupe, that part of San Miguel east of Highway 84 and below the mesa rim east of Las Vegas and that part of Harding county below the mesa rim west of Ute Creek and that part of Quay north of Caprock.

No open season will be held on Mearns' or Bobwhite Quail.

The contest between Everett Grantham and Ed Mechem has been stuck like a broken record for weeks now on the Democratic charge that Republican Governor Mechem has upped the payroll cost about 20 per cent in the bureau of revenue and the highway department.

And that's absolutely correct. The bureau outlay for salaries was up 16 per cent for the first 18 months of the Mechem administration over the first 18 months of the previous Democratic administration. At some points it was as much as 29 per cent higher.

The highway department spending was up 20 per cent over the same 18 month period.

In the interest of giving the sap citizens the full picture it should be pointed out what other independent offices in the statehouse are spending. The Democrats certainly won't say anything about it, but the Republicans are perhaps modest to mention it, or may prefer not to have noticed it. The state auditor has the great advantage of all the state offices. The department spent 115% more salaries during the first half of his year than for the last half of 1950. The amount jumped from \$11,975 to \$25,710. There are compensating factors that account for much of the increase as there are in most other offices.

Next to Auditor Bob Castner's highest figure, is that of State School Superintendent Tom Wiley whose payroll is up 90 per cent above the figures of 1950. Reports filed by the superintendent with the secretary of state showing an advance in salary spending for a half a year from \$44,000 to \$83,000. State Treasurer Rich Grissom is spending 41 per cent more and that doesn't count an employee that is paid by the finance board. Attorney General Joe Martinez has held his advance down 16 per cent but he has had help from the finance board, the corporation commission and the land office in meeting some salary payments.

The corporation commission spending on salaries has soared from \$42,000 to \$83,000 for a half month period according to reports filed with the secretary of state. The advance is 73 per cent.

Perhaps normal is the 37 per cent increase in paying the salaries in the secretary of state's office. That payroll is up from \$9,005 for a six month period to \$12,189.

State Land Commissioner Guy Shepard held the line the best of all among the Democratic office holders. His advance for the first six months of this year over the same period two years ago was 22 per cent. The increase is much higher now, however, because most all of the 80-odd employees received substantial raises in June.

There's hardly an official in the statehouse who doesn't offer a stout excuse for the pay climb. The auditor, for instance, has taken on the new duty of writing highway department checks, and is also paying the salary of Blanche Lucero, brains of the auditor's office and assistant secretary of the state board of finance who earns better than \$900 a month.

The corporation commission is way up because of spending in its rate department and modernizing the office operation. Services have been extended in the education office to account for some of the 90 per cent advance.

But the big reason is inflation and the growth of the state, requiring more employees in many instances. All the officials' salaries were raised by the last legislature and the advances in the workers' salaries followed.

The bureau of revenue may be spending more than it should, but 16 per cent advance in salaries is at the very bottom of the pile. And the highway department's 20 per cent increase is below that of any of the offices conducted by elective officials.

# INDIAN TRIBES LIVED ALL ALONG RIO RUIDOSO; SOME USED IRRIGATION

Van Smith is known to have been the first Anglo-American to build a home in the settlement he

named Roswell in 1880. He was preceded by about 10 years by Juan Chavez, a sheep-herder who built a crude home along North Spring River.

Early as they were, they were merely followers of Indian tribes who settled around Roswell and in the Hondo, Berrendo and Ruidoso valleys long before the arrival of Coronado, the great Spanish explorer, in 1540.

Archaeologists have estimated the Pit House People, as they call the early Indians, lived in Roswell about 1400 A. D. in some areas much earlier.

What is now Roswell's busiest and most important sections was once an Indian encampment. A skeleton, pottery and numerous other Indian artifacts have been found on the site of the Roswell High school.

**Remains Excavated**  
On both sides of Rio Hondo, especially in the Bloom Mound, about 14 miles southwest of Roswell, ruins have been excavated in which were found skeletons and bones, pottery, fertile seed of squash, beans, and corn, balls of stone and quantities of arrow heads. Burned corn was probably left hurriedly when perhaps wandering tribes raided the scanty herds of Roswell's first farmers.

Fish hooks filed sharp from hard stone and other valuable articles used by the early Indians, were found in the Berrendo section northeast and northwest of Roswell and southeast, between Roswell and Artesia.

On the former Bonnell ranch at Glencoe a larger pueblo than the Bloom Mound having a series of rooms an altar, a fire pit, arrowheads and whole pottery was discovered and partially excavated in 1941.

Remains found near San Patricio,

are believed to have been of a prehistoric animal of the ice-age era. The huge bones might have been of the same kind of mammoth the bones of which were dug from a site near Blackwater draw between Portales and Clovis in 1936 by Dr. Edgar B. Howard, paleontologist of the Academy of Natural Science, Philadelphia, Pa.

**Javelin Points Found**  
Under a vertebra of the giant beast, partly exposed by erosion, a stone javelin point, such as used by prehistoric hunters, sharp as new after thousands of years lying under the soil. Under a shoulder blade was another, and a third stood upright between the shoulder blades. At the base of the tusk were javelin points made of bone and a stone scraper such as might have been used for fleshing the hide.

A more recent discovery by amateur paleontologists was a huge tooth of a prehistoric animal, nearly a half yard in length, found on a ranch near Roswell.

An ancient conduit near the former White Mountain Inn, Highway 70, is another proof of probably the same tribe's ingenuity and agricultural industry.

The conduit was formed through out hundreds of years by mineral deposits originally lying near the top of the hard water-soaked soil. It was undoubtedly dug with crude hand-made implements by the first American farmers of New Mexico for irrigation of their squash and corn crops.

**Ditch Visible**  
Although broken, missing in places, the ditch's plainly grooved along the top of the mineral deposit rock wall, from two to three feet high in places, running for

nearly half a mile from the mineral spring water supply. Another elevated stone ditch leads from the spring in an opposite direction. As the irrigation water ran in the conduit, the lime content formed the hard encrustation on the sides of the ditch, gradually building the wall by thick deposits of lime, magnesia, probably gypsum and other minerals from the spring water.

Analysis of the water by chemists showed that the wall was not built up by sedimentary accumulation, so probably would not be good for constant drinking or household use.

The Indians lived in what is believed to be the site of an aboriginal village halfway between the conduit and the highway, where fragments of their waterjugs and colorful pottery are found. There have been no burial grounds or secret burial caves found closer than Gran Quivira, about 5 miles northwest, which gives credence to the belief that the peaceful, industrious Indian farmers were spirited away by raiding enemy tribes.

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
