Issue Bank Stock; Cashier Is Named

El Paso Man Named Cashier Of Institution

Certificates of stock were being issued this week here in Ruidoso. Bank as the time neared for starting construction of the building in Carter's Park, it was announced officially.

Also announced this week was the name of the cashier of the bank, an El Pasoan who is to move to Ruidoso to put the wheels in motion for opening the institution as soon as possible.

Construction of the bank building likely will start in two weeks, it was said following an air trip to Santa Fe where members of the board of directors, and the cashier, Robert H. Jones, conferred with state banking officials.

Jones is to move here within about a month. He is married and has two children, Randy, aged 7, and Jeff, aged 4. Jones has been cashier of the Southwest National Bank in El Paso since July 15, 1947, when that concern was organized.

His Naval service was as a chief storekeeper, dispersing. Two years of his four were served in the New Hebrides.

Going with Jones to Santa Fe Monday were Bank President Kenneth Wall, C. J. Eiland and Ralph Brown, directors. They are one of Brown Air Service's planes.

Jones purchased 15 shares of the stock in the bank, that amount having been reserved in the early organization period for whoever would be the executive officer.

Reese Resigns; Gazaway Named To School Board J. B. Gazaway of Green Tree has been appointed to fill the vacancy on the Ruidoso Municipal School Board created by the resignation of Emmett Reese.

Reese tendered his resignation at the regular school board meeting last Thursday evening. He has served as a member of the school board since 1949. He has been very active and gave much of his time to school affairs.

Shier Surprises Burglars At Work

H. H. Shier, operator of Prescription Pharmacy of Hollywood and Ruidoso, answered a call to fill a prescription for a customer about 10:30 Saturday night here, and surprised what he believes were a couple of burglars at work as he unlocked the front door of his establishment.

As he switched on lights in the store, he heard the back door alarm, then noticed considerable business papers from his desk and stock from his shelves scattered about the floor.

"Same old story," he commented. "They forced entry through the back door and used the same kind of tools they had before to pry into the narcotics cabinet."

It was the third time in three months stocks of narcotics had been stolen there. This time only a very small amount of drugs were taken, he said. They did not get any other merchandise.

Printing Plant Is Expanded To Full Capacity

The Ruidoso News, founded in 1946, is being printed in its entirety in Ruidoso this week for the first time. This forward step was made possible by the installation of considerable machinery by C. W. Miller, veteran newspaper mechanical worker, who is working under contract with the publishers, Mr. and Mrs. Vic Lamb, to produce the paper here.

Principal machinery Miller moved here included a large Huber newspaper press, which prints four pages at a time, and a Model 8 Linotype machine.

The Ruidoso News was first printed in the Las Cruces Citizen plant in Las Cruces when Lloyd P. and Ida Bloodworth established it in May seven years ago. It next was printed by the El Paso Printing Co. in El Paso, later in the shop of the Eddy County News in Carlsbad.

For the last two years the News has been printed in printing plants in Alamogordo, first in the shop of the Otero County Times, and then at the Alamogordo News. Such arrangements have been costly and time consuming, and on many occasions, very inconvenient for the publishers.

When Vic Lamb and Ben Vaughn purchased the News from the Bloodworths in November of 1951, they brought with them considerable equipment from Texas and added to that of the Ruidoso Printing Co. which they bought from Byron Autry, established a large commercial printing plant in connection with the News. Much of the equipment was for printing a newspaper, but it remained idle until recently when the additional machines were moved in by Miller.

He purchased the press in Fairbury, Illinois, and it was shipped to Alamogordo by rail, then brought here in two truck loads. It was moved in in pieces and had to be assembled from the ground up in the News' shop. The linotype was bought by Miller at Silver City, and was moved by truck to Ruidoso.

