VILLAGE BUYS TWO FARMS

Mayor Raymond Buckner this week confirmed the news that the Village of Ruidoso is buying a 15 acre farm from Mr. and Mrs. Joe Nelson, and about 13 acres of land from the Allen Beavers in the Ruidoso valley, and that the village is negotiating the purchase of still another small piece of acreage in that vicinity.

Purpose of buying the land is to secure additional water rights for the Rio Ruidoso, which may be transferred to the head of the stream through application to the state water engineer. Should the water rights be secured, it will give Ruidoso almost double the amount of water now allowed the city, Buckner said.

Ask Reservations For 1,000-Mile Tour By Ruidoso

Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce Tourist Development Committee announced a three-day good will trip, Oct. 5 through 7, covering 1,000 miles and 40 towns. The population of towns to be covered is estimated at over one million people.

Arrangements have been made with the New Mexico Transportation Co. for a chartered bus and driver for 30 passengers. The trip will carry men only. Herb Gregerson, Carl DeBord and Ogden Carroll are to contact the local businessmen and make reservations. Cost of rooms and transportation will be approximately \$25 per man. Friday morning the committee will call as it is necessary to get reservations in advance so that arrangements can be made in each town to meet with civic groups for meals, coffee stops, etc.

The group will leave Ruidoso Monday, Oct. 5 at 7 a. m. and will return to Ruidoso 10 p. m. Wednesday, Oct. 7.

Towns to be visited include: Roswell, Acoma, Elida, Portales, Clovis, in New Mexico; Farwell, Hereford, Canyon and Amarillo in Texas; Stanton, Midland, Spring, Ft. Stanton, Midland, From their Midland overnight stop, the route goes the final day on to Odessa, Monahans, Kermit, Dexter, then to Roswell and home that night.

Ruidoso Mayor Raymond Buckner said the latest word on availability of water from Lake Bonita was that although water might be sold, water rights would not be relinquished there by the big concern. "They won't need so much water now because they are retiring the steam locomotives and replacing them with diesels, but they also figure some day they'll need the water again when they use atomic power for their trains."

The first annual Lincoln County Achievement Day for the youth of the county will open at 8:30 a. m. Saturday of this week in the high school gymnasium in Captain.

Sponsored by the Captain Chamber of Commerce, with Ruidoso C. C. of C. aiding in some of the details, the event will draw entries from 4-H club members, Future Farmers of America chapter members and Boy and Girl Scouts.

All exhibits must be in place at the school gym before 9:30 a. m. Saturday morning and remain on display until 5 that afternoon. Handcraft articles must have been made during the last year.

Judging schedule for the day will be: Livestock from 9 a. m. until noon; home economics articles, from 9:30 until 12:30 noon; vegetables, from 10 a. m. until 11:30 a. m. and athletic events from 1:30 until 5 p. m.

One of the big crowd attractions will be the Turtle Derby to be held in the afternoon. There will be six races, with eight turtles in each race. Winners of the six races will run (7) in a final heat to determine the champion. Turtles are being sponsored by business firms and individuals of several Lincoln county towns. Sixty turtles are being sponsored by Ruidoso business people. Money derived from the turtle races will go to defray costs of the Achievement Day, said County Agent Ralph Dunlap, who was in Ruidoso Monday working on details of the junior county fair.

First of the turtle races will be held at 1:45 p. m., following the queen judging at 1. Awarding the showmanship trophies will be at 2:15 p. m., a greased pig race will be staged at about 3 p. m., and recognition of judges and officials of the event will be made at 3:45. Matched racing will be run at 4:15 to 4:45.

Bond music during the day will be by Hondo Valley High School Band, it is announced. Ruidoso, Hollywood, Green Tree and residents of all the communities of the three valleys, as well as all other parts of the county, are urged to turn out a big attendance for the event in which youngsters of the county will be displaying their work for the year. They deserve your support, as one Ruidosan said this week.

### Game Commission Sets Restrictions On Quail Hunting

There will be no open quail season this year in Otero, Lincoln, Terrence, San Miguel, Quay, Curry, Roosevelt, DeBaca, Guadalupe, Lea, Chaves and Eddy counties, the New Mexico department of game and fish has announced.

However, if later information obtained on the late quail hatches justify, any or all of these counties may be opened at the discretion of the State Game Warden.

The quail season in other counties will begin at 12:00 noon, December 5, and close December 30 at sunset.

Bag and possession limit is eight birds per day and shooting hours will be from 12:00 noon opening day to sunset and thereafter, from sunrise to sunset until the season closes.

This season is for sealed quail and Gambel's quail only. There will be no open season on Meadors or bobwhite quail. Shotguns larger than 10 gauge or capable of holding more than three shells in both magazine and chamber will not be permitted.

The game department has also set the migratory and upland game bird season to run from September 1 to October 12.

There will be no open season on White-winged doves, Inca, Mexican Ground doves or Band-tailed pigeons.

The season for taking ducks, geese, coots, rails and gallinules, including sora, will be continuous for 60 days. Opening at noon, October 31, 1933 and continuing until December 29. Bag and possession limit on ducks has been set at five per day and no more than ten in possession, except opening day, no more than five may be possessed.

Limit for geese is three per day. Migratory game birds, legally taken, can be held in storage for 90 days after the season closes.

No live decoys, bait or baited grounds, motor-driven boats and vehicles, or use of livestock as blinds can legally be used.





At the luncheon Sunday afternoon, Tommy Thompson of Carlsbad presided, ably backed up by Charley Johnson, of Roswell, lieutenant district governor, with the full back as District Governor, Merle H. Tucker, of Gallup, formerly of El Paso. It was my pleasure to shake hands again with the Rev. Bill Dando of Carlsbad, one of the

most beloved men among the Southwestern Kiwanians. It also was a distinct pleasure to listen to the superb singing of the Carlsbad Velvets, a really great quartet. I'm sorry I can't remember the names of all four of those singers, but "Ox" Jameson has been known to me for some years.
