ED BONNELL COUPLE DIES IN SHOOTING TRAGEDY

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bonnell were found shot to death in their ranch home eight miles west of Hono on U. S. Highway 70, 15 miles east of Ruidoso, at 4 p. m. Thursday of last week.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict that Mrs. Bonnell "came to her death by reason of gunshot wounds inflicted by a rifle in the hands of Ed Bonnell," her husband. The verdict in Mr. Bonnell's death was "gunshot wounds, self-inflicted."

C. D. Weems of Ruidoso, justice of the peace, conducted the inquest. Jurors were Frank and Grace Gomez, Fernin Pacheco, Mrs. Inez Pacheco, Roman Sanchez, Senovio Villacasa.

Location of the Bonnell ranch home is 50 yards off the road. There were two shots in the back of Mrs. Bonnell's head, one in the left shoulder blade. The shots were from a .44-40 (buffalo) rifle.

As state police reconstruct the story, Mr. Bonnell then fired two shots with the same rifle at himself, then used a .22 rifle and shot himself in the forehead.

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Investigators found no preparations had been made for the mid-day meal. Neighbors had seen the couple around 11 a. m. The bodies were discovered when Mrs. Sidney Bonnell, an aunt of Mr. Bonnell, called at the sheep and cattle ranch at 4 p. m.

Called to the home were Sheriff Glen Bradley, of Carrizozo, Lincoln County; Glenn V. Falster, Tinnie, A. B. Munsey, Green Tree, and Capt. E. A. Talaya, Alamogordo, all of the New Mexico Police.

Dr. Alfred B. McCall, who reconstructed the story, Bonnell had been dependent for some time, but the cause was not known. He had been "crippled up" in an auto accident about a year ago.

State police say there was some evidence of a struggle before the shootings occurred. Mrs. Bonnell's body was near an outside door, through which she apparently was trying to escape, and Bonnell's was in a bathroom.

Bonnell, the sheriff said, had sustained a broken neck in an auto accident about two years ago and had suffered spells of drowsiness since then and was under a doctor's care.

Among Bonnell's survivors are a sister, Mrs. Iko R. Brooke of Albuquerque, and a brother, Leo Bonnell of Santa Rita.

Two Truckers Die In Crash On Highway 70

Two truckers, employed by Transcon, met instant death at 5:30 a. m. Wednesday morning on U. S. Highway 70, at a spot halfway between Clayton Bennett's and Ruidoso Junction when the large diesel truck in which they were riding was in collision with another diesel truck, driven by Jerome M. Jung, 23, of Sioux City, Iowa.

Charges of involuntary manslaughter were filed against the latter following the wreck. His trailer and van, loaded with eggs, and leased by him from Klaus Pedersen of Sioux City, was enroute to Tucson and Tijuana, he said. He told investigators State Highway Patrolman A. B. Munsey he did not know what happened. His truck was across the line at the point of impact. The east-bound Transcon truck had almost left the highway to avoid the collision.

Jung escaped with only minor cuts and bruises. He was alone in the wreck were Lawrence V. Latham, 39, and James A. Whitaker, 35. Both were from Oklahoma City. The truck they were riding in was loaded with electrical goods. Both of the two men were taken to Oklahoma this week by Mullins-Hamilton Funeral Home of Alamogordo.

Mrs. Clayton Bennett and Mrs. Oscar W. Carroll almost saw the crash. Both were outdoors near the places of business where they work when they heard the crash and saw dust, smoke and debris fly. Mrs. Carroll said it sounded like an explosion.

Mechem stating: "We strongly endorse your plan and request for the State Department of Public Welfare to take over and operate Ft. Stanton Hospital. Advise if we may be of assistance in any way."

It was signed by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

Attendance, Betting Records Soar On Opening Week-End At Ruidoso Downs Here

New Mexico's 1953 Racing Season opened at Ruidoso Saturday with the largest crowd in opening day history. More than 3,000 people jammed the picturesque oval to watch a total of \$30,450 through the mutual windows, on a combined 12 race card of thoroughbreds and quarter horses. This eclipsed last year's opening day mutual by more than \$30,000, thereby establishing not only a record for opening day mutual handle, but for attendance as well.