Miller, who had been employed in the Alamogordo News office for two years, has worked on numerous weekly and daily newspapers throughout the Southwest, including Oklahoma and New Mexico. He is married and he and his wife bought the Lowell Mountain residence near White Mountain Development Co. as their home when the pair decided to make Ruidoso their residence.

In June last year the Lamb's came sole owners of the News, buying the interest of Ben Vaughn. The changeover from printing a newspaper in one town, and then in another, is a tremendous task, and has kept all of the force busy for many days in preparation for the entire job of assembling the machinery, testing it and putting it in actual operation has taken more than three months, since all hands were busy with their usual work of producing the paper each week out of town and with handling the ordinary run of newspaper printing. Miller's printing of the Alamogordo News, ordered of the up until two weeks ago, came here on week-ends to help the Lamb's in putting the machine in running order.

It may be several weeks yet before all departments of the News' new-to-frontier efficiently, and until then, the staff is asking everyone's co-operation in bringing in news and advertising copy early. Deadline for advertising news will remain the same—Wednesday afternoon. Publication of the paper in Ruidoso, however, will enable the News' staff to observe later deadlines on any emergency news or "big stories," and will be a part of the extra service the community can expect in the future.

Still more machinery is needed to put the plant in top operating order, and will be added from time to time, the publishers have planned.

Legislative Council Prepares Digest Of Eleven Amendments To Be Voted On September 15

(Editor's Note: At the request of State Senator M. E. Morgan of Alamogordo the New Mexico Legislative Council prepared a digest of the eleven amendments to the state constitution on which citizens will ballot Sept. 15. The News will present the digest in a series of five articles.)

COMMENTS ON PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1
Time and Privilege of Voting at Bond Elections—Article 9, Section 12 of the Constitution pertains to municipal bond elections. The proposed amendment would change this Article in two ways: 1) The proposal would eliminate the requirement that the municipal bond

election be held during a regular election for city officers. In other words the specific requirement as to when the election can be held is removed. 2) At the present time only persons who have paid a property tax are eligible to vote in the bond election. The proposal would extend the voting privilege to veterans who have been exempt from payment of the property tax. One idea behind the amendment is to permit persons who have claimed their property tax exemption to vote in such municipal bond elections. Their present authority to do so is doubtful because the present requirement is that the voter must have paid a property tax and thus persons who have been exempt from payment might be excluded.

TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1
(Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Joint Resolution No. 8)

A JOINT RESOLUTION
Proposed to amend Article 9, Section 12 of the New Mexico Constitution, relating to municipal indebtedness and relating to qualifications for voters in any municipal election wherein municipal debts are incurred, and to eliminate the provisions thereof requiring that the election on the question of incurring indebtedness be held at a regular election for councilmen, aldermen or other officers of such city, town or village. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico: Section 1: It is hereby proposed to amend Article 9, Section 12 of

the New Mexico Constitution to read as follows: "No city, town or village shall contract any debt except by an ordinance, which shall be irrevocable until the indebtedness therein provided for shall have been paid or discharged, and which shall specify the purpose to which the funds to be raised shall be applied, and which shall provide for the levy of a tax, not exceeding twelve mills on the dollar upon all taxable property within such city, town or village, sufficient to pay the interest on, and to extinguish the principal of, such debt within fifty years. The proceeds of such tax shall be applied only for the payment of such interest and principal. No such debt shall be created unless the qualified electors of the same shall have been authorized to a vote of such qualified electors, thereof, as have paid a property tax therein during the preceding year and a majority of these voters, the question by ballot deposited in a separate ballot box, shall have voted in favor of creating such debt."

Section 2: The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election, or at any special election prior to that date, which may be called for such purpose.

