Blue grama may form almost pure stands or it may grow alongside side oats grama, block grama, hairy grams, western wheatgrass, gallets, sand dropseed, or others. It is widely adapted but seems to thrive best on rich medium textured soils; however, it does well on light and heavy sails up to 10,-000 feet. Blue grama has a hard stem and cures well on the ground. Incidentally, frost cured grass is not normally as nutritious as dry weather cured grass. This grass greens up fairly early in the Spring if the vigor, moisture, and temperature conditions are right. It also has been known to lay dormant for several seasons during periods of extreme drought, also dormancy may be brought on by excessive grazing.




