New March Composed In Ruidoso

John W. Campbell, 1951 graduate of Midwestern University and now a graduate student in the University of Tulsa, is the composer of a new march which has been recorded and is available for use in the March of Dimes campaign now getting under way.

Campbell, a native of Lawton, Okla., intends to win his master's degree in composition this year at Tulsa. He is a member of the university band and its assistant conductor. He also plays clarinet in the Tulsa Philharmonic Symphony.

Roger Fenn, director of the band at Tulsa University, declared Campbell's composition a good concert composition and shortly thereafter it was recorded by that band. Campbell then dedicated it to the March of Dimes, with an eight-line text of inscription worked out by himself and Mrs. Campbell. A generous portion of all proceeds of sales of the records will go to the March of Dimes fund, he said.

On Sunday morning, the day's activities will start with electronically-timed quarter mile acceleration trials. Following the trials, there will be a driver changing race, with two drivers for each car.

Other events will involve tossing bean bags from moving cars, brake ability tests, a block towing event which will be held on a wooden block through marked stripes on the ground in ever-tightening spirals, and a blindfolded obstacle run in which the driver is instructed by his navigator.

The lowest powered car in the Ruidoso events will be a Morris Minor of 39 horsepower. In addition to several Japsars, one of the latest modified 100-horsepower models is entered.

The most unusual car that will be seen is a special British Allard, built as a racing car with a 275 horsepower engine.

Soil Conservation Aid To Farmers In District Shows Growth In '52

Satisfactory progress was made in the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation District during 1952. Its leaders declare. At present 157 farms and ranches, comprising 574,957 acres, are being worked through conservation plans and 19 additional farmers and ranchers, whose lands contain 87,213 acres, have requested assistance.

The District tractor was kept busy almost constantly during the year, leveling land, building tanks, diversions and other conservation jobs. Other contractors also did considerable work along this line.

The range conservation program seems to be coming along nicely. This is a grazing system based on the available grass, not on number per section. There have been some favorable comments leaving the impression that "maybe those fellows have something."

Members of the board issued this statement: "We have cooperated with the State and National Associations of Soil Conservation Districts by our membership in those associations. We are also cooperating with the County Agent and a number of other agencies."

"We wish to thank the Soil Conservation Service for their technical assistance during the past year. Their assistance has materially aided us in carrying out a sound soil and water conservation program."

Mescalero Business Committee Lays Plans For Growth In 1953

The newly elected Business Committee of the Mescalero Indian Reservation organized last week and outlined policies and plans for Indian activities for the coming year.

Wendell Chino, college graduate and associate pastor of the Reform Church (Protestant), was elected chairman and is probably the youngest member ever to hold this office. He is 30 years of age.

Other members of the committee include Rufus Sage, John Allred, Christian Naiche, Richard Magooch, Wheeler Tlanthous, Samson Miller, Andrew Little, Henry Treps, and Lucian Posa, all of well-known pioneer families on the reservation.

Chino is the son of Sam Chino, now 97, who served for 40 years as chief of police on the reservation. Christian Naiche is grandson of the indomitable old Chief Cochise, of the early day conflicts in the Southwest.

One of their most important projects will be to press for final decision on their land claims against the government, involving millions of acres of their original lands in the Southwest, particularly New Mexico and West Texas. The com-

mittee points out that it was the custom of the government to compensate the Indians when their land was taken from them, but no such treaty was ever made with the Mescalero Apaches, and no compensation has ever been received.

Attorney R. T. Mobley of Alamogordo represents the Indians and filed their land suit in Washington, D. C., in 1945.

Under the Mescalero Tribal constitution adopted under the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934, the Business Committee, consisting of 10 members elected by the people, serves as the governing body of the tribe. They are charged with the preserving and obtaining best utilization of the tribal resources with the cooperation of the government officials, establishing new tribal enterprises and handling all phases of tribal self government, including enforcement of law and order. The tribe operates its own court, presided over by Indian judges. John Tee has been judge the past several years.

In their conferences this week the committee planned to improve their forest products utilization, build up their irrigation farming through better utilization of their water rights in Tularosa, three rivers and Nogal canyons with sible development of Marucha Springs, and agreed to study possibilities for development of iron ore and drilling tests for gas on the reservation. Having one of the largest cattle growing enterprises in the Southwest, the group also will study ways and means of improving their meat production.

Discussion of the government's proposed plan to withdraw supervision entirely from the Indian agencies has brought much comment, both pro and con, according to Chairman Chino. Many of the old timers, he said, are hesitant toward the idea, while most of the younger members of the tribe feel that the new plan would be successful.