COMMENTS ON PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2
Removing Prohibition of Sale of Liquor to Indians

Senate Joint Resolution No. 11 proposes to amend Article 11, Section 1 of the Constitution. That section as presently worded prohibits the sale of liquor to Indians. The proposed amendment would eliminate this prohibition. Two other sections of the Legislature are amendments to this proposal. One is a law which removes the prohibition of liquor to Indians. The effective date of this law is conditioned upon approval of this amendment. The other is a memorial to the Congress of the United States asking that amendment to the provisions of the Enabling Act for New Mexico which also prohibits the sale of liquor to Indians. The Enabling Act is the Act of Congress which set forth the conditions for the admission of New Mexico into the union as a state. Thus, only Congress can change that condition. When we adopted

our Constitution for New Mexico we included an article entitled "Compact with the United States" which repeated the conditions which Congress had laid down in the Enabling Act. It was in this compact that the prohibition against sale of liquor to Indians was written into our Constitution.

This legislature has taken action along three lines to remove the prohibition against consumption of liquor by Indians.

TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2
(Senate Joint Resolution No. 11)

A JOINT RESOLUTION
Proposing an amendment to Section 1, Article 21 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico in order to eliminate the provisions thereof prohibiting the sale, barter or giving of intoxicating liquors to Indians and the introduction of such liquors into Indian country.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico: Section 1: That Section 1, Article 21 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended to read as follows:

Religious toleration—Polygamy—Perfect toleration of religious sentiment shall be secured, and no inhabitant of this state shall ever be molested in person or property on account of his or her mode of religious worship. Polygamy or plural marriages and polygamous cohabitation are forever prohibited.

Section 2: In the event of the passage and approval of this resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next general election, or at any special election prior to that date, which may be called for such purpose.

The Durham-Humphrey Amendment To The Federal Food, Drug And Cosmetic Act As It Applies To Pharmacists

I have been asked to write on the Durham-Humphrey Amendment to the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act as it affects the pharmacist. The intent of this Amendment, as developed by testimony at Congressional Hearings, is to eliminate confusion in the labeling of drugs so that retail pharmacists will be able to tell immediately from the package whether or not a drug is one which requires a prescription.

This Amendment divides drugs into two general classes. The first consists of those drugs which cannot be dispensed without a prescription. Such drugs, when shipped in interstate commerce and until the time that they are dispensed, must bear the statement "CAUTION: Federal law prohibits dispensing without prescription."

The second general class of drugs includes those which may be dispensed over-the-counter without a prescription. The Durham-Humphrey Amendment requires that these drugs do not bear the "Caution" statement.

Drugs which must be dispensed on prescription only by this Amendment, are divided into three classes. The first class includes the following habit-forming drugs: opium, heroin, morphine, cocaine, barbiturates, and other substances which are habit-forming.

The second class of prescription-only drugs includes those which because of their toxicity or other potentiality for harmful effects, or the method of their use, or the collateral measures necessary to their use, are not safe for use except under the supervision of a practitioner licensed by law to administer such drugs. You will note that toxicity, per se, is not the sole criterion for determining whether a drug should bear the prescription legend. Some of the potent antibiotics are good examples of drugs which are relatively non-toxic but which are, in our opinion, prescription drugs under the legal definition. Potentialities for harmful effect from non-supervised use of penicillin arise because of improper dosage or failure to use necessary collateral measures in serious diseases; because of the possibility of the development of resistant strains; the possibility of sensitization to the drug that may prevent its use later on in an emergency situation; and the possibility of overgrowth of the non-susceptible organisms.

It is our position that these drugs include as unsafe in general, drugs for serious diseases which cannot be treated effectively by the layman.

The Durham-Humphrey Amendment also designates as prescription-only drugs "new" drugs which cannot legally be filled by another pharmacist so would have limited use to the customer.