This served only as a preview of things to come, for on Sunday over 3,000 people pushed their way in to the mountain resort race track to wager a total of \$103,070 on the 12 race card. Long shots were the rule instead of the exception as the favorites found the going rough. Payoffs varied from a short \$2.60 on the favored Super Charge, in the Futurity, to a round 100 on the Futurity, to a round 100 on the Futurity.

Sunday's form-players found the going a little easier as the payoffs varied from a short \$0.60 to a solid \$28.70 on the thoroughbred, Wisconsin Sec. Pari-mutuel handle for the opening week-end this year totaled \$185,526, as compared with \$130,972 last year on June 21-22. About 5,000 persons attended the opening week-end last year.

Two new electric odds boards, one located in the infield and another located beneath the stands, now mutual machines, electric totalizers and large improved facilities have not only increased the efficiency of the mutual plant but have also served to make the purchasing of mutual tickets quicker and easier. This has also served to hasten the posting of odds and prices on the mutual board.

Racing will continue at Ruidoso Downs on week-ends and holidays through Sept. 7th. Many features have been added to this year's condition book with two or more feature races being run each day. A Daily Double is again being offered on the first and second races with twelve races carded for each racing day. Since all of the box seats were sold before the racing season opened, a new season box seat plan has been established in the grandstand for the convenience of those who wish to arrive late at the track. It is believed by all who attended the opening two days that this will be the greatest season of them all for one of New Mexico's most picturesque race tracks.

Big Pregara Downs will present its fourth day of thoroughbred and quarter horse racing on Sunday, June 21, with the running of four added money races. Principal interest will be divided between a top thoroughbred race at six furlongs and an outstanding quarter horse race at 1 1/2 miles.

In the eighth race of the day at six furlongs, eight horses are scheduled to parade postward for a purse of \$300 plus 5% of mutual handle in the co-featured Miller High Lilo purse. Second half of this twin feature will be a quarter horse race at 330 yards. This race will also carry a purse of \$300 plus 5% of mutual handle and will give the quarter horse racing fans their first glimpse of Brigand, one of the top money winners of 1953. Along with the top weighted Brigand will be Stardeck F, winner of many good races in 1953, Grey Face, Al's Gallant Man and the balance of a full field of eight.

In the thoroughbred end of this twin bill at six furlongs, The Mede will rank as the odds on favorite. He is expected to receive most of his competition from one of last year's top sprinters, K C Katy.

The Nixon Bar purse at one mile and one furlong also scheduled for Sunday's racing card will give the route horse players a chance to select from a field of seven good thoroughbreds in a well balanced field. Top weighted and highly regarded in this race will be the R. G. Michelen entry of Riosavor, winner of three in 1953.

County Committee Formed to Study Acquiring Bonita

A permanent committee from three Lincoln County communities was formed last week to investigate the possibility of acquiring Southwestern Pacific's interest in the Bonita Dam water distribution system. Representatives from Carrizozo, Capitan and Ruidoso first met with the County Board of Commissioners in Carrizozo and after being given official sanction by the Board to work for the best interests of Lincoln County in the matter, convened to form a permanent organization. The following were in attendance: From Ruidoso—D. D. Swearingen and Fred Bonnell. Carrizozo—L. Z. Manire and Vernon Petty. (Fred English, the third committeeman from Carrizozo, was out of town on a business trip.) Capitan—S. E. Greisen and J. E. Harcrow.

At their meeting, in the district court room Monday afternoon, the committee elected Ben Greisen chairman. He, in turn, appointed Earl Harcrow secretary. The secretary was instructed to write the Southern Pacific Company advising them of the committee's formation, upon the recommendation of the Board of Commissioners.

All members of the committee have been appointed by the Village Councils of the three communities. Each community will have one vote. Ruidoso was asked to appoint a third committee member. Following a discussion of the present and future use of the water stored in Bonita Dam, the committee adjourned, the next meeting to be held at the call of the chairman.