Contrary to popular belief, the Indians do not receive an annuity from the government, and the Mescalero Apaches face the problem of making a living the same as any other citizen. Their livelihood comes from four principal sources: timber, livestock farming and wages, Chino points out.

Their approximately 400,000 acres of grazing land supports some 10,000 high grade Hereford cattle, of which 95 per cent are owned by the individual Indians in varying numbers. These individuals are banded together as the Mescalero Cattle Growers Association and elect their own board to direct their business. Daniel P. Young is manager for the Cattle Growers' group. Operation of the cattle business totals probably half of the individual income for the reservation.

As to farming there are about 4,000 acres of tillable land, divided into individual assignments and each assignment includes a four-room dwelling and necessary barns. The Indians are free to leave the reservation and may establish themselves elsewhere if they wish to do so. They may work for wages, both on and off the reservation.

BARBARA NELSON TO COMPETE FOR \$100 BOND

Barbara Nelson was selected by the Seniors and faculty of Mescalero High School to compete in a Good Citizen contest, sponsored by the Daughters of the American Revolution. Barbara will go to Carrizozo Feb. 21 to fill in a questionnaire. The winner will be selected on her dependability, service, leadership, and patriotism as judged from the answers to the questions. After taking the test, the judges will select the winner, who will be named the Good Citizen of New Mexico, and she will receive a \$100 U. S. savings bond.

The Mescalero reservation was established by executive order of President U. S. Grant on May 27, 1873. Subsequent executive orders in 1874 and 1875 altered the area and defined the boundary, fixing the gross area at 719 square miles or 460,563 acres. The executive orders specified that the reservation was for the Mescalero Apaches and such other Indians as the department may see fit to locate thereon. In 1913 approximately 200 members of the Chiricahua bands who had been held as military prisoners since the surrender of Geronimo in 1886, were moved from Ft. Sill, Okla., to the Mescalero Reservation.

The population today is close to 1,000, with standard of living and mode of dress comparable to the rural population in adjoining areas.

Abandoning the old boarding schools of former years, day schools were built some years ago but nowhere possible these are being combined with the Otero County public schools. Carrizozo Indians attend the schools at Ruidoso; at Mescalero, Indians and non-Indians attend the same school, and after completion of the elementary grades the Indian children may continue high school work in the Indian schools of Santa Fe and Albuquerque or attend local high schools at Tularosa, Alamogordo and Ruidoso.

Wendell Chino attended the schools at Mescalero and graduated from the Indian high school at Santa Fe. He attended Central College in Pella, Iowa, Cook Training School in Phoenix, Ariz., and received his degree from Western Theological Seminary in Holland, Mich., in 1951. He was the first Mescalero Apache to be ordained as a minister of the gospel.

branches or trunk—never leave unsightly stubs, which hinder healing of the wounds and serve as an entrance point for disease organisms.

If you have never done any pruning before, ask a qualified person to show you how. To prune a fruit tree or plant intelligently, you should know how it bears its fruit and also its habit of growth. For example, grapevines bear their fruit on new shoots coming from the previous season's wood. Therefore, prune out as much of the old wood as possible each year, leaving sufficient one-year wood to produce a crop.

The apple bears much of its fruit on short fruit spurs which are distributed up and down the main branches and upper trunk and at the ends of the one-year twigs. If you remove these fruit spurs and cut back the one-year twigs, you will destroy a lot of the fruit bearing wood. The peach bears its fruit directly on last season's growth and therefore may be pruned severely.



Aliens Are Warned To Submit Address Reports By Jan. 31

Joseph Minton, district director of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, El Paso, Texas, announced last Thursday that, under the provisions of Section 265 of the new Immigration and Nationality Act, all aliens, who are residents in the United States, as well as all aliens who are residing in the United States temporarily for a period in excess of 29 days, must file an Address Report during the period from January 1 through January 31, 1953, and each succeeding year thereafter.

The address report card (form 1-33) is available at all post offices as well as at all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. It must be properly filled out and returned to one of the aforementioned agencies.

All aliens, according to Minton, residing in the United States PERMANENTLY, must submit the address report card in addition to a change of address report which must be turned in on Form AR-11 within 10 days of such change of address. Aliens TEMPORARILY in the United States must submit, in addition to the report submitted in January of each year, Form AR-11 showing their current address, at the expiration of each 3 months period, regardless if there has been a change or not.