4. Is it necessary to place the warning "WARNING—May be habit forming" on prescription packages?

This warning is not required on the Durham-Humphrey Amendment.

specifies under what circumstances such drugs may be dispensed. The original prescription may be written or oral by a practitioner licensed by law to administer such drug. If the drug is dispensed on an oral prescription of such a practitioner, it must be reduced promptly to writing and filed by the pharmacist. We believe that oral prescriptions, when reduced to writing by the pharmacist, should follow the standard form; that is, the date, serial number, name of the prescriber, name of the patient, names and amounts of drugs prescribed, and directions and cautions, if any, given by the prescriber. You will note, in particular, the requirement that the prescription be that of a practitioner licensed by law to administer such drug. If the prescription is either written or oral, it taken from anyone other than the prescriber, the pharmacist takes the responsibility for its authenticity.

Neither written or oral prescriptions may be refilled if the refilling is authorized by the prescriber either in the original prescription or by oral order, which is reduced promptly to writing, and filed by the pharmacist. Neither the law nor the regulations specify the precise form in which the refill authorization should be received. We do think it is important that the record be kept in such fashion that when a prescription is presented for refill, the pharmacist can readily look up the complete history of the prescription—particularly when it was filled or when it was last refilled. Prescriptions should not be refilled except on instructions of the physician himself or under his express authority. It is our opinion that a physician cannot delegate the authority for refills any more than he can delegate the authority for writing the original prescription.

Some of the questions with which pharmacists are commonly confronted are the following:

1. Legality of filling a prescribed drug, or an authorized refill, from one state to another.
2. Although there are no regulations dealing specifically with this question, and there have been no court cases interpreting the law in this regard, it should be obvious that we would not bring a case against a druggist for mailing a prescribed drug, or an authorized refill, to a patient who is on a vacation or is, otherwise, temporarily away from his home or his physician.
3. Refill instructions, such as "Refill as requested," "REFILL ad lib," and "Refill PRN."
4. Although we do not know the legal status of such an instruction on the original prescription, since no court cases have involved such a situation, we do know that this type of instruction lends itself readily to abuses. We, therefore, prefer a type of refill instruction that is more definite and self-limiting.
5. May a pharmacist give a copy of a prescription?
6. There is nothing in the Federal law to prohibit the giving of a copy of a prescription clearly marked as a copy. However, such a copy cannot legally be filled by another pharmacist so would have limited use to the customer.
7. Is it necessary to place the warning "WARNING—May be habit forming" on prescription packages?
8. This warning is not required on the Durham-Humphrey Amendment.

quests it in his written or oral prescription.

5. May a doctor prescribe barbiturates in large quantities?

The law places no limit on the amount of a barbiturate which a physician may prescribe. However, here is one of the situations where the professional judgment of the pharmacist should be employed. He should be certain that the physician did not make an error in the amount when it seems unreasonably large.

6. May a patient obtain a refill by saying that the physician authorized her to do so?

The answer to this question may appear obvious to most of you. However, it is one with which many pharmacists are confronted. The answer is no. The authorization must come from the physician and must be transmitted by him or someone acting under his expressed authority.

You may wonder why the Food and Drug Administration considers the Durham-Humphrey Amendment so important. The investigations of our inspectors show that the dispensing of habit-forming drugs, without a prescription and refills without authorization of the physician, are causing a sum total of more deaths, injuries, broken homes, human derelicts, and other tragedies than all the other violations of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act put together. During the past fiscal year, illegal sales of prescription drugs accounted for 80 per cent of the criminal actions alleging drug violations. The heaviest penalty was a two year prison sentence for a druggist convicted of supplying barbiturates to teenagers. For the first time in the drug control legislation, a physician was convicted of aiding and abetting a violator. He had furnished a druggist with signed blank prescriptions which the pharmacist used for sales of sulfathiazole and penicillin to persons seeking treatment for venereal diseases, but who were unknown to the physician.

Here in Colorado we have brought a number of criminal cases, based on the illegal dispensing of these dangerous drugs, and we are continuing to develop such cases at the present time. I will mention a few of them.

A teacher at one of the Denver Public Schools fainted in her classroom. Her physician telephoned our office to advise that this patient was obtaining refills from a certain pharmacist without authorization. Our investigation indicated not only unauthorized refills but the forging of a physician's name to a prescription. The Court, in this case, assessed a fine of \$1000.00 against the pharmacist.