Hold Annual C of C Banquet

Frank Phelps, manager of Cloy Chamber of Commerce, was principal speaker in the annual Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce banquet, held Tuesday night at Carrizozo Lodge. His remarks were sharp and to the point, and he cracked a few jokes and bits of humor. He said competition was the spark that made communities grow—and cited the case of one town that kept out competition of any sort—and never increased in size nor trade, slowly losing ground through the years. He said the Chamber of Commerce was the one organization through which the people built their town and urged support of its projected plans through membership.

Other highlights of the program included the presentation of a scroll by Mr. and Mrs. E. Carter for a 125x125 foot plot of ground in Carter's Park area to the Ruidoso State Bank, a bought for \$10,000, and which will be opened here sometime soon, through efforts of the chamber of commerce and a special committee. Kenneth Watt, newly elected president of the C. of C., and a member of the committee which worked on the bank project, accepted the plot on behalf of the C. of C. of Ruidoso.

Motion pictures made in color by Carmon Phillips of the Ruidoso area, including scenes in the Mesalero Apache reservation, air views of the resort country, the annual Ascencade tour, winter shots, etc., were screened at the conclusion of the meeting.

Bob Kaufman and Leroy Goch presented vocal and piano numbers. Invocation was by Rev. Frank Matthews, Methodist minister. Introduced by Carl DeBord, master of ceremonies, were Joe Evans, El Paso author and humorist; W. S. Campbell, Green Tree, recent winner of a car in a national contest and one of our out-of-town guests; Mr. and Mrs. Phelps, Clovis; Paul Scott, Artesia; Mrs. Lillian Bagwell and her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, Alamogordo; Mr. and Mrs. Lake Frazier, Mr. and Mrs. Townsend Hood and daughter, Mrs. Sparks, The Laselle and Woody Groves, all of Roswell.

During the dinner, a tape recording of the recent Mutual Broadcasting System's radio program, Queen for a Day, on which a queen was picked for a vacation trip to Ruidoso, was played for the crowd.

The meal was served in the Herb Greggerson's Copper Room at Carrizozo Lodge and prior to being seated the 100 persons viewed some of the relics and antiques on display in the Greggersons' museum.

VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO SETS \$10,000 BOND ELECTION FOR STREET WIDENING

The village trustees of Ruidoso this week ordered publication of a notice calling for an election of Wednesday, Aug. 12, to decide whether or not it would issue \$10,000 in general obligation bonds for the purposes of condemning and purchasing rights-of-way for a street widening project here, set up by the State Highway Department as Project SP PAS 235 commenced to hold the election on H. M. Graham, Zach Collier and Rudolph Thies, judges; Reynolds Jones and Mmes. Ruth Moore and R. K. Knox, clerks.

News of the County of Lincoln's part in assisting Ruidoso in the project was contained in this report by Paul Baker, Carrizozo newspaper, who met with the county commissioners last Monday in Carrizozo.

To assist the Village of Ruidoso in getting its street widening project started, the County Board of Commissioners voted to borrow \$10,000 from the State Highway Department and loan it to Ruidoso—with a provision attached. Ruidoso, in order to use the money, must first float a bond issue to insure repayment to the County.

Apaches Claim Prior Right To Land Around Ft. Stanton

Wendell Chino, president of the Mesalero Apache Indian tribal council, Monday declared his people hold prior claim to the land on which Ft. Stanton, U. S. Public Health stands, and that the tribe has taken steps to establish legality to that claim. The hospital and adjacent lands are being sought by the state of New Mexico, by the Navajo Indians, by private ranching interests, and by the Mesalero Apaches.

Chino last week telegraphed New Mexico lawmakers in Washington, also the secretary of the interior, the office of Indian affairs and other Indian officials asking that government control be kept of the Ft. Stanton hospital and until the Mesalero Apaches' position and claims can be heard. The telegram said that once the Mesalero agency headquarters were at Ft. Stanton and that the old Fort was within the boundaries of the Mesalero reservation as established by executive order Oct. 20, 1975.

Chino says several of the older men of the tribe can recall an agreement between the tribe and the government that when the hospital lands were taken out of the reservation that title to them would revert back to the Mesalero Apaches when and if the govern-