2. In another case, we received a report to the effect that a barbiturate addict, who had died of a fall while under the influence of barbiturates, was friendly with the owner of a Denver pharmacy and obtained these drugs without prescriptions. Our investigation indicated that another drug addict died of barbiturate intoxication from drugs obtained from the same store without a prescription. The druggist in this case also applied the name of a physician to a prescription which was filled out in the store. In this case the store and the owner were each fined \$1000.00 by the Court, a total fine of \$2000.00.

3. The third case that I now recall was indicated with a report by a hospital patient who had taken an overdose of barbiturates. In this case the prescription was obtained from a friend and refilled by the patient. Our inspectors refilled the same prescription five times without authorization of the prescribing physician. In two cases the refills were for double the amount specified in the original prescription. The patient received 48 tablets in two days, whereas the person to whom the prescription was originally issued was to receive only three tablets daily.

6. In another case, a large number of refills were obtained without the physician's authorization. This case seemed more tragic than most of them due to the fact that the son and daughter felt that their mother would have been alive if the pharmacist had not illegally refilled the prescription.

At this time I wish to emphasize that we are not trying to harass the pharmacists. We have a real interest in your problems and a genuine desire to be helpful. Most druggists refuse to sell prescription drugs without authorization. The fringe operators are a decided reflection upon the pharmacy profession. However, we receive reports on those violations from hospitalized victims, pallid officers, social workers in "Sick Row" sections, coroners, physicians, hospitals, Venereal Disease Clinics, and others faced with problems caused by the availability of dangerous drugs to addicts and other persons incapable of using them properly.

Our inspectors, in developing cases, do not entrap the pharmacists. They appear to regular customers, without identifying themselves and without physician's authorization, and make purchases of drugs without prescriptions or by illegal refills.

Our cases are not based on one illegal sale or one illegal refill. They are based on many such cases of illegal dispensing of drugs in order to show that it is a practice of the pharmacy. After the evidence is gathered by our investigators, the violators are granted a hearing, at which time the violation is explained to them and they are granted an opportunity to present, informally, evidence as to why they should not be prosecuted. After this informal hearing, the case is transmitted to our administrative offices in Washington with our recommendation, as prosecution or otherwise, and the case is sent to the United States Attorney who presents it to the Court for decision.

The violations which we have encountered in Colorado recently appear to be caused by an unfortunate attitude of some pharmacists towards the law and the Durham-Humphrey Amendment. These pharmacists have apparently substituted their own judgment for the law itself. Their common response is to the effect that the inspector appeared to be a clean-cut person who would not commit suicide or otherwise make improper use of these dangerous drugs. They have overlooked the fact that many of the least suspected persons are the ones who are obtaining these drugs for just such purposes.

I sincerely hope that my comments will serve to impress upon you the need for a more strict adherence to the requirements of this law. I am confident that if you practice pharmacy in the way that you have been taught to practice it, you will encounter no difficulties with the Food and Drug Administration.



Stetson School To Be Used In 1953-54 School Term

In a statement to the Ruidoso News this week, J. Howard Morris, superintendent of schools, stated that present plans call for the use of Stetson school for the 1953-54 school term. Mr. Morris stated that the best interests of students concerned will be served by this change.

"All seventh grade students will be transported to Stetson under this temporary set-up. The same lunch room facilities that served the Stetson school when it was in operation are still intact and hot lunches will be prepared and served the students there this year. "Inadequate space in the Ruidoso Junior-Senior high school building necessitates the transfer of a part of this group of students to other quarters for the 1953-54 school term. The Stetson school building lends itself for this purpose better than any other facilities that are available. The seventh grade seems to be the logical group to be housed in the Stetson school. This by reason that there will be between fifty and sixty students in this grade. It is believed that the best interests of students concerned will be served by this change."
